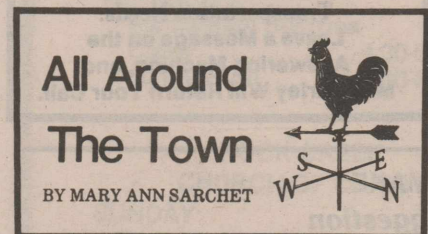
This year's rodeo is set for Friday, May 15, at 7:00 p.m. at Wood Memorial Arena.

Parents are reminded to keep the kids out of the arena when they are not entered in that event to avoid confusion for the younger ones.

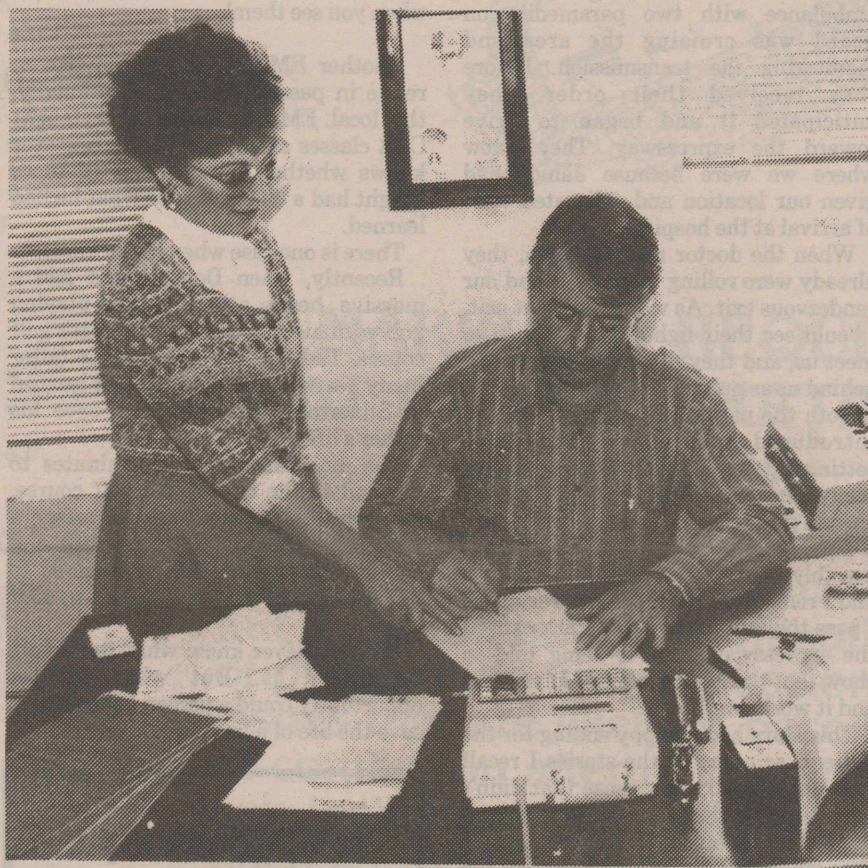

While you are there, ambulance personnel will be available to check blood pressure and assist anyone needing help in filling out their 911 emergency cards. If you have not received a 911 emergency card, there will be plenty available there. This will be a good time to ask any questions you may have regarding the appropriate use of the Emergency Medical System and how the 911 system can benefit individuals.

The ambulance service wants to use this time to recruit any interested individuals to sign up for the upcoming Emergency Medical Technician class, which will begin as soon as enough interest is shown.

The Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service also would like to take this opportunity to say THANK YOU! to all the employers of the EMS personnel, for letting their employees take time from work to respond to the emergency calls. At time it can be very inconvenient to have an employee leave his or her place of work, but it is believed the service is one of necessity.

experiences demonstrates the way the system is supposed to work. On a run with a patient with a head injury, I was driving the unit and we had no paramedic on board. It didn't take long

for us to realize that we needed a paramedic badly to start an IV for the patient.

The EMT's job is to "paint" such an accurate "picture" of the patient's condition with correct terminology and vital signs that the attending physician at the emergency room recognizes the patient's needs. The EMT doesn't ask for a paramedic to be sent; the doctor orders it.

On this particular day, as we were nearing Canyon and EMT Janice Hill was having the conversation with the emergency room doctor, a Canyon ambulance with two paramedics on board was cruising the area and monitoring the transmission. Before they received their order, they anticipated it and began to drive toward the expressway. They knew where we were because Janice had given our location and estimated time of arrival at the hospital.

When the doctor radioed them, they already were rolling toward us, and our rendezvous exit. As we neared that exit, I could see their lights as they sped to meet us, and they drove up and parked behind us as quickly as I stopped.

