Rotan School Faces \$18,000 Oil Losses

Rotan's school could lose between \$8,000 and \$18,000 for the year 1977-79 as a result of decreases in oil production, according to Tom Harkey, Rotan Superintendent.

Harkey visited with Jerry Krupka, Continental Oil Company representative recently and was put on notice that Rotan could lose between 5 and 10 per cent in oil values. This loss will mean that Rotan will have to dip into the reserve interest and sinking fund to make up the loss. According to Harkey, there is approximately \$50,000 in the reserve fund, set aside to insure payment of the \$53,000 yearly note on the construction of the new high school building.

The loss in revenue is blamed on an overall depletion in oil production throughout the county. "We have been on a decline in production for the last 4 or 5 years," said Harkey, "we had an increase in the price of oil two years ago which

offset any loss", he concluded.

"With the decline in production and ceiling on the price of oil, we are in trouble", said Harkey. He also indicated that he didn't know if a revision in rates or values was necessary at this time to offset the decline in production. "A lot depends on the program that is passed by the legislature," he concluded.

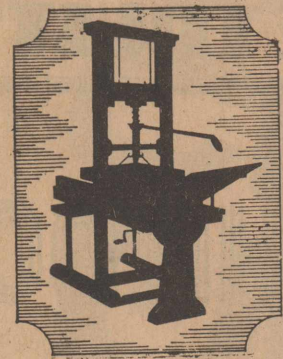
Rotan Lions To Hold Broom Sale

Roby Council Votes To Install 14 Stop Signs

The Roby City Commission met in regular session last Monday afternoon and voted to spend approximately \$300.00 to install some 14 stop signs in three locations in Roby.

Councilman Jimmie Laurie brought a suggestion before the commission concerning some type of traffic control device in the area of the

Roby City Swimming Pool and Park. After considerable discussion the commission voted to install approximately 10 stop signs along the streets leading into North 4th Street and on the streets leading into Walton Street. The commission also voted to install additional stop signs in the area of the Rodeo Arena and the Roby School.

In other action the commission discussed a request by Miss Dudley Hambright, representing the Roby Cemetery Association, that a summer work program employee be detailed to assist in the maintenance of the cemetery. The matter was tabled until additional information could be secured concerning the number of employees the City of Roby would be eligible to use.

Councilman Laurie brought up the possibility of constructing some type of holding container for aluminum cans. He indicated that the money raised from the sale of the aluminum cans could be used to benefit the Roby park and recreation areas. Councilman Mathies and Mayor Hayes were in agreement that the suggestion had merit, and instructed City Manager Jimmy Price to look into the suggestion for further discussion at the June meeting.

The council passed a resolution approving the application for a preliminary loan for low rent public housing. The housing authority of the City of Roby is in the process of making application for financial assistance on 20 units of low rent housing.

In other action the councilmen discussed street paving and the progress on opening the Roby swimming pool. No action on the matters were finalized.

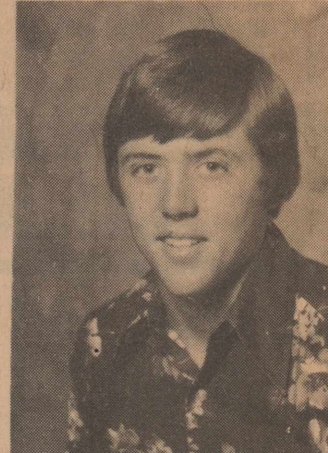
Brad Stuart To Make State in 330 Hurdles

He was released on a \$750.00 bond on the April 27th marijuana possession charge.



