"It's a game of inches;" Haskell to host Olney

I'm going to start this article by pointing out that this last Friday night classic match-up, and long time rivalry game between the Haskell Indians and Stamford Bulldogs may have been the best game I've seen between the two, in about 27 years of watching these games. The team played extremely well throughout the game between two pretty evenly matched opponents, but a friendly bounce here, and a miscommunication on defense there, gave the Bulldogs a 28 to 24 win.

One of my favorite movies is "Any Given Sunday." In the pre-game speech, the coach points out to his players that football is a game of inches. You have to fight and claw for every inch, and at the end of the day the team with the most inches is who usually wins the game. Friday's game was a match-up between two very good teams, who not only have playoff hopes, but probably very good chances at district championship futures.

Haskell homecoming begins Fri., Sept. 25

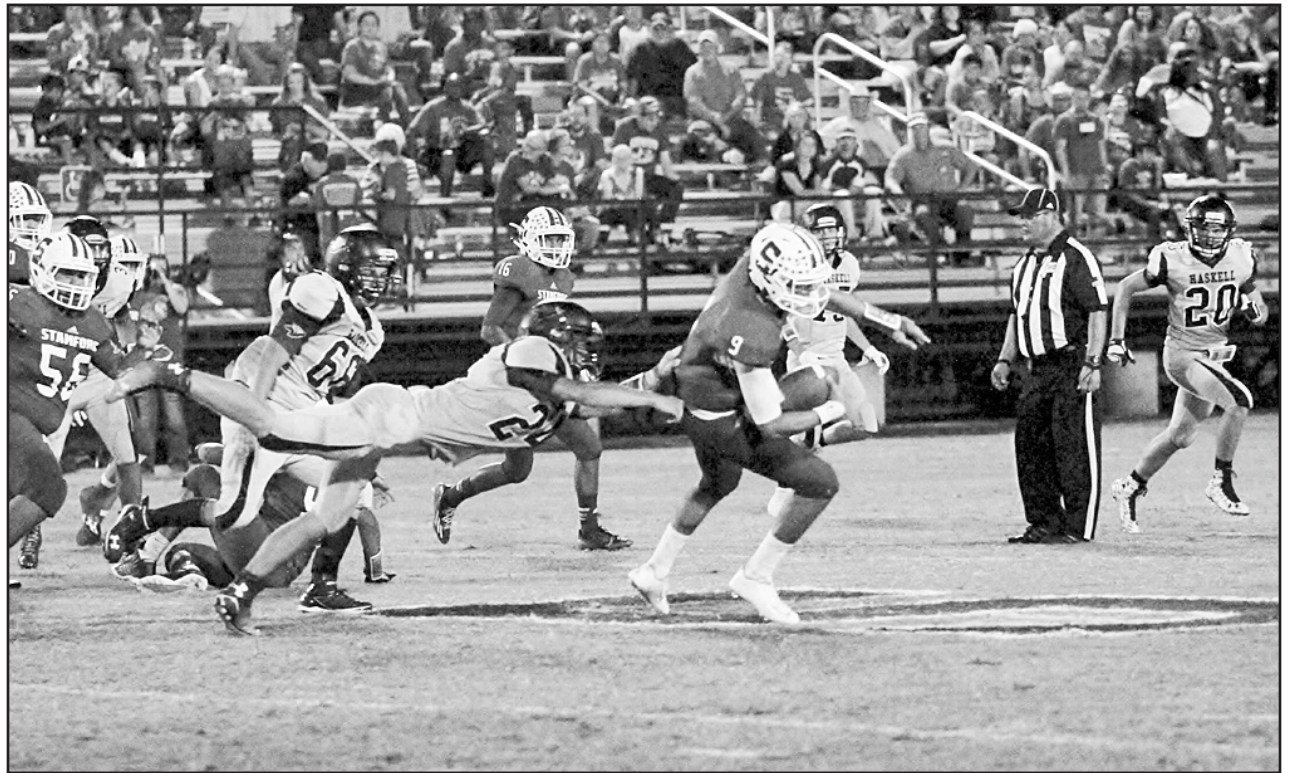

came into this match-up undefeated with 3-0 records, now the Bulldogs are 4-0, continuing their shot for the perfect season. The Indians will sit back, watch some film, listen to their coaches and try to learn from their mistakes, as district play approaches. While watching film and listening to the coaches I am sure they will see all the positive things they did, and how they were just right there, within inches of beating a top 10 team from the bigger 2A classification.

