



The program was conducted by the Fire Protection Training Division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency and Vocational Industrial Foundation. Principal instructors were Bill Thompson of Austin, Deputy State Fire Marshall; Harold Emerson, Crime Prevention Director of the Abilene Police Department; Ed Smith of Channelview with the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Assn. and Joe Schinkler of Abilene, regional Supervisor of the Texas Air Control Board.

Sessions included "Attack on Arson", "Bombs-Search, Recognition and Procedures": "News Media and The Fire Service"; "Manager-Mayor Relations With the Fire Chief"; "New Proposed Key Rate" and EPA Clean Air Act.

Chief Neeley reported the sessions attended were very informative and the field projects were very instructive.

The 102 state winners will participate in a four-day Century III Leaders meeting in Colonial Williamsburg, Va., in March, 1977, in which national education, business and government leaders will conduct seminars about current issues. At the completion of the conference, the national winner will be selected.

Winners will be selected on the basis of performance a specially prepared in current events examination conducted in each school; the student's participation in school and community activities; and a "Projection for Innovative Leadership" This projection must be a written statement of the student's ideas about how Americans can meet the nation's needs and challenges during its third century.

Owen B. Kernan, executive secretary of NASSP, says the competition will begin at local participating high schools were one winner will be selected for A Certificate of Recognition, and an opportunity to win a state scholarship.

Any graduating senior in an accredited public, private or parochial high school can enter the competition by submitting an application to the school principal before the deadline of Oct. 15, 1976. NASSP has sent complete information to the principals all accredited high schools.

Local winners will be announced by their schools by Nov. 1, and state winners will be notified by Dec. 26.

Last year's national winner was Miss Shelley Smith, Crestwood High School, Cresco, Iowa. She is attending the University of Minnesota on her \$11,000 state and

As It Looks From Here

Probably few would deny the right of public employees including policemen and firemen to form their ownlocal organizations in order to express their grievances. It is natural that they act collectively to bargain with

The trouble is that it is difficult to distinguish in law between purely local organizations and the big national unions with their monopolistic power. Because of their political clout, the big unions usually resort to strikes or the threats of striking as their first move in collective

their local entity of govern-

ment on pay and working

bargaining. Strikes against government at any level are different from strikes against the private sector. In the first place, the public gets hurt since there are no corporate profits against which to measure the unions' demands. Secondly, the taxpayer's wallet is the source of whatever additional cost is involved.

An independent research group has gathered figures from the Bureau of Labor Statistics on what has happened in the 34 States where governments are required by law to engage in collective bargaining. The report shows four interrelated trends over the last

"1. A dramatic increase in the number of state and local employees.

"2. An increase in unionization. Since 1956, the number of employees in the

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

According to the state farm leader, Texas farmers recognize that their probgrain and rice prices are a direct result of the policies of the Ford administration and Secretary of Agriculture Butz.

"Texas farmers want a farmer-Secretary of Agriculture who is sympathetic with the problems of family farmers and ranchers. They identify Secretary Butz with the international grain traders and the feed processors. They can't waint to get rid of the present Secretary of Agriculture," Naman commented.

"There is deep unrest and resentment among the farmers and ranchers in Texas. Rice farmers are disgusted with the administration over the loss of the rice program. Peanut farmers are angry at the Secretary of Agriculture Mrs. Neda Kiser; Mr. and of his distortion of the truth about the peanut program and bad administration of that program. Wheat, feed grain and cotton producers are seething at the bad administration of the disaster program and the low loan prices set by the Secretary. Cattle producers are mad at the attitude of the administration toward imported beef.

"I know of no segment of Texas agriculture sympathetic to the farm policies of this administration. I predict the agricultural community will go for Carter and Mondale," Naman said.
