Rotan Baptist Church 70th Anniv. Sunday

The First Baptist Church of Rotan will observe their Seventieth Anniversary on May 1. A special anniversary service is being planned to mark this event.

The First Baptist Church was organized on April 28, 1907 in the house that is located at 301 N. Garfield and was constituted with thirteen charter members. Among those who made up the presbytery were Elder J.D. Rankin, J.G. Rankin, and Deacons S. Patton and G.E. Boren. George McBeth, a member of the First Baptist Church, attended that organizational meeting with his father.

The new church continued to meet in the house on Garfield Street until the Spring of 1908 when a few frame buildings were erected at the present site. The first unit of a new place of worship was built in 1941, and, in 1965, the church constructed a two-story educational unit. The building which stands today was

erected in 1966 following the merger of the Hillcrest Baptist Church and the First Baptist Church.

Beginning with thirteen charter members, the First Baptist Church has grown

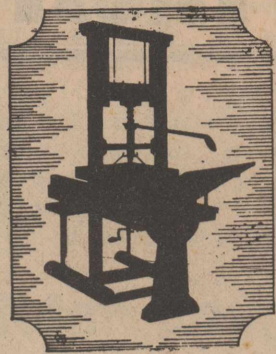
Hobbs School Talent Show Set May 3rd

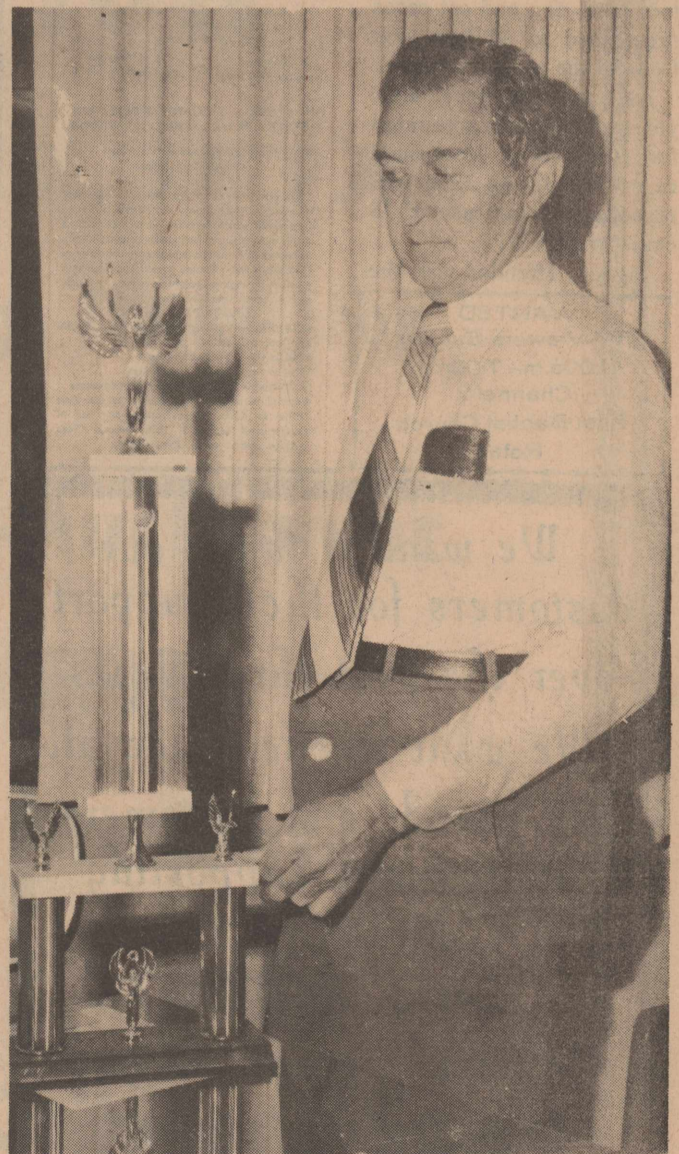
Frank Lopez to Play Football At H.P.S.U.

Accent ON HEALTH

Kittens are supposed to be fluffy, playful creatures who love to test their claws and teeth on anyone who plays with them.

