

Seven Scouts Depart For National Meeting

A group of seven Rotan Boy Scouts and Scoutmaster Jack Cadenhead will depart Rotan Thursday for a two week trip to Washington, D.C. and the National Scout Jamboree in Morian, Pennsylvania.

Scouts that will accompany Cadenhead on the trip include: Robert Gray, Shannon Strickland, Ruben Cabrera, Robert Posey, Ricky LeBleu, Toby Moore and Michael Cadenhead. They will join three other adult leaders and 33 other scouts from the Chisholm Trail Council in Abilene for the two week tour.

The group will depart Abilene by bus to Dallas then fly from Dallas to the Nation's capitol for a four

day sight-seeing tour. While in Washington, Congressman Omar Burlison and Senator John Tower have arranged tours of the F.B.I. Building and White House. The boys also plan to attend President Carter's church on Sunday morning, July 31.

At the conclusion of their tour they will ride by bus to Morian, Pennsylvania for the National Jamboree.

The activities at the National Jamboree include cooking, swimming, sailing, canoes and competition in fire building, the metric system, and athletic competition.

The group will depart Pittsburg on August 10th for their return to Rotan.

New Dog Problem Is Surfacing In Rotan

A new problem has emerged within the City of Rotan concerning the capture and confinement of stray dogs within the city limits.

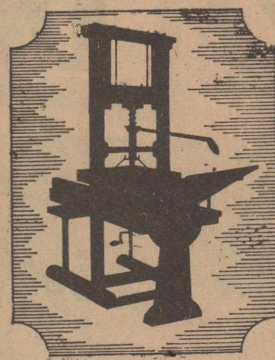
Dr. Barry Allen, owner of Rotan Veterinary Clinic, has requested that the City of Rotan pay for the construction of a stray animal holding pen. Dr. Allen volunteered to permit the City of Rotan to construct the pen on his property at the Veterinary Clinic. His purpose for requesting the holding pen was to segregate the increasing number of captured stray dogs from dogs left at the clinic for boarding purposes. According to reports, Dr. Allen wants all stray dogs treated for ticks before permitting them to be boarded in the Veterinary Clinic kennels.

Rotan Councilmen unanimously approved the construction of a holding pen and authorized Superintendent Jack Aaron to work with Dr. Allen concerning the specifications and size of the new pen.

In other action Councilman Rodney Denton made a motion, seconded by Councilman Rodney Tanersley, to amend the current dog ordinance increasing the impounding fee from \$5.00 to \$8.00. This fee is normally paid by the dog owner to the Rotan Veterinary Clinic and credited by the Clinic to the City of Rotan.

The vote to increase the impounding fee passed after councilmen recorded a split vote on the issue. Councilmen Denton, Nowlin and Tankersley voted in favor of the increased impounding fee, while councilman Chester Schick recorded his vote against the increased fee.