Both the paramedics came on board, introduced themselves, and after setting up the IV and getting things ready, one of them got back in his unit, and we proceeded on toward Amarillo.

The telling of this incident can't possibly convey the thrill that I felt, and I remember the incident every time I pass the Palo Duro State Park exit on the expressway. This is being told to show that the EMS system really works and it works well!

This story had a happy ending for the patient, as many of the stories I recall did. But I recall, also, those that didn't have happy endings for the patient and the family involved. There was never a time when the doctors and nurses at the hospital were unable to bring back the patient that I didn't feel that everything possible had been done that could have been done to preserve his life.

I recall tearful experiences and moments of prayer with some of the families, all of whom were dear to the ambulance crews because in a little town everyone knows everyone else so well.

The EMS system really does work. The men and women in the EMS deserve your respect and support. They are doing a very hard job well. Don't forget to give them a big thank-you

Another EMS story I would like to relate in passing is this. Occasionally, the local EMS members have taught CPR classes at the school. No one ever knows whether or when any of those taught had a chance to use what he had learned.

There is one case when we do know. Recently, when Don Cornett had a massive heart attack while playing golf with his son, Tad, at Dimmitt's golf course, Tad had the opportunity (after many years) to use what he had learned in Silverton High School to save his father's life.

The ambulance took 22 minutes to respond to the call at the golf course, and while Tad was assisted (after a while) in giving CPR by a nurse and another trained in CPR, it seemed to him like a long time that he had to do it alone.

We just never know what the future holds for us. But what greater opportunity could a person have than to save the life of a loved one?

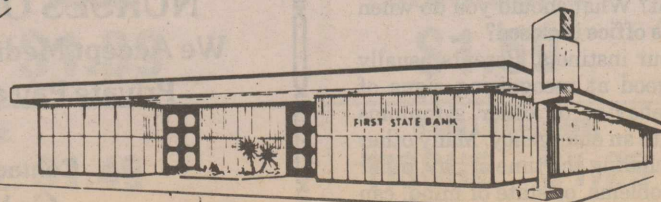

High Plains cotton producers had their thoughts about current Texas Seed laws voiced in Austin Tuesday, May 12. Wayne Huffaker, president of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, traveled to Austin to present those thoughts to a legislative sub-committee looking into the issue. The committee's purpose was to determine if anything needs to be done regarding seed laws during the next legislative session.

The PCG statement will include a call to maintain the farmers' right to catch planting seed. PCG also urges that any changes made to current seed laws be ones that provide a framework encouraging development of new varieties within the state.

"We feel that most of the problems associated with current seed laws can be overcome," notes Huffaker. "What we need to do now is work to achieve that goal."

Huffaker adds that one way to solve current problems could be the development of a royalty program that allows seed companies to offset the enormous investment necessary to develop a new variety. "High Plains producers understand that it takes money and commitment to develop a new cotton variety. This understanding comes from initiating the Plains Cotton Improvement Program that is helping develop new cotton varieties suited to the High Plains."

Huffaker's comments primarily focused on the importance of farmer-caught seed on the High Plains. Seedling disease and weather often cause producers to replant a significant amount of cotton acres every year. To overcome these obstacles producers use some of the highest seeding rates in the Cotton Belt.

Averaging 17 to 20 pounds per acre, High Plains producers have been known to plant as much as 30 pounds of seed per acre trying to get a good stand of cotton. Even if they do get a good stand the first time there is still a reasonable chance that at least some of that cotton will need replanting.

Growing cotton on the High Plains means two very important criteria have to be met. Both of them relate directly to the amount of planting seed used by High Plains producers. First, the amount of seed planted means it must be at a reasonable cost per acre. Producers frequently have to absorb this cost two or three times on part of

their cotton acres each year. The second is the assurance that there will actually be enough seed to plant as many times as necessary to establish the crop.

Recognizing Emergencies

How do you tell the difference between a true emergency and a minor problem? Certain symptoms are so alarming that the need for emergency care—or even an ambulance—is obvious. But what should you do about more common illnesses and injuries?

Only a doctor can diagnose medical problems. But, you can protect your family's health by learning to recognize certain symptoms.

Know which symptoms to watch for. According to the American College of Emergency Physicians, the following are warning signs of a medical emergency:

- Difficulty breathing, shortness of breath
- Chest or upper abdominal pain or pressure
- Fainting
- Sudden dizziness, weakness or change in vision
- Change in mental status (such as unusual behavior, confusion, difficulty arousing)
- Sudden, severe pain anywhere in the body
- Bleeding that won't stop
- Severe or persistent vomiting
- Coughing up or vomiting blood
- Suicidal or homicidal feelings

You also should be familiar with the symptoms of common illnesses and injuries.

