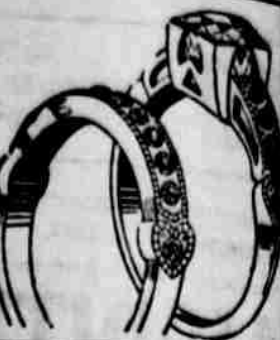

The display will go into the Texas Memorial Museum when the first unit is completed late in the fall, as will all other displays on exhibit in the University Centennial Exposition.

### H. J. R. No. 9 A JOINT RESOLUTION

—proposing an Amendment to Section 26 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 26a, providing that under no apportionment shall any county be entitled to more than seven (7) Representatives unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people; providing for the apportionment in counties of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people; providing for its submission to the voters as required by the Constitution and making an appropriation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26, of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 26a, as follows:

"Section 26a. Provided however, that no county shall be entitled to or have under any apportionment more than seven (7) Representatives unless the population of such county shall exceed seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census, in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative for each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population as shown by the latest United States Census; nor shall any district be created which would permit any county to have

more than seven (7) Representatives except under the conditions set forth above."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at the next General Election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, limiting every county to not more than seven (7) representatives under any apportionment unless said county shall have a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative to each

one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population."

And those opposed to said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, limiting every county to not more than seven (7) representatives under any apportionment unless said county shall have a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative to each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas, is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The Sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

SARAH ANN'S COOKING CLASS

Life in the summer can be made very pleasant with a tall glass of cold tea and a dainty sandwich. Cut them thin, remove crusts and use colorful and seasonable fillings. Sandwiches will remain fresh and moist if wrapped in oil paper and placed in a container with a tight cover. Keep in the refrigerator until needed.

SANDWICH FILLINGS

Celery Sandwich Filling To one cup mayonnaise, add 1-2 cup chopped celery. Spread between buttered bread and insert a lettuce leaf. Green pepper or equal parts of green pepper and pimento may be used instead of celery. Grated raw carrots are good, too.

Piquant Sandwich Filling

To 1 cup mayonnaise add 1-4 cup chow chow or India relish, 1-4 cup chili sauce, 1-4 cup chopped celery, 2 tablespoons chopped pimento. Spread on a layer of scantily buttered white bread, cover with shredded lettuce and then press on a slice of graham flour.

Cheese Filling

Blend 1 cream cheese with 2 tablespoons orange juice, 1-2 teaspoon grated orange rind, salt and 1-2 cup chopped pecans or peanuts. Spread between slices of Boston brown bread.

Ribbon Sandwiches

Cut bread in thin slices, spread with softened butter and put together in 6 tiers, spreading each layer with a different filling—Cream cheese for the first, minced lamb for the second, mint jelly for the third, chopped hard boiled egg for the fourth, and currant jelly for the fifth; or you may use chicken, chopped nuts, olives, crisped bacon, grated cheese and a red jelly. Press together well, and wrap in cheesecloth. When ready to use slice down in quarter-inch slices.

Bread and Butter Sandwiches

Dainty bread and butter sandwiches are always in good taste upon any occasion. They may be shaped in any of the fancy shapes. Plain sweet butter is hardly to be surpassed, but colored and flavored butters lend variety and are quite fastidious. To color, add a few drops of vegetable color to creamed butter, working it in smoothly.

Lemon butter is made by creaming 1-4 cup butter with 1-2 teaspoon salt, dash of cayenne, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1-2 teaspoon grated rind. For red butter put 1 pimento through a sieve and blend with 1-3 cup of butter. Spinach juice or olives pounded to a paste will make green butter.

Liverwurst Sandwiches

1-4 cup sliced pickle. 1 small onion. 1-2 cup liverwurst. Few drops lemon juice. 3 tablespoons mayonnaise. Put the pickles and onion through the food chopper. Work the liverwurst into a paste and add the pickles, onion, lemon juice and mayonnaise. Spread thickly between slices of rye bread. Serve beer and a green salad with these sandwiches.

Cucumber and Tongue Sandwiches

1-2 cup chopped cucumber. 1-2 teaspoon onion juice. 1 tablespoon mixed green pepper. 1-2 cup minced cold boiled tongue.

Mayonnaise. Mix all ingredients and add enough mayonnaise to moisten. Spread between thin slices of white bread.

Lily Sandwiches

Remove crusts from bread and cut in thin slices. (For all rolled sandwiches use a close textured bread). Lay on a dampened cloth, spread with cream cheese softened with a little cream. Fold over to make a cornucopia; press lightly so that the edges hold together. In the opening place a small strip of yellow cheese to represent the stamen.

Ham Sandwich Filling

To 1 cup ground ham add 1-4 cup chopped sweet pickles, 1-4 cup chopped celery and mayonnaise or tomato catsup to spread. Add salt and pepper to taste. From 1 to 3 hard boiled eggs may be added.

Nut Bread Sandwiches

Cut nut bread thin, butter lightly and put 3 slices together with cream cheese between the first layer and raspberry jam between the second.

Open Sandwiches

Cut rye bread in round pieces and spread with butter and anchovy paste. Place a thin slice of tomato on top and cover with a layer of mayonnaise. Sprinkle with paprika.

Apple Sandwich

Select a large red juicy apple, wash and core but do not peel. With a cookie cutter cut thinly sliced bread into rounds the size of the apple. Blend some peanut butter with sufficient honey to make it spread easily. Spread the bread and slice the apple. Put together sandwich fashion.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:  
 "Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State, provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and/or school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund.  
 All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals; the appointments of all members of said Board shall be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present. Each vacancy shall be filled by the respective appointing power that theretofore made the appointment to such position and the appointive powers shall have the authority to make recess appointments until the convening of the Senate.  
 In all criminal cases, except treason and impeachment, the Governor shall have power, after conviction, on the written signed recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, or a majority thereof, to grant re-
