

#### **Hospital Money Loss**

The Fisher County Hospital Board Members, with the exception of Kirmet Terry, reluctantly voted to increase the room rates at the new facility by \$10.00, beginning on February 1, 1977.

Semi-private accomodations will run residents \$60.00 a day while private rooms will be \$65.00 a day.

You can bet your bottom dollar that the board members didn't want to go up on the rates, but when they are faced with going in the hole about \$200,000.00 for 1976...they have to do something.

Jim McCallay, Hospital Administrator, gave us a few reasons for the room charge increase.

Insurance and utilities are two of the classic examples of rising hospital costs, according to McCallay. In the old hospital the total utility bill for a month was approximately \$900.00 and that included water, gas, electricity, sewer and garbage pickup fees. At the new facility the electric bills alone have been running \$5,000.00 to \$5,600.00 a month.

Insurance of all forms at the old hospital amounted to approximately \$6,000.00 a year for 1973 and 1974, according to McCallay. In 1975 there was a little increase, but for 1976 insurance sky rocketed to \$26,000.00.

The administrator said that liability coverage and malpractice insurance was the primary cause for the jump. The only answer to the financial situation at the new hospital is increased occupancy. The hospital distirct will probably go in the hole about \$207,000.00 for the year 1976. Needless to say, it can't afford very many years at that rate.

incrase when the new facility was occupied. McCaullay says he'll figure the 1977 budget on about 50 percent occupany. While occupancy showed signs of strength in the final quarter of 1976 (41% in October, 54% in November and 48%

in December), it only averaged a sickly 44.8 for the entire Bicentennial year. Like many other businesses the hospital has basically the

same costs (lights, personnel, administrative, staff, etc.) whether it be 44 percent occupied or 70 percent occupied. the financial difference to the district between funds generated at 44 percent and 70 percent is the prime reaseon

we are going in the red over \$200,000.00 for 1976. I don't personally agree with some of the things that are going on at the hospital, but that doesn't mean I don't or won't support the facility.

It all goes back to the very question we wrestled with when we made the decision to build the Fisher County Hospital. We want the hospital to be there, we want the security of knowing that we have modern life saving equipment at our disposal and with a hospital we can't expect to retain the doctors we have--let alone attract new ones.

We are going to pay the bills at the hospital--in the form of taxes, but if we choose to have our operations in Abilene, Stamford, Sweetwater and Lubbock we're only going to drive the distrist deeper into debt.

I hope the residents of Fisher County realize that the \$10.00 room rate increase was approved with much reluctance on the part of the board. When there are no other means of generating revenue you just have to grit your teeth and hope that this is the last time you'll have to raise rates.

Our financial problem at the new hospital is not going to evaporate and the only way it can possibly get better is for more people to use the facility.



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

#### **Rotan Dog Ordinance**

Regulating the keeping, possessing and harboring of dogs within the City: Prohibiting dogs from running at large within the City; Providing for an annual license to be paid; Providing for impoundment, destruction or other disposition of dogs found running at large within the City; Providing a penalty for violation of any provision or part of said Ordinance; And replealing present ordinance concerning

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

**ARTICLE I** 

Section 1. Definitions-For the purpose of this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribe to them:

(a) At Large: At large, shall, for the purposes of this ordinance, mean anydog when it is off of the property of the owner, and not under the immediate control of a compteent

(b) Dogs: The male, the female, and the de-sexed dog. (c) Owner: Any person owning, keeping, harboring, or having control or custody of a dog.

Section 2. Unlawful Possession - It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep, possess or harbor any dog in the City, except as provided in this ordinance and any failure, neglect or refusal to comply with the provisions of this ordinance or any act or omission contrary to the terms hereof shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100.00

Section 3. Running At Large Prohibited-No person owning, possessing, or harboring any dog shall permit such dog to run at large within this City at any time.

Section 4. Dogs Which Cause Annoyance- No person shall harbor, possess, or keep any dog which by loud and habitual barking, yelping, or howling shall cause serious annoyance to the neighborhood.

Section 5. Exemptions- Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the care and treatment of animals are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance, except where expressly stated. The licensing and vaccination requirements of this ordinance shall not apply to any dog belonging to a non-resident of the City and kept within the City for no longer than 30 days; provided, all such dogs shall, at all times, while in the City, be kept within a building, enclosure or vehicle or be under restraint by the owner.

Section 6. Dangerous, Vicious Dogs at Large Prohibited- No dog of dangerous, vicious or fierce propensities or tendencies shall be at large at any time within the City, and it shall be unlawful for the owner or other person having any such dog in his possession or control, or in any manner keeping or harboring any such dog within the City to cause or permit any such dog to be at large within the City. If any dog bites or attemps to bite any person while such dog is at large, then such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be dangerous, vicious, or fierce dog and a dog of dangerous, vicious or fierce propensities and tendencies.

