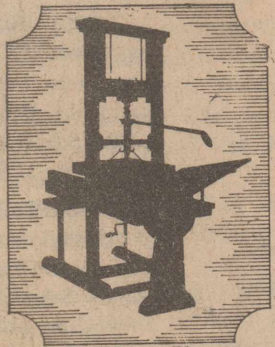
There will be a Fisher County Jackpot Barrel Race each night. This event is for 4-H age children.

## Roby Council Names New Board Members

The Roby City Council met in regular session last Monday afternoon and appointed new members to the City of Roby Equalization Board and Roby Housing Authority Board.

Members of the Housing Authority Board that were re-appointed for the 1977-78 year included: Kirmitt Terry and Zanna Anderson. Other members are J.T. Palmer, Ralph Ammons, and Dwilyn Parker.

Roby City Equalization Board members appointed for the 1977-78 year include: Harmon Holcomb, J.T. Polk, and Jerry Hoodenpyle, chairman. Alternates include: Kenneth Martin and Mike Terry.

In other action at the monthly Roby Commission meeting, members present discussed the purchase of a new typewriter and reviewed an invitation to attend the open house of the new medical facility at Texas Tech University.

City Manager, Jimmy Price, reported to the commission that the stop signs, recently voted to be erected, had arrived but city workers were waiting on poles and hardware to set the signs.

Price also reported to the council on the aluminum can project. Commissioners tabled any action until the project could be given further study.

Price gave commissioners information on the possible employment of personnel on a grant to work at the cemetery.

In final action commissioners discussed the swimming pool and the possible seal coating of some streets. The Roby Council also agreed to transport the new Miss

Texas Teenager to Austin to meet with Governor Briscoe. A representative of the Roby Council will transport Anne Grahame to the State capitol sometime within the next 45 days.

## Commissioners Agree To Increase Oil Valuations

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court held a special session last Monday morning to discuss the financial future of the county and to discuss the projected decline of oil revenue tax dollars.

After a 30-minute discussion of possible alternative, commissioners voted to leave the 95 cents per \$100.00 valuation tax rate that has been the basis for taxing, at the same figure for 1977.

Commissioners did discuss increasing the percent of assessment used to compute tax dollars for oil companies. According to Fisher County Judge Dwight Lovett, "Approximately 3 years ago Commissioners decreased the assessment percentage from 23 percent to 20 percent of the total value for oil companies."

Commissioners agreed last Monday to leave the assessment value at 20 percent for 1977, but to

begin a two-year increase in 1978. Commissioners are expected to increase the assessment value to 21½ percent in 1978 and to 23 percent in 1979.

Fisher County Commissioners are faced with a 6.4 million loss in valuation in oil

property throughout the county that will mean a projected tax dollar loss of approximately \$60,000.00 for 1977.

The oil valuation meeting has been set in Fisher County for July 12, 1977.

## Rotan Summer Recreation Program Starts Monday

The Rotan Summer Recreation Program begins on June 13 and ends July 8. A four-week program is planned for elementary, junior high and high school age students. Time for elementary, grades 3 through 6, and junior high groups will be from 9:00 a.m. until noon each day, Monday through Friday. High School boys and girls time will from 6:00 until 9:00 each evening. The gyms will not be open at any other time except times listed above, unless parents or adults supervise.

Activities planned are: badminton, ping pong, handball, dart games, scooter boards, skate board, basketball, weights room, trampoline, volley ball, dodge ball, tumbling, horse shoes, track and field, tennis, etc.

The purpose of the program is to encourage students to spend time each day in physical activity during summer to better their physical health and gain knowledge about games and activities that are offered. The instructor will encourage students to stay busy and learn basic rules and fundamentals of each activity offered.

The instructors will be Sonny Barnes and Sid McCown. Barnes will be supervising all indoor activities for boys and girls, while McCown will be in charge of outside boys and girls programs.

The tentative outside schedule for all age groups involved in the program is: 9:00 to 10:30, tennis; 10:30 to 12:00, golf; 6:00 to 7:30, track and field; 7:30 to 9:00, field games (soccer, football, etc.).