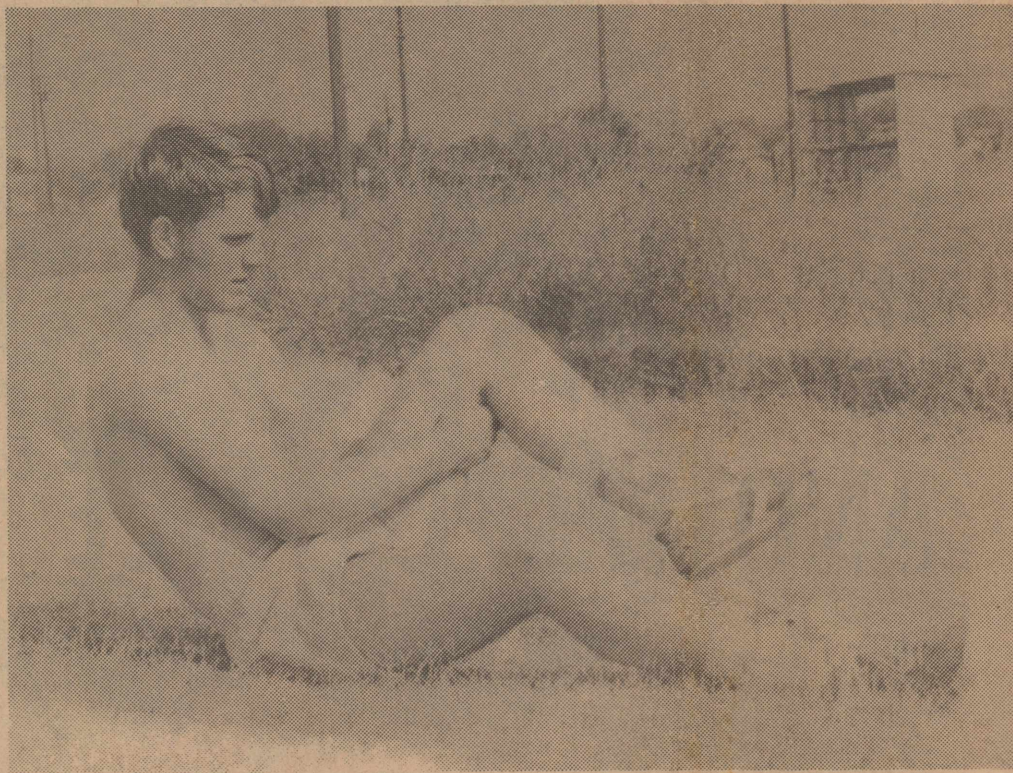

Anson used a total of 4 pitchers in their vain attempt to shut off the Rotan All-Stars at the plate.

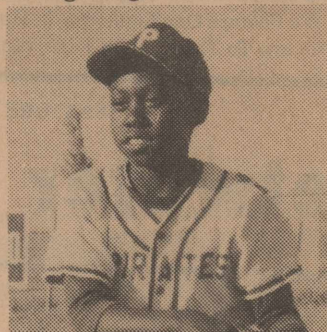
Rotan collected a total of 6 runs off 6 hits, committed 2 errors and left 7 men stranded on base.

Rotan Plagued With Unpaid Water Bills

Rotan City Councilmen, during a special meeting of the Rotan City Council last Monday afternoon, were made aware of an unusually large amount of unpaid water bills by City Secretary Kenneth Vann.

Vann told the councilmen that \$776.00 in water bills for the month of June were unpaid as of July 25. Normal procedures call for all water connections to be cut off by the City of Rotan if bills remain unpaid by the 25th of the month following billing.

Vann told the councilmen that one business owner had an unpaid water bill amounting to \$150.00. It was his opinion that councilmen should be braced for a personal contact concerning that particular delinquent bill.

The business owner complained to city personnel indicating that the water meter was malfunctioning. City personnel supposedly checked the water meter and informed the business owner

Emergency Cited

Rotan Council Vote Split On Trash Truck Purchase

Rotan City Councilmen voted to purchase a new trash truck and Pac-More trash container at a special meeting last Monday afternoon after Rotan Mayor Lester Sescil declared that a state of emergency existed.

Rotan Councilman Rodney Denton voted against the purchase of both the \$6,800 Pac-More trash container and the \$7,479.00 1977 Ford F-600 truck. Denton was of

the opinion that the items "Haven't been advertised properly".

In the regular Rotan City Council meeting of July 12, Councilmen voted to accept bids on the trash container and truck separately and as a package. There was also some question concerning the length of time that the bid notices appeared in the newspaper.

Mayor Sescil, faced with either complying with the law as written by by-passing the law, chose to declare a state of emergency and open bids for the trash container and trash truck.

It was Sescil's opinion that a serious health problem could emerge if the present trash vehicle were to become inoperative. City Water Superintendent Jack Aaron indicated to Councilmen that the condition of the present trash collection vehicle is extremely poor.

