

Double Mountain Baptist Evangelism Conference

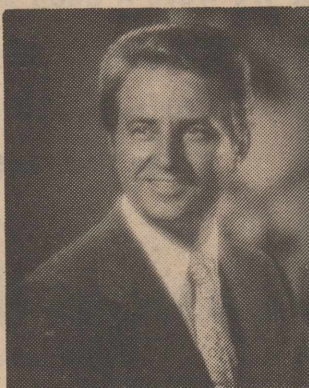
"Let Christ's Freedom Ring" is the theme of the Evangelism Conference sponsored by Southern Baptist Churches in the Double Mountain Area. The conference will be held at First Baptist Church, Haskell, on Monday, January 26, with the afternoon session beginning at 2 o'clock and the evening at 7 o'clock.

Dr. James Draper, Jr., pastor of First Baptist Church, Euless will be the principle speaker at both sessions.

Draper was born in Hartford, Arkansas on Oct. 10, 1935. He attended Milby High School in Houston; Baylor University, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth. He has pastored in the following churches: Steep Hollow Baptist Church, Bryan; Iredell Baptist Church, Iredell; Temple Baptist Church, Tyler; University Park Baptist Church, San Antonio; Red Bridge Baptist Church, Kansas City, Mo.; First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, Okla.; Associate Pastor and Director of Church Staff at First Baptist Church, Dallas.

Draper has conducted more than 120 revivals in over 15 states. Served on Executive Committee and Prayer Chairman of Billy Graham, "Heart of America" Crusade and produced and directed a daily radio broadcast during the final six weeks of the Crusade preparation on radio in Kansas City.

He has written for the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention; served as main speaker for Youth Week at Glorieta; preaches in six to eight State Conventions, conferences,

and assemblies each year. Preached at the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami, Fla. 1975.

He has received several honors such as the Doctor of Divinity Degree from Howland Payne College; serves on the Board of Trustees at Baylor University and Baylor Medical Center and is trustee on the Annuity Board.

Draper has written, "The Church Christ Approves," which was published by Broadman Press in 1974, and "Neighbor, Your Hose is on Fire," which was published by Crisendo Book Publications and released in 1975.

Other speakers for the conference include Howard Jon Pastor of First Baptist Church Hamlin; Allan Cartrite, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Roby; and Mrs. J.C. Yeary, Haskell and Larry Pittman, Stamford.

Music will be under the direction of Teg Burge, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church, Haskell. Special music will be by the Revelations, men's quartet from Amari Lynn Mink, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church, Ham Mark Cook, Minister of Music at Trinity Baptist Church, Stamford; Cross Roads Quartet and Fred Bent of Stamford.

Choir for the evening session will be composed of singers from all participating churches in the area, and rehearsal will be at 6:15 p.m.

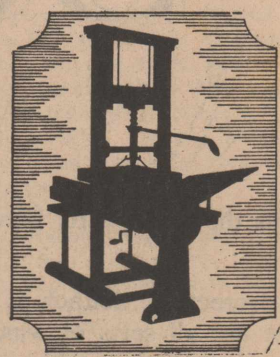
Fisher County Bicentennial Plans

Glenn Willeford, Rotan Police Chief, has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the position of Fisher County Sheriff.

Willeford will be 30 years old this June. He and his wife, Susan, daughter Marianne, and son Jimmy, who is in Kindergarten at Rotan Primary School, reside on McKinley Street in Rotan. Willeford is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University with

a major in law enforcement and a minor in history. He has been the Rotan Police Chief since November 6, 1974. He has prior law enforcement experience with the Nolan County Sheriff's Department and the Crockett County Sheriff's Department at Ozona, Texas. Willeford holds the

Intermediate Certificate as a Texas Peace Officer with over four years of experience. He is a U.S. Army veteran and spent a year in the Republic of Vietnam during 1968 and 1969. While in Vietnam he was awarded the Army Commendation Medal for Achievement for his efforts in helping set up a new Army Finance Section under hostile enemy fire at Phy Bai.

The Rotan Chief is a member of the Rotan Lions Club and the Texas Police Association, a professional organization. He was recently selected to be listed in the 1976 Bicentennial Edition of Who's Who in American Law Enforcement. The Willefords attend the Church of Christ.