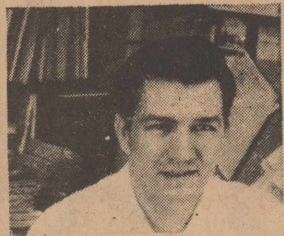

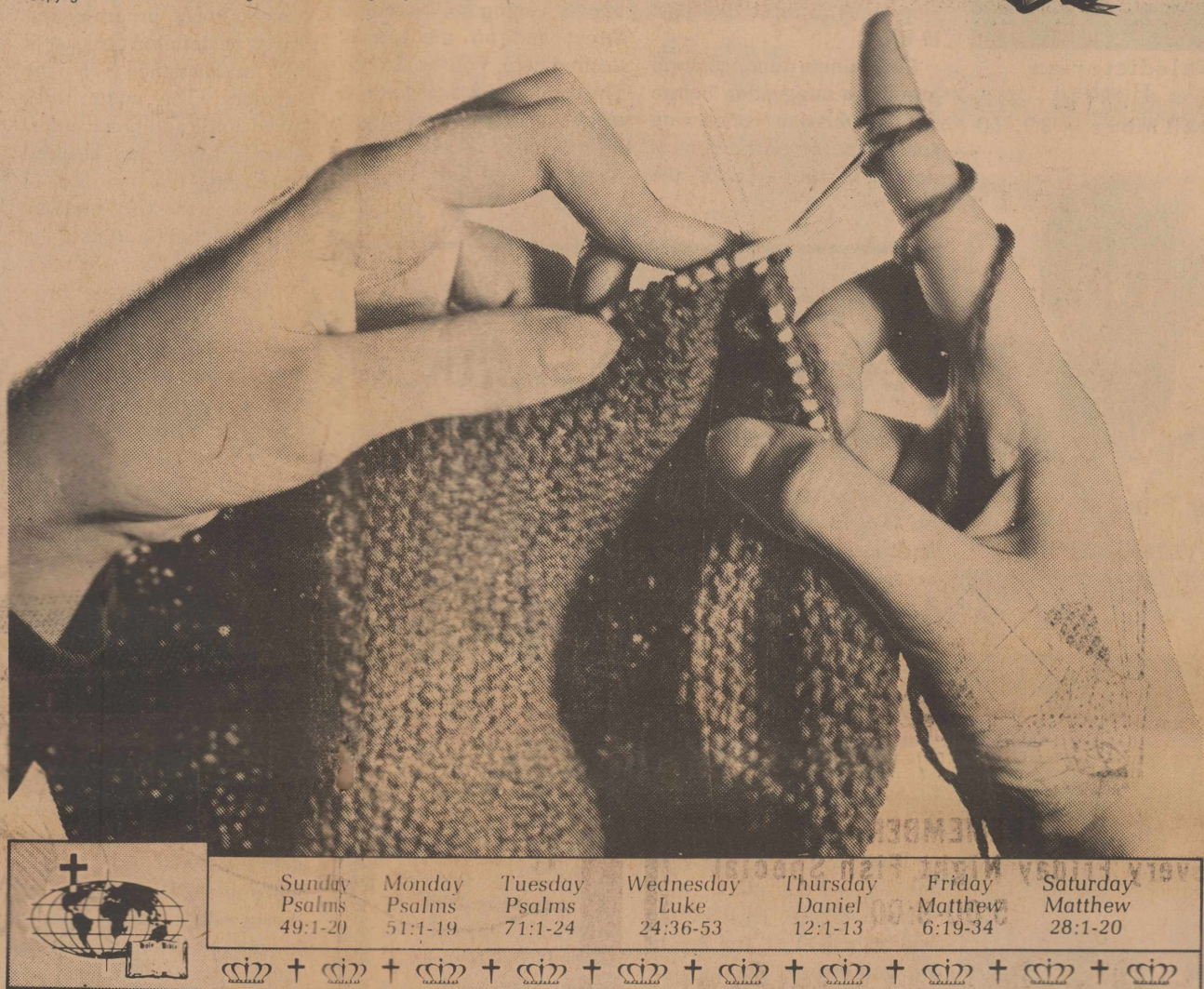
How does she do it? She evades this question.

County Gets \$683,000 Of State Travel Cash

Fisher County received \$683,000 of the state's \$5,306,118,000 travel receipts in 1975, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Fisher County had 27 of the state's 207,676 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$130,000.

