

#### **New Rotan Mayor Takes** Oath, New Jobs Given

The members of the Rotan run less than the anticipated City Council, under the guidance of new Mayor Lester Sescil, have definitely established a flavor of openess and concern for the citizens of Rotas as they met for the first time to discuss city business.

It was a three and one-half hour maiden meeting for new councilmen Rodney Tankersley, J.D. Burk, and Rodney Denton. They, together with veteran councilmen Jim Nowlin and Chester Schick, touched on discussions concerning bootleggers, minors driving without a license, rennovation of the city jail and the dog ordinance.

The mayor began the Tuesday night meeting by appointing the following councilmen to the existing city committees: Police and Fire Departments-Rodney Tankersley, J.D. Burk and Lester Sescil; Street and Alley Committee-J.D. Burk. Rodney Denton and Chester Schick; Water, Sewer and Garbage Committee-Rodney Denton, J.D. Burk and Jim Nowlin; Park, Pool, Golf Course and Cemetery Com-Schick: Administrative Committee-Lester Sescil, Rodney

Tankersley and Jim Nowlin. Later during the meeting, the Mayor expressed his desire that interested citizens of Rotan contact the councilmen appointed to the new committees, to funnel ideas, complains and suggestions to the council.

In other action Charles Thornton, representing Miss Softball America in Rotan. appeared before the Council with a request that the council give consideration to installing a restroom and watering system at the girl's softball field, southwest of Rotan. No action was taken, however, the council requested Thornton and City Manager Vann to get together some cost figures

for the proposed projects. Vann gave councilmen a report on the status of the fence being erected at the dumpground. According to Vann, the 600 x 300 fence is two-thirds finished with projected costs, less labor, to \$2,300.00.

Councilmen gave Vann permission to install the new city "Water Approved" signs and voted to purchase a new light pole and lights for the Little League field. The cost of the lights and pole to be in the vicinity of \$1,200.00. Revenue Sharing Funds will be used for the purchase.

Considerable time was spent discussing areas within the police department. Chief Chuck Renfro reported that (a) a 12-year old girl had been bitten by a dog, (b) He had raided the bootlegger and confiscated a large container used to chill beer, (c) That a police car hit a cow, north of town, outside the city limits while responding to a plea for assistance. Damage to the vehicle was \$359.00.

Councilman Rodeny Tankersley expressed his concern over Rotan law enforcement personnel leaving the city limits, doing the duties of other law enforcement agencies and leaving the City of Rotan unprotected.

Councilman J.D. Burk Rodney Denton and Chester the deputy sheriff be detailed to Rotan on Friday and Saturday nights to assist local law enforcement personnel.

> The subject of the condition of the Rotan jail was discussed. The councilmen expressed a desire to have cost figures on renovating the jail to make it meet state standards. Chief Renfro and City Manager Vann are to

obtain those estimates be-

fore the May meeting. In other action J.D. Burk asked for an explanation of the city's policy concerning minor driving without a license. Some councilmen were of the opinion that police personnel should continue enforcing the law. while others indicatd that policemen should let things go the way they are going now. Council Rodeny Denton said he wanted the Police Chief to set a policy and see that the policemen enforce it. The matter was tabled after considerable discussion. Mayor Sescil suggested that councilmen give the matter serious thought and be prepared in May to take action on the matter.

The bootlegger problem was discussed. Some councilmen felt that the bootlegger should not be raided by Rotan Law Enforcement personnel. They felt that Texas Alcoholic and Narcotic Association personnel, Texas Rangers or Fisher County Sheriff's Department personnel should be present whenever raids are conducted. Other councilmen had mittee-Rodney Tankersley, expressed a suggestion that mixed feelings on the matter. This is also to be given study with action to come at the May meeting.

> The dog ordinance, recently enacted and revised, was discussed by the council.

Mayor Sescil expressed his desire to see councilmen work closely with Rotan residents to attempt to find solutions to some of the problems aired at last Tuesday night's meeting.

#### **County School Braced** For School Fund Bill

The issue of public school finance is expected to come before the House of Representatives early this week.

House Bill 750, which was reported out of the House Public Education Committee, represents a reversal of the trend two years ago for local school districts to pick up a greater share of the public school funding tab.

According to the projection for Rotan ISD, Rotan will spend \$556,100 for public education. Of that amount, \$442,000 will come from the State with the local school district paying \$112,000.

Rotan's local fund assignment is estimated at \$34,700 less under the proposed House Bill 750.

According to the data released for Roby IDS, its total program cost will be \$332,500, with the State paying \$292,600. Roby's local fund assignment will be \$31,600 less than the present local fund assignment.

The total estimated cost for Hobbs ISD is \$132,800, with the local district responsible for \$107,900 and the State responsible for the remaining \$24,900. Hobbs local fund assignment should decrease by a total off

McCaulley ISD has a projected program cost of \$92,000, with the local share at \$3,100 and the State's Caulley's local fund assignment will be \$54,800 less than the current total.

Under the proposed public school finance measure, the State's share of the minimum Foundation Program is increased and property tax reductions are mandated at the local level.

Provisions for House Bill 750 will freeze local property taxes at their present level for the fiscal year 1978 and provide a \$73 million statewide reduction in property taxes for the fiscal year 1979.

It is expected that several amendments will be proposed to House Bill 750 which could alter this present proposal once it reaches the

#### **NFU Officials Spend April 13 In Washington**

officials from 22 states had a wideranging 80-minute discussion late Tuesday afternoon, April 13, at the White concern at the negative House in which the farm reaction from farmers to his group leaders indicated the "dismay" of the nation's farmers with farm commodity support rates established for 1977 and proposed for 1978.

President Jimmy Carter spent 50 minutes with the Farmers Union presidents, including Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco.

The dicsussion included Vice President Walter Mondale and Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland.

#### **Corporation Tax Estimate Due**

Corporations operating on a calendar year tax basis with an expected income tax liability of at least \$40 are required to pay estimated taxes by Friday, April 15.

When the payments are deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, they must be accompanied by Form 503, "Federal Tax Deposit, Corporation Income Taxes," the Internal Revenue Service said.

The amount deposited by April 15 should cover one quarter of the 1977 estimated tax. The estimated tax and the amount of each installment can be computed on Form 1120-W, "(Worksheet) Corporation Estimated Income Tax", which is not filed with the IRS but retained in the corporation's records, according to the IRS.

Supplies of Form 1120-W and ahelpful pamphlet, IRS Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax", are available free from local IRS offices.

#### **Texas House Passes Budget**

The House Appropriations Committee Thursday approved and sent to the house floor its version of the general appropriations bill calling for the expenditures of some \$15.7 billion for the fiscal years 1978-79.

This measure does not include proposals for school finance or teacher pay raises which total \$957 million for the biennium.


The most significant dollar amounts in the proposed state budget include appropriations for the state highway system, the state's health, welfare and rehabilitation agencies, higher and public education.





Ask your pharmacist if you have any questions about the information on the label or about medicines in general.
