

Mrs. Preston Campbell was hostess to the Center Home Demonstration Club Tuesday, Oct. 26, with ten members present. Mrs. Willard Burk, vice president, presided over the meeting.

Roll call was answered with my favorite wild game.

The program was presented by Mrs. Lowell Thornburg on caring and cooking wild game. She gave a recipe for venison stroganoff, which was later served: 1 lb. ground venison, ½ cup chopped onion, 2 T. flour, one-eighth t. pepper, 1 oz. can mushrooms, 1 cup sour cream, 1 clove garlic, 2 T. oleo, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup chicken soup. Brown meat, onion, garlic in oleo, add flour, salt and mushrooms. Simmer 5 minutes, add soup, cook 10 minutes, add sour cream just before serving. You may add 2 or 3 cups of cooked egg noodles which is very good.