It also estimated \$27,000 in State and \$6,000 in local taxes were paid by visitors.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model, which for the first time, breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S.

Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which, last year, estimated that Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's \$75 billion travel industry. Only California and Florida now outrank Texas, the Center said.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine

where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

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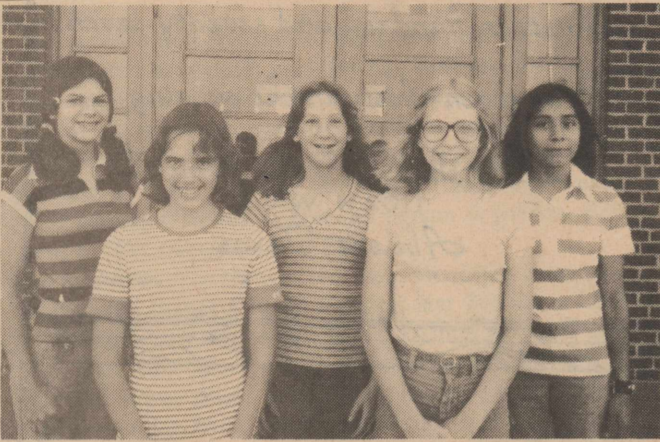

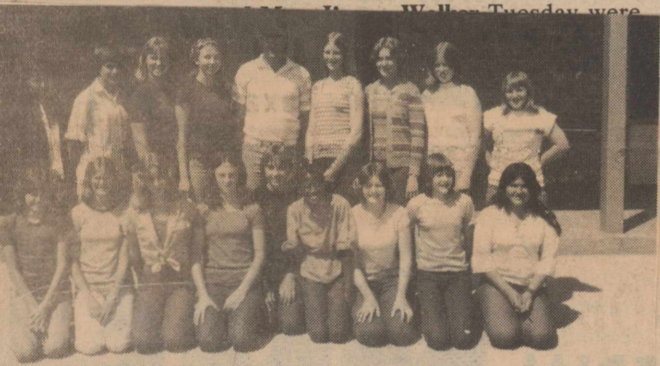

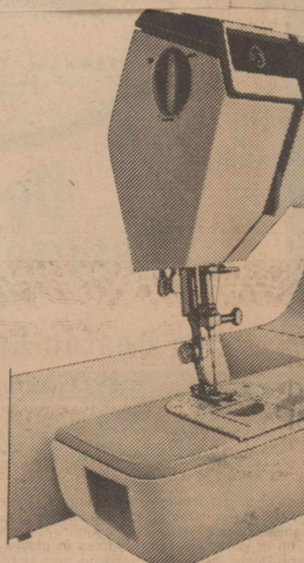

Burleson stated that the Defense Task Force of the Budget Committee--of which is a member--held only three formal meetings and was not asked to make any recommendations on the level of the defense budget, either to the Chairman or to the full Budget Committee. "The sum for national defense in this Resolution was simply plucked arbitrarily out of thin air and has neither logic nor recognition of the hard facts for our future safety in this volatile world," Burleson said. He also mentioned that recommendations of other Committees in Congress were much higher than even President Carter's recommendation. President Carter became involved in the effort by calling the House leadership to urge support of his total national defense recommendation of \$120.1 billion for Fiscal Year 1978.

Health Tips

Texas Medical Association

Young baseball players, especially pitchers, may be risking permanent injury if they play too hard, the Texas Medical Association says.

An immature boy or girl who pitches too frequently runs the risk of doing lasting damage to his or her shoulder and elbow. The elbow joint is particularly vulnerable between the ages of 9 and 16 since the growing ends of the long bones which meet at the elbow are still not completely fused to the bone shafts and cannot withstand the strenuous muscle pull involved in pitching. Any adult pitcher is likely to have a sore arm after a game, but such a disorder is essentially a muscle-tendon strain with no crippling implications.

If youngsters were left to themselves, they would

probably regulate their play activity in a self-protective way. They would be unlikely to practice for hours on end to perfect their techniques, and they could be expected to quit when they were tired.

