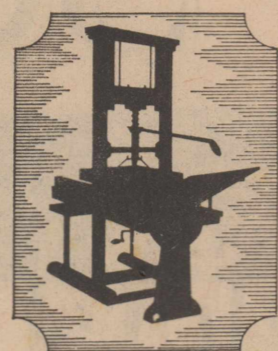

### Martinez Asked To Replace Williams

## HOSPITAL BOARD EXPECTS \$200,000 LOSS IN 1976

The members of the Fisher County Hospital District Board of Directors met in regular session last Monday night and passed the tentative budget for 1976.

The 1976 budget as accepted by the board was \$686,830.00 as compared with the 1975 actual budget of \$638,295.00. Two representatives from two major oil companies operating in Fisher County were present for the budget hearing portion of the meeting. Jerry Krupka of Continental Oil Company and

Bob Ford of General Crude were present when Jim McCallay Fisher County Hospital Administrator, reported to the board that the hospital district had a \$100,000.00 loss in 1975 and was looking at a possible loss of \$200,000.00 in 1976.

In order for the Fisher County Hospital District to come any where near breaking even in 1976, the occupancy rate will have to increase rapidly at the new facility. In 1975 the average patients per day figured out

around 13, according to McCallay. That figured out to a 40.6 percent occupancy. The hospital district collected 92.72 percent of the money owed the hospital for services.

In other action, the board reviewed the telephone system that is to be used at the new hospital with Jim Paddock of Southwestern Bell in Abilene.

McCallay indicated that the room rate would have to be adjusted when the new hospital opens this summer. The current room rate is \$38.00 for a semi-private accommodation. This will be increased to at least \$43.00 and the private accommodations will probably jump to at least \$45.00. These figures are in line with other area hospitals.

Joe Dale Burk appeared before the board and received approval for his insurance agency to write coverage on personnel and

liability effective March 1, 1976. The board members set the hospital board election for the first Saturday in April. The terms of Ralph Ammons, Kermit Terry and the seat vacated by David Williams will be on the ballot.

The board voted to ask Rudy Martinez of Hobbs to fill in the un-expired term of David Williams.

The hospital board will meet in a special session on February 16 and is expected to set the

geographic boundaries for the directors election.

In final action the board voted to change their regular monthly meeting to the third Monday effective with the March meeting.

## Two Accidents, Marijuana And Shooting In Rotan

Rotan Police officers were busy last week investigating two automobile accidents, two marijuana arrests, and a shooting.

Both accidents were on Sunday, February 1. One in the 500 block of North Garfield, the other at the intersection of Burnside and Florence Street. Both drivers were arrested for DWI.

A 21-year old Rotan man was arrested on Friday, January 30, for possession of marijuana less than 2 ounces, by Rotan Police Chief Glenn Willeford. The man pled guilty in County Court, was fined \$150.00 and \$51.50 court costs by Judge Lovett and given 15 days in jail, suspended for 6 months.

The shooting incident took place on Sunday, February 1. Willie Woodard was allegedly shot in the hand by Gloria J. Smith. She was arrested and charged with "Assault with

Intent to Murder". City Judge J.C. Edwards set bond at \$5,000.00. She is currently in the Fisher County Jail.

A second 19-year old Rotan youth was arrested for posses-

sion of marijuana, less than 2 ounces, on February 2. The subject pled guilty, was fined \$150.00 and court costs, sentenced to 10 days in jail without probation by Judge Lovett.

## Calendar Club Will Not Sponsor Variety Show

The annual variety show was discussed and it was decided that the club would not sponsor the show in 1976.

## W.A. Cross Withdraws From Election

W.A. (Dub) Cross, who a few weeks ago filed for the office of Commissioner of Precinct #1, asked that his name be removed from the ballot and thus has withdrawn from the race.

Cross was under the impression that A.J. Ford was not going to seek re-election whenever he filed.

## Over 400 Attend First Baptist Note Burning

A crowd of approximately 400 attended the "note burning" services at the First Baptist Church in Rotan last Sunday morning.

Fred Thomas, pastor, of the church, introduced the trio of J.D. Burk, chairman of the Deacons; M.D. Ivey, a Deacon for 52 years and member since 1937; and D.L. Smith, a Deacon

for 36 years and member since 1940. Burk, Ivey and Smith ignited a facsimile of the note indicating that the new church building was free of debt.

The church building was built while Rev. Billy Hudnall was pastor.

The church owed \$132,000 when Fred Thomas assumed duties as pastor four years ago. It was constructed in 1966.

She is a 1972 graduate of Rotan High School. Winners will be announced in May when the HPU yearbook, the "Lasso", comes out.

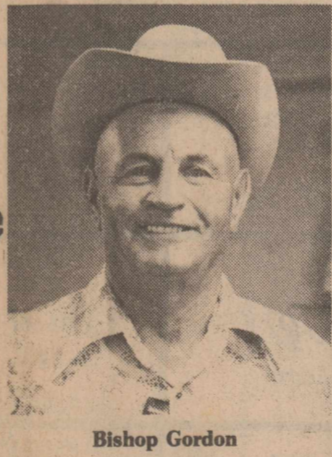
## Rotan, Snyder Lodges Have Joint Meeting

## Report

Cotton market activity was moderate to strong during the week ending January 29, according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Prices were steady with advances in the latter portion of the week. Low micronaire prices accounted for most of the price rise. Most 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire cotton sold for 19 to 20 1/2 cents per pound above CCC loan rates. Grade 42, staple 31, mike 3.5 to 4.9 sold for 49 1/2 to 51 cents per pound. Grade 43, staple 31, mike 2.7 to 2.9 sold for 40 to 42 cents per pound.

Cotton quality continued mixed, with grades ranging from White to Yellow Stained. Fifty-one percent was within the Light Spotted grade category, 37 percent was Spotted, and 8 percent Tinged. Grade 42 continued predominant at 25 percent. Fifty percent was reduced in grade due to Bark. Fiber length was 43 percent staple 31, 31 percent staple 30, and 21 percent staple 32 and longer.

Around 27 thousand samples were classed during the week ending January 29. Most of the cotton remaining to be ginned is in Scurry, Howard, and Martin Counties. The season classing total is now 370,000 samples, compared to 166,000 at the same time last year.

## Saving Bond Report Given

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$2,060 in Fisher County were reported by County Bond Chairman R.L. Springer. Sales for the twelve-month period totaled \$39,953 for 67 percent of the 1975 sales goal of \$60,000.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$20,059,965, while year-to-date sales totaled \$240,610,031 for 103 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$234.3 million.