The Pac-More Container Company of San Antonio submitted the only bid for the trash container. In a motion by Councilman Jim Nowlin, and seconded by Chester Schick, the bid of \$6,800.00 was accepted. Councilmen Nowlin, Schick and Tankersley voted for the motion while Councilman Denton voted against the motion.

Rotan Motor Company was awarded the bid on the truck after their low bid of \$7,479.00 received council approval. Councilmen Nowlin, Schick and Tankersley voted in favor of the purchase while Councilman Denton voted against the purchase.

The only other firm to submit a bid on the trash truck was F&M Chevrolet-Buick Company.

The total cost of the new trash collection unit and truck will be in the vicinity of \$14,210.00. This is \$2,789.00 less than the \$17,000.00 in Federal Revenue Sharing money that councilmen voted to spend toward the purchase of a new trash vehicle.

Thornton, Harris Win At State TAAF Meet

Two Rotan resident track competitors came home with awards after taking part in the State TAAF Track Meet in Pasadena last weekend.

Mark Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Harris of Rotan, took a 6th place in the 120 yard low hurdles with a time of 18.5.

David Thornton, son of

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thornton, was 5th in the 100 yard dash finals with the time 11.1 and 7th in the 220 yard dash with a time of 25.7.

The 12-13 year old 440 Relay Team consisting of Eli Turner, Roger Hooper, Mark Harris and David Thornton, recorded a time of 50.1 in the preliminaries but were disqualified when a judge ruled that one handoff was made outside of their lane.

The 14-15 year old finals were held on Saturday, July 23, but to the extremely high caliber of competition no one from Rotan managed a spot in the finals.

The 440 relay team consisting of Byron Weathersbee, Albert Campos, Gregg Hayes and Cecil Turner failed to qualify for the finals after running a strong 47.7 in the preliminaries.

Cecil Turner also ran in the 100 yard dash but didn't make the Saturday afternoon finals.