"If you will elect me to be your sheriff, I promise to come to your aid when you need me and to thoroughly investigate any complaints that you might have", said Willeford.

Roby Athletic Club Meeting Monday Night

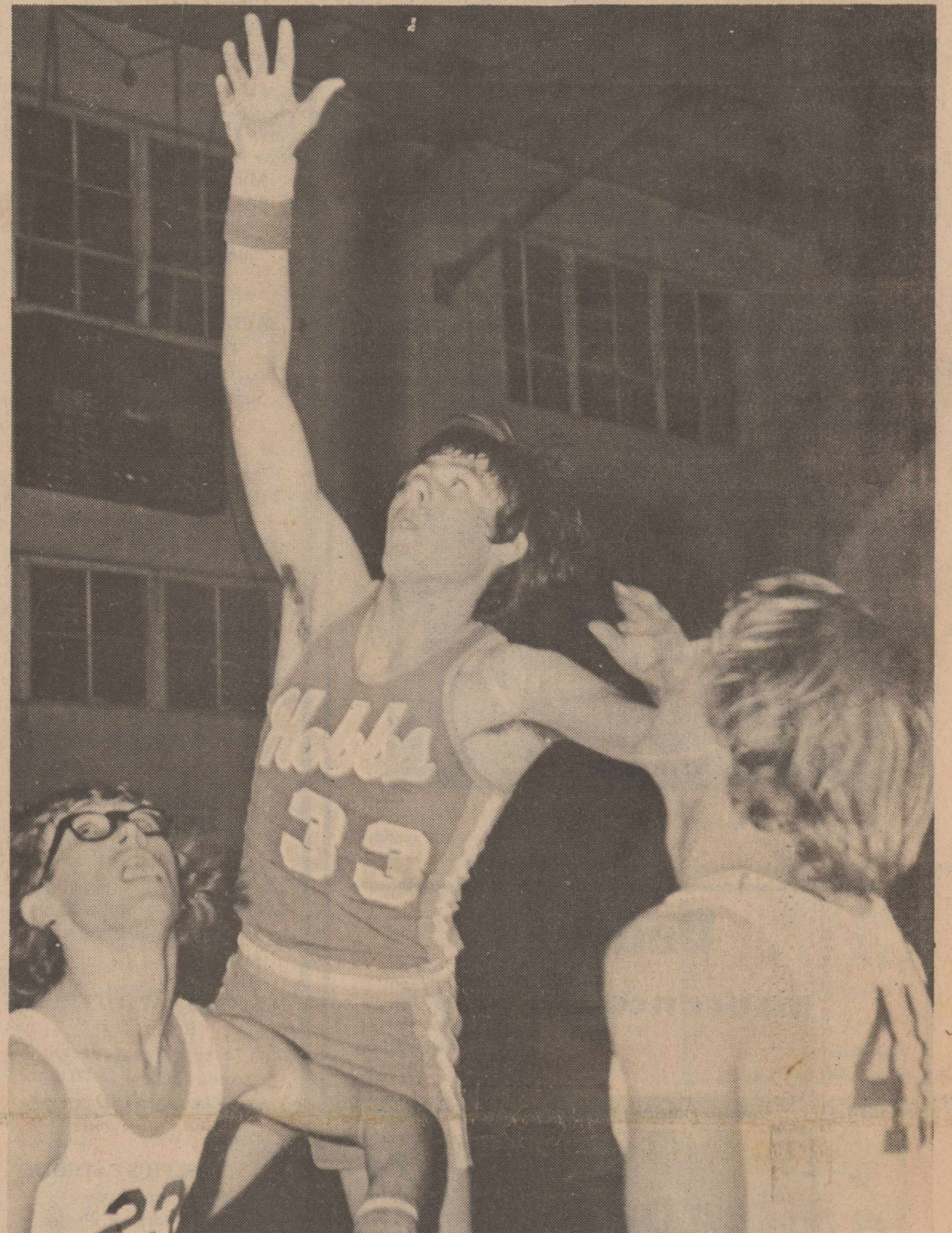

The list of political candidates increased by two this week to bring the total to 13 that have announced for a Fisher County Office in the columns of this weeks paper.

Glenn P. Willeford, Rotan Police Chief and W.D. (Dub) Waldon of Roby, placed their names on the political candidate column seeking the office of Fisher County Sheriff this week.

