

## Rotan School Board Expects \$40,000 Loss

The Rotan Independent School Board met in session last Monday night and discussed school business in a marathon session that lasted until after midnight.

In regular action the board discussed roof repairs with Vernon Bates of V&H Enterprises in Clinton, Oklahoma. He made a complete explanation of the work his company would accomplish if the board awarded V&H Enterprises the bid. The board set the date of May 18th to hear an explanation on roof repairs from Lydick Hooks Roofing Company of Abilene and Barr Roofing Company of Abilene.

John Harbison gave a report to the board on the science and chemistry department of Rotan High School. He and the students in his class have prepared a booklet giving details and directions on all experiments in the departments.

The board discussed the location of the Rotan School Tax Office in regard to space requirements. No action was taken on the matter, however, Superintendent, Tom Harey was authorized by the board to look into the possibility of re-locating the tax office.

A bid of \$3,000 was submitted by the Double Mountain Trenching Service for laying a water line from the school well to the playground north of the junior high building. No action was taken on the bid. The board felt like the roofing project currently under consideration took priority over the ditching water project. They do not intend to neglect the water line and will give further consideration at a future meeting.

Superintendent Harkey gave a report to the board on the

preliminary tax figures submitted by Pritchard & Abbott on values for the school district for the coming year. This estimate shows a loss of \$2,500,000 on the tax roll. This amounts to an actual tax dollar loss to the school district of \$40,000.

Kelly Glaze, Rotan Band Director, received a \$500.00 raise for the 1976-77 school year. He received very complimentary remarks from the board concerning his work with the bands in all phases of the music program.

## Roby Board Accepts Two Resignations

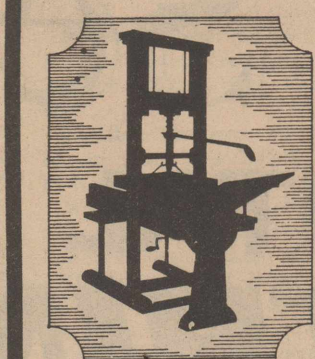
The Roby Independent School Board met in session last Monday night for their regular meeting for May and accepted the resignations of the band director and one teacher.

Band Director Dianna Hunter resigned her position effective at the end of the current school term to accompany her husband to Lubbock where he will begin work on his graduate study at Texas Tech.

Marjorie Mitchell submitted her resignation to the board and had it accepted. She does not plan to work during the 1976-77 school term.

In other action the board agreed to join the Texans for Equitable Taxations, Inc. in Austin, Texas. This newly formed association was formed to move the financial burden for school finance off the advalorem taxpayers.

A large portion of the meeting of the board, was spent in discussing the 1976-77 budget. Superintendent Caffey Welch is

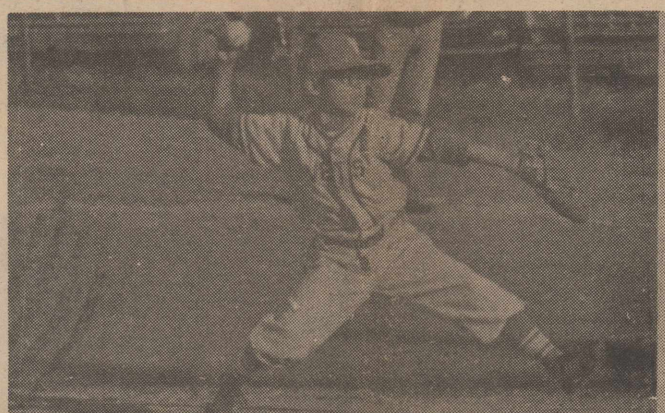

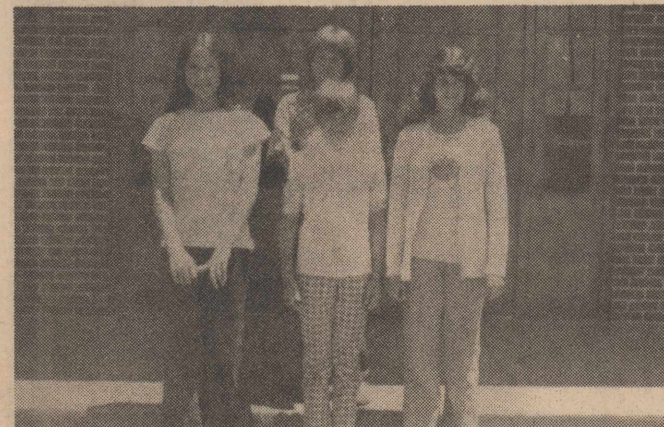

The Roby Cemetery might well be called the "Place of the Dead" because that is the final resting place on this earth of many of our citizens who have departed this life. I am sure there is no comfort for the departed person to know that the cemetery is well-kept and presents a generally neat appearance. However, I do know that the friends and relatives of the deceased appreciate a cemetery that shows by the care it receives that someone does furnish a substantial amount of work for the cemetery on a regular basis.