This game was full of hard fought action between both squads, Haskell had 282 yards of total offense on 58 plays, and the Bulldogs put up 397 total yards on 55 plays. The only real difference in these two teams is their method

of attack, with the Indians using spread and pistol formations to attack mostly with the running game. The Stamford offense is powered more by their passing attack. Example, Dylan Hanson of Haskell completed six out of 11 passes for 66 yards and one touchdown, while the Bulldogs' Ligon West threw the ball 31 times completing 24 of them for four touchdowns, with one interception.

You will see the same kind of lopsided difference in the teams running games. Haskell carried the ball 46 times for 216 yards, as the Bulldogs ran the ball 24 times for just 78 yards. The Indians ground game was lead again by #22 Lane Burson, who despite having a defense that was out to stop him, still had 24 carries for 130 yards, averaging more than

five yards per carry with one touchdown. Stamford was led by Zai Zai Smith who carried the ball nine times for 43 yards, but Smith also led the Bulldogs in receiving, catching eight passes for 146 yards.

On Saturday morning Coach Grady Benton had this to say about the game. "It's not in Haskell's nature to settle for almost. With that said I couldn't be more proud of my team, my coaches, and my community's will to win. We talked about it all week coming down to a play here or there, and that's exactly what happened. It's unfortunate that anybody had to lose that football game. We must learn from that experience, refocus quickly and prepare for our next challenge."

Now the Tribe will be trying to get back in the

win column, as the Olney Cubs will be traveling to Indian Field. Haskell isn't just looking for a win, but also celebrating Homecoming for old people like me. The Cubs are coming into Haskell with an 0-4 record, looking for an upset to earn their first win of the season. So Indian fans save all the Homecoming partying for after the game, and support your Indians while they earn win number four, before heading into district play.

The Federal Communications Commission and the Public Utility Commission of Texas have established programs to make basic telephone service more affordable to eligible customers. **Lifeline Service** is a program designed to make basic telephone service available at reduced rates to eligible residential customers. Customer's eligibility to receive the discount must be renewed periodically. The program is limited to one benefit per household, consisting of either wireline or wireless service.

Who Qualifies? You are eligible for Lifeline Service if your annual household income is at or below 150% of the federal poverty guidelines, or in your household resides a person who receives or has a child who receives benefits from at least one of the following programs:

Medical Assistance (Medicaid), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance (FPHA), National School Lunch Program (only applicant or customer who satisfy the income standard of the program for free meals), Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Health benefits coverage under the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), An eligible customer residing in tribal lands, Bureau of Indian Affairs general assistance, Tribally administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Head Start (only those households meeting its income qualifying standard), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), Children under 17 years of age with no health insurance, Other eligible programs may apply.

Information about customers who qualify for Lifeline Service may be shared between state agencies and Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative Inc. Lifeline customers can also subscribe to optional services at the same rate offered to other customers.

What Universal Services are available to all customers? Universal services are offered to all customers of Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative. Universal Services available include the following services: Voice grade access to the public switched network or its functional equivalent, Minutes of use for Local service, Access to emergency services to the extent the local government has implemented 911 or enhanced 911 systems, Toll limitation for qualifying low-income consumers, Local Calling for Residential Service is \$10.55-\$16.00 and Business Service is \$15.90-\$23.30, Ability to report service problems seven days a week

In addition to the above services, Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative offers optional calling features, along with Santa Rosa Communications Long Distance, SRCaccess.net-internet/DSL, and SRTV (where available). Customers who are eligible for the Lifeline Program are also eligible for toll blocking at no charge.

Store Front Development Program taking applications

The Development Corporation of Haskell (DCOH) and Haskell Downtown Revitalization Committee (DRC) are now accepting applications for the 2015-2016 Store Front Development Program (SFDP).

The DCOH Store Front Development Program is a matching grant program available for businesses and commercial building owners within the Haskell city limits. Approved applicants are eligible to receive up to \$2,500 in grant funds for completing façade and exterior improvements according to program guidelines. Eligible projects

approved for SFDP funds may include paint, signage, lighting, windows, doors, awnings and contract labor.

The DCOH board of directors has allocated \$30,000 in the 2015-16 Fiscal Year for the Store Front Development Program, which is in its third year. Applications will now be reviewed on a quarterly basis

by the Haskell DRC until grant funds are exhausted for the year.

