The members of the Roby Lions Club will begin their annual candy sale this week, according to Roby president, Gayle Morgeson.

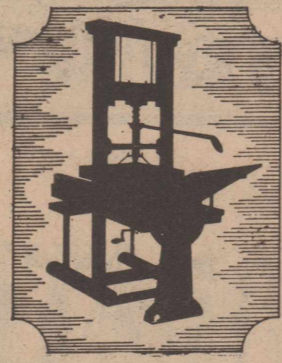
The sale will last until Halloween. Candy may be purchased from any lions club member or at various stations in Roby.

Commissioners View Sketches On Building

The Commissioners Court members viewed an architect's sketch of the interior and exterior of the old Kash Grocery building last Monday morning as one part of their routine meeting.

The architectural firm of Lovett and Sellers presented an exterior sketch of the

building and an interior layout of office space designations to the commissioners. The commissioners instructed the firm to proceed with the drawings that will eventually see a Fisher County Home Demonstration kitchen, HDC meeting room, and office spaces

for welfare offices in the building.

In other action the court discussed the date of the closing for Veteran's Day observances. Although Veteran's Day is November 11th, the court will close in observance of Veteran's Day on October 25.

Fisher County Judge Dwight Lovett told the court that Mrs. Marie Boyd, Texas State Health Department, had indicated that she was going to turn back one of the rooms in the court house that will not be used in the future.

The court discussed Justice of the Peace Jeff Simmons attending a Justice of the Peace meeting in Big Spring.

In closing action the court voted to pay a \$40.00 bill received for the installation of a radio in the Fisher County Ambulance, the radio was given to the hospital district to be used in the back-up ambulance.

Roby School Board Adopts Final Budget

The Roby School Board members met in regular session last Monday night and approved the tax roll as submitted by Buelene Shipp, Roby Tax Assessor-Collector.

The new 65 and older \$3,000 homestead exemption reduced the valuation for 1976-77 some \$366,000 while the veteran's exemption brought it down another \$24,000.

The total valuation for 1976-77 amounted to \$10,844,542.00 which generates approximately \$185,000.00 based on the \$1.70 per \$100.00 valuation.

This new \$185,000.00 figure is increased some \$34,000.00 over the \$151,000 collected last year.

The Roby School Board also adopted the final 1976-77 budget totaling \$455,681,000 which is approximately \$22 to \$24 thousand dollars higher.

Joe DeLosSantos and Jerry Hoodenpyle reported to the board concerning their recent trip to San Antonio to attend the School Board Member and Superintendent's Meeting.

The board approved Buelene Shipp attending a meeting in Abilene on October 21 for Tax Assessors and Collectors.

The board approved the final payment of \$1,266.50 to

Bullock Electric of Sweetwater.

In final action the board hired Ronnie Green to construct a concrete ramp at the elementary school for wheel chair patients and accepted the leave of absence from Kathy McCown effective January 10, 1977. Dora Reyes of Sweetwater was hired in place of Mrs. McCown for the remainder of 1977.

Ambulance Service - A Changing Picture

The first motorized vehicle used for the transportation of medical patients in the United States was in 1906 in the San Francisco earthquake. Since that time we have seen many changes in ambulance services in the U.S.

For many years now ambulance service has generally been provided by funeral homes and private concerns. As costs rose higher and higher and profits from these services dwindled, more and more of these services became a liability instead of an asset.

In the early 1960's a federal study was made of the available facts from the 1950s. It was determined that close to 50,000 people died in the United States from lack of basic care after injuries and illnesses. This study showed that with proper training of personnel many lives could be saved.

The National Highway Safety Act of 1966 began to put some teeth into providing better initial care. After this act of 1966 we have seen new federal guidelines and even new state guidelines for ambulance services.

The last Legislation on ambulance service in the State of Texas was by the 48th Legislature of 1943. But this in no way means that great strides have not been made over the past few years to upgrade our Emergency Medical Services.

As new guidelines were instituted, new training programs were offered which would increase the efficiency of those who were entrusted with the initial emergency care.

Advanced First Aid was offered and then required. The Emergency Care Attendant course is now available. This is a 24-hour basic course.

The Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course has become one of the most popular courses and may soon become required for

attendants who work with patients on our ambulance services. This is a basic 120 hour course which covers many emergency situations and teaches a wide range of patient care.

Also offered are more advanced courses in Emergency Health Care. Included are the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (or Paramedic) course which is an additional 500 hours of training. Colleges in some areas are now offering an Associate Degree in the Emergency Medical Field.

Fisher County has been fortunate to have had a good ambulance service offered by the Weathersbee Funeral Home for so many years. But, with advancing cost, stricter guidelines and higher wages for personnel it became more and more difficult to offer this service. Finally, on September 9 of this year the ambulance service moved to Fisher County Hospital.

