Headquarters to be Located In Office County Agent; Plan Is Outlined

According to R. H. Maxwell, county agent, he has just received word that his office is to be made the headquarters for the emergency crop oans, and formers desiring loans should apply to Reynolds Wilson, who will be in charge.

According to the regulations under which the crop loans are to be made this year, any farmer who secures a loan must state that he does not intend to increase his acreage or production in violation of ministration program.

In counties where a county production council has not been set up, before any application for a loan will be considered the farmer who is applying will have to give satisfactory evidence that he is co-operating with the production control program of the Agricultural Adustment Administration.

The maximum amount of an emergency crop loan that may be obtained by any one individual is \$250, the minimum is \$25.

Applications for loans in any amount from \$25 to \$150 may be accepted by the emergency crop oan office provided the farmer does not have suficient security to obtain a loan elsewhere.





#### ELIMINATE LEGAL RED TAPE

Attorney General Homer Cummings has asked members of the Bar Associations throughout the country to join him in an effort to have the making of rules governing court room procedure taken from the legislative branches of government and turned over to the judiciary. This, in essence, was understood to mean taking the courts out of politics.

"Surely." he said, "rules of court can be applied with less rigidity than statutory provisions.

It is, in effect, the same shift of authority accomplished by England in 1873, and "it has been functioning with success ever since." he added.

"The English administration of justice is rightly renowned," he continued. "Legal writers attribute no small share of its celerity and success to the fact that practice and procedure are regulated by rules prescribed by a rules committee consisting of eight judges and four

A similar arrangement would doubtless work well in this country. Court procedures should be simplified in all states and steps should be taken to eliminate red

Attorney General Cummings' proposals should be supported by the members of the bar, and also by other citiens, anyone of whom may be injured at some time by unnecessary legal delays or by other technicalities in court room procedure.

#### WHITE COLLAR JOBS

Boys should be thought to think less of fitting themselves for "white collar" jobs, says Prof. F. G. Nichols, of Harvard, who points out the greater opportunities for promotion in industry than in clerical pursuits.

The young man who starts at the bottom in a factory often soon outdistances one who begins, say, as a bookkeeper. The idea is that while the clerk or bookkeeper may have a white collar job from the very first, the ambitious and intelligent industrial worker has a better chance to rise to an executive position, so that when he does reach the white collar job it means something worth while.

Advice along a similar line is given by President Thatcher of the Massachusetts Agricultural College, who defends vocational schools against the reproach sometimes leveled against them by the classical student. He says that "the idea is erroneous that vocational schools are undignified because they work with materials near at hand and not with a knowledge of things that are ancient and far off."

#### GRADING FARM PRODUCTS

No farmer would expect to sell at a good price a barrel filled with onions, cucumbers, turnips and potatoes all mixed together. It is almost as foolish to expect to get the best market price for a barrel of a single product in which all sorts are dumped without regard to size,

By neglecting to properly grade their produce, many farmers must sell it for less than might be obtained for the same stuff by exercising a little care in preparing it for market. In discussing this important phase of marketing an expert says:

Quality and uniformity in grains, fruit, cotton, potatoes, dairy and poultry products command a premium from the buyer. A crate of large clean eggs of uniform color will bring more in a central market than one in which small, dirty, many colored eggs are included. Dirty potatoes of mixed sizes sell poorly alongside of clean ones that have been graded."

#### A USEFUL INVENTION

From Paris omes news of an invention which should be hailed with enthusiasm by the motoring public. It is an automatic jack to be operated from the instrument board of the automobile.

In case of a flat tire the driver may raise the wheel by simply pressing a button. Each wheel is supplied with a jack in the form of a steel cylinder fitted with a double telescopic piston. When not in use the lower end of the jack is drawn up level with the axle, so as not to reduce the road clearance.

The advantages of having a car equipped with such a device would be greater than its mere convenience of operation. The jack would be there when it was needed. Thieves could not steal it, and neighbors could not