This weekend will be a very busy one, as the Haskell/Mattson/Weinert/Rochester Homecoming 2015 and the many activities associated with it, take place. There is one other event happening, that you will want to be sure to add to your schedule.

Randy Mac will be back! Randy McLelland, who served as the Youth Pastor at First Baptist Church in Haskell for over nine years, will hold a book signing at Henderson Book Store, on the west side of the square in Haskell. The event is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 26, from 11 a.m. until 1:30 p.m.

McLelland has written and published "Livin' It Up," a collection of short stories which provides a healthy, daily dose of humor along with a devotional thought from Randy's long-time friend and Christian author, Robert Noland.

McLelland didn't begin his adult work life intending to go into the ministry. While working as a pipefitter in Pasadena where he and his wife Robbie lived, he was approached by his church pastor to consider full time youth ministry. Although he declined on several occasions, God had a plan. He says, "After a time of struggling with God's obvious call on my life, I made the decision to go into full time youth ministry at twenty-nine years old."

He moved his family to Haskell in 1986. As those

who were in the area during his time at FBC Haskell know, he was not only the youth minister, but also a very integral part of the community. He often performed and exceeded events and was always willing to share his talents.

McLelland has been speaking and entertaining groups for many years. Even as a young boy, he knew he liked being behind a microphone. Through the years he not only evolved in his Christian faith and his music interests, but he also discovered that he enjoyed making people laugh.

Since leaving Haskell in 1995, McLelland's life has taken many twists and turns. In the fall of 1997, McLelland says, "We were given the opportunity to pursue a long-time dream of having our own ministry. It involved preaching, concerts and providing clean entertainment for various events." Six years later he established Livin' It Up Ministries. In January 2003, through God's leading, he started and pastored a new church, Cornerstone Christian Fellowship, in Glen Rose.

In December 2010, after a long, hard fought battle with Lupus, Robbie his wife of thirty-three years, stepped into Heaven with her Lord.

McLelland recalls that shortly after moving to Haskell, he met Kevin and Julie Walker, who were serving at East Side Baptist Church in Haskell. He and

Kevin worked together at many youth camps in the area. The Walkers left Haskell in 1989, accepting a position in Lampasas. They later moved to Arlington, where he was the Worship Pastor at Pantego Bible Church. They eventually moved to Colorado to start a new ministry, however Kevin was diagnosed with Lymphoma, and passed away in March 2010.

God was not finished with Randy McLelland or Julie Walker. Through a winding set of circumstances, they reconnected after many

years and in September 2013, were married in Estes Park, Colorado. They live in Monument, Colorado, where she is a sign language interpreter and they continue to travel, providing ministry, entertainment and/or motivational talks wherever the opportunity arises. McLelland says, "We now seek God's plan to use us for His glory, however He sees fit."

Food manager certification course deadline is Oct. 5

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, one in six Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

If under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Jones, Taylor and Nolan Counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This two day program will be offered for \$125.00 on Oct. 19 and Oct. 26 at the Taylor County Extension Office. Cost includes training, materials, and the ServSafe food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification will be valid for five years.

Registration deadline is Oct. 5.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

- Increased customer satisfaction
- Improved relationships with health officials
- Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:

- identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling
 - preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food
 - teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees
 - complying with government regulations
 - maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
 - controlling pests
- Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. Each spring at Steppin' Out for Memories, the Alzheimer's Association annual dinner dance and auction, local artists select paintings by artists in Memories in the Making to inspire their own works of art, which are sold at the auction to raise money to support programs for Abilene area families living with Alzheimer's. The workshop offers a way for artists to gain insight into Alzheimer's disease and learn how people with dementia express themselves creatively.

