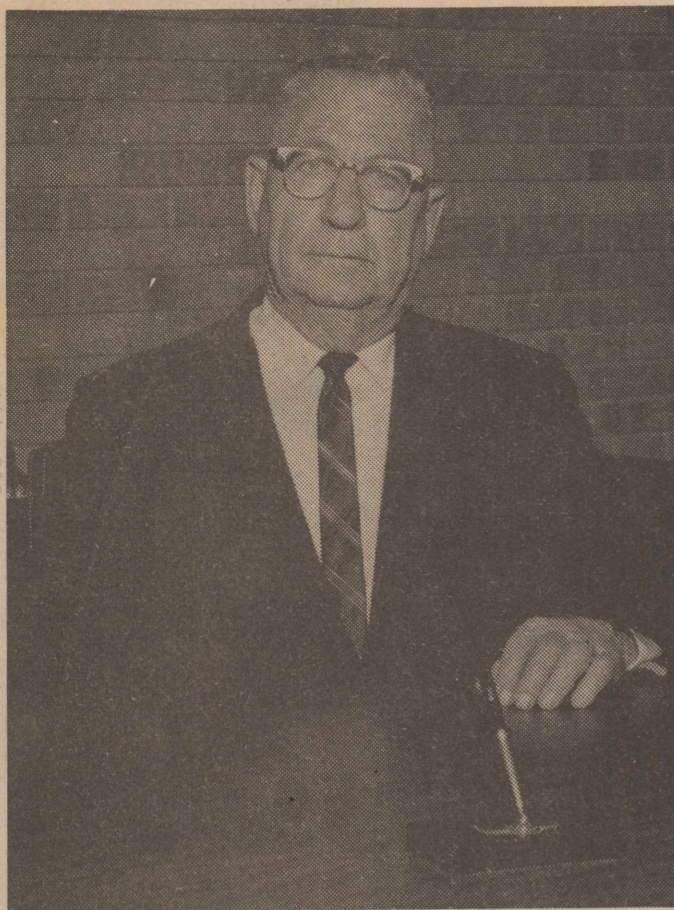

### Raleigh Springer Civic Leader, Dies At 76

Raleigh Springer, age 76, died early Tuesday afternoon at the Fisher County Hospital. He had been confined to the hospital on several occasions during the past several months. Springer moved to Rotan in 1945 from Aspermont to take over as president of the First National Bank. He had been in the banking business in Aspermont for 20 years before moving to Rotan. Springer was born in Haskell, Texas on December 14, 1899 and was active at one time in almost all Rotan civic groups. He was a member of the Rotan Lions Club, Rotan Chamber of Commerce and headed the Salvation Army fund drive for many years. One of the favorite causes and most dear to his heart was the Cattlemen's Roundup for Crippled Children. He served as the Roundup area chairman for several years. He was also a strong supporter of United States Savings Bonds, having served for many years as chairman of the county bond sale drive. Springer was a member of the First United Methodist Church, having worked and held most all offices in the volunteer function. He was active in the construction of the Methodist parsonage and a member of the church board when funds were raised to construct the present church building. Under Springer's guidance and leadership, the First National Bank of Rotan blossomed from a two million dollar asset institution in 1945 to its present size of fourteen to fifteen million in assets. Springer had the reputation of being a tough conservative banker, but one that was extremely fair with everyone. He was highly respected by area farmers and ranchers with whom he had the majority of his business dealings. Springer was instrumental in landing the Rotan Housing Authority and getting the Community Center for Rotan. Springer relinquished the reins of the presidency of the First National Bank approximately two years ago to his son James. He was chairman of the board at the time of his death. He is survived by his wife, Golda, one son, James of Rotan; and three grandchildren; Phil of Dallas, David of Austin and Cindy of Rotan. Funeral arrangements were pending at press time.

### Community Block Grant Meeting For Rotan Thurs

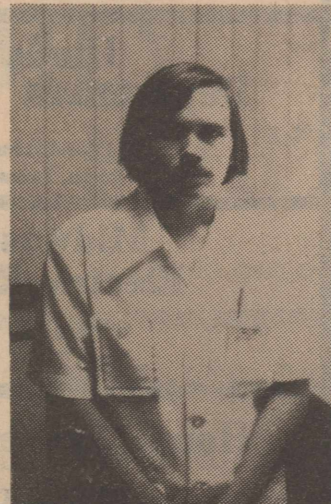

WHEREAS 4-H members put into practice the skills and science they learn through their projects and activities and strive "To Make The Best Better", the motto of 4-H Club Work; and

