

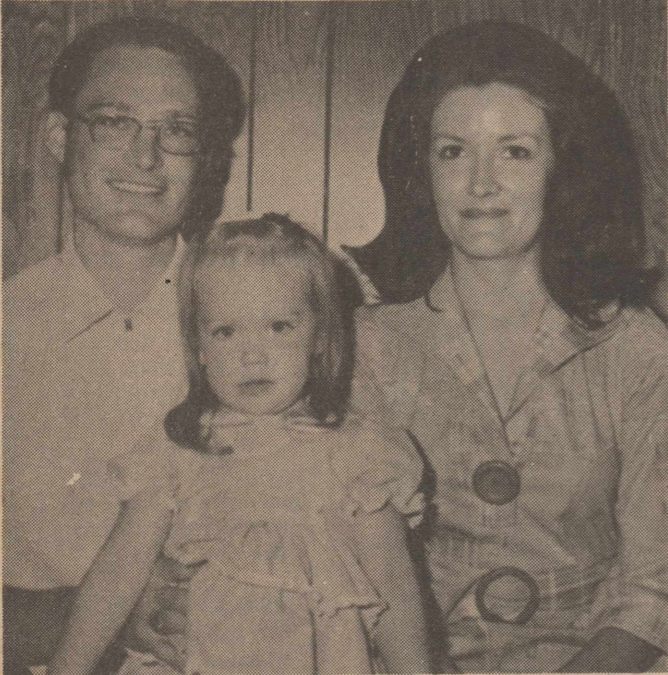
## Cleburne Murdoch New At Clinic Pharmacy

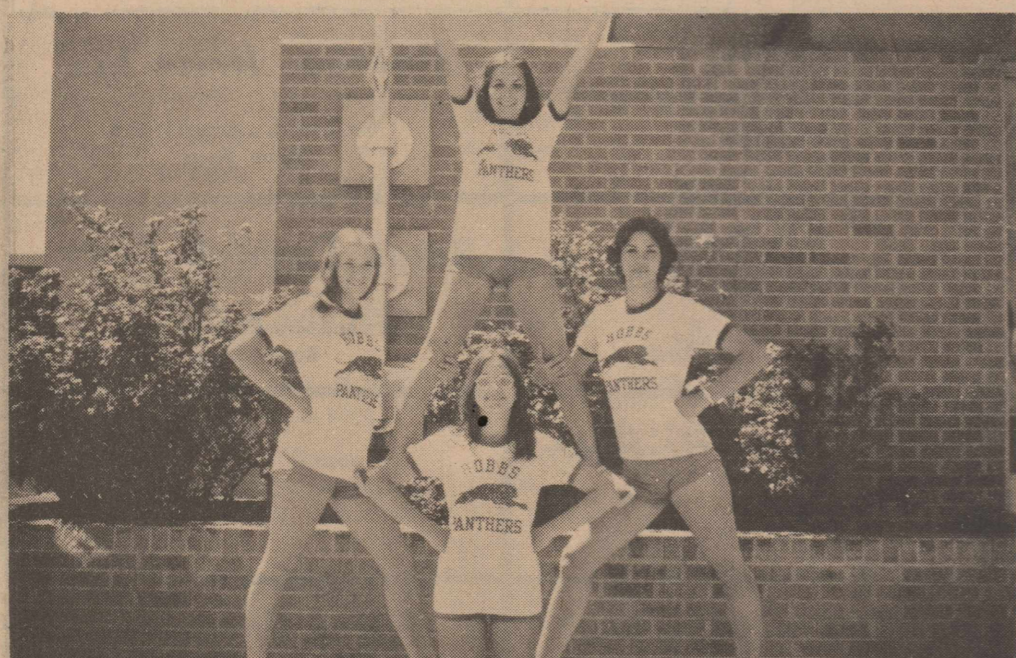

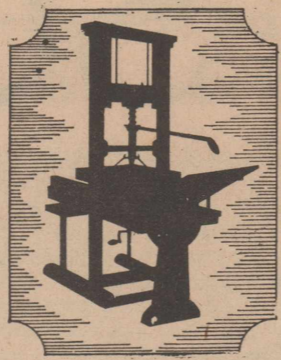

## Rotan Superintendent Checks Oil Produced

Rotan Superintendent, Tom Harkey, indicated early this week that he has a year-by-year analysis of several producing oil wells in the Rotan Independent School District that are to be

studied by school personnel and board members in an effort to begin planning the 1977-78 school budget.