Ironically, it is some parents' and coaches' activity in children's baseball that has increased the risks to young players. Some adults become so involved with

winning games that they put pressure on the youngsters to practice endlessly and to aim for victory at all costs. In the face of this pressure, the young player tends to push him or herself beyond healthy levels of endurance and hesitates to complain of pain. The result is that bone disorders are neglected and some young players end their careers with irreversible bone damage.

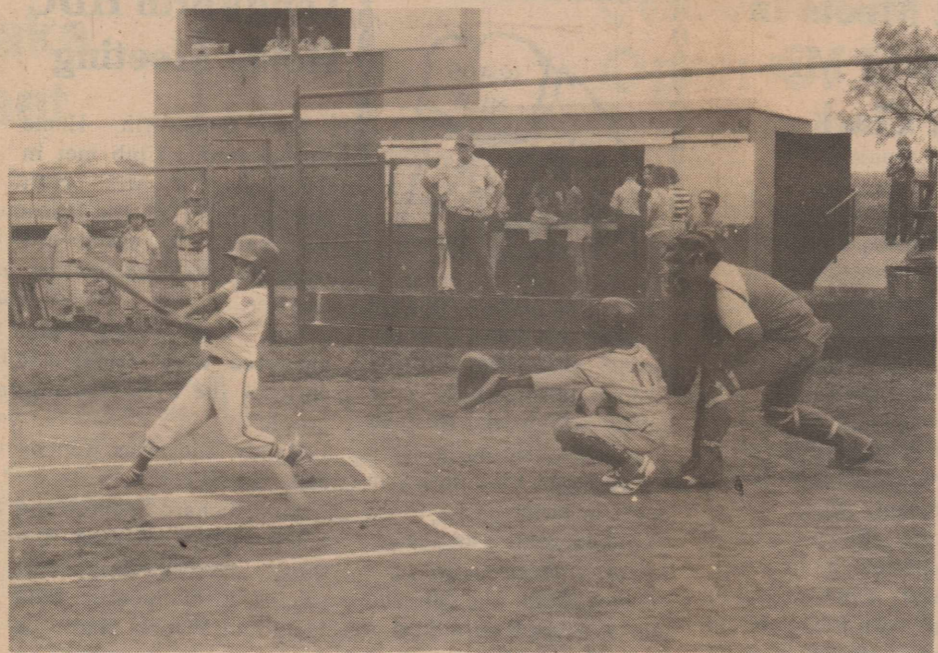

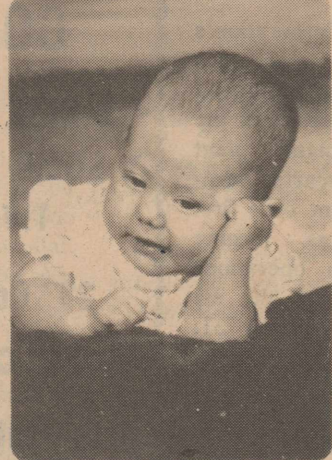

Veterans Education Program Is Expanded

The new Veterans' Educational Assistance Program (VEAP), which helps young people accumulate educational funds during a military enlistment, was explained recently by Lieutenant Col. Charles H. Bell, Commander, Dallas District Recruiting Command.

The program started the first of this year and allows service members to put aside \$50-\$75 monthly, which is matched two-for-one by the government.

"This means", the Col. said, "that an Army enlistee may leave the service after three years with several thousands of dollars to pursue a college or vocational-technical education."

"If the maximum \$75 monthly is saved by the soldier, this amounts to \$2,700 during a three-year enlistment. The government contributes another \$5,400, bringing the total to \$8,100," the Colonel explained.

The VEAP funds are paid out in monthly installments for each month of college or vocational-technical school completed after enlistment.

What happens if the soldier decides not to use these funds for education after discharge was explained by the Colonel. "In that case, LTC Bell said, "all the money saved is returned, less the amount contributed by the government."