But when the playful kitten displays real antagonism and becomes ill, there's the possibility of rabies, reports the Bureau of Veterinary Public Health of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

That's what happened during 1975 to a kitten which earlier had survived an attack by a skunk on a farm. It was brought to Austin and given away as a pet. The kitten died soon after being put under surveillance by a veterinarian. The Department of Health Resources Laboratory in Austin confirmed that the kitten was a victim of rabies.

As a result, 14 persons who handled and suffered the normal biting and scratching of the kitten underwent a series of rabies shots.

This story had a happy ending for all those involved.

In fact, there were no rabies cases among humans in Texas during all of 1976 although the Department of Health Resources supplied 920 series of antirabies treatments to residents here. The last documented case of human death attributed to natural exposure to the rabies virus in Texas was in 1962. During 1972 one human death was attributed to exposure to the rabies virus in a laboratory. Rabies, despite the low number of human cases, still is one of the most terrifying diseases which can affect man. It is still found in wild animals and is a constant threat to unvaccinated domestic animals and pets, especially in rural settings.

Rabies was confirmed in 345 animals in Texas last year, an increase from the 329 cases confirmed by laboratory tests in 1975, reports the Department of Health Resources. Of the total number, 16 were found in laboratories at Fort Sam Houston and Brooks Air Force Base.

The number of dog rabies cases increased slightly in 1976, from 25 the previous year to just 28-17 in Laredo in December. But in the cat population, rabies dropped from 20 cases in 1975 to 12 in 1976--proof that rabies vaccinations are in order for cats, too. Total dog and cat cases decreased to 40 last year from 45 the previous year.

As expected year after year, wild animals accounted for the most confirmed cases--288 during 1976 representing an increase of 25 cases over 1975.

Biggest offender was the

skunk with 204 cases. Bats accounted for 70 cases, foxes for 8 cases, raccoons for 5 cases, and one coyote.

Rabies cases are widespread throughout Texas. Of the 345 cases reported last year 93 of Texas' 254 counties had at least one.

In identifying rabies cases in Texas, the Department of Health Resources Laboratories examined a total of 7,566 specimens as suspected rabies cases. These represented more than 51 animal species during 1976. Dog

and cat specimens were the most common received at the laboratory--and represented small percentages of positive cases per test. Tests were run on 2,141 dogs in finding 28 positives, while the 2,012 cats tested showed 13 positivies. Almost a third of the skunks testes were positive for rabies.

A lot of work is performed in pinpointing positive rabies cases, but you can't take chances with rabies.

The chances of a human surviving a case of rabies is virtually nil. A six-year-old Ohio boy was the first recorded case of a human surviving the dreaded "mad dog" disease, according to the National Center for Disease Control. Another survivor has been reported since then, in Argentina. Rabies virus attacks the nervous system, the heart, the lungs, the brain, and, "you die from any one of a half-dozen different problems", according to a spokesman for the Center for Disease Control.

The Ohio youngster received intensive, supported care which saved his life. He is reported as a normal, healthy boy now--some five years later.

Rabies declined in Texas last year, but there's always the possibility of outbreaks as long as the disease is prevalent in wildlife, says the Veterinary Public Health Bureau of the Department of Health Resources. It advises all pet owners to have their pets vaccinated against the disease and to always avoid contact with any wild animal which acts friendly or peculiar and seems to have no fear of man. These animals could be rabid.

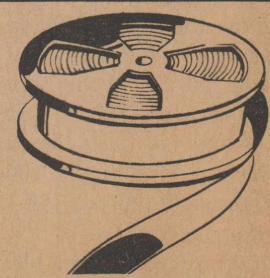

Rep. Elmer Martin Gives School Finance Briefing

The Texas House of Representatives passed by a vote of 102-36 a \$695.4 million public school finance measure. This bill provides for 85-per cent state funding of the foundation school program.

