Many homemakers have asked us for information on how to freeze okra for frying. The following information was received this week from Frances Reasonover, Foods and Nutrition Specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

Fried okra is a favorite with most families. For freezer storage for periods longer than 3 weeks, steam blanch, fast freeze on a cookie sheet, roll in cornmeal or a mixture of cornmeal and flour, seal in plastic bags and return to the freezer.

Okra may be dried and used in such foods as soups and gumbo. To dry the okra, wash, trim and slice crosswise in 1/8 to 1/4 inch discs. Place on a drying tray and dry for 3 to 6 hours at 140 deg. F. in a preheated oven with the door proped open at least 4 inches. Thur. 2 Okra will dry in the sun in 8 to 11 hours if the temperature is 100 deg. F. or above and humidity is relatively low. Thus far this summer, temperatures in Texas have not been favorable for sun drying. Pack dried okra as soon as

cool in a dry, scalded, insect-proof container such as canning jars with well fitted lids. Coffee cans may be used if okra is first placed in a plastic bag. Pack as tightly as possible without crushing.

Store the containers of dried okra in a dry, cook and dark place. Low storage temperatures extend the shelf life of the dried product.

The Divide Trojans come to Hobbs this Friday at 8 p.m. The Panthers are thinking positive about getting in the win column and are looking forward to a very exciting game.




County Entomologist Column

COTTON; Dry weather conditions and heavy boll weevil populations have destroyed many squares and small bolls in the tops of the plants. Boll weevil infestation causing from 10-90 percent square damage are present in many fields.

Bollworm infestations have increased in a few cotton fields where cotton is still growing well. Five-ten small worms per 100 terminals can be found in some of these fields.

GRAIN SORGHUM: Most sorghum fields in the area are mature and some harvesting is underway. Sorghum that is blooming or will bloom in the future should be watched closely for Sorghum midge.



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



PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

NUMBER ONE **ON THE BALLOT** (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legis-lature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sec-tions 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

(H.J.R. 99) H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as estab-lished by the Legislature. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