Now we move into a new phase of ambulance service. The concept and practice which we now are striving for is the ambulance service as an extension of the Emergency Room. This takes better equipment and more training for personnel. This means higher costs all around.

I am sure that we in Fisher County want the best life

Rotan City Under Dog Restraining Order

Rotan Mayor James Springer briefed the three councilmen present for last Tuesday's meeting on the newest development in the Rayford Hargrove vs. The City of Rotan lawsuit.

Hargrove, on behalf of his two minor sons, is seeking \$215,000 in actual damages and \$5,000.00 in other damages because a City of Rotan policeman shot and killed the family dog. Under the current 1966 Rotan City Ordinance governing dogs the ordinance specifically spells out that an owner will not let his dog run loose. The Hargrove dog was killed approximately a dozen blocks from home. The City of Rotan is being challenged because the same ordinance does not specifically say that a dog will be shot if found wandering through town.

The most recent development in the case is a restraining order received by Mayor Springer from Hargrove's attorney, David Cave, signed by Judge Weldon Kirk. The restraining order asks that no dogs be shot until the pending suit is legally disposed of through due process of law.

In other action the Rotan Council discussed the recently appointed condemnation committee with respect to some of the old buildings and unsafe structures within the city limits. The committee consisting of Wayne Harris, Darrell Underhill, Jerry

Dycus, Carlton Burrow, Rodney Tankersley, and W.B. Hardin will begin condemnation procedures on numerous buildings not in compliance with the ordinance.

The council discussed faulty street signs and plan to replace numerous traffic control signs that have either been bent, broken, painted or stolen.

Rotan Police Chief Chuck Renfrom asked permission to organize a reserve police force. The reserve employees would receive 70 hours of training and be

called upon during emergencies.

The City Councilmen present included Chester Schick, Lawrence Bredemeyer and Lester Sencil. Councilmen not present were Jim Nowlin and Arvin White.

The councilmen voted to accept bids on a pickup for the city.

Rotan City Manager, Kenneth Vann, released the names of two new employees recently hired by the city. M. Huerta will be working in the yard and Jerry Boone will begin work in the near future in that same capacity.

Rotan Elementary In New Reading Program

A new dimension has been added to the curriculum at Rotan Primary. First, second and third grade students are able to attend everyday for activities in the Reading Lab. Children are able to work at their own grade level on skills which are most important to their reading ability. At any given time in the lab at least four different activities are occurring.

The most looked forward to, experience is the new System 80 machine. This is a machine which looks like a small television and operates with a record and filmstrip. The student is asked to

respond to a question by pushing a button under the correct answer. If the correct answer is given, the frame advances. If an incorrect answer is pushed, the frame is repeated until the student chooses the correct answer. The lab contains kits for beginning readers up to students reading at upper grade levels. Most of the children say they wish they had the machine at home.

The Reading Lab is a time to make learning fun. Work is done in small groups with individual instruction. The general feeling of the children is that the Lab is just that—fun.

Screwworms Continue To Increase In Area

Maggots collected in 141 Texas counties during September were identified as screwworms, totalling 6,870 cases, reports Dr. James E. Novy of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Novy is veterinarian in charge of field operations for the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Screwworm Eradication Program.

September samples brought Texas' total for the year to 19,975 cases. This compares to 9,381 by the same date last year, and 71,651 the first nine months of 1972. So far this year Arizona has recorded 132 cases, Arkansas 2, New Mexico 68, and Oklahoma 53.

On the basis of samples submitted by ranchers during September, heaviest Texas screwworm populations are in the hill country and west into Pecos and Brewster counties, comments Novy. Case reporting has declined drastically in most of South Texas where only Hidalgo and Brooks counties recorded more than 100 identified screwworm cases.

Novy adds that verbal reports by South Texas ranchers indicate a severe problem exists in the area, but case reports give evidence the screwworm population has declined drastically over the area.

Screwworms are larvae of the screwworm fly. Adult females of this species deposit batches of about 250 eggs on edges of wounds in any warm blooded animal.

The Screwworm Eradication Program is based on the sterile male concept. Female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes.

Screwworm flies, reared in the APHIS insectary, are

sterilized by nuclear irradiation. Screwworm fly populations are located by lab identification of maggots collected by livestock owners. Sterile flies are then released to mate with wild flies. Eggs produced as the result of a sterile to fertile mating will not hatch, ending the life cycle.

Roby Rebounds And Whips Garden City

The Roby lions hosted the Garden City Bearcats on the Lion's home field last Friday night. The confrontation began at 7:30.

