

## Rev. Cecil Tune Ending 41 Years In Ministry

Rev. Cecil Tune's ministry as a gospel preacher has spanned 41-1/2 years and carried him to 20 odd West Texas communities. His service to the Lord as a full-time minister will draw to a close on Sunday, June 5. He will be accepting full retirement as a Methodist Minister and undertaking to enjoy life to its fullest with all the rights and benefits of a servant of God for the largest part of his adult life.

Rev. Tune began his ministry in November of 1935 on the high plains of Texas. His first appointment was the Plainview circuit. In December of 1936 he was the assistant pastor of the First Methodist Church in Plainview. He stayed at Plainview for a year and a half and in May of 1937 he was named pastor of the First Methodist Church in Stinnett.

In November of 1939 he pastored two churches at O'Brien and Sagerton and while there began formal training at McMurry College in Abilene.

While at Sagerton-O'Brien he developed a respiratory infection that to some extent has stayed with him until today. While not a boisterous, loud speaker in his delivery, Rev. Tune has captured the love and affection of all his congregation by delivering moving, pointed and timely sermons. He was born in Drasco, 10 miles north of Winters, during "A time when mothers didn't go to the hospital to have babies", said the pastor.

He married his wife in July of 1937 in Plainview. They have four children. Ava, age 32 a stewardess at Braniff Airlines in Dallas; Billy a Band Director at Thrall High School, 40 miles northeast of Austin; and twins Buddy of Austin and Betty of Lubbock. Betty, Mrs. Don Madewell, whose husband is employed with Texas Instruments in Lubbock has the only grandchildren. They have two girls, Tammy and Wendy.

The fact that the two grandchildren are in Lubbock quite possibly had a strong undercurrent for the Tune family establishing their first non-parsonage home in Lubbock. They will be living at 3004 43rd St. in Lubbock, beginning June 6, 1977. "Our move to Lubbock will also put us within a 30 mile circle of 6 churches that we served over the years", said the retiring minister. He has a sister and a sister-in-law that are both school teachers living in the Lubbock area.

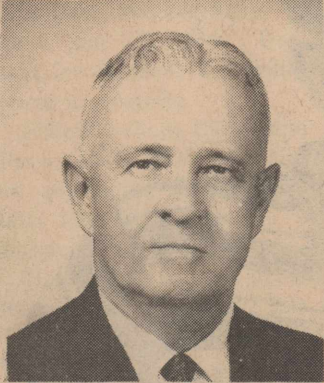
Asked about some of the personal satisfying experiences he has received over his ministry, Rev. Tune commented, "I started a men's organization in Shallowater while I was pastor there and between 26 and 30 men averaged attending". He felt this resulted in monumental growth to the local church. "While serving as a full time evangelist I had a revival in Lamesa during the summer of 1960 and 21 decisions were made for the Lord", said Rev. Tune proudly.

Other churches served by Rev. and Mrs. Tune include: Sparenburg in 1942, Lueders in 1945, Blackwell in 1947,

Meadow in 1948, Ackerly in 1951, Shallowater in 1953, Pleasant Valley in 1957, Canyon in 1963, Andrews in 1965, Loraine in 1968, Stanton in 1970, Midland in 1971, and Rotan in 1975.

"My wife is dreading this move", said the pastor, "this will be a rented house, so we know we will eventually have to move again. We felt it better to get settled for a year or so before purchasing our home".

Rev. Tune will be among 11 pastors honored on June 2 with retirement ceremonies at the Methodist Conference at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Abilene.

## Rev. Fred Thomas Takes Call To Winters Move

Rev. Fred Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Rotan for the past six years, has accepted a call to pastor the First Baptist Church in Winters. The local resignation by Rev. Thomas is effective May 30. His last Sunday services in the local church will be Sunday, May 29.

Rev. Thomas began his 33 year ministry on December 1, 1941 as pastor of a small church in Bonham, Texas at the age of 17.

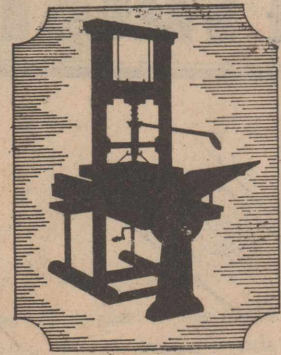
In the six years he has been at Rotan, Rev. Thomas indicated that retiring the \$132,000.00 debt on the auditorium and part of the education facilities in just 4 years would probably be remembered as a high point in his local ministry. He was especially appreciative of the reception given both he and his wife by the entire community since coming to Rotan in April of 1971. Rev. Thomas has been active in the Rotan Ministerial Alliance, Rotan Lions Club and active in the Rotan Little League Program.