Others already in the race for sheriff include Mickey Counts, and Kenneth Hardin.

In the hot race for Fisher County Commissioner of Precinct #3 a total of five candidates have filed. Jay Hendon, Stanley Nowlin, Bill Cade, L.D. McGrew, and Ervin Hale have announced in the columns of this weeks paper.

In the Commissioner Precinct #1 race incumbent A.J. (Blackie)

Ford is being challenged by Kyle Moore and W.A. (Dub) Cross. Robert Buck, Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector, is the only entry in that race. He is seeking re-election.

Gray 2 points; Bryan Cave 2 points; James Stanberry 4 points; Frank Lopez 6 points and Tim Allen 2 points.

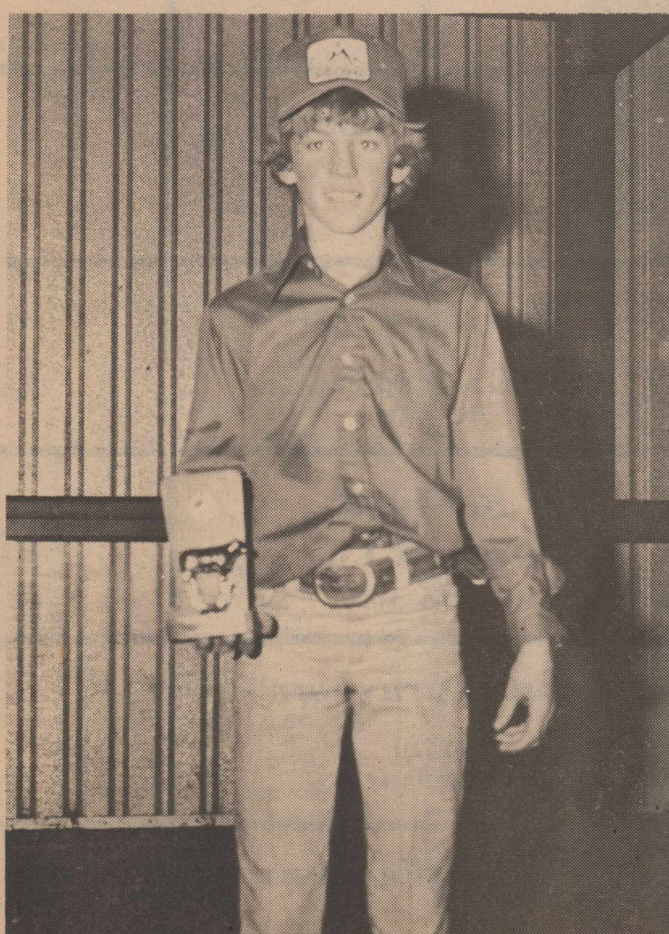
The Hammers made 9 of 12 free throws in their 8 point win over the Jim Ned Indians.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING WATER RATES FOR THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That from and after the passage of this ordinance and as hereinafter provided for, the City of Rotan through its Water Department shall charge and collect and every consumer of water shall pay for water furnished by the City of Rotan to said consumer, the amounts calculated by application of the following rates to meter readings:

WATER RATES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS FOR THE CITY OF ROTAN FOR ALL MONTHS BEGINNING WITH JANUARY 9, 1976, BILLINGS:

- (A) Minimum charge per month inside city limits for 2,000 gallons or less \$4.00
- (b) Minimum charge per month outside the corporate limits of the city for 2,000 gallons \$4.00
- (c) Excess over 2,000 gallons per month for both "a" and "b" per 1,000 gallons \$1.00

SECTION 2: All ordinances, resolutions, or other actions of the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas, in conflict with the rates, fees, charges or other provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall become effective immediately and applied to the first billing following passage on first reading.

ORDINANCE NO. 104
AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING SEWAGE RATES IN THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS; ESTABLISHING DEFINITIONS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. SEWAGE RATES

From and after the final reading and passage of this Ordinance, the City of Rotan shall charge and collect the following fees for sewer connections with the City of Rotan, Texas:

SEWAGE RATES CHARGED TO RESIDENCES, BUSINESSES, CHURCHES, SCHOOLS, GOVERNMENT ENTITIES AND SUBDIVISIONS THEREOF, AND ALL OTHER PREMISES BY THE CITY OF ROTAN FOR ALL MONTHS BEGINNING WITH JANUARY 1976 BILLINGS:

- A. Residential
 - 1. one bath \$2.00 per month
 - 2. two baths \$2.65 per month
 - 3. three baths \$3.30 per month

4. Any premises having more than three baths shall be assessed a fee of \$3.30 per month plus .65 cents per bath for each and every bath in excess of three.

