600 Votes Polled in Saturday's Primary

For the race for Representative, P. Ratliff of this city defeated T. R. Odell of Throckmorton a majority of around 900 in the three counties of Haskell, Throckmorton and Baylor, which comprise the district. In Haskell county unofficial returns at all boxes give Ratliff 2338 to Odell's 1051.

In District Judge, Bruce W. Davis, present incumbent, defeated T. R. Odell of Throckmorton a majority of approximately 900 votes in the district, which is comprised of Haskell, Throckmorton and Baylor counties. In Haskell county the following returns were received: Davis, 2338; Odell, 1051.

In the race for Commissioner of Precinct No. 1, G. B. Tanner, now in his first term, received a vote of 3012 while his opponent, W. P. Wiant received 860 votes. In the race for Tax Assessor Milton Watson was re-elected, receiving a vote of 2285 while his opponent, Elgin Carothers, received 1286 votes. No other county and district offices were contested, the present officials being re-elected without opposition.

In the race for Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, J. S. Smith, a former Commissioner of this precinct, defeated his opponent, J. S. Simmons, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, defeated his opponent, Monroe Howard, for his second term.

In the race for Commissioner of Precinct No. 4 will provide the only contest for the second primary. C. Phillips present Commissioner received 235 votes; O. L. Darden, W. T. Morgan 105; and M. L. Phillips and Darden will receive each other for the office in the second primary.

In the race for Constable of Precinct No. 1, DeBar, now serving his first term, defeated J. H. Ivey for the office, DeBar receiving 630 votes, Ivey 491.

HASKELL'S WATER SUPPLY FREE FROM CONTAMINATION

The following statement regarding the analysis of Haskell's water supply is handed us by Water Commissioner Leo Southern, who has just received the report from the State Board of Health regarding the analysis of water samples from the city wells taken July 29th.

"We are in receipt of a report from the State Health Department at Austin giving the Bacteriological Analysis of water samples sent from all of our wells that have been in use this summer. These samples collected July 24, 1936, and the report shows no contamination. There has been no trace of typhoid at any time. We are treating the water as a matter of precaution and will continue to treat it at intervals so long as the private septic tanks are in use in the city.

FARMERS URGED TO BEGIN SELECTION OF EXHIBITION PRODUCTS

The farmers, 4-H Boys and Girls Clubs and Women's Home Demonstration Clubs of Haskell County are urged to commence to save the best of their crops and look forward to participation in your Fair this fall, Oct. 16-17-18 at Haskell. There will be no passes this year, everyone paying his way over to the manager and treasurer. However, committee members will have passes for those in charge of exhibit. Also livestock exhibitors who have two or more head entered will receive an exhibitors ticket.

ORGANIZATION FORMED TO DIRECT CO-OP CAMPAIGN IN HASKELL TERRITORY

Following a mass meeting of farmers and business men held at the courthouse in this city Friday night at which time the plan of the Texas Cotton Co-Operative Association was explained by Rev. H. B. Haterius of Stamford, an organization was formed to direct the co-operative marketing program in Haskell county to the end that every cotton grower in the county may become fully acquainted with the working of the plan. R. C. Couch, vice president of the Farmers State Bank, presided at the meeting Friday night, and stated that he thought the co-operative program was worthy of a trial at the hands of the farmers.

J. T. Bynum was named president of the Haskell county campaign organization; B. M. Gregory was selected vice-president and Earl Morgan, secretary-treasurer. A steering committee, composed of B. Walters, J. M. Radford, I. S. Grindstaff, B. Cox, J. F. Kennedy, Leo Southern, W. E. Johnson, Martin Arend and N. I. McCollum, was appointed to work with the officers in directing the campaign.

With the letting of contracts at Austin Wednesday for grading and drainage structures on Highway No. 30 between Haskell and the Jones county line, active work on the construction of Haskell county's permanent highway system provided for in the \$985,000 bond issue voted last December will likely be started within the next fifteen days.

The part of Highway 30 covered by the contracts awarded Wednesday include 14.3 miles of grading and drainage structures from Haskell to Jones county line, and the contract for the large structures was awarded to Ward & World, of Itasca, Texas, on a bid of \$47,623.12. Mackey & Hopper of Oklahoma City with a bid of \$48,998.78 were awarded contract for small structures.

It is understood that construction work under the contracts let Wednesday is to be started within the next few weeks, or as soon as contractors can get their equipment on the location, for which all right-of-way and survey work has been completed.

Contracts for grading and drainage structures on Highway No. 18 in Haskell county from the Jones county line through Sagerton to the Stonewall county line will probably be awarded today (Thursday).



S. J. R. No. 19
Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees

of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session.

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in

"Every morning the first thing I would do was to put two and a quarter pounds of coffee in a four-gallon pot, fill it two-thirds full of water until it boiled, and then add the rest of the water. As soon as the first four gallons of coffee began to go I started a second pot, and there was a pot of it on the stove every minute of the day. I used nine pounds of coffee a day—sixteen gallons—and I guess they would have drunk more if I'd had had time to make it for them.

Twice As Much Coffee

Byrd Expedition who will say that Mr. Tennant was its most important member. Beside being chief cook, he was the one and only cook for the forty-two adventurers whose main diversion on many days, was eating. For fourteen months he began his labors at 5 o'clock in the morning and stayed at the range until 8 at night. Nor did he confine his menus to simple, easily-prepared dishes. S. J. R. No. 19 Proposing a Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on November 4, 1930.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

The Legislature shall meet every two years as such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be sub-

mitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of the session.

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1930.

Displaced by Machines

Never in the history of modern industrial development has there been such a rapid increase in new machinery as in the years since the World War closed. This is the principal reason why the average mechanic is earning twice as much as he was when the war started, although his cost of living is only about 60 per cent more. In the long run the change benefits everyone.

But for the time being, new machinery means anxiety and sometimes tragedy. The man who is thrown out of a job because some machine will do in a minute the work that it has taken him five minutes to do by hand, can see no bright spot in the situation. The fact that in some far distant way more work will be made for someone by the change does not give comfort for the lack of a pay envelope. It is not surprising that labor has many fears of scientific progress.

The change is inevitable. When the wages of labor went up rapidly shortly after the war, manufacturers had to consider methods of keeping their labor costs down, or they could not continue. Goods at prices at which they could be sold. Introduction of much new machinery resulted, and it has kept on.

Now the problem is what to do with people who are displaced by the new machines. One of the principal difficulties is that so many of them know only how to do just one kind of work. It may be that the state needs more schools and classes to teach trades to adults who have been thrown out of work by machines.

If a man could go away to some near-by city and take a course of a few weeks in some class where he could learn a new trade, it might be a great help in finding work. The state needs to pay more attention to its jobless men and women, and see that everything possible is done to find jobs for them, and to fit them for new kinds of work.

Hot Weather

A large part of the American people are quite unhappy through summer's hot weather. They groan and grumble when the thermometer reaches the higher altitudes, and wish they could spend the entire summer in some cool resort where no torrid heats could ever touch them.

If they had that privilege, they might not come out a bit better at the end of the year. Alternations between heat and cold seem a natural thing. The regions of the earth that have had these variations have produced most of the peoples that have ruled the world.

Much of the prosperity of our country is due to the warm sunlight that ripens our crops, and which makes us the world's leading agricultural country. So let us be philosophical on hot days, take things a bit easy, and don't try to do too much in the hot sun. We shall then come through the summer the stronger for all the out door life it gives us.
