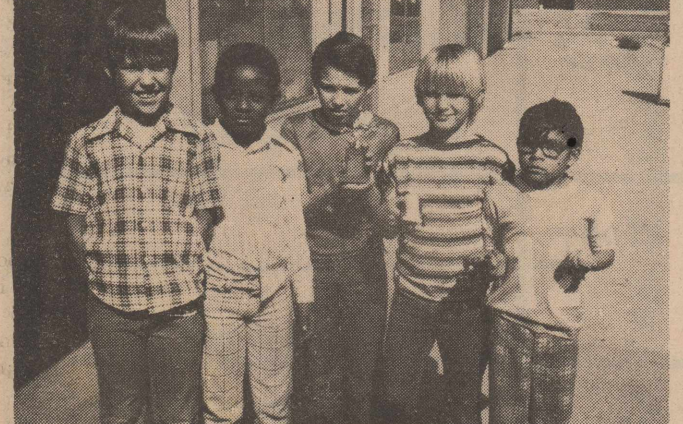
James Carter Named As Little League President

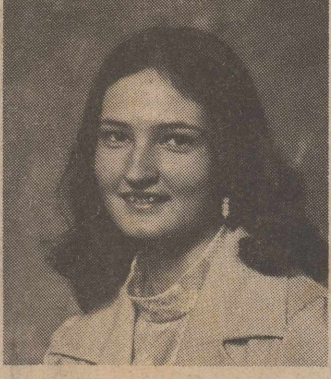

Entomology Notes

The greenbug population (an aphid in the above condition) which has been giving producers trouble for the last couple of months has decreased to extremely low members in wheat fields. This population decline was mainly due to a small parasitic wasp which lays its eggs in the body of the greenbug.

There are many factors which will effect it and when the wasp will cause a decline in the greenbug population. The two principal factors are host density and weather conditions, particularly temperature. The host density (greenbug population) must be large enough over a fairly large area for the wasp to easily find individuals in which to oviposit.

The temperature is also very important as the parasitic wasp is not very active at temperatures below 60-65 degrees F. There is a possibility of the greenbug reappearing in wheat this year. It would be a good idea to continue checking wheat fields for this pest.

The alfalfa weevil is becoming abundant in some fields. The economic threshold for alfalfa weevils is when 25 to 30 per cent of the alfalfa tips show feeding damage or when 25 or more larvae per square foot are present.

There will be a meeting concerning the pest management system for Fisher and Jones counties on March 22, at 8:00 p.m. at the Fisher County Court House. This will be an important meeting and all interested producers should attend.

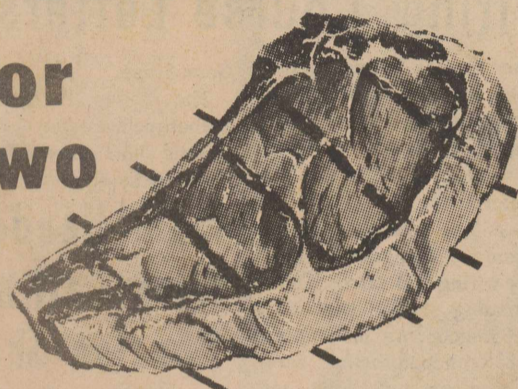

Scholarships for editors of WTC publications are approximately \$300-400. These positions may be filled either on a semester or academic year basis.

"Other awards may also be made for such special assignment areas, such as photography, advertising sales and management, beat and special assignment reporting, feature writing, exchange and circulation, and copyreading," McBride said. "Usually, they range from tuition to tuition, fees, and books, but some may be even more."



JOURNEY TO WHERE?

This Lenten season should give us cause to contemplate Jesus' journey to the cross and to think about whether or not we are willing to embark upon such a journey. Luke's Gospel tells us that he "Set his face to go to Jerusalem". As His journey began with determination so must ours. In spite of the gathering storm against Him, He entered Jerusalem. The Gospel of God's love for man needed to be carried to the people of Jerusalem. Jesus meant to carry the message into the heart of the enemy camp, and would not be swayed.

The journey began with the lament; "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, ... How often have I longed to gather your children... and you refused!" (Lk. 13:34 JB) What we need in the church today is a compassion for persons and a determination to tell them of God's love. We have too many who heed the warning to stay out of the enemy camp. Jesus was warned to stay out of Jerusalem (Lk. 13:31) but His love for the people would not let Him turn back.

Professor Herman C. Stuempfle, Jr., of the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, Pa. asks us some very important questions in regard to the church's attitude toward opposition: (1) "Why does the

I do not like to think of what the results might have been if Jesus had refused to go to Jerusalem. If we are to embark upon the journey with our Lord, we too will have to face denial, rejection, abuse, mockery, anguish and pain. Is this a journey we are able to take?

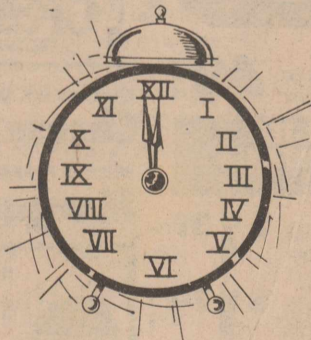

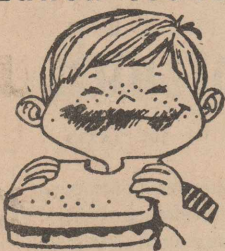

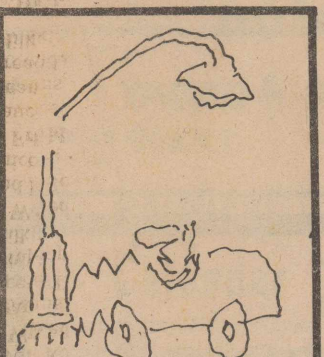
