

HEROES OF PEACE

It is an old truism that the heroes of peace seldom get the recognition they deserve. They can display a selfish devotion wheth, if shown in war, would bring them the thanks of the nation, without getting so much as a passing nod from the fellow-citizens whom they are serving. An instance is a recent item in the newspapers telling how 50 government scientists in Montana are slowly winning their long fight against Rocky Mountain spotted fever. This fever, a disease apparently much like typhus, is transmitted by the bites of small ticks. Eleven of the scientists who have been fighting it have lost their lives as a result; by the law of averages, some more of them will die before the fight is finished. And spotted fever offers an exceedingly unpleasant means of shuffling off this mortal coil. But the fight goes on. Some day the fever will be conquered. One more curse will be lifted from the shoulders of the race-lifted by bravery that will never get its just dues.

CURIOUS YOUTH TAKES RISK

The story from Santa Monica, Cal., telling how a 16-year-old boy lost his life while using a homemade diver's outfit to explore the bottom of a yacht harbor, illustrates the insatiable curiosity that features the life of the average boy today.

Not many express themselves through the use of a gasoline can for a helmet and a garden hose and a bicycle pump for a life-line in order to see under the water and to explore places unknown but very many of them seek to understand life and to know it with equipment of mind and body that is fust as dangerous to happiness,

Life is something of a puzzle to the boys and girls of this age. They grapple with its problems and confront strange issues. Very often they have little or no guidance from parents or others. They move along mysterious co rses, seeking unknown

goals that they little understand. Adfults in every community have a duty to assist these youngsters in finding themselves and beginning the journey of life along the right road. How many of us attempt to do our part in this great obligation? How many of us become so engrossed in our own selfish ambitions that we lose sight of the youthful army that walks behind us and forget to mark the pitfalls that lurk in the shadows along the path?

THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS

The held of newspaper men is to talk glibly about the value of the freedom of the press to the people of the United States but, too often, they fail to stress the equally important fact that this freedom must not only include an absence of government interference but an actual freedom from ulterior interests in the management of the press, No man has a higher regard for the freedom

of the press than the writer but it is not to be obtained unless newspaper men vigorously insist upon the freedom that can come only when ownership of the press is not linked with other interests. In the comparatively small cities of the nation

freedom from other interests is generally the rule and the newspaper is usually the sole business venture of its owners. They have no conflicting financial investments that might militate against the expressions that one expects from a free press. However, there have been cases in the United

States when huge corporations became interested in the ownership of newspapers, to be used as mouthpieces for their interests and to suppress unfavorable news. Under such conditions freedom of the press is a meaningless phrase and a free press does not exist.

A JOINT RESPONSIBILITY

Owen D. Young's American Youth Commissionsion has apparently opened the right attack on the unemployment problem facing millions of young Americans. At the initial conference, called by Chairman Young in New York City, the alleviation of conditions affecting the country's idle youth was held to be a "joint responsibility" of employer. labor, social welfare, governmental and educational groups. Buck-passing of this vital problem has been carried on too long, Mr. Young contends. He estimates that probably 5,000,000 youths between the ages of 18 and 24 are out of work and out of school -a segment of the whole unemployment problem staggering in its proportions. Mr. Young's commission should get the full cooperation of the country in this "joint responsibility.

RAILROAD'S COMEBACK

R. V. Fletcher, general counsel of the Association of American Railroads, spoke optimistically about the railroads the other day in Chicago. He predicted that in the present cycle there will be few any, additional railroad bankruptcies. Not only is freight traffic, measure | in carloadings so far this year, approximately 10 per cent above the corresponding period a year ago, said Mr. Fletcher, but gross revenues are up 14 per cent and the net railway operating income is 17 per cent better than it was 12 months back. Several important railroads, he reported, are discharging their obligations to the RFC and at the same time are reducing their indebtedness to the Railroad Credit Corporation, a private lending agency for the more prosperous roads. All of which would seem to indicate that modernization and refinancing, together with a general upturn in business, are really just about all the radioads need to come back.

PRESIDENT'S ACHIEVEMENTS (Wheeling Register

Of the many constructive things that stand out in a retrospect of President Roosevelt's 40 months regime, none is more impressive than the prompt teps taken immediately following the bank panic that was sweeping the nation. This was accomplished by closure of all the banks, their re-opening under conditions that insured their stability, passage of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act and plac-ing the funds of the Reconstruction Finance Cor-poration at the disposal of various banks in need

This action of the President restored the confidence of the people in the banking system and reestablished the country's banks on a sound basis. For months banks had been closing their doors at an alarming rate. Depositors became panicky and

started to withdraw their funds. For protection the banks place restrictions on withdrawals, thereby ying up cash resources for the transaction of business. It was a period of fear and distrust and renuired a bold and courageous stroke to save the situation.

The President met the situation unfalteringly. He ordered all banks closed. Demanded solvent banks to show their solvency and required bank unsound condition to take immediate steps to put their finances in shape. It would only have ggravated the unrest had the long drawn out process of picking out the solvent from the insolvent banks been attempted. So the President closed them

Bank officials, stockholders and business men responded to this stimulus studied the situation and ded by the respite, banks commenced to reopen under conditions approved by the Federal Deposit Insurance Act which insured all deposits up to \$5,000, quickly removed all doubt from the public mind. With the assistance of the RFC, order was gradually restored and virtually all banks reopened

proposing an Amedment to Section 48, Article III of the Consti- STATE. tution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of making an appropriation for the

GISLATURE OF THE STATE OF thereto.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as fellows: "Section 48a: In addition to the

powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools colleges and universities, support-ed wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and or school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund. All funds provided from the

compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."