Under this legislation, however, school districts will be required to freeze local taxes at their current levels in 1977-78 and lower taxes to a statewide total in 1978-79. New provisions in House Bill 750 include: a shift from a 180-day school term to 174 days; \$117 million extra funding for such maintenance and operation costs for schools as utilities and supplies; \$21.5 million increase for transportation expenses; \$6.5 million increase for drivers education; funds to hire additional teachers to lower the pupil-teacher ratio in kindergarten through grade three; \$2 million for extra personnel in districts with migrant student populations.

The Senate will now have to work on its public school funding measure, and if they fail to adopt the House measure, a joint House-Senate conference committee will meet to work out a compromise bill.

Although teacher salaries are not included in House Bill 750, a \$263 million pay bill has been approved by the

House Public Education Committee and is expected to come before the full House within the next few weeks.

This legislation would provide some \$263 million for the biennium, with the bulk of the raise going to experienced teachers. The pay hikes would be formulated through a small increase in the base salaries and by creating three new pay steps beyond the 10 steps currently in existence, making the top pay for a bachelor's degree teacher on pay step 13 about \$14,000 annually.

"This is a measure I opposed in its final form because it establishes a new state level bureaucracy without accomplishing all that must," said Rep. Elmer Martin.

House Bill 846 would establish a single county-wide appraisal unit for all areas of the State, taking over the appraisal responsi-

bilities now vested in cities, school districts and special districts. However, the bill will not take in the county tax assessor's appraisal duties unless the county assessor makes the decision to join the county-wide appraisal unit.

Retired teachers will get a significant boost in benefits if Senate Bill 74, as approved by the Senate State Affairs Committee, is enacted into law.

This committee approved a \$170 million proposal which would increase benefits to already retired teachers as well as those who will retire in the future.

"I believe that Senate Bill 74 is a fair proposal, considering the many demands for state funds, and an improvement in the teacher retirement system that will benefit both former and present teachers," said Rep. Elmer Martin.