Harkey indicated that he corresponded with the Texas

Railroad Commission to obtain the information. The history of production shows a drastic decline in production which accounts for the tremendous loss of approximately 2 1/2 million dollars in valuation to the local district.

One example cited by Harkey concerning the oil production was on the Marbet Production Company well - Jackson B. Andrew Noodle Creek site. The production of this well in 1972 was 84,206 barrels; in 1875 production dropped to 9,413 and in February of 1876 production had declined to only 217 barrels.

Harkey indicated that this is only one of several wells that he had the history of production on from the Railroad Commission. He invited anyone interested in seeing the analysis to visit the office of the Superintendent.

The estimated 2 1/2 million dollar valuation loss will mean a loss of approximately \$40,000 in tax money to the school district for the 1976-77 year.

"The \$40,000 that the school district will lose in taxes would go a long way toward making needed repairs to the roof and providing heating needed in the junior high school building", said Harkey. It seems apparent that the Superintendent will now have to dip into the interest and sinking fund to have the money to provide these necessary repairs and provide heating.

## M. R. Womack Resigns As Rotan Principal

The members of the Rotan Independent School Board met in special session last Tuesday night for the purpose of discussing three items on the agenda.

The board heard representatives from Lydick Hooks Roofing Company and Barr Roofing Company in Abilene present detailed explanations of the work their respective companies would accomplish if their bids were accepted.

In other action the board discussed the resignation of M.R. Womack. He has resigned his position with the Rotan Independent School District to accept the elementary principal position of the Amherst Element-

tary School. Amherst is located approximately 40 miles northwest of Lubbock.

In final discussion the board discussed property taxes with Superintendent Harkey for the 1977-79 school year.

## Steve Sweet Resigns At Calvary Church

Rev. Steve Sweet, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church for the past year, resigned his position on May 2, and moved to San Angelo where he will do supply work in the ministry and attend school at Angelo State University.

A pulpit committee consisting of J.A. Barnes, Tye Harrison, Jesse Heffernan, Charles Underhill and Ed Price has been appointed to begin the search for a new pastor.

In the one year period that Sweet was pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, the membership increased from approximately 75 to over 100 members.

## Election Judge Changes Site For Box 10 Vote

Melvin Clements, election judge of Box 10 in Fisher County, Precinct #3 Rotan, indicated that a conflict in reserving the Community Center, has forced voters to cast ballots at the Rotan High School lunch room in the coming run-off election.

The Community Center had been reserved for a family reunion. Voters in Box 10 will move from the Community Center to the school cafeteria for the run-off election on June 5th only, indicated Clements.

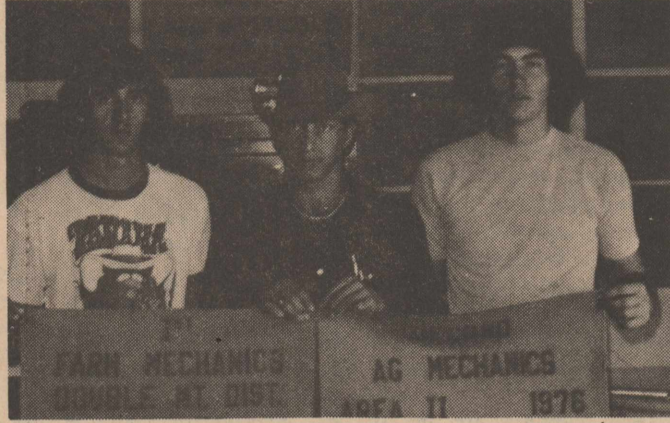

Interstate Commerce Commission Notice AB 119.

The Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company Abandonment Between Stamford and Rotan in Fisher and Jones Counties, Texas.

The Interstate Commerce Commission hereby gives notice that by order dated April 29, 1976, it has been determined that the proposed abandonment of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company line extending 40.18 miles between Stamford and Rotan through Fisher and Jones Counties, Texas, if approved by the Commission, does not constitute a major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment within the meaning of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), 42 U.S.C. ss 4321, et seq., and that preparation of a detailed environmental impact statement will not be required under section 4332 (2) (C) of the NEPA.

It was concluded, among other things, that 60 percent of the traffic handled on the line has been lost due to the change in distribution patterns of one of the major industries in the area. Consequently, traffic on the subject line is low and the diversion to motor carriers, if the abandonment is approved, should not have a significant effect on the existing environment. Additionally, industrial activity in the area is limited and another rail line serves the only other major industry located on the applicant's line. Although cotton is a major commodity shipped by the subject line, movement should not be precluded due to the close proximity of alternate rail lines and the availability of a good highway system. The proposed action, therefore, is not expected to have a serious impact on the existing rural communities.

Approximately 95 percent of the right-of-way is held in reversionary interest and will revert to the original landowners. Depending upon the subsequent use of the land corridor, abandonment could have a serous impact on local wildlife populations.

