



The Interstate Commerce Commission hereby gives notice that by order dated April 29, 1976, it has been determined that the proposed abandonment of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company line extending 40.18 miles between stamford and Rotan through Fisher and Jones Counties, Texas, if approved by the Commission, does not constitute a major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment within the meaning of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), 42 U.S.C. ss 4321, et seg., and that preparation of a detailed environmental impact statement will not be required under section 4332 (2) (C) of the NEPA.

It was concluded, among other things, that 60 percent of the traffic handled on the line has been lost due to the change in distribution patterns of one of the major industries in the area. Consequently, traffic on the subject line is low and the diversion to motor carriers, if the abandonment is approved. should not have a significant effect on the existing environment. Additionally, industrial activity in the area is limited and another rail line serves the only other major industry located on the applicant's line. Although cotton is a major commodity shipped by the subject line, movement should not be precluded due to the close proximity of alternte rail lines and the availability of a good highway system. The proposed action, therefore, is not expected to have a serious impact on the existing rural communities.

Approximately 95 percent of the right-of-way is held in reversionary interest and will revert to the original landowners. Depending upon the subsequent use of the land corridor, abandonment could have a serou impact on local

wildlife populations. This determination was based upon the staff preparation and consideration of an environental threshold assessment survey, which is available on request to the Interstate Commerce Commission, Office of proceedings, Washington, D.C. 20423; telephone 202-275-

Foster homes are needed in Fisher and Nolan counties to provide care for aged, blind, or other disabled adults who can no longer continue living in their homes, but are not medically eligible for nursing home care, according to Stan Dieckmier of Abilene, adult social services supervisor, Texas State Department of Public Welfare. The foster family home program is one of the adult programs provided by the department as an alternative to institutional

"We are seeking warm hearted people who have room in their homes for one to three aged or disabled people who are not related to them," Dieck meier said. "The foster family must be willing to help provide opportunities for social, recrea-

Upon notification, the social worker will interview prospective foster care providers and check to see that the home meets health and safety standards. They will also give ongoing consultation to approved providers on any problems that may arise, he said. Also, would help the persons seeking foster care and those wishing to give it to get acquainted before further arrangements are made. This is a family-sharing program where all concerned need to be congenial.

Cost of the foster care is shared by each receiver and the welfare department, who together pay a total of \$220 per person per month to the provider, according to agency regulations.

Several weeks ago, I contacted the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare about this situation but have not, as yet, received a response. To further emphasize to the Secretary of the concerns of the people of Fisher County, I am taking the liberty of forwarding this petition to him.