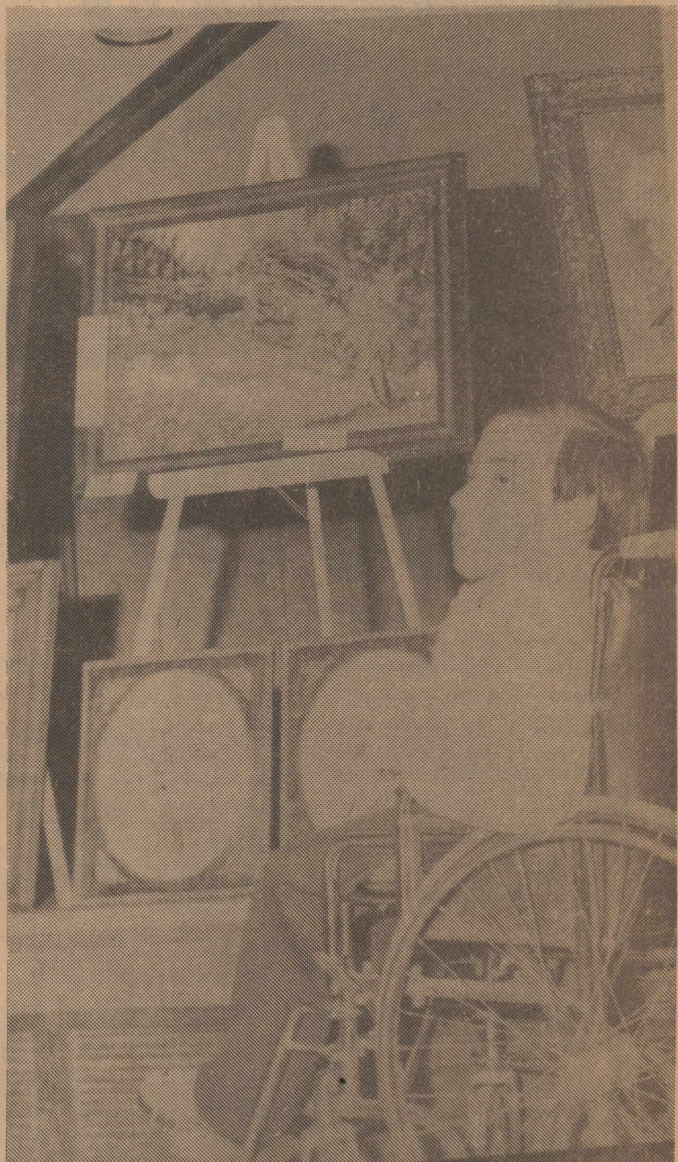

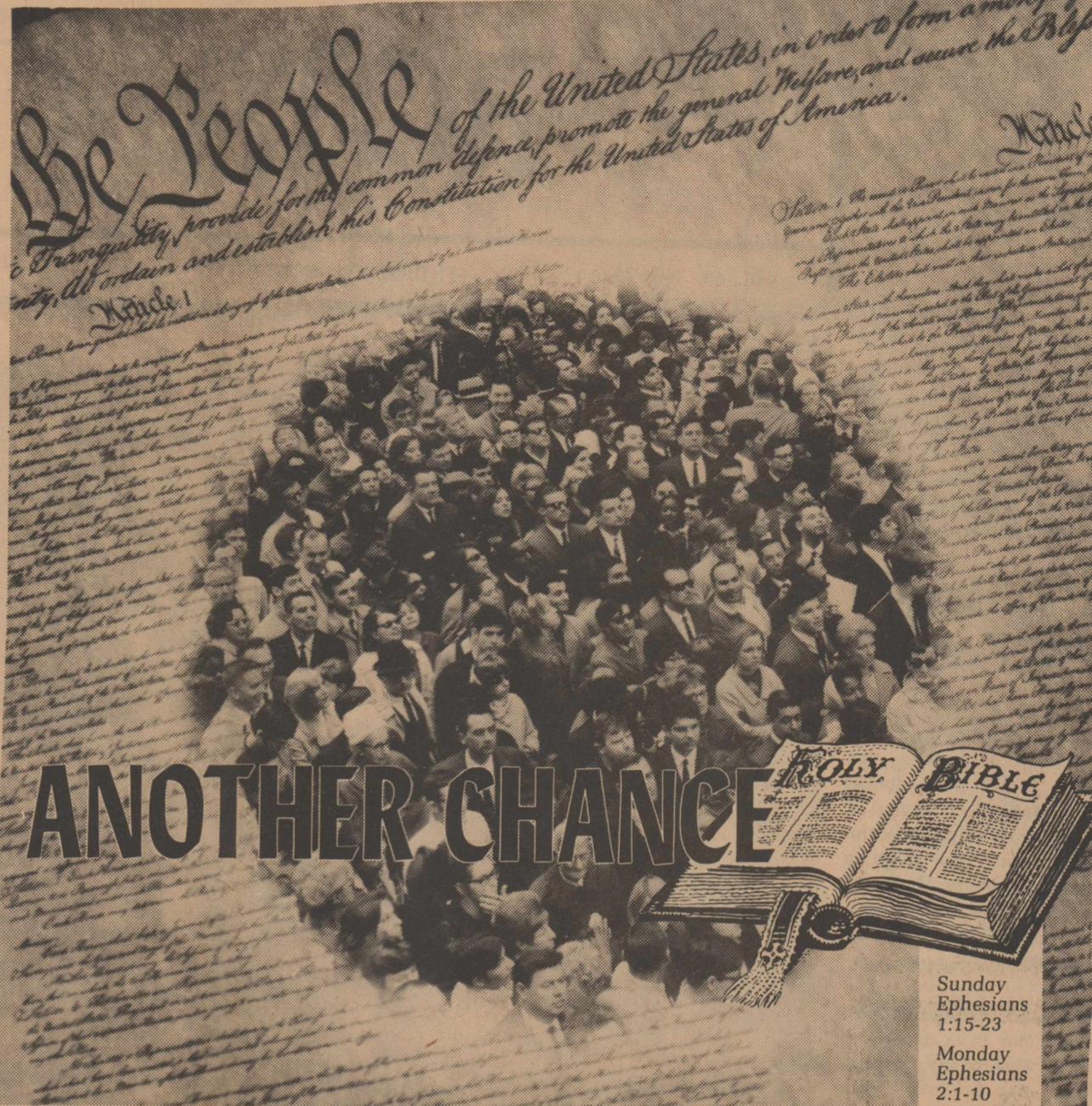

Meeting On New Program July 29

Fast rising energy costs and the recent severe weather have made it difficult for low-income persons to meet utility/fuel consumption costs.

In May of this year, the U.S. Congress appropriated \$200 million for a Special Emergency Energy Crisis Intervention Program. The programs prevent hardship or danger to health or survival due to actual or potential utility shut-off, lack of fuel or difficulty in meeting utility needs.

Specifically, emergency financial assistance will be provided to eligible households experiencing: (1) utility shut-offs; (2) inability to obtain fuel; (3) dire financial difficulty due to past utility payments.

The following eligibility guidelines must be met: (1) persons named on utility company and/or fuel supplier billings may apply; (2)

proof of poverty level income constitutes income eligibility; (3) documentation of utility/fuel need must be certified and verified to establish program eligibility; (4) the aged, blind and disabled will be given priority up to August 15, 1977.

Assistance will be on a one time basis for utility/fuel costs incurred since October 1, 1976 with a maximum of \$250.00 per household. Payments will be by the Community Service Center-People for Progress, Inc. directly to the utility company and/or fuel supplier for payment on past due amounts or as credit towards future fuel consumption.

Funded is \$28,000 for Nolan, Mitchell, Fisher and Scurry Counties. This money must be obligated by August 31, 1977. "Obligation" for the purpose of this grant shall mean certification for

grandchildren including Joe Self of Dallas who was reared in the Lewis home; five great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

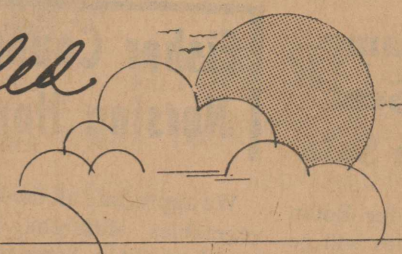