The Roby Cemetery was originally established under the jurisdiction of Fisher County and was operated by the Fisher County Commissioners Court. The cemetery was later turned over to the City of Roby. A few years ago the Roby Cemetery Association was incorporated and received a charter from the State of Texas to operate on a non-profit basis. The cemetery association operates under by-laws with a board of directors consisting of seven people. Annual meetings are held each year, usually in May, for the purpose of discussing the affairs of the association.

In 1974 the board of directors initiated a program designed to make funds available for the annual care of the cemetery. The people were asked to contribute funds to go into a special interest bearing account to be called the Roby Cemetery Perpetual Fund. The principal is never to be drawn and spent. Only the interest from the fund is to be used for the upkeep of the cemetery. The program has received a wonderful acceptance and a total of \$9,557.16 has now been placed in this fund. This amount of money does not produce enough interest to care for the cemetery, but it is a start in the right direction.

The old part of the cemetery has 497 burial plots. The lower cemetery has 444 plots and the new addition has 30 plots making a total of 971 burial plots that need care each year. The cost for this care can not be furnished by those who have been placed in the cemetery. It must be furnished by the rest of us as the family members that are still living.

The members of the association are as follows: Dick Melton, President; John Kiker, Vice President; Miss Dudley Hambricht, Secretary-Treasurer; Mrs. Fred Parker, Reporter; J. B. Hughey, Mrs. J. B. Hughey, Thurman Terry and Mrs. Parker Wetsel. These board members have started a fine program and we, the people who have friends and relatives buried here, need to give them the necessary financial support to do a good job.

We can give this financial support in several ways. I would like to suggest two ways for us

to consider. Number one, write a check of \$25, \$50, \$100 or \$500 made to the Roby Cemetery Association, Box 216, Roby, Texas. This amount will be added to the permanent perpetual fund and the interest from the fund will still be working, annually, long after you and I have gone to our final resting place. Number two, I would suggest that any Estate, when a property division is to be made, would designate a part of its funds for the Roby Cemetery Perpetual Fund. If these things are done the fund will grow, year-in and year-out, and eventually the necessary money for perpetual care of the resting place of our loved ones will be assured.

One last request--Express your appreciation to the Board of Directors of the Roby Cemetery Association. They have spent many hours of hard work doing what should be done by others.