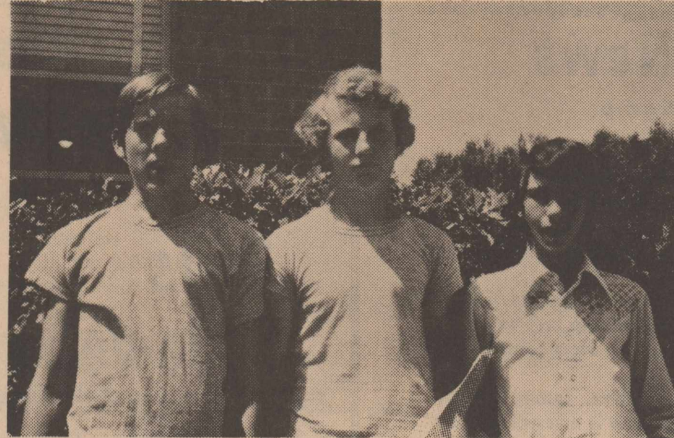

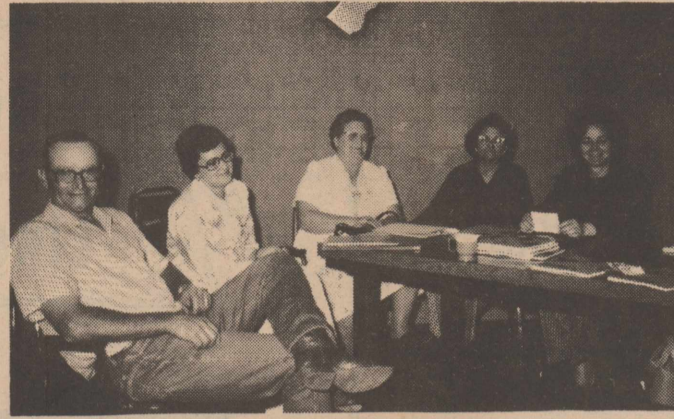

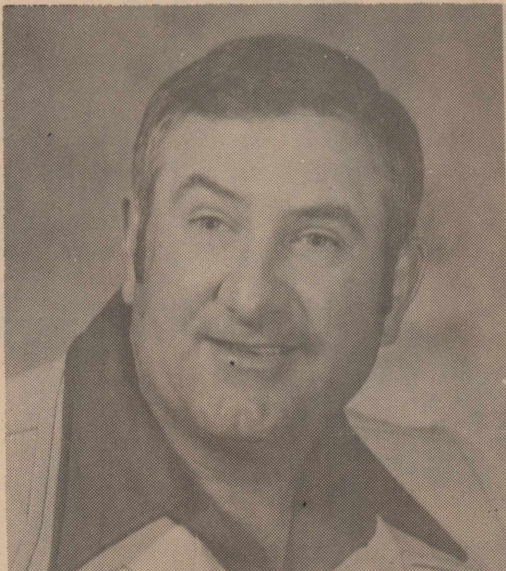

that the Treasury Department had made an investigation of the matter at the request of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Assistant Secretary of Treasury David McDonald told Farm Bureau officials that the Treasury has determined that a subsidy does exist and that countervailing duties had been imposed.

According to an announcement by the government, the subsidized beef is now subject to payment of countervailing duties equal to the net amount of subsidy.

"Farmers and ranchers are well aware of the need for two-way trade, but we cannot compete against subsidized imports," Chaloupka said.

The farm leader said that consumers in the country are well-protected by current and projected supplies of domestic beef.

"Beef supplies are up 10

percent over last year, and we have 28 percent more cattle on feed," he said. "Furthermore, there is 42 percent more grain in storage than last year and much of this will be used in beef production."