B. Commercial, Schools, Housing Authorities, and etc., rate shall be assessed 33 1/3 percent, adjusted to the nearest .05 cents, of the present rate now in effect.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS
 The term "bath", when used to refer to a residence, shall mean any room containing a commode connected to the City sewer system.
 The term "bath" when used to refer to all other premises, shall mean each commode connected to the City sewer system.

SECTION 3. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING LEGISLATION
 All other ordinances, resolutions, or other actions of the City Council of Rotan, Texas, in conflict with the rates, fees, charges, or other provisions hereof, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. effective date
 This ordinance shall be effective immediately and applied to the first billing following passage on first reading.

ORDINANCE NO. 105
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING IN PART SECTIONS NO. 11 AND SECTIONS NO. 12 ORDINANCE NO. 35 OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR CHARGES FOR THE COLLECTION AND REMOVAL OF GARBAGE, TRASH, AND RUBBISH, FROM HOMES, BUILDINGS AND PREMISES USED FOR BUSINESS AND RESIDENTIAL PURPOSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Amending Ordinance No. 35
 a. Section No. 11 providing charges for the removal and collection of Garbage, Trash, and Rubbish at Residential dwellings is hereby repealed.

b. Section No. 12 providing charges for the removal and collection of Garbage, Trash, and Rubbish at commercial and business establishments is hereby repealed.

c. And, that sections No. 11 and 12 of Ordinance No. 35 of the City of Rotan, Texas, shall hereafter provide the following charges for removal and collection of Garbage, Trash, and Rubbish, and shall read as follows:

SECTION 2. CHARGES OF TRASH OR GARBAGE
 The collection and removal of garbage, trash, and rubbish from houses, buildings, and premises used for residential purposes shall be once each week. Fair and reasonable charges for this residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in a column for a calendar month as follows:

- Single Family Residence \$2.50 Per Mo.
 - 2 Family Residence \$3.75 Per Month
- For Multiple family dwellings having more than two (2) family dwellings, the minimum charge shall be \$2.50 plus 50 percent of \$2.50 X the number of family units.

The basis of the above service charge is the collection and removal of the normal accumulation of all garbage of each family unit once each week.

SECTION 3. Charges for Commercial and Business Service.
 The charge for the collection and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be based upon the container size, number of collections each week and upon the volume of such trash, garbage, and rubbish removed. A fair and reasonable charge shall be made for such commercial and business service, but in no event shall such charge be less than:

- (1) 13.75 per month for a building housing a single business unit or office.
- (2) \$3.75 per month plus 50 percent of 3.75 X the number of business units or offices for a multi-business or office building.

This ordinance shall become effective immediately and applied to the first billing following passage on First Reading.

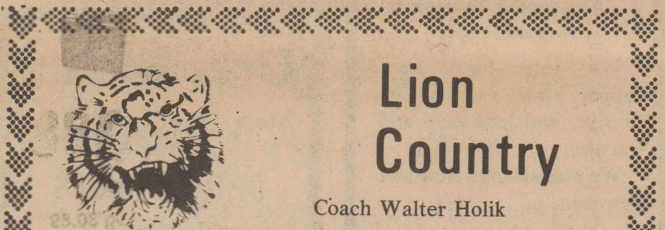

I would also like to take this time to thank the many people who support and follow these girls. The girls and I really appreciate your attendance at the games.