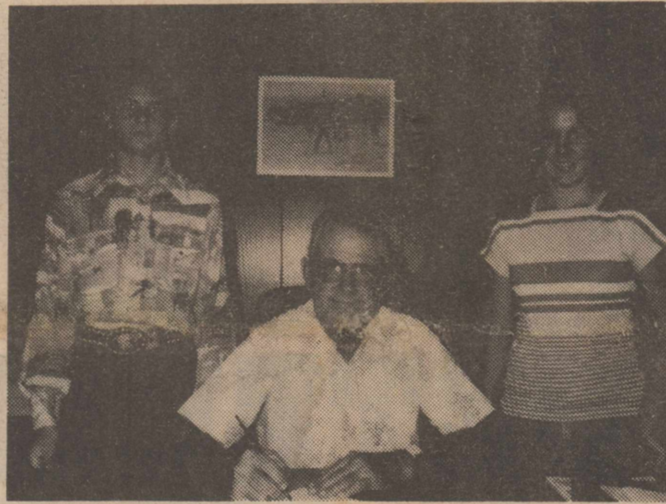

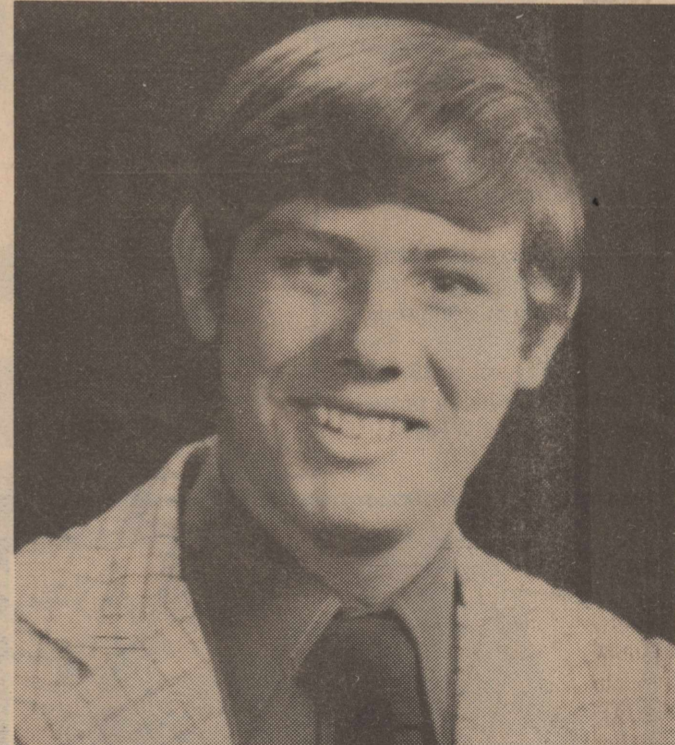
Randy is a strong leader is very deserving of the highest 4-H award at the county

The program was conducted by the Fire Protection Training Division of the Texas Engineering Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency and Vocational Industrial Foundation. Principal instructors were Bill Thompson of Austin, Deputy State Fire Marshall; Harold Emerson, Crime Prevention Director of the Abilene Police Department; Ed Smith of Channelview with the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Assn. and Joe Schinkler of Abilene, regional Supervisor of the Texas Air Control Board.

Sessions included "Attack on Arson", "Bombs-Search, Recognition and Procedures"; "News Media and The Fire Service"; "Manager-Mayor Relations With the Fire Chief"; "New Proposed Key Rate" and EPA Clean Air Act.

Chief Neeley reported the sessions attended were very informative and the field projects were very instructive.

national award will be a \$10,000 college scholarship. Two winners from each state and the District of Columbia will get \$1,000 scholarships, and the nine national finalists will receive an additional \$500 scholarship.

The 102 state winners will participate in a four-day Century III Leaders meeting in Colonial Williamsburg, Va., in March, 1977, in which national education, business and government leaders will conduct seminars about current issues. At the completion of the conference, the national winner will be selected.

Winners will be selected on the basis of performance in a specially prepared current events examination conducted in each school; the student's participation in school and community activities; and a "Projection for Innovative Leadership". This projection must be a written statement of the student's ideas about how Americans can meet the nation's needs and challenges during its third century.

Owen B. Kernan, executive secretary of NASSP, says the competition will begin at local participating high schools were one winner will be selected for A Certificate of Recognition, and an opportunity to win a state scholarship.

Any graduating senior in an accredited public, private or parochial high school can enter the competition by submitting an application to the school principal before the deadline of Oct. 15, 1976.

NASSP has sent complete information to the principals of all accredited high schools.

Local winners will be announced by their schools by Nov. 1, and state winners will be notified by Dec. 26.

Last year's national winner was Miss Shelley Smith, Crestwood High School, Cresco, Iowa. She is attending the University of Minnesota on her \$11,000 state and national scholarships.

The Century III Leaders Scholarship Program is administered by NASSP and is funded by the Shell Oil Company.

**COUNTY AGENT NEWS**

Certified seed purchased after Jan. 1, 1977, will be certified only for genetic identity.

This means that the seed has been produced and processed under standards and procedures established by the Texas Seed and Plant Board and enforced by the Texas Department of Agriculture to assure that the variety is as represented by the certification label accompanying the seed.

Since the new certification standard is concerned only with the genetic identity of the variety, it does not consider such quality factors as purity, inert matter, other crop seed, weed seed, noxious weed seed and germination percentage. However, the Texas Seed Law still requires that seed quality information be truthfully labeled on a separate analysis label accompanying the seed. Remember, both labels tell the complete story about the seed.

Listed are a number of reasons for the change in seed certification standards: --To assure a more depend-

able supply of seed officially certified as to genetic identity.