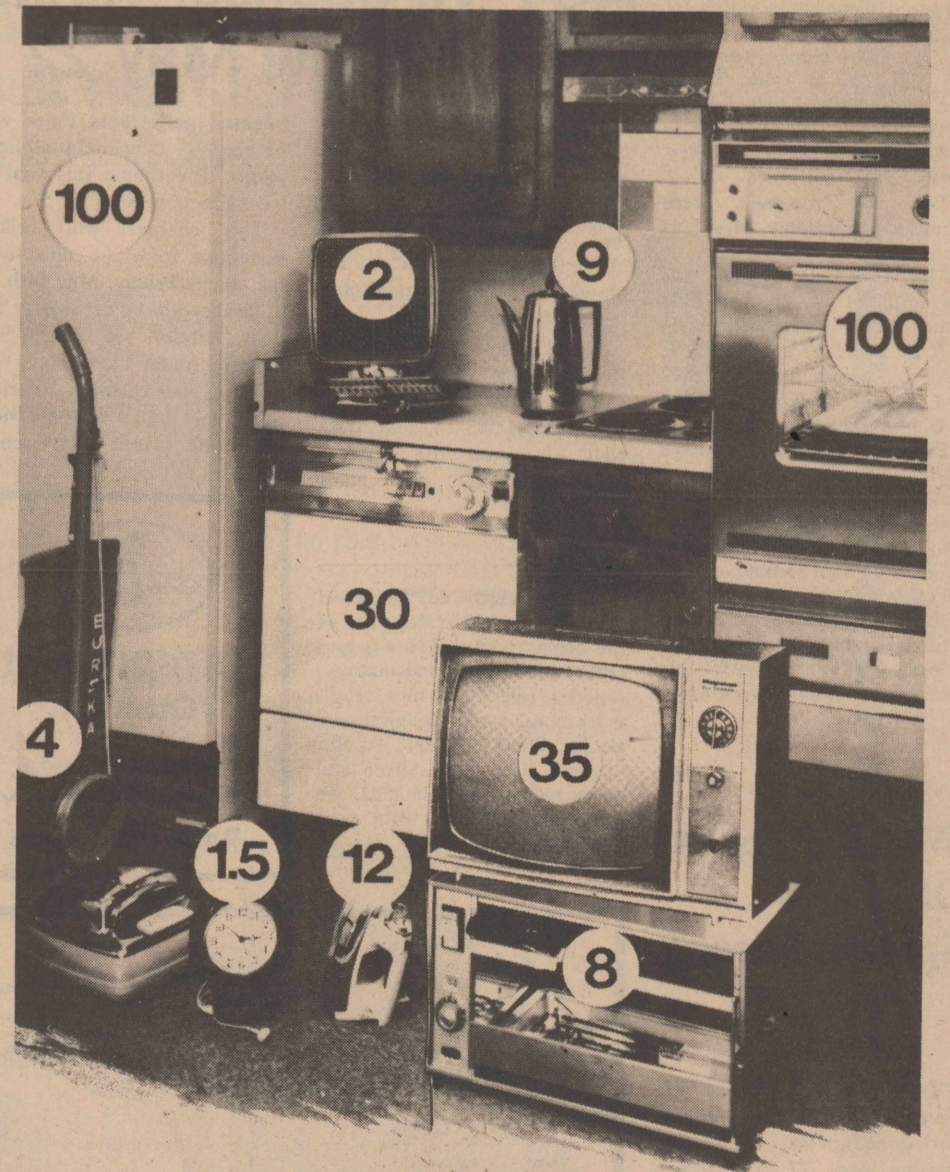

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

BY RICHARD SPENCER

Callie Bermudagrass, another of an impressive line of improved pasture bermudas dating back to the early 1950's, has come a long way in a relatively short time.

Since it was first selected at Mississippi State University in 1966, Callie (Cynodon dactylon) has been planted by 8,000 persons in 35 states and territories, 11 foreign countries and 27 colleges and universities.

Callie's rise to prominence was outlined during the annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference April 8-9 at Texas A&M University. The conference was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and The Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Vance H. Watson of the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station said Callie is a robust grass which has larger stolons, wider leaves and taller growth than the famed Coastal and other bermuda varieties and hybrids commonly used for forage.

Growth rates of 2.5 to 6 inches per day have been reported in some southeastern states.

Range of distribution has been from Alaska on the north

to Africa on the south, but most of the grass plantings are on a line from North Carolina to Texas.

No far, forage production from Callie has been higher than that of common, Coastal or Alcia in Mississippi trials. The grass stands well under moderately high to high nitrogen levels and produces yields of hay. Crude protein has varied from a high of 20 per cent at 2 to 3 weeks of age to a low of about 8 per cent at 13 weeks.

No controlled grazing studies have been made on the new grass to date, but five projects are scheduled this spring in Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida. However, ranchers who

have used Callie in their grazing programs report that animal acceptance and performance have been favorable.

They will also give ongoing consultation to approved providers on any problems that may arise, he said. Also, would help the persons seeking foster care and those wishing to give it to get acquainted before further arrangements are made. This is a family-sharing program where all concerned need to be congenial.

Cost of the foster care is shared by each receiver and the welfare department, who together pay a total of \$220 per person per month to the provider, according to agency regulations.

PURIFY YOUR HEARTS

"But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thy heart to lie to the Holy Spirit, and to keep back part of the price of the land... How is it that thou hast conceived this thing in thy heart? thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God" (Acts 5:1-5).

A casual study of the passage before us reveals that Satan's operation was made possible by man's co-operation. Ananias was fully responsible for the condition of his heart. Had he resisted, the devil would have fled (Jas. 4:7), but while Satan filled, Ananias opened his heart to receive.

This passage is a reminder that purity of heart is not accidental, not is pollution of heart unavoidable. A clean heart comes by the power of God and the commitment of man, while the impure heart comes by the temptation of the devil and the concession of man. Thus, the wise man said, "Keep thy heart with all diligence for out of it are the issues of life" (Pro. 4:23); and again, "As he thinketh in his heart, so is he" (Pro. 23:7).

When we feed our minds with suggestive, lewd, or pornographic literature and T.V. shows, we jeopardize our souls. When we take envy, jealousy, greed and kindred dispositions into our hearts, our agonies are multiplied. When we allow either of the foregoing to find lodging in our hearts, we are sealing our own doom. We shut

off our vision of God both in time and eternity, for only "the pure in heart—shall see God" (Matt. 5:8). Our failure to burn the book, shut off the T.V., remove the envy, etc., lies not so much in the lack of conviction that those things are harmful, but in a lack of faith in Jesus Christ who loved us and died for us. Our hearts are "cleansed by faith" (Acts 15:9).