Talk to your regular doctor before you have an emergency. Ask what you should do if you think someone in your family needs emergency care. Should you call the doctor's office first? Should you go straight to the emergency department? What should you do when the doctor's office is closed?

Trust your instincts. Parents usually are very good at recognizing signs of unusual behavior or other symptoms that indicate an emergency. Many other factors, including the time of day, other medical problems, or state of mind, can make an otherwise minor medical problem an "emergency".

April Weather Was Wetter, Warmer Than Normal on South Plains

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of April 1992 was slightly warmer and wetter than usual.

Temperatures averaged 0.9 degree above normal and ranged from 3.2 degrees above normal at Hereford to 1.5 degrees below normal at Spur. Silverton's average temperature was 58.8 degrees, a little below the South Plains average of 60.5 degrees.

Maximum temperatures averaged 0.2 degree below normal and ranged from 3.0 degrees above normal at Hereford to 3.5 degrees below normal at Spur. The highest temperature reported during the month was 99 at Big Spring on the 29th. Silverton's average maximum temperature for the month was 73.3 degrees, and the highest temperature recorded here was 86 on the 24th.

Minimum temperatures averaged 2.0 degrees above normal and ranged from 3.4 degrees above normal at Hereford to 0.5 degree above normal at Jayton, Lamesa and Spur. The lowest reported temperature of the month was 30 degrees at Dimmitt and Tulia on the morning of the 3rd. Silverton's minimum temperatures averaged 44.2 degrees, and the lowest temperature recorded here during the month was 31 on the 3rd and 4th.

Precipitation was scattered throughout the first three weeks of the month and averaged 0.46 inch above normal. The area range was from 2.36 inches above normal at Plainview to 0.53 inch below normal at Snyder. Silverton received 1.55 inches of moisture during the month, which is below the South Plains average of 1.67 inches, but is above the 1.49 inches that normally falls here during April.