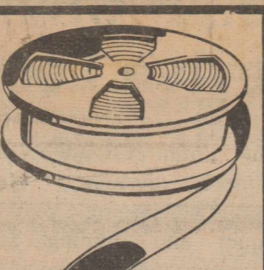

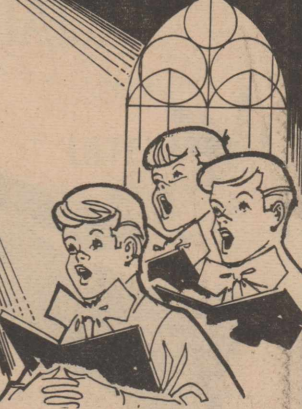

This picture was taken just a year ago. It was a perfect afternoon for a garden wedding reception. Joan and Kenny were so much in love.

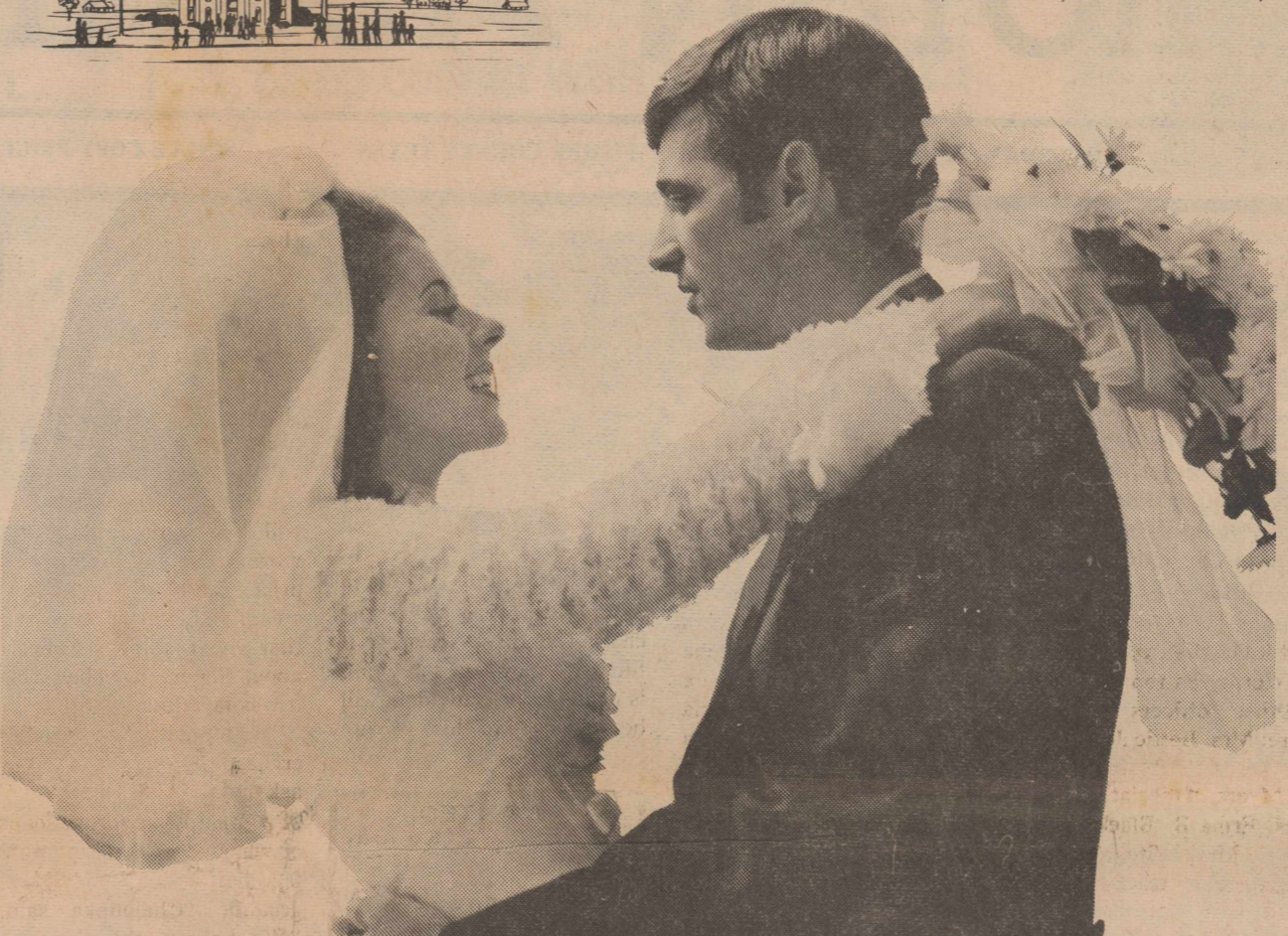

**Farm Leader Warns Of Wheat Storage Problem**

With wheat harvest just getting underway, the president of the Texas Farm Bureau said a crisis may be developing over storing this year's crop.

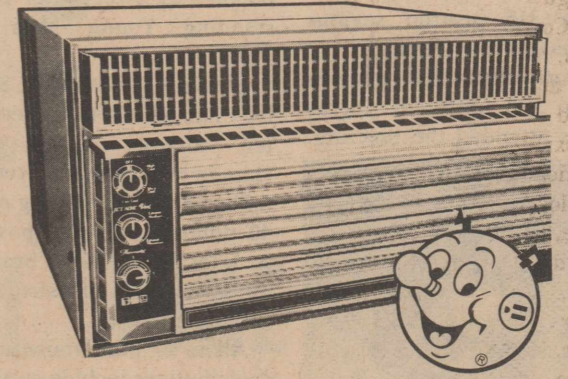
"Our problem is we've already got almost a year's crop in storage and we're expecting good to bumper crops in the winter wheat area from Texas to Nebraska", said Carol Chaloupka, Dalhart grain and cattle producer.

"What we fear," he said, "is that a shortage of storage will depress our prices even more." He said that wheat prices have been falling steadily since last year, and that wheat is now selling for about 40 percent below what it was last June.

"If the situation reaches crisis proportions, we will ask that the U.S. Department of Agriculture approve loans on wheat stored in temporary facilities, even on the ground," Chaloupka said. "We believe this may be