Conscious thought control is prescribed by Paul for the Christians as being essential to holy living (Phil. 4:8); therefore, make your mind move in the realm of elevated thoughts, for only "he that hath clean hands and a pure heart... shall ascend into the hill of Jehova and... stand in his holy place" (Psa. 24:3-4).

## Fisher County Program Building Group Meets

Members of the Fisher County Program Building Committee reviewed achievements of the past year and made plans for the coming 12 months at their regular meeting Thursday, May 6, 8:00 p.m. at the Court House in Roby. Of special significance was a statement by John Matthies saying, "Rural counties, cities and schools must stick together if they are to survive."

Matthies, serving as chairman of the Committee, explained its role and function--that of planning, carrying out and evaluating the Extension education program in Fisher County. Matthies also stated that the Committee is assisted by the County Extension staff in these tasks.

The Program Building Committee consists of an executive committee and program area committees in crops, livestock, family living, 4-H and aging. These program area committees focus on program that can strengthen their areas of responsibility. At the annual meeting, the following program area committees gave reports: Family Living, Mrs. Dale Cave; Aginc, Mrs. Annie Bruce; Crops, Keifer Cauble; Livestock, James Cave; 4-H, Tom Harkey.

Family Living Committee report was given by Mrs. Dale Cave, chairman. Mrs. Cave reported on the indepth program being carried on in foot and nutrition which included the Food Fair, a mail-out on food buying, circular letters mailed monthly on nutrition, nutritional meetings for mothers of young babies and Home Demonstration Club programs. She discussed plans for the coming year which will be to continue the study in Foods and Nutrition.

Mrs. Annie Bruce, chairman of the committee on Older Texans, reported for that committee. Accomplishments of the committee include placing tape players and a tape of the Bibles in each of the three rest homes, mailing a monthly newsletter to Older Texans in the County, supporting two county clubs for Older Texans and selecting the Outstanding Older Texan for Fisher County.

Chairman of the crops committee, Keifer Cauble, reported that committee had put out twenty result demonstrations in crops and harvested 14. They had sponsored a Farm Management Shortcourse. Their plans are for more result demonstrations and educational meetings.

Reporting for the Livestock Committee was chairman, Ja-

mes Cave. This committee has sponsored one Pour on Demonstration and one Ear Tag and Implant Demonstration also one shortcourse. Plans are to have more educational meetings on Brucellosis, weed control tests and implant and ear tag tests.

Tom Harkey, Chairman of the 4-H Committee reported accomplishments of 4-H members and leaders for the past year. This included projects in food, clothing, personality development, livestock and rabbits.

Many district and state awards have been won by Fisher County 4-H members as well as leaders in the past year.

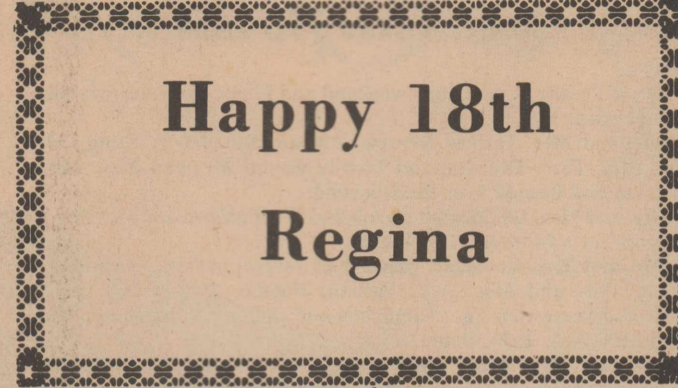

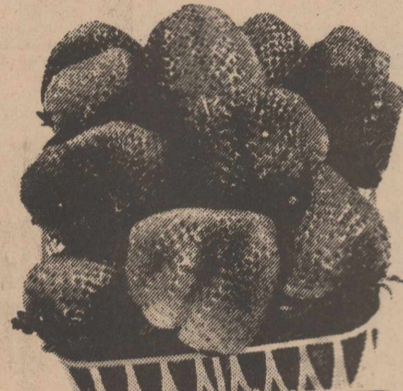