"There is an excellent opportunity for good substantial growth in Winters", said Rev. Thomas. He also indicated that the church was planning a remodeling program of the education facilities and is planning to construct a new parsonage.

The First Baptist Church at Winters averages a solid 225 in Sunday School every Sunday and is in excess of \$80,000.00 in total receipts.

Rev. Thomas and his wife Effie have two children. A son Freddy, age 28, is in his 2nd year at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, and their daughter, Mrs. Ronnie Floyd is the wife of the pastor of the Cherokee Baptist Church in Brownwood.

The new Winters pastor began his ministry in Bonham in 1941. In September of 1942 he attended Decatur Baptist College in Decatur. This school has since moved to Dallas and is now known as Dallas Baptist

Rotan Police Chief Chuck Renfro appeared before the council with Ernest Skeen and recommended that he be hired as a full time patrolman. Renfro also announced that he was going to check into Hendrick Memori-

al Hospital on Wednesday, May 25, for testing. As has been the practice with the hiring of other police department personnel, the council passed a motion authorizing

Chief Renfro to hire Skeen. The split vote came when the subject of pay was discussed for police officers. Chief Renfro and Patrolman Tom Jones, until the hiring last Tuesday of Skeen, had been pulling 12 hours each--7 days a week.

Councilman Jim Nowlin made a motion, seconded by J.D. Burk that a \$100.00 per month raise be given all patrolmen--when the city was operating with three full time patrolmen. Until recently the full time police force consisted of four full time men. At the last regular council meeting, Councilmen Tankersley, Burk and Denton voted for chopping the full time force to three full time employees. Councilmen Schick and Nowlin abstained from voting.

Last Tuesday Councilmen Burk, Tankersley and Nowlin voted in favor of giving the three full time police department employees a \$100.00 per month raise, while Councilman Denton voted against the motion. Councilman Schick was not present for the meeting.

Under the new pay schedule passed by the council last Tuesday night, a patrolman will receive an increase from \$700.00 to \$800.00 per month; the Assistant Police Chief will jump from \$710.00 to \$810.00 a month, and the Chief of Police will be raised from \$795.00 to \$895.00 a month. The Police Chief also is given a \$50.00 a month expense account bringing his

total salary plus expense to \$945.00 a month under the recently passed pay adjustment for a 3 man force.

A second motion also was split by the council last Tuesday. Councilman Nowlin moved and received a second from Councilman Tankersley to leave the long standing starting salary for beginning patrolmen at \$50.00 a month less for a 90 day probationary period. Councilmen Burk, Tankersley and Nowlin voted in favor of the motion while Councilman Denton voted against the motion.

Councilman Denton made a motion, seconded by Councilman Tankersley, that no further action on pay structures be taken until the June regular council meeting. The motion received unanimous approval.

At 8:10 p.m., the councilmen began a one hour-fifty minute review of some 45 ordinances that had been placed into law between 1961 and 1969. Many of the ordinances concerning the official closing of streets around the Rotan School and obsolete gas, water, electric and telephone rates were removed from the main ordinance file.

Councilmen, acting on the

## Farm Bureau To Push To Defeat CPA Bill

The Texas Farm Bureau, along with Farm Bureaus over the nation, is making a big push to defeat the Consumer Protection Act of 1977.

U.S. House and Senate Committees have reported out bills. H.R. 6118 and S. 1262 would create an independent, non-regulatory "Agency for Consumer Advocacy" charged with the responsibility of representing consumer interests before all federal agencies.

In an action-requested letter sent to all counties in Texas, the TFB urged that communications be sent to Congressmen, both Texas Senators, and to President Carter in opposition to the proposed Consumer Protection Act of 1977.

Farm Bureau policy on the matter reads in part: "We do not believe the government can protect every consumer in each of his transactions without infringing upon his personal freedom. We oppose the establishment of any consumer agency..."

The Agency that would be established in the proposals would be directed by an administrator appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate for a four-year term. The administrator and his staff could intervene in the actions of any federal agency which affects consumers, and could sue any agency in federal courts to force concessions on behalf of consumers.