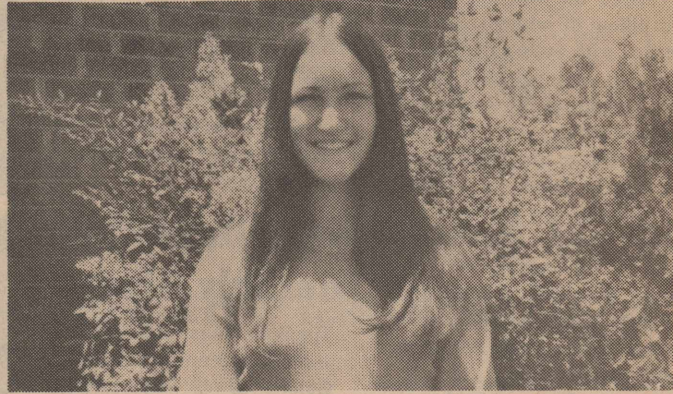

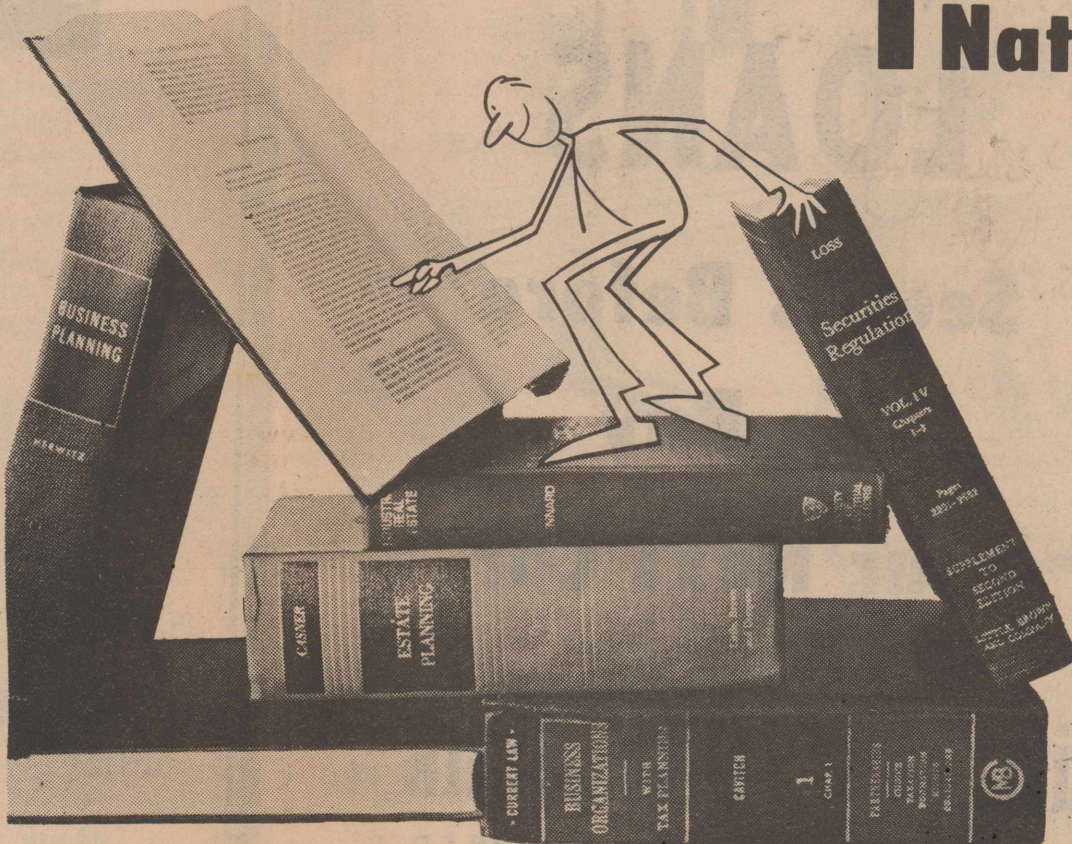

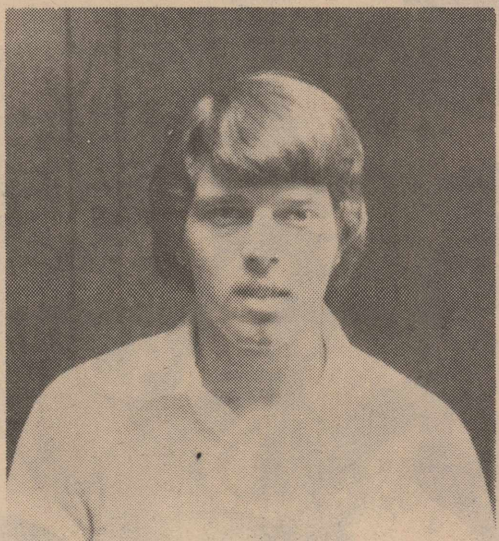

Roby had led in total points until the final four races, but no points were scored by Roby in the 440 run, the 220 and mile run. Loraine gathered in 40 points in these 3 races. With the mile relay left, Roby had 94 points and Loraine 106 points.

The Lins had to win first and Loraine 4th place for a team championship. Other schools would be needed to fill the gaps. On the first leg, Highland took a 15 yard lead over the field. As the second runners began their lap, Highland is 15-20 yards in front with Roby and Loraine side by side. Scott Fullwood, Highland's, top athlete opens a 75-80 yard lead on the entire field of runners. Loraine comes in second 10 yards in front of Roby's Al Gonzales. Brad Stuart begins to close the gap on the Loraine runner by the first 100 yds. catches him and begins to widen the gap on distance between he and Loraine's 3rd runner. Highland, far out front, Stuart closes the gap to about 50-60 yards as he hands to James Putnam. Loraine now is about 15-20 yards behind, can Putnam catch Highland's anchor?

It seems by now most Roby fans are thinking that Roby will have to settle for a 2nd place and Hobbs doesn't appear close enough to put Loraine in 4th place. By the middle of Putnam's

lap he has closed the distance between himself and Highland's runner to 30 yds., but can he continue at that pace, coming off the curve onto the straight away, James is 10 yards back. One hundred yards away from a first place finish, can he do it, ten yards from the finish he catches and wins by a step. Loraine finished 3rd and wins the team trophy with 118 points to Roby's 114.

Brad Stuart headed the District meet by being high point individual with 37 points, his second year in a row to win this honor. Brad qualified in 4 events for regional, 1st in 330, 1st in pole vault, 1st in mile relay and 2nd in 880 run. Carlos Jones qualified in 2 events for regional, 1st in shot and 2nd in discus. James Putnam qualified in two, 2nd in 200 dash and 1st in mile relay. Johnny Rivas and Al Gonzales qualified in the mile relay. Mike Wilburn will run as an alternate in the 880 for Stuart. Brad will concentrate on the 330 I. Hurdles for a berth to the State meet in Austin.

In late February, 15 boys reported for track, by the district meet 9 boys represented some forty-five boys in Roby High School. One senior, Carlos Jones, three juniors James Putnam, Mike Wilburn, Seven

Evers, one sophomore Brad Stuart, and four freshmen, Al Gonzales, Johnny Rivas, Timmy Morton and David Posey. Timmy Morton was the only team member not to score a point at the district meet, but if any boy had a justifiable reason to quit the team, Timmy did. He was bothered all season with asthma and allergies. He lost weight, got sick, but never missed work out a day. Timmy ran in any race he was asked, from the 220 to the mile run. As the district meet Timmy qualified for the finals in the 440 but finished 7th in the finals Wednesday afternoon. Timmy Morton has the desire to work hard and with time will be a valuable team member to the Roby track team. Mike putnam has been a very valuable assistant, being a trainer, timer, hurdles sitter, getting up early and going to bed late.