Lisa Buck, Memories in the Making® Coordinator for the Alzheimer's Association,

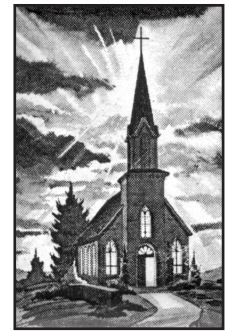

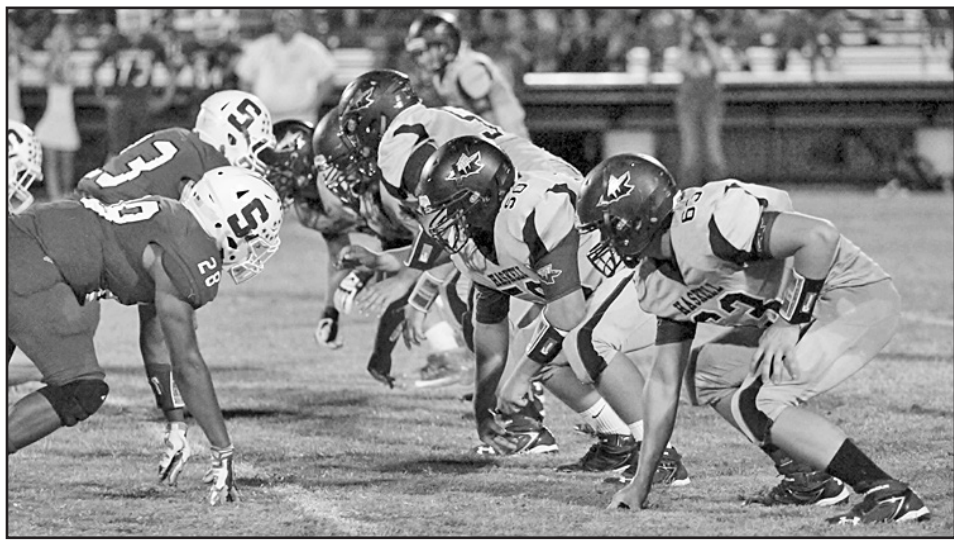

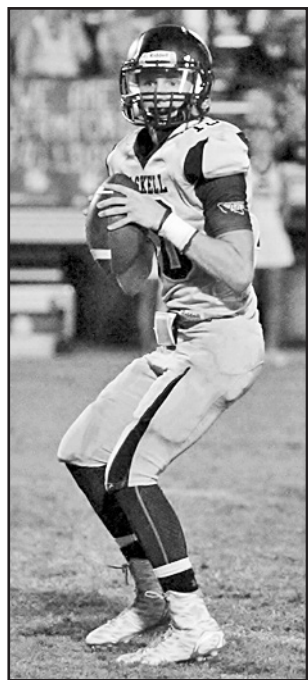
Lane Burson receives Ford Player of the Week honors

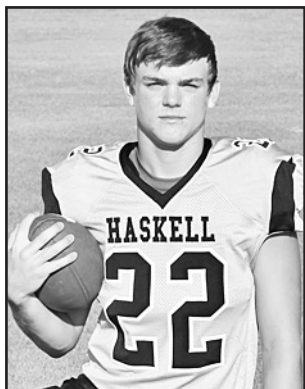


LOOKING TO PASS—Haskell Indian Quarterback #10 Dylan Hanson reads the defense before sending the pass.

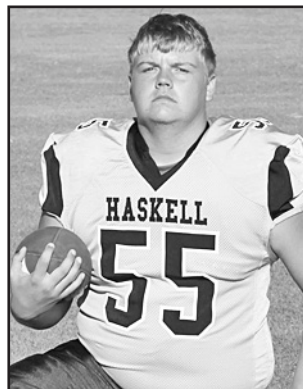

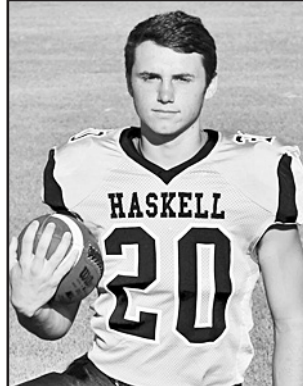
MOVING THE BALL—Haskell Indian #22 Lane Burson seems to fly through the defense as he rushes for yards for the Indians in the game against Stamford.



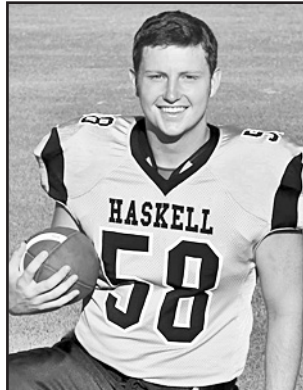

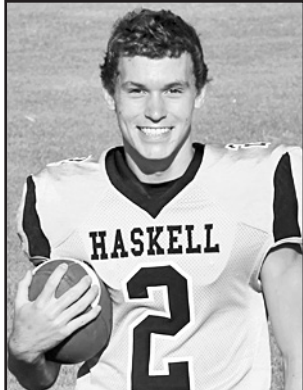

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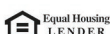
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