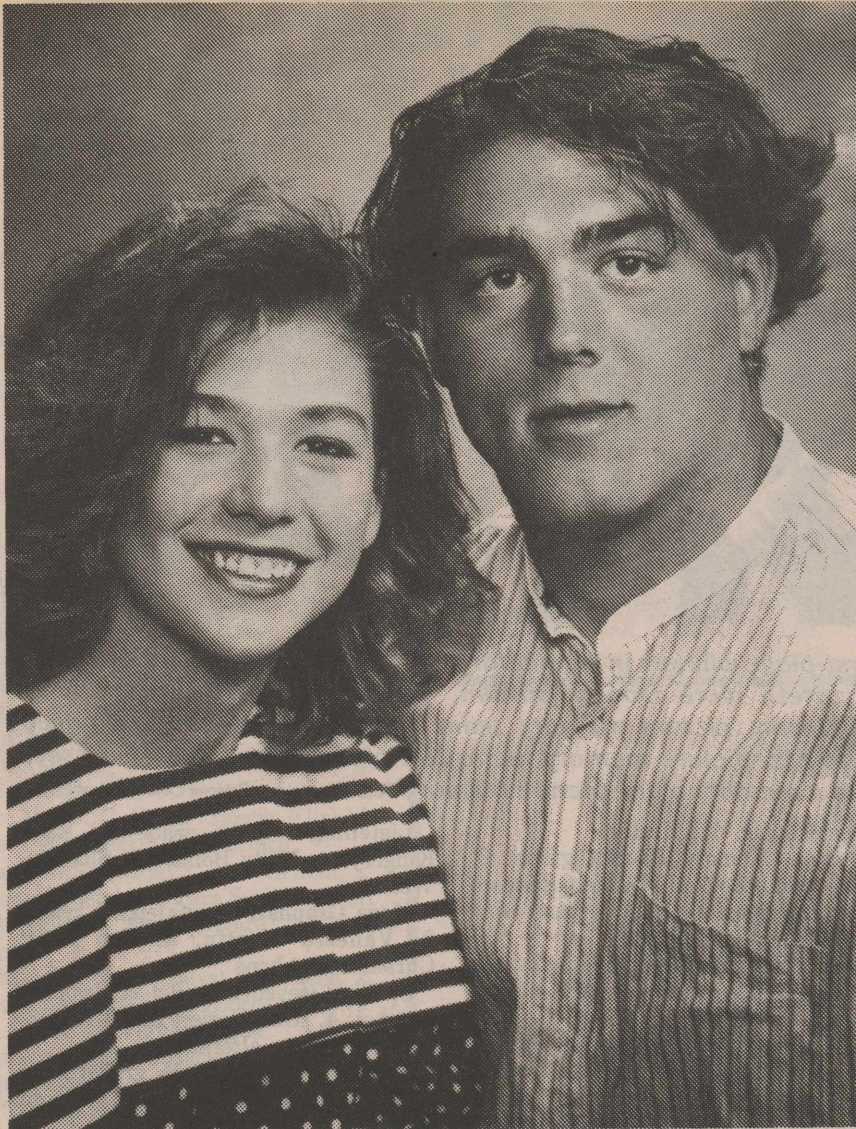

Why is EMS Week Important to Citizens?

National Emergency Medical Services Week, May 10-16, 1992, is an opportunity to generate public understanding and support of EMS as a vital public service.

In the past decade, emergency department visits in some communities increased as much as 104%, according to the American Hospital Association. During the same period, one out of seven rural hospitals ceased operation. In addition, about 60 designated trauma centers have closed since 1986, based on a report issued by the General Accounting Office.

Clearly, patient demand for emergency services continues to increase dramatically. At the same time, there are fewer resources to care for these patients. Shortages of appropriately qualified emergency providers affect EMS both in the hospital and prehospital settings. Hospital and emergency department overcrowding is a problem in nearly every community, often leading to ambulance diversion, long waits for patients with minor emergencies, etc. Recession-driven budget cuts at the state and local level threaten to further reduce life-saving emergency medical resources.

Governor Proclaims EMS Week in Texas

To help Texas citizens to know what to do in a medical emergency and to recognize the lifesaving efforts of emergency medical services personnel, Governor Ann Richards has proclaimed May 10 through 16, 1992 as Texas Emergency Medical Services Week.

"Almost everyone has witnessed an emergency at some time," said James Edwards, Silverton EMS director, "but not everyone knows what to do." Everyone needs to know that if they witness an automobile crash, the injured victims should be left in the vehicle until EMS arrives unless the danger of fire or an explosion exists.

"We are trained to remove victims from car crashes without further injury to an injured neck or spine," Edwards said. Also, said Edwards, if you stop at a motor vehicle crash, do not park your vehicle directly behind the wrecked vehicles, but pull in front of the crash site and park approximately 50 yards ahead.

Besides responding to calls for prehospital emergency medical care, the EMTs and paramedics of Silverton EMS play an important role in educating the community about preventing injuries.

"National Safety Council statistics show that nearly 50,000 people die in motor vehicle crashes every year," Edwards said. Each year in Texas, trauma is a major cause of death and disability, especially for young Texans. The 1,330 emergency medical service

departments in Texas answer more than one million calls every year for trauma and other injury and medical emergencies. Emergency medical services specialists work to insure that citizens receive prompt and appropriate care whenever and wherever it is needed. Thousands of lives have been saved with prehospital medical assistance and with the prevention messages taught by local emergency medical services.

"We can thank the 41,000 emergency medical services personnel in Texas for reminding citizens about the dangers of drinking and driving, about the importance of wearing safety restraints, about putting children in safety seats, and about being alert to

pedestrians and bicyclists. Emergency medical services personnel also teach citizen CPR courses and first responder medical care courses to help citizens know what to do in a medical emergency," Edwards continued.

It is important that the citizens of Texas know about the emergency medical services and to learn more about what to do in a medical emergency and who to call, Governor Richards said in making her proclamation. "All citizens can benefit from learning how to prevent emergencies from happening."

"Therefore, I, Ann W. Richards, Governor of Texas, do hereby designate May 10-16, 1992 as Texas Emergency Medical Services Week and urge all

citizens to become aware of safe and healthy habits, Mrs. Richards said.

"During EMS Week, Silverton EMS is joining with Texas Department of Health to urge people to prevent accidents on our roads, in our homes, at play and at work. "If one family learns to take precautions to prevent, for instance, accidental poisoning, because of what we say during EMS Week," Edwards said, "then we will have done our job."