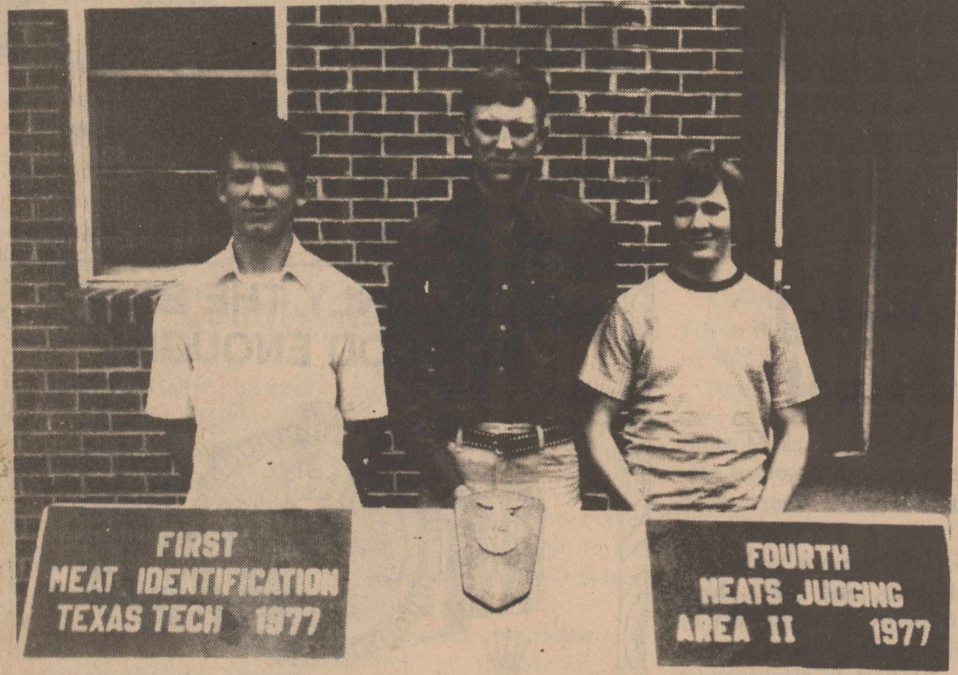

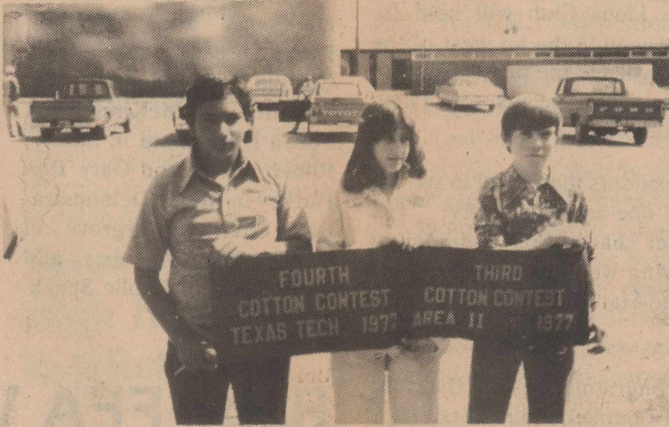

Financing Plans Made For Beef Program

Financing plans for the proposed Beef Research and Information Program have been tentatively outlined, announces Richard Spencer, County Extension Agent. The Act is public Law 94-294, and is enabling legislation similar to that for wheat, potatoes, cotton and eggs. Funds would come from assessments on producers' receipts from sales of cattle, he explained. The law sets a maximum check-off assessment rate of one-half of one per cent (0.5 per cent) of the live animal value, but for the first three years, the rate has been set at 3/10 of one per cent. The funds would be collected according to a "value-added concept", which would assess all sellers in the marketing chain. The concept is similar to that of "pencil shrink".

However, sales of breeding cattle may be exempt until the animals are sold for slaughter. The initial purchaser in the marketing chain would deduct the amount of assessment from his payment to the original owner. Each succeeding purchaser would deduct an assessment based on the current market value, representing an amount equal to the previous assessment plus an added assessment resulting from the animal's increased value during the seller's period of ownership. The purchaser at the point of slaughter would remit the assessment to the Beef Board, as proposed in the Act. Consequently, packers would be responsible for maintaining records of the transactions, deducting the assessment from the sale of the animal and forwarding the money to the Beef Board. Provisions of the Act also allow for producers not wishing to participate in the program to request and receive a refund upon application to the Beef Board. To qualify for this refund, however, the request

must be made in writing and sent--along with a copy of the sales slip--with a 60-day period after the end of the month in which the assessment was paid. Based on an expected beginning assessment rate of 0.3 per cent of the value of each animal slaughtered, nearly \$40 million would be generated in the program's first year of operation.

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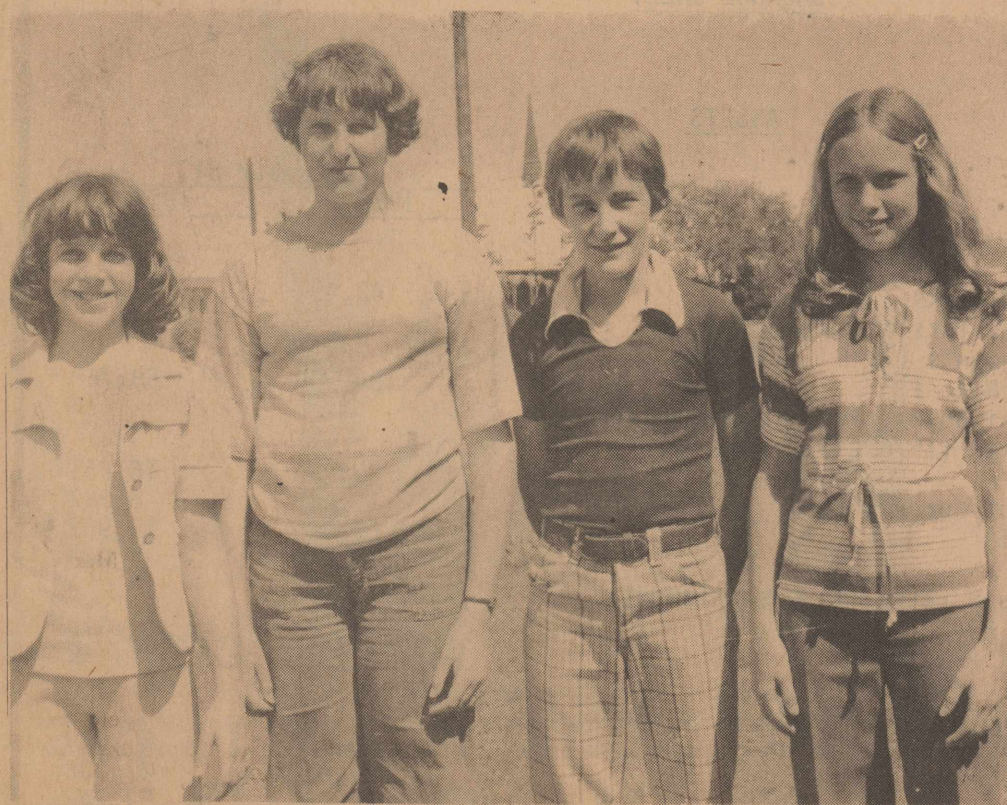

