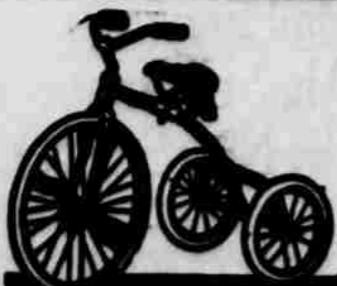

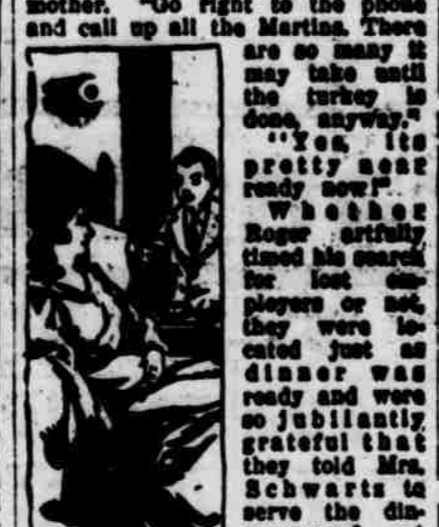
"But, darling, did you tell her I was sick, and that our maid had to go home for a funeral?"

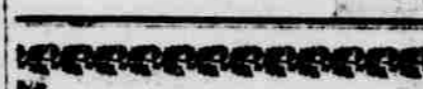