The Lions staged a comeback to their old winning form after being beaten by Baird week before last. The Lions were very sore about their loss and proceeded to revenge it by stomping Garden City 46-0.

The Lions kicked off to the Bearcats to open the game. The Lion defense was up to its old form when they forced the Bearcats to turn over the ball. The offense took over and proceeded to move the ball down to the goal line by the combined running and passing efforts of Ricky Morton and Ricky King. The Lions performed just as well under the quarterbacking of Ricky King who is substituting for Brad Stuart. Brad Stuart is on the bench for the remainder of the season from a broken collar bone suffered in the Baird game.

The first and only score of the first quarter was made by Ricky Morton on the Lions opening drive of the game. The touchdown was set up by a long punt return, then a long bomb from Ricky King placed the Lions deep into Bearcat territory. Ricky Morton then went around the right end and zipped across the goal line. The extra point attempt fails and the score was Roby 6-Garden City 0. The Lions continued trying to score but didn't make the right play at the right time.

In the second period everything went right after Ricky Morton intercepted a pass at the Lion 45 yd. line and ran it all the way back for a TD. The extra point try was again unsuccessful. Roby 12-Garden City 0. The Lion defensive team managed to bottle up the Bearcat offensive efforts long enough for the Lion offense to put together another scoring drive in the closing minutes of the half. The score came with Ricky King on a keeper went to the one foot line.

King gave the ball to Ricky Morton who powered his way over the goal line. The Lions lined up in play formation for the extra point. Ricky Morton took the ball around the right end and crossed the line scot free. The score was then Lions 20-Garden City 0.

Garden City might have been able to score had there been more time left. They had beaten their way down to the goal line and were knocking on the door when the half ran out. The Lions went to the lockers 20 points ahead of the Bearcats.

The Lions returned to the field for the second half cold. On their first drive of the half they were plagued by penalties. The Lions soon found themselves with 45 yards to make a first down. They tried hard but did not succeed. The Bearcats had the same problem. The Lions recover first and took advantage of Bearcat penalties. The Bearcats gave up ground until the Lion offensive machine was on the Bearcat 30-yard line. Ricky Morton found James Putnam open and dropped him a pass which Putnam took over the goal line. The extra point flopped. The score was 26-0.

The next scoring drive began when the Bearcat quarterback became near sighted and throws the ball to Ricky King on the 50 yd. line. A Bearcat penalty a few plays later placed the Lions

on the Bearcat on the 30 yard line where Brad Boyd took over the ball. He began to blow the ball down to the goal line and blasted through the middle from three yards out. The extra point is again no good. At the end of the third period the score was Lions 32-Bearcats 0.

The Lions were really steamrolling then and continued to do so in the fourth period when David Kiser intercepted a pass on the 45 yd. line. Johnny Rivas gets the ball to the Bearcat 36 yd. line. Brad Boyd then went around the right end and was stopped at the 26 yd. line. Al Gonzales dashed around the left end and over the line for another score. Ricky Morton then took the ball around the right end for another two points which left the Bearcats trailing far behind, 40-0.

The Lions came back again late in the fourth quarter when the defense blocked a punt on the 14 yd. line. Johnny Rivas took the ball to the 8 yard line where Al Gonzales got the ball on the reverse play around the left end and took it over for another score. The extra point attempt again flopped. The Lions were way ahead 46-0.

Ricky Morton makes another touchdown in the last seconds of the game but it was called back due to a penalty. The clock runs out with the Bearcats on the short end of the stick 46-0.