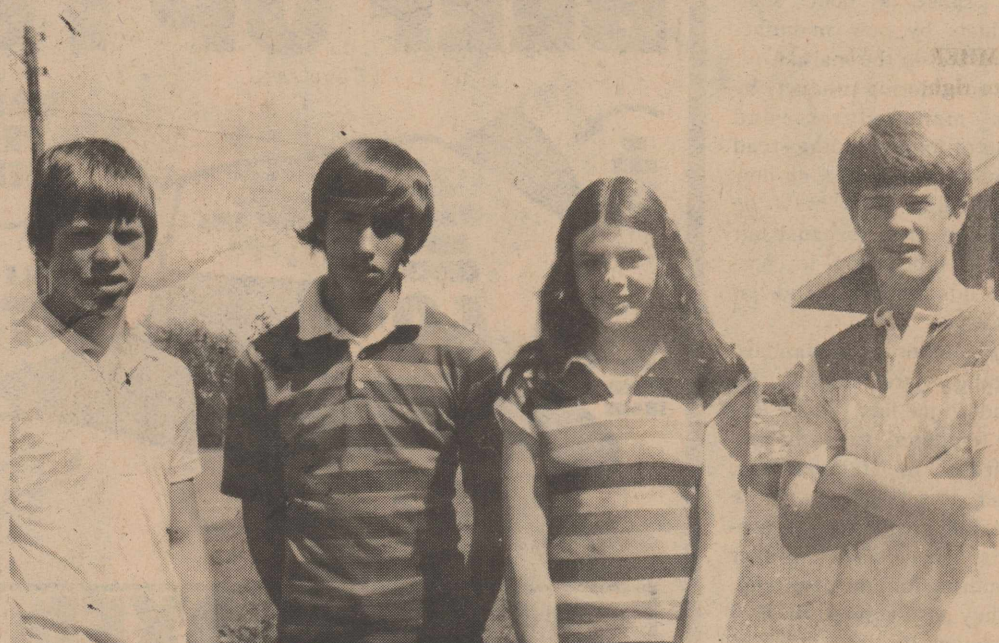

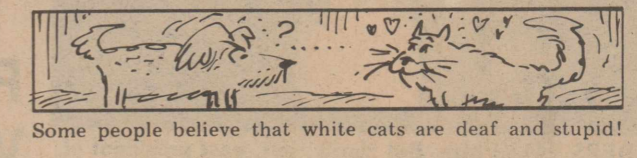
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Proper canning equipment is essential to the success of obtaining good quality and safe home canned food.

Be sure to obtain jar lids and caps from reputable manufacturers. Check to see that sealing compounds are even and free from cracks--with caps and screw bands free from dents. If not, a poor seal may result, causing spoilage. Also, bands that have been allowed to rust may cause a poor seal. Products by new manufacturers are on the market.

In considering products by new manufacturers--and those of long standing--read instructions carefully on how to use lids. Lids must be made so they exhaust air during processing--to prevent lids buckling and jar breakage.