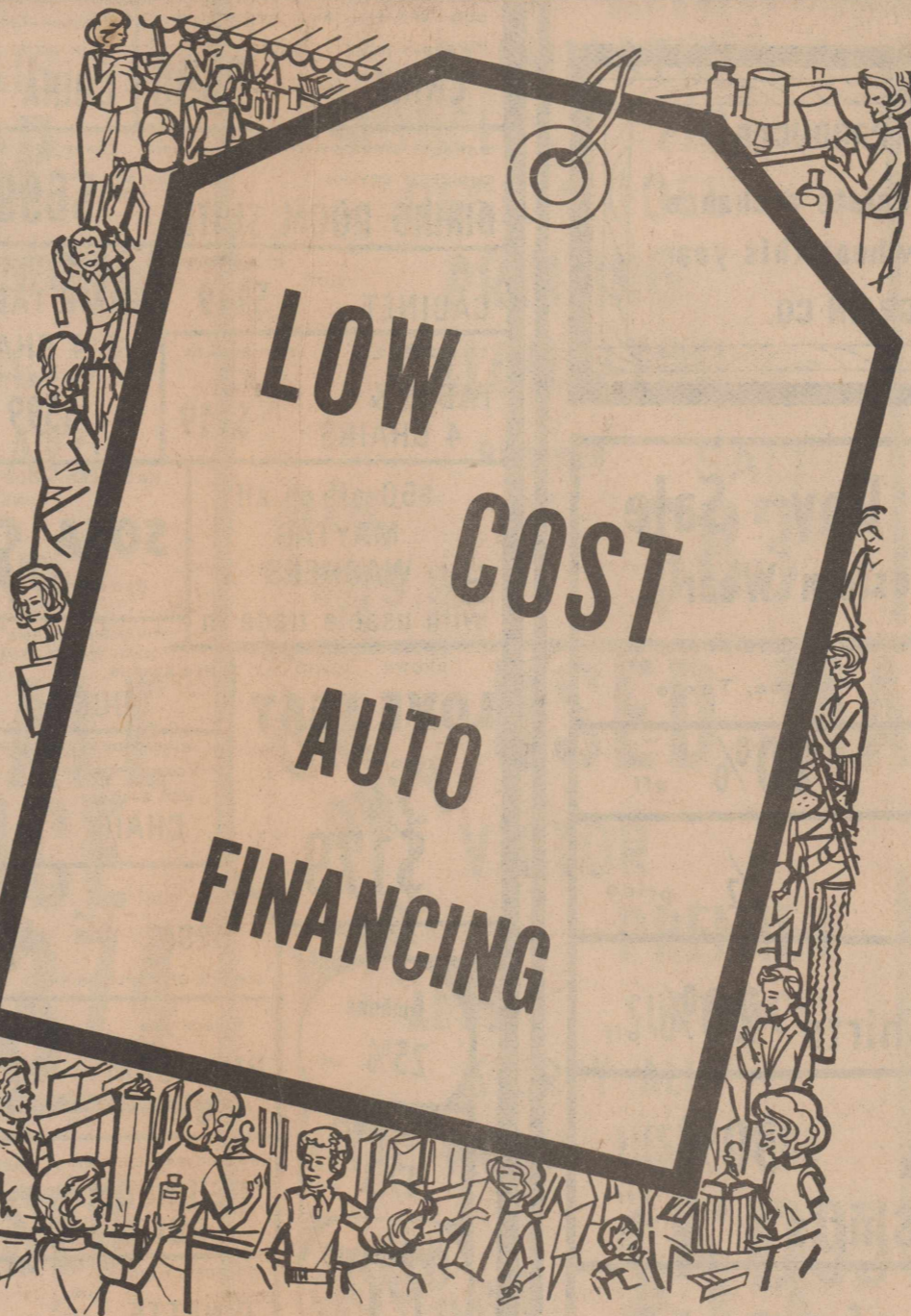

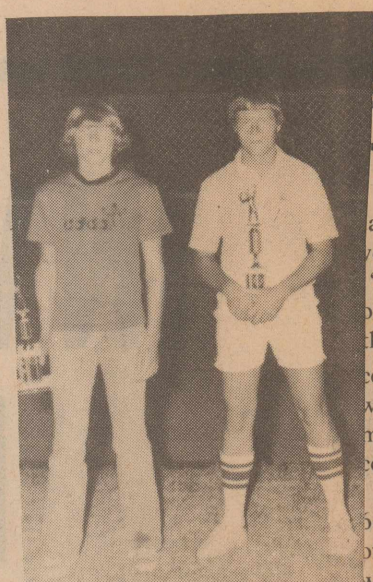

Dear Kim, The 65th Legislature adjourned sine die at midnight on May 30, 1977.

As for my own legislative program, it was a good session. Eighteen Senate bills authored by me have been or will, subject to action by the Governor, become law. Additionally, twelve bills carried by House members should become law of the State of Texas.

Unfortunately, we did not pass a new education finance law, and it appears that the Governor will call a special session of the Legislature to deal with this problem and possibly inheritance and utility tax relief. This session will probably occur in July and is vitally needed by most of our school districts in the 30th District.

ake the time to register and vote No," says Naman, "everyone who owns even one head will find himself in the position of bookkeeper/collector for a Beef Board which could be spending millions of dollars without considering the producer."

Registration is set up June 5-17 through the local ASCS office. Certified producers will then vote July 5-15. "The Texas Farmers Union is certainly in favor of self-help programs so that producers can promote and research their commodities. We just want to be sure that the program doesn't become a wasteful boondoggle that only helps the advertising and travel-tour industry. Democratic representation is totally absent from this legislation."

Naman concluded by once again urging producers to register and vote "NO", calling the government-enforced check-off a "mandatory rip-off that the cattle industry does not need."

