Rangeland Seeded In Kleingrass Desirable

discussed grass for seeding to rangeland is Kleingrass. It has only been during the last 3 or 4 years that its popularity has increased. Kleingrass was introduced in 1942 but was not until the 1950's that desirable types were developed and evaluated. In the early 1970's Kleingrass started to come to the front and gained popularity despite the seed cost, which has seldom been less that \$6.00 per pound.

Kleingrass is adapted to a wide range of soils. Plantings have thrived under dry conditions in shallow and sandy soils, but apparently is best adapted to clay type

Because Kleingrass forage is avidly grazed by cattle and other classes of livestock it should be planted in pure stands to allow for proper grazing management. If Kleingrass is planted in a mixture with less palatable grasses there is evidence of Kleingrass steadily increasing in composition, Kleingrass probably is best seeded alone.

Kleingrass starts growth in early spring and it remains green until fall. During mild fall and winter periods it maintains some green basal leaves throughout the winter. Its seed mature unevenly and shatter as it matures and there is never a time when all of its seeds are mature and ready to harvest. The best harvest time is 5 or 10 days after first seed shattering occurs. Depending on location, from 1 to 3 seed crops a year can be produced.

approximately 3½ hours.

certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department (TDA) for issuance of certification.

March 21 is Agriculture Day in Texas, and Fisher County farmers and ranchers can be proud of the \$23,086,000 contribution they make to the economy of their area and the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C.

That figure is the amount of cash receipts and government payments in 1975, the most recent figures published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

"Though 1977 may prove to be one of lower profits for agriculture, cash receipts during this year should be substantial," White stated.

"Production costs have doubled for many regions in the state in the past two vears, but several commodities have been able to stay even with these costs."

State totals for 1975 were \$5.9 billion with livestock bringing in \$3,060,908,000 and crops \$2,785,683,000. Total cash receipts for 1976 are estimated to be more than \$6 billion.

Livestock and products in Fisher County were valued in 1975 at \$9,601,000. Crops totaled \$12,570,000.







No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period, except that where customer's only use for gas service is in an outdoor grill and/or a fireplace starter, the amount shown for the first consumption block shall constitute a minimum monthly bill.

ADJUSTMENTS The amount of each

monthly bill computed at the above-state rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the \$1.3488 per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate designated polling place charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other to 7:00 o'clock p.m. regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the above designated Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount Sunday, or an official State equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district and valorem taxes and taxes on net and 5:00 o'clock p.m. income), levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1976, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to

such bill. Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.