Remember to use standard canning jars made for standard jar lids. These jars are tempered to withstand contrast in temperature. Other jars, such as those containing commercial products, may lack proper tempering for home canning, so they pose a greater risk of breakage in the pressure canner or boiling water bath. Also, standard lids may not fit them--and that will result in a poor seal. In selecting jars, check for tops that are cracked or chipped--as these will cause a poor seal.

Concerning the canner itself, remember that pressure canners are necessary for processing low-acid vegetables. Botulism, a sometimes fatal food poisoning, can result when low-acid vegetables are not processed under pressure.

Pressure sauce pans also may be used--if they are adequate in size and have an indicator or gauge that operates accurately at 10 pounds pressure.

Keep pressure canners and sauce pans clean and freed from odors and stains for best results.

Test pressure canners that have a dial gauge at least once a year--or more often if the canner is used frequently or if the lid receives a hard knock. For testing, use a maximum thermometer or electric testing device.

During the yearly checkup also make sure the petcock and safety valves are clean and in working order--and tighten the screws on handles.

Stretch and turn rubber gaskets that allow leakage of steam, or if brittle, replace with a new gasket.

Cleaning supplies for pressure canners include whiting (a gritless scouring powder), soap scouring pads and vinegar.

Vinegar will remove dark stains or odors from inside the canner. Use one cup vinegar in a canner half full of water. Heat to five pounds pressure for 15 minutes. Remove and rinse canner.

Full-strength vinegar is ideal for soaking small parts, such as the petcock, to

remove sediment and stains.

Other supplies include detergent and plumbers paste. The paste should have an oil or graphite base, which will not harden. Use paste to close nicks that allow steam to escape--or when replacing a gauge. The paste can be used to coat

threads of the gauge.

For canners with screw type lugs, use a solvent, such as kerosene or lighter fluid. A few drops of solvent will let the screws operate easily.

A water bath canner is used to process high-acid foods. A rack on which to

place the jars inside the canner also is necessary.

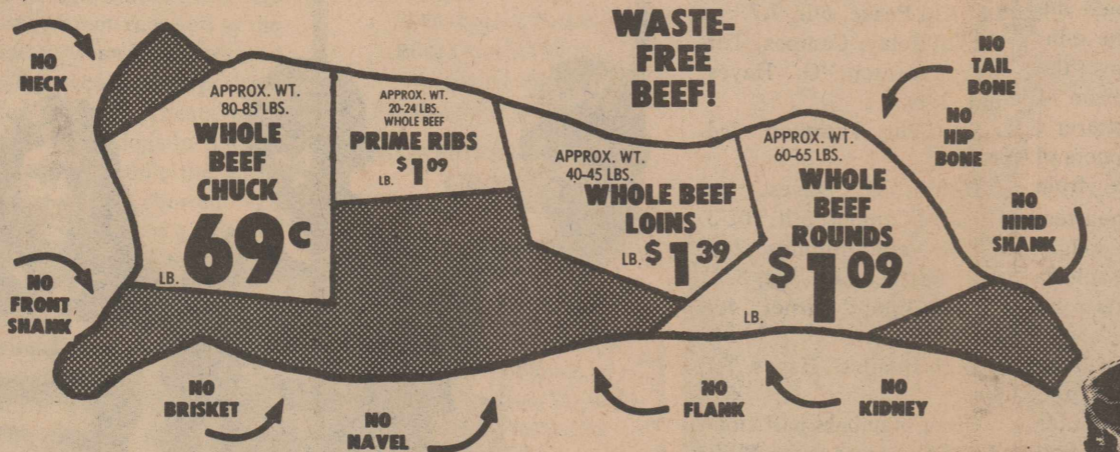
Water bath canners may be purchased, but any big, clean kettle with a rack and tight-fitting lid will do--if its deep enough to hold jars upright and permit water to boil gently one or two inches over the top of the jars.

Several other "tools" are helpful in home canning. Corers for pears or tomatoes speed preparation of these foods for canning, and that is important to quality. Canning tongs facilitate the safe removal of jars from pressure or water bath canners. Tongs should hold the jars

firmly enough so they will not slip and break. Jar fillers help keep the tops of jars clean--and that helps in assuring a safe seal as lids are applied.
