

U.S. House and Senate Committees have reported out bills. H.R. 6118 and S. 1262 would created an independent, non-regulatory 'Agency for Consumer Advocacy" charged with the responsibility of representing consumer interests before all federal agencies.

In an action-requested letter sent to all counties in Texas, the TFB urged that communications be sent to Congressmen, both Texas Senators, and to President Carter in opposition to the proposed Consumer Protection Act of 1977.

Farm Bureau policy on the matter reads in part: "We do not believe the government can protect every consumer in each of his transactions without infringing upon his personal freedom. We oppose the establishment of any consumer agency...

The Agency that would be established in the proposals would be directed by an administrator appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate for a four-year Merri Marlene Hammit, term. The administrator and his staff cold intervene in the actions of any federal agency B.S. in Dental Hygiene. which affects consumers, and could sue any agency in federal courts to force concessions on behalf of
