The first shower of the reporting period was on Tuesday, Sept. 14, with .36. On Saturday, September 18, another .22 fell in the


morning hours. The largest daily total was on Sunday, September 19, when the area received 1.03 inches during the 24 hour



The first quarter opened with the Panthers receiving the kick-off. They pushed the ball forward only to fumble and lose it. Foster Care Plan Reviewed

The Department of Public Welfare's new subsidized adoptions program is reducing the cost of foster care in Texas, Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell said today.

The savings is being realized for children placed in state-subsidized adoptions instead of remaining in state-paid foster care.

The program begain September 1, 1975. It finds adoptive homes for hard-toplace children, and offers the adopting families subsidies for such things as medical and legal expenses.

The program operates for children with mental or physical problems, or groups of school age brothers and

The program was passed in 1971 by the 62nd Legisla-

Bobbie Matthews, in charge of the program, said "Without some kind of financial assitance, we'd not be able to get adoption for some children and we'd have to keep then in foster care until they were grown.

It costs an average of \$110 a month to keep a child in foster care, Ms. Matthews

Thirty-five children were approved for state-paid subsidized adoption, Matthews

"By placing them into adoption, we saved 30 percent over what it would have cost if they'd stayed in foster care," said Matthews.

"But the real value of the program is not financial," said Vowell. "It means that a child who otherwise would not have a permanent home with a family, will have one. There is not way to figure that value in terms of dollars and cents".

Farm Bureau Gives Hobbs Safety Tips

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held Septem-

ber 21 at Hobbs School. The three things needed to start a fire--air, fuel and heat-brightly illuminated as Bullard plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, causing the flashing "FIRE" sign. He defined fire control as he removed, one at a time,

the three parts. As part of a discussion on fire control and the classes of fire (A,B,C,D) Bullard dem-

smothering the flame of a candle; smothering the flame of a kitchen fire (pot. of burning grease-class B) and taking away the air or oxygen of another class B fire--a burning gasoline rag.

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Bullard gave applicable prevention and control sugges-

tions. For fire control, Bullard pointed out that many fires in the home, vehicles, equipment and onstrated taking away air by other buildings can

extinguished while in the incipient state; provided you have a U/L approved extinguisher of the correct size and type. "Recharge each portable extingusiher after each use", he added.

This very educational fire program was brought to the group under the sponsorship of the Fisher County Farm Bureau. FFA president, Willis Ogden, assisted Bullard as Junior Fire Marshall. Schedule Set

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said beef producers are in a crisis situation now that may affect future beef supplies.

'There'll never be a better time for housewives to fill their freezers with bargain beef," the Dalhart grain and beef producer said.

"Many cattlemen will be forced out of business unless there is an upturn in cattle prices soon," said the farm leader.

"There's been a gradual decrease in cattle prices all summer, but the situation in the past three or four weeks has become disastrous," he

Chaloupka said there is a disappointing lag in the pass-through of lower prices at the retail level.

"However, beef is selling in the stores for about 13. percent less than a year ago. This is a real bargain, and we want to let the housewives know about it so we can move some of the present glut of beef off the market" he said.

The president of the 190,000 member general farm organization said that efforts are being made by Farm Bureau to bring "more efficiency and fairness" into marketing of beef.

"The American Farm Bureau Federation has asked Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz for a step-up in ongoing investigations into factors affecting the farm price of beef", Chaloupka said.

"For example, we want to know whether or not labor unions are blocking the movement of boxed beef into markets and if so, what effect is the blockage having on beef prices," the farm leader said.

Boxed beef involves the breakdown of beef carcasses at the packing plant and packaging the meat cuts for shipment to retail outlets. It means a savings over shipping whole carcasses and reduces labor costs.

Labor contracts with meat cutter unions either prohibit or severely limit the movement of boxed beef into at least 12 major cities, including Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and Houston.

Another issue relating to labor unions involves labor contracts with meat cutter unions which prohibit the sale of meat after 6 p.m. in some large cities.

The Farm Bureau is also asking the U.S. Department of Agriculture to find out what can be done about the lag in "passing through" lower cattle prices at the

retail level. Chaloupka said USDA statistics show that retail beef prices never come down as fast or as far as cattle



Social security benefits were being paid to 1,349 residents of Fisher County at a rate of \$202,018 a month at the start of 1976, Glyn Hammons, social security manager in Abilene said

Monthly social security benefits are payable to workers and their dependents when the worker retires, becomes severely disabled, or dies. 694 retired workers and 67 disabled workers received monthly social security benefits at the beginning of 1976. In addition, 216 wives or husbands of the worker, 167 children and 205 widows, widowers or parents received monthly social se-

curity benefits. In Fisher County 382 beneficiaries were under age 65: 967 beneficiaries were age 65 and over. Of the total number of adult beneficiaries were age 65 and over. Of the total number of adult beneficiaries, 504 were men and 678 women.

In the 11 county area served by the Abilene Social Security Office, there is a total of 37,615 beneficiaries receiving monthly payments totalling \$6,075,598.

Today, social security is the Nation's basic method of providing a continuing income when family earnings are reduced or stop because of retirement, disability, or

Nine out of 10 workers in the United States are earning protection under social security. Nearly 1 out of every 7 persons in this country receives monthly social security checks.

Such a program will be increasingly important in the months ahead. Under present economic conditions, lowCOUNTY

yields are not profitable, and fertilization, at least with nitrogen, is generally necessary for profitable yields. Yet, the need for each plant nutrient and its potential profitability should be closely evaluated.

For additional information on fertilizer use in Fisher County producers are invited to review the 1975 handbook

of result demonstrations. Various fertilizer rates were used on different crops to determine the highest profit potential, and these studies merit close evaluation.

There's good reason for concern if any licensed vaccine, bacterin, antitoxin, serum or related product fails to perform. Few

products have been tested as thoroughly as the veterinary biologics licensed by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

The Virus-Serum-Toxic Act of 1913 requires all veterinary biologics in interstate trade to be licensed by USDA and to be pure, safe, potent and effective. Licen-

sing and inspection procedures keep producers and their products up to the mark--requiring high stand-ards of sanitation, exact records, uniform production procedures and sampling and testing of every production lot. Even the labels and instructions for use must meet USDA approval.