A fruit jelly and jam-boree is a way to use any kind of fruit. Whether jelly, jam, conserve, marmalade or preserve--there is a way to use even overripe fruits.

All of these products are similar, as they preserve fruits with sugar and jelly them to some extent. Their individual characteristics depend on the kind of fruit used, how the fruit is prepared, proportions of ingredients, and cooking method.

Jelly uses fruit juice and is clear and firm enough to hold its shape when turned out of the container.

Jam uses crushed or ground fruit. It tends to hold its shape but is less firm than jelly.

Conserves are jams made with a fruit mixture that often features raisins and nuts.

Marmalade is a tender jelly which small pieces of fruit distributed evenly throughout the mixture.

Preserves are whole fruits, or large pieces, in a thick syrup often jellied.

Four essential ingredients make these products--fruit, pectin, acid and sugar. Fruit gives each product its characteristic flavor and furnishes part of the pectin and acid required for a successful gel. Some fruits have enough natural pectin to make high-quality products, but others, especially jelly, require added pectin.

Commercial pectins, made from apples or citrus fruits, are available in two forms--powdered and liquid. Either is satisfactory when used in a recipe developed for that form, and each can be used with any fruit.

Acid is needed for flavor and gel formation, but acid content varies with different fruits. Lemon juice or citric acid may be added to fruits low in acid. However, commercial fruit pectins contain some acid.

Sugar also helps in gel formation, serves as a preserving agent, and adds to the flavor of the jellied product. Beet and cane sugar can be used with equal success. Corn syrup and honey can be used to replace part of the sugar.