According to Ed McKay, TFB national affairs director, prime areas of action for the Agency would be prices, quality, safety, availability, and reliability of products and services for consumers. Actions of organized labor

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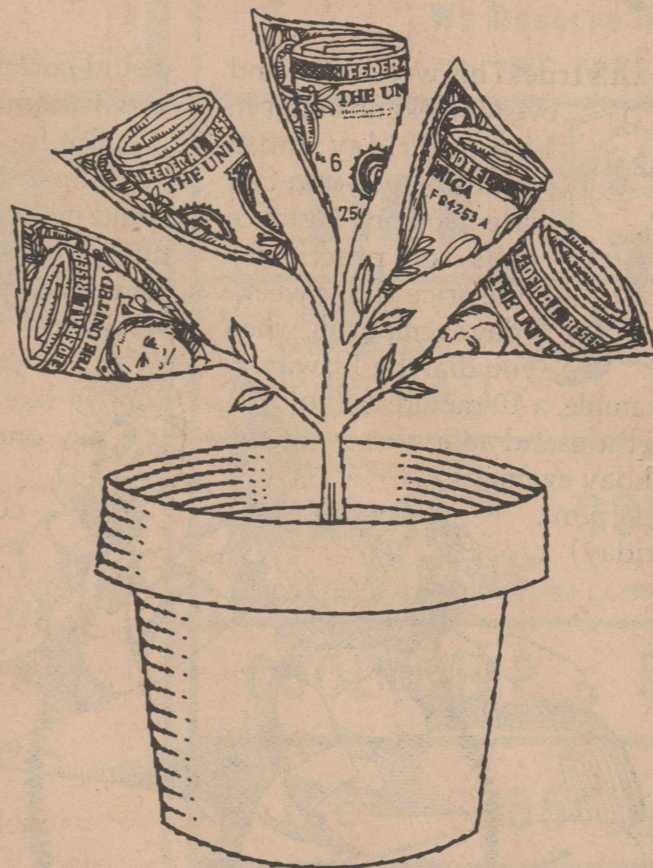
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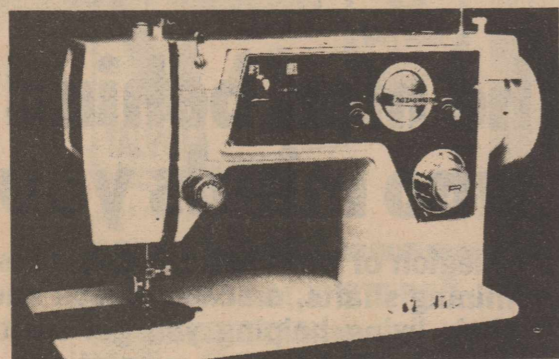

advice of City Attorney Norman Arnett, are expected to pass a new ordinance concerning speed limits within the City Limits of Rotan that will supersede many old ordinances. Arnett recommended that the council pass one master speed ordinance. The council is taking the recommendation under study at the present time.

Councilmen found that several of the original ordinances were unsigned and not dated as they staged their first of what will be several meetings specifically designed to review and update Rotan City Ordinances.

The ordinance covering the keeping of livestock within the City Limits of Rotan was reviewed. Since this ordinance was approved in a referendum by the residents of Rotan, it can not be changed without a vote and approval of the city residents.

The voters of the City of Rotan also approved the one cent City Sales Tax, but there is not an ordinance on file imposing the tax. Councilmen are to review this ordinance again at the next ordinance meeting tentatively called for June 28.

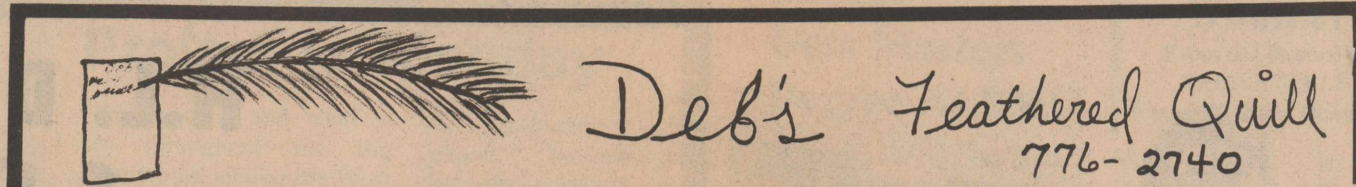
## Second Rotan Lawman Resigns During May