## S.S. And All Welfare Plans Are Confused

Frequently someone comes in asking questions about the "Welfare program you operate." So much confusion exists about the role played by the Social Security Administration, that some direct information about what we do should help those who do not understand.

Congress placed upon the Social Security Administration the full responsibility for administering the Aged, Blind, and Disabled portions of the programs which previously were administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Since January 1974 these programs the State operated have been run by the Social Security Administration as the Supplemental Security Income program.

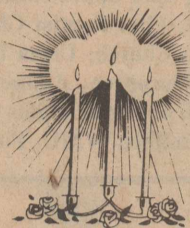
Another area of confusion that developed when the Supplemental Security Income Program started was with the Texas Medicaid Program. The Social Security Administration does not administer the Medicaid program. It is still a State program administered under the direction of the State

Department of Public Welfare. Through an agreement between the Social Security Administration and the State of Texas, anyone eligible for SSI is automatically eligible for Medicaid. For this reason many people mistakenly think that the Social Security Administration administers

the Medicaid program. The Medicare program, however, is administered by the Social Security Administration. This means that all regular social security questions, all Supplemental Security questions and all Medicare questions should be directed to the Social Security Administration.

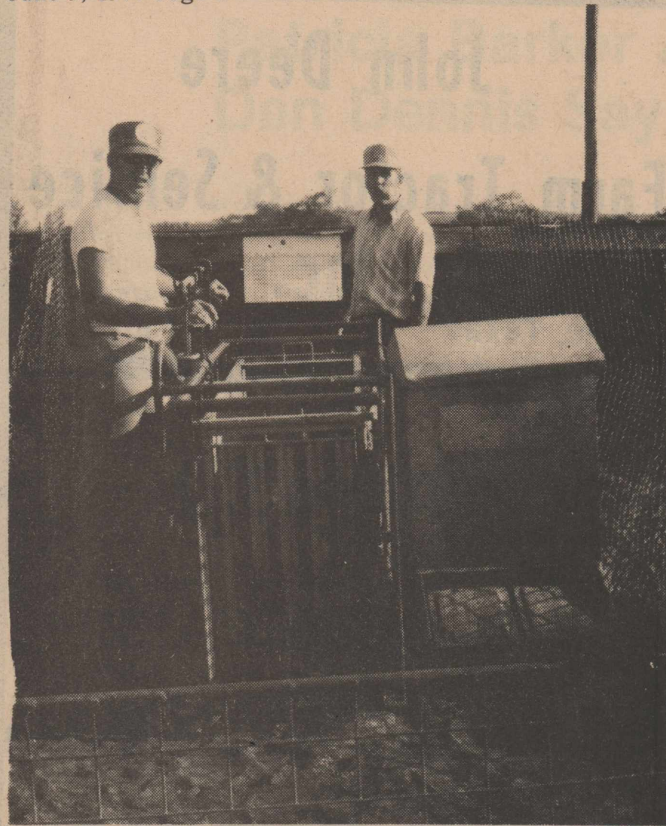

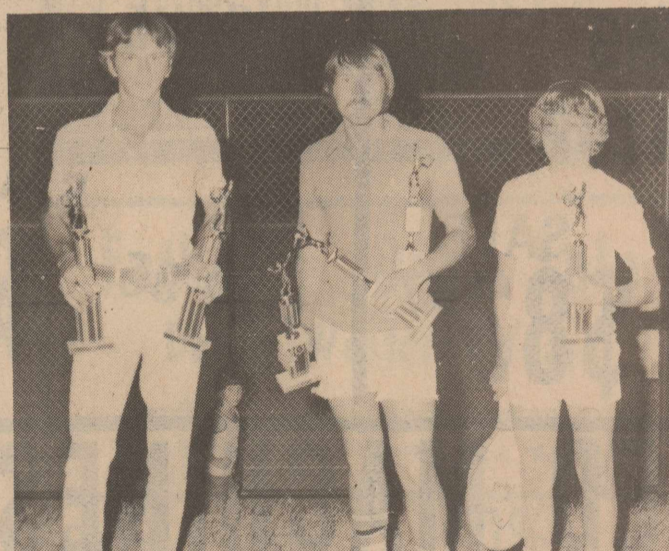

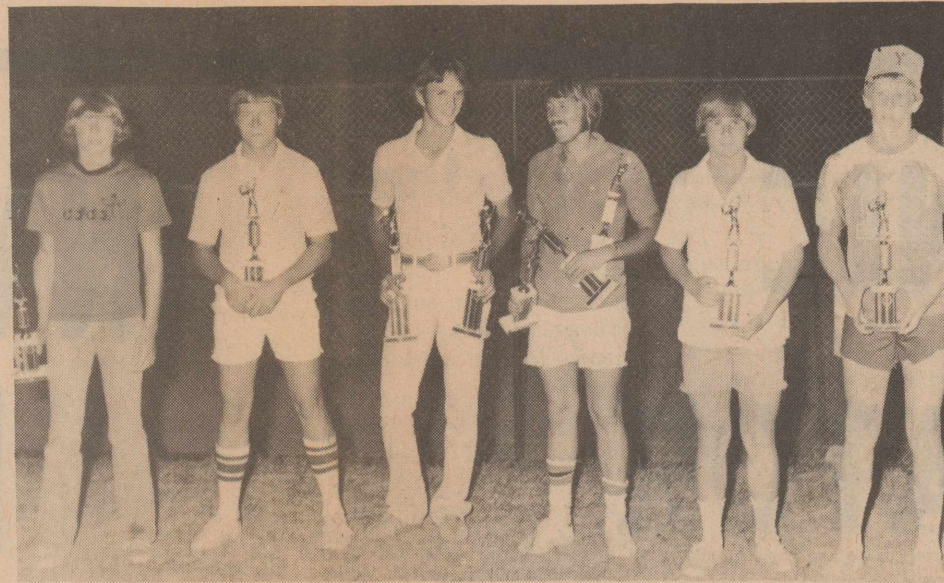

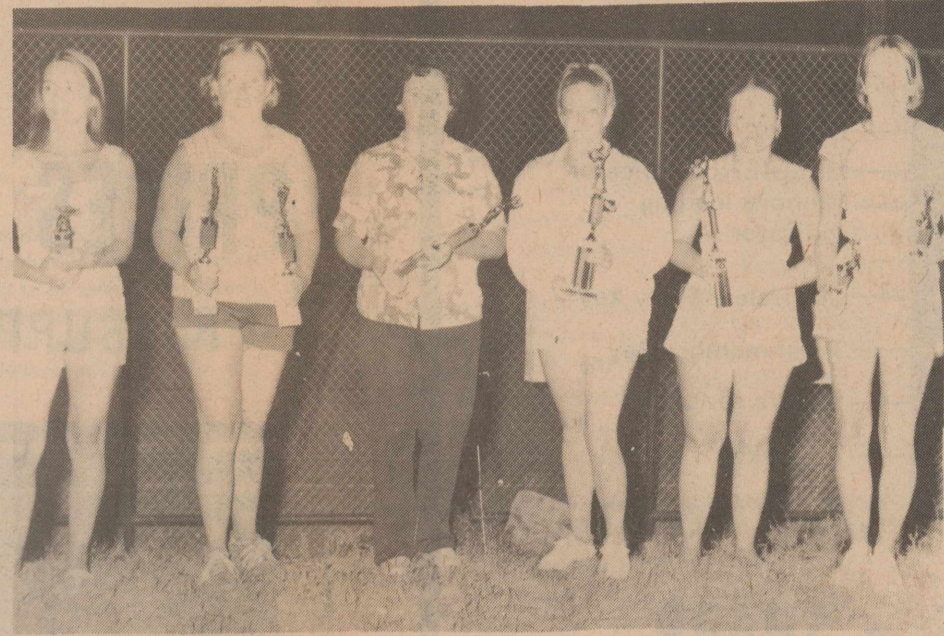