Making jellied products requires some special equipment. Use a large kettle to bring the mixture to a full boil without boiling over. A jelly, candy or deep-fat thermometer will be helpful in making jellied fruit products without pectin.

Try preserving these fun foods for your family:

Dewberry or Blackberry jelly: Sort, remove stems or caps, and wash 3 quarts of lew or blackberries to get 4 cups of juice. Very ripe berries may be crushed and the juice pressed out without heating. Otherwise, add a small amount of water and bring to a boil on high heat. Put the prepared fruit in a clean white cloth and twist and press to remove the juice.

Put 4 cups juice in a large kettle. Add 7-1/2 cups sugar and place on high heat, stirring constantly. Bring quickly to a full rolling boil that cannot be stirred down.

Add 1 bottle liquid pectin and heat again to a full rolling boil. Boil hard for one minute.

Remove from heat and skim off the foam quickly. Pour jelly immediately into hot, dry jars or glasses that have been sterilized by boiling them in water for 15 minutes. Fill to within 1/8 inch of top of container.

Seal jars immediately with a lid according to the manufacturer's directions. Or fill glass to within 1/8 inch of top and cover with melted paraffin. Add enough paraf-

fin to make a layer 1/8 inch thick. Prick air bubbles in paraffin. This recipe makes 11 to 12 six ounce jars of jelly. For strawberry jelly, substitute strawberries for dew or blackberries in the recipe.

Uncooked Berry Jams: 3 cups crushed blackberries or strawberries (takes about 1-1/2 quarts); 5 cups sugar; 1 package powdered pectin; 1 cup water. To prepare fruit, sort and wash fully-ripe berries. Drain, remove caps and stems, crush berries.

Measure 3 cups of prepared berries into a large mixing bowl. Add sugar, mix well and let stand for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Dissolve the pectin in water, bring to a boil and boil 1 minute. Add pectin solution to the berry and sugar mixture. Stir for 2 minutes.

Pour the jam into freezer containers or canning jars, leaving 1/2 inch head space at the top. Cover containers and let stand for 24 hours or until the jam has set.

The recipe will make about 7 half-pint jars.

Store uncooked jams in a refrigerator freezer. They can be held up to 3 weeks in a refrigerator or up to a year in the freezer. Once the container is opened, use the jam within a few days.

Federal Land Bank Set For Reduced Rate

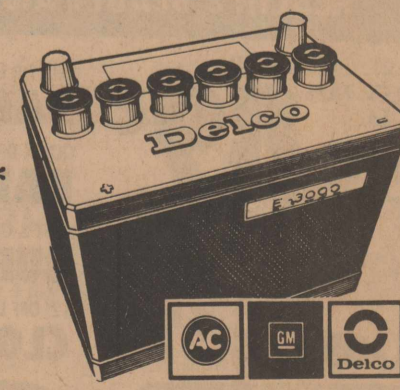

Mrs. Nell Crawford of Gainsville visited Mrs. Deel. She also took her to Hamlin to a family get-together.

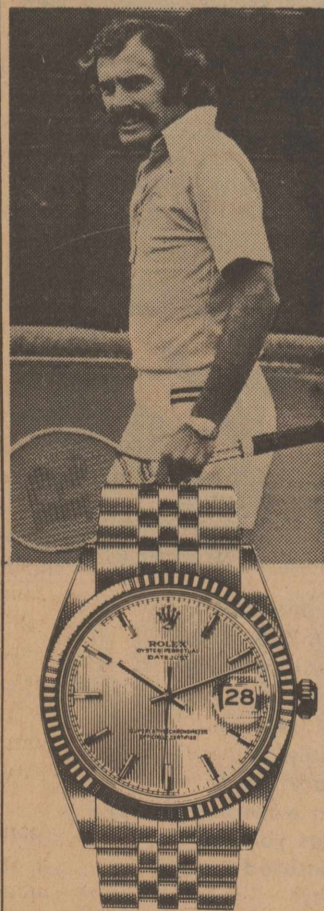