The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

For an informal review, contact the Appraisal District staff at the courthouse or call 823-2161.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the Appraisal District staff, you may have your case heard by the Appraisal Review Board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive a written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the Appraisal District office at the courthouse or write Briscoe C.A.D., Box 728, Silverton, TX 79257. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the Appraisal District has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more,

you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the Appraisal Review Board approves records for the year. Contact your Appraisal District for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the Appraisal District informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the Appraisal District or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

When should you call an ambulance instead of driving to the emergency department? Ask yourself the following questions:

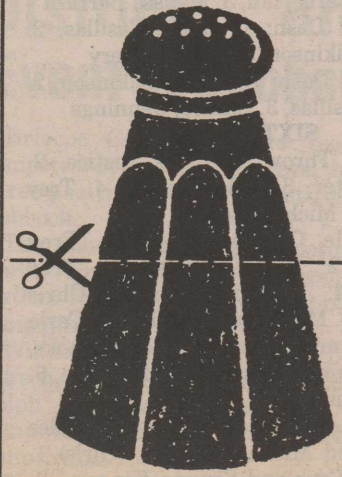
- Is the victim's condition life-threatening?
- Could the victim's condition worsen and become life-threatening on the way to the hospital?
- Could moving the victim cause further injury?
- Does the victim need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?
- Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting the victim to the hospital?

If the answer to any of these questions is "yes", or if you are unsure, it's best to call an ambulance. This is true even though you can sometimes get to the hospital faster by driving than by calling an ambulance. Paramedics and emergency medical technicians communicate with the physician in the emergency department by radio. They are trained to begin medical treatment on the way to the hospital. This prevents any delay that could occur if the patient is driven to the emergency department. The ambulance also can alert the emergency department of the patient's condition in advance.

If you live in a community with a single emergency number, calling for help is easy. Just dial 911. When you call for help, speak calmly and clearly. Give your name, the address, phone number, location of victim (such as upstairs in the bedroom), and nature of the problem. Don't hang up until the dispatcher tells you to. They may need additional information or need to give you instructions.

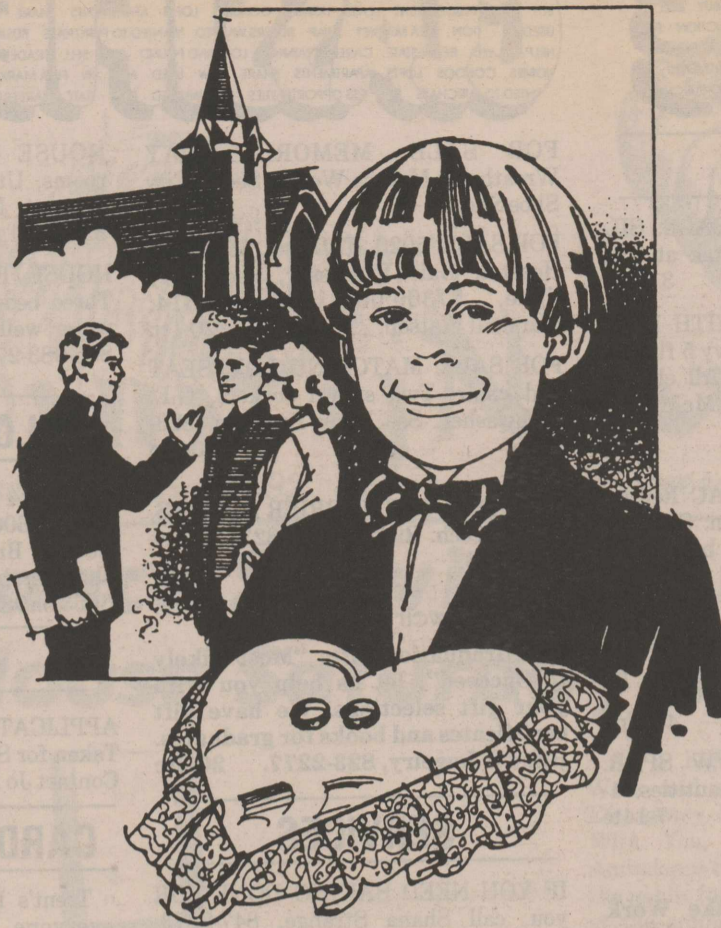

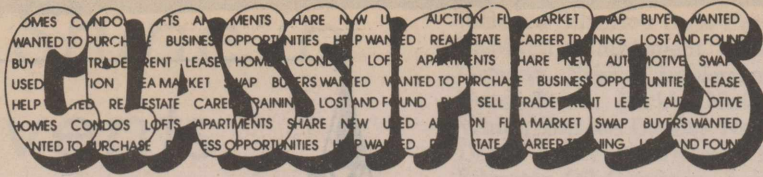
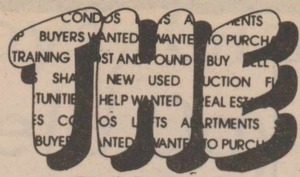


A MARRIAGE REQUIRES A LOT OF PREPARATION TO SUCCEED

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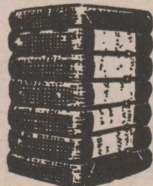
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