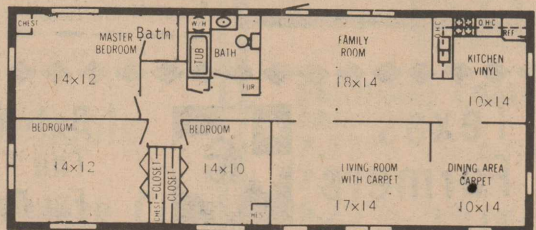

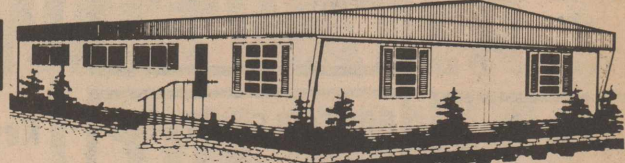
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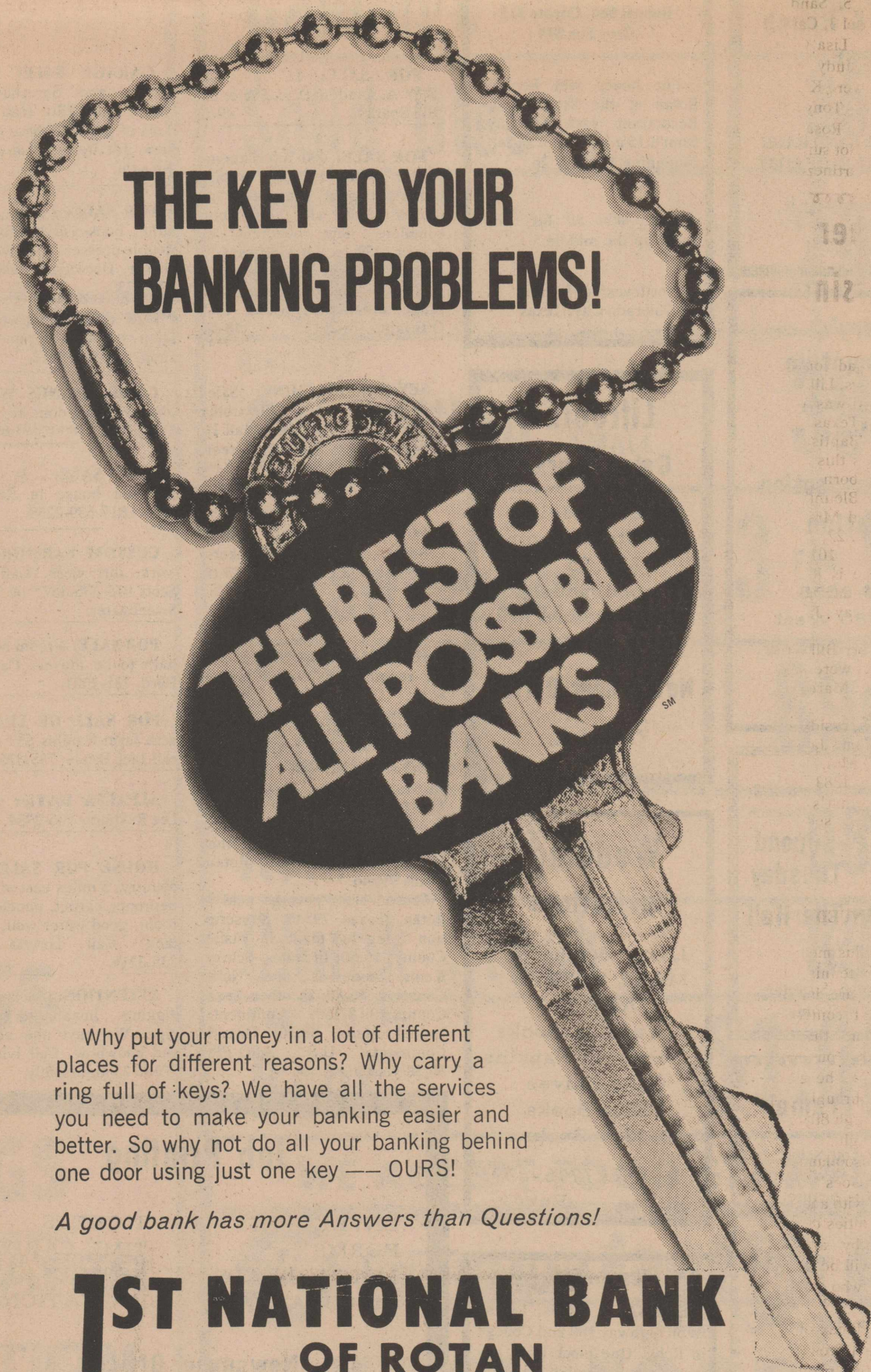