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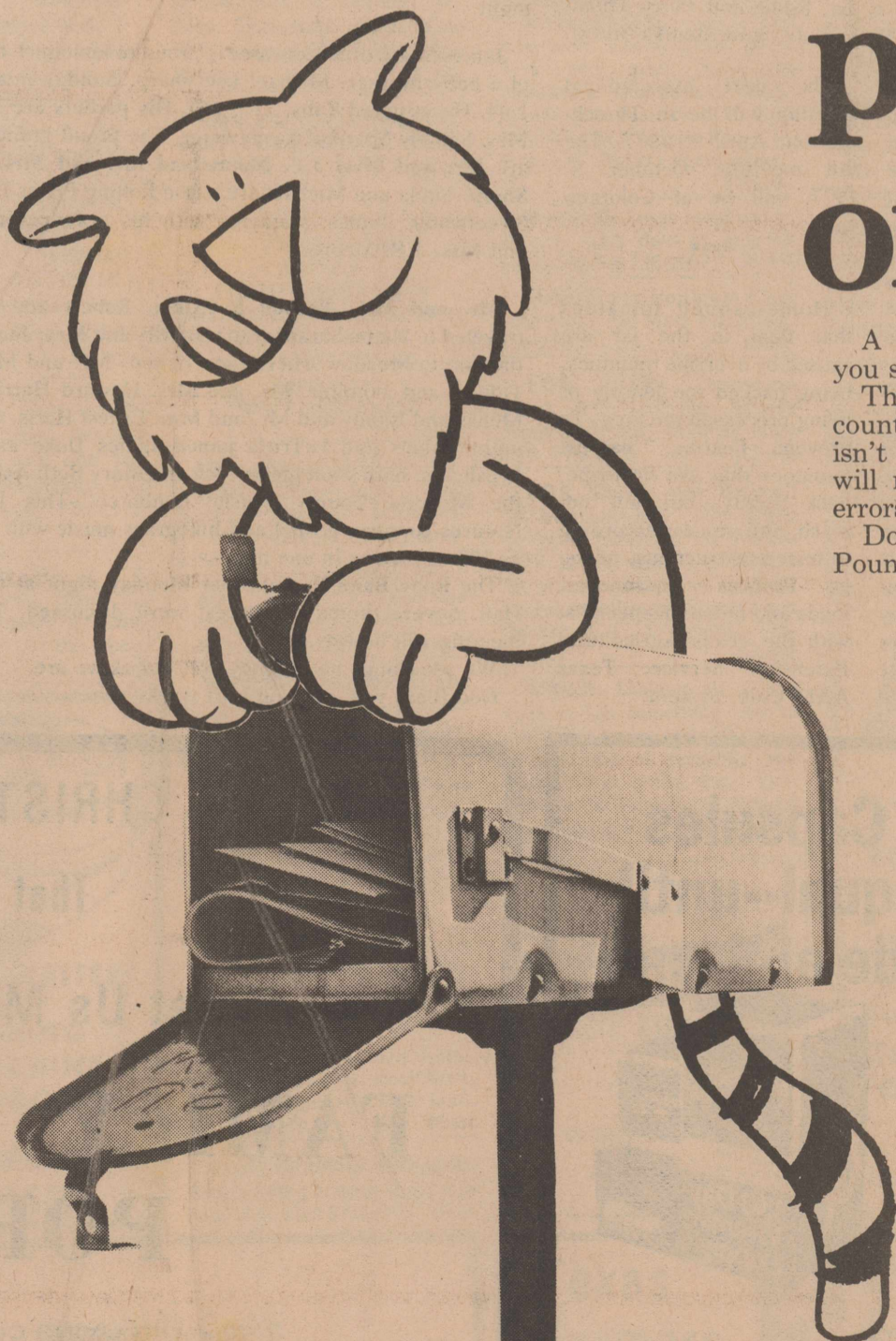

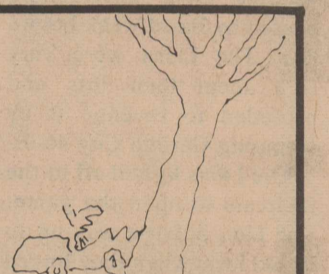

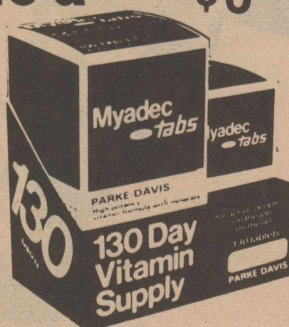

Warren Newberry has served as executive director of the Texas Farm Bureau since February 15, 1972.

In this position he is the chief administrative officer and business manager of the Texas Farm Bureau and Affiliated Companies.

A native Oklahoman, the TFB executive director was reared on a cotton, wheat, and beef cattle farm near Lone Wolf, Oklahoma. He still maintains an active interest in the management of this farm. He graduated from Lone Wolf High School in 1942 and attended the University of Oklahoma.

Newberry operated the family farm until joining the staff of the American Farm Bureau Federation in 1953. He was the first president of the Oklahoma Junior Farm Bureau, and also served as vice chairman (in 1950) and chairman (1951) of the American Farm Bureau Federation Young Farmers and Ranchers Committee.

In 1953, he was employed by the American Farm Bureau Federation as director of Farm Bureau young people's activities from which Farm Bureau's young farmers and ranchers program developed.

In 1956, he was assigned to work with the Southern states as area field services director. He held this position until May of 1970 when he became the director of the field services division of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the position he held when we became Texas Farm Bureau executive director.

During the period that he served as area field services director with the AFBF, Newberry resided in Vernon, where he was an elder in the Christian Church.

Newberry and his wife, Jewell, are the parents of two children, Steve and Lina. The Newberrys lived in Waco. Newberry is an elder and Chairman of the Board of the Lakewood Christian Church.