Section 7. Destruction of Dangerous, Vicious Dogs- Any dangerous, vicious or fierce dog or any dog having dangerous, vicious or fierce propensities and tendencies found at large after the owner thereof has previous knowledge or notice that such dog is dangerous, vicious, or fierce, or has dangerous, vicious or fierce propensities and tendencies may be killed by any police officer of the City without such officer having to catch or impound such dog. Section 8. Vaccination - No person shall own, possess, keep or harbor a dog within the City which has not been hereof be given full force and effect for its purpose. vaccinated for rabies.

#### **ARTICLE II**

Section 9. License Required - Every person owning, possessing, keeping or harboring a dog within the City shall obtain a license therefor.

Section 10. Application - Any person desiring a license required by this ordinance shall make application therefor to the City Secretary, describing the dog to be licensed and the name and address of the applicant and owner.

Section 11. Vaccination Certificates - No license shall be issued under the provisons of this ordinance unless a current certificate of vaccination for rabies, signed by a licensed veterinarian, certifying that the dog to be licensed has been immunized, has been presented to the City Secretary.

Section 12. Fee- The applicant for a license required by this ordinance shall pay to the City Secretary the sum of \$3.00 as a license fee for each dog.

Section 13. Duration - Every license issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall expire on the 31st day of December following its date of issuance; provided, however, that renewal of such license shall be allowed up to the first day of April following such expiration.

Section 14. Tag- Upon the issuance of a dog license, the City Secretary shall give to the licensee a tag which shall bear the

number of the license and calendar year in which it is issued. Such license tag shall, at all times, be attached to the collar to be worn by the dog licensed. It shall be unlawful for anyone, other than the owner, to remove such license tag from the dog for which issued or for anyone to attach such license tag to a dog for which such tag is not issued.

Section 15. Replacement Tag - In the event the license tag is lost, a replacement tag may be obtained from the City Secretary upon presentation of a valid license and the payment of the sum of \$1.00.

Section 16. Authority - It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police or any authorized representative of the City to seize and impound, destroy or otherwise dispose of any dog found running at large within the City, and to seize and impound all dogs found in violation of the other provisions hereof within the City, whether such dog shal lbe in the immediate presence of its owner or custodian or otherwise.

Section 17. Right of Entry - The Chief of police or any authorized representative of the City is hereby authorized to unter upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land for the purpose of seizing and impounding any dog found thereon in violation of this ordinance.

Section 18. Registry - All dogs that may be found within this City contrary to the provisions of this ordinance may be impounded in the Veterinarian Clinic and, upon receiving any dog, the person in charge shall make a complete registry, entering the breed, color and sex of such dog, and the time of taking into custody, and if licensed, he shall enter the name and address of the owner and the number of the

Section 19. Disposition of Unredeemed Dogs - Any dog not redeemed within 72 hours after impounding shall be disposed of by sale or by destruction.

Section 20. Redemption of Impounded Dogs - The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to its sale or destruction by the payment of a \$5.00 impounding fee and \$5.00 per day for each day or portion of a day such dog shall have been impounded. Any owner of any unlicensed dog impounded in addition to the above fees shall have said dog vaccinated and licensed immediately upon

Section 21. Redemption by Person Other Than Owner - If the owner of any dog impounded under this ordinance shall fail to redeem his dog within the time allowed for redemption, any other person may, upon complying with all provisions of this ordinance, redeem such dog from the pound and be the lawful owner of such dog thereafter.

Section 22. Redemption After Sale - The owner of any impounded dog may, within 30 days after such dog is sold, redeem the same from such purchaser by paying the purchaser the amount of the purchase price paid by him, and in addition thereto, all fees and vaccination charges, if any were incurred, and in addition thereto, the sum of \$1.00 per day from the date of sale to the date of redemption. Upon the expiration of 30 days from the date the dog is sold, the right of the owner to redeem such dog shall expire.

**ARTICLE IV** 

Section 23. Repeal Of Existing Ordinance - The ordinance of the City of Rotan regarding licensing, quarantining, prohibiting dogs from running at large and other provisions heretofore passed by the City County on August 26, 1966, is hereby specifically repealed.

Section 24. If for any reason, any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision of this ordinance, for it is the definite intent of this City Council that every section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase, word, or provision

Section 25. This ordinance shall be effective February 1, 1977, and shall be published in the Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record, the official newspaper of the City of Rotan, on January 20, 1977 and on January 27, 1977.


1. One round (or square) wooden table with four legs. and two short-backed wooden chairs. Pedestal-type tables will not work unfortunately





Bullock also reminded those businesses which file their sales tax returns on a quarterly basis that they must have those returns in the mail no later than Jan. 31 to avoid possible penalties.

He noted that some 172,000 businesses which collect less than \$750 a

month in sales taxes file their sales tax returns and collections on a quarterly rather than a monthly basis.