--To establish uniformity with the Federal Seed Act.

--To encourage international seed trade.

--To encourage competition for producing higher quality seed.

--To allow production of certified seed having quality characteristics for different market needs.

Producers buying seed for the 1977 planting season should look for the new genetic certification label along with the analysis label accompanying the seed. Each of the labels has a specific purpose. The certification label means the variety is properly identified while the analysis label provides seed quality information. Producers must read carefully both labels to determine if the seed meets their requirements.

## Bicentennial Display Coming To The County

The Bicentennial of the American Revolution is bringing the world's attention to the time when the 13 British colonies on the Atlantic coast of North America declared their independence from England.

It would be 69 years before Texas became a state of the Union; so, one may ask, how can Texans feel personally involved in celebrating an event so far removed by time and distance? After all, we were only a minor sub-province to New Spain in 1776.

The Institute of Texan Cultures has produced a major traveling show that answers the question. With pictures and story pulled together by a colorful, innovative design, it shows that Texas does not have to borrow all of its Bicentennial history from the U.S. East Coast.

The exhibition will be displayed in Hobbs School Library from Oct. 1 to October 15. It will be displayed later at First National Bank of Rotan, Rotan High School and the Fisher County Courthouse at Roby.

What is called the American Revolution was but the first stage of the Revolution of the Americas. Within 50 years after 1776, the greater part of the Western hemisphere was free of European rule, and Texas had a stake in three of these revolutions.

The show is named "Texas and the American Revolution". Borrowers pay only freight charges to and from the Institute.

The exhibit consists of eight columns of silk-screened words and pictures. The tallest columns are nearly nine feet high; others are

over six feet. It was produced by the research and exhibits staff of the Institute, which is an educational research arm of The University of Texas at San Antonio. The show is a result of almost five years of planning, research, design, and fabrication.

Other traveling exhibitions

available for loan from the Institute in San Antonio include "Texas and Her Constitutions", "Vaquero: Genesis of the Texas Cowboy, A Photographic Essay by William D. Whittliff", "The Negro Texans", "The Japanese Texans", "The Spanish Texans", "Highlights of Our Spanish

Heritage", "The Texas Rangers: Their First 150 Years", "Sam Houston Exhibit", and "Sam Houston Sampler".

Information on the exhibitions are available from the Institute, Box 1226, San Antonio, Tex. 78294.

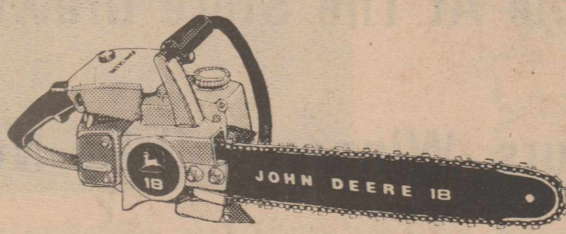

## As It Looks From Here

By Omar Burleson

Probably few would deny the right of public employees including policemen and firemen to form their own local organizations in order to express their grievances. It is natural that they act collectively to bargain with their local entity of government on pay and working conditions.

The trouble is that it is difficult to distinguish in law between purely local organizations and the big national unions with their monopolistic power. Because of their political clout, the big unions usually resort to strikes or the threats of striking as their first move in collective bargaining.

Strikes against government at any level are different from strikes against the private sector. In the first place, the public gets hurt since there are no corporate profits against which to measure the unions' demands. Secondly, the taxpayer's wallet is the source of whatever additional cost is involved.

An independent research group has gathered figures from the Bureau of Labor Statistics on what has happened in the 34 States where governments are required by law to engage in collective bargaining. The report shows four interrelated trends over the last several years.

1. A dramatic increase in the number of state and local employees.

2. An increase in unionization. Since 1956, the number of employees in the

Public sector has increased six-fold.

3. A trend toward legislation giving these unions more power in dealing with governments at all levels. During the period surveyed all but 7 of the 34 States which have such laws or executive orders outlawed strikes by public employees and even those 7 imposed some restrictions.

4. A sharp increase in the number of strikes against the public even in such states where strikes are prohibited by law.

"In every state except one," the Council says, "passage of a compulsory public sector bargaining law has resulted in increased

strike activity." The figures show that the number of strikes in states with collective bargaining laws has been consistently greater than in those without.

Even in those where no strikes, there is a danger in allowing public employees to become puffy in the hands of the big national unions which have no interest in the local community but only for power brought about by the size of the union. If public sector collective bargaining proves to be the wave of the future then we are going to have to keep these dangers in mind or else like the horrible example of New York City—ordinary citizens will be working for the unions.

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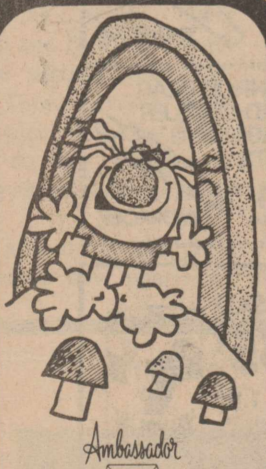
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## Roby Begins District Play Friday At Home
