

## Football In County Begins Friday Night

Rotan's Yellowhammers, Roby' Lions, and Hobbs' Panthers open the 1977 regular season play this Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

Rotan will be at home with the Spur Bulldogs. On September 9, they face Roscoe at home then go on the road for three weeks against Rochester, Crowell and Haskell. The second half of season play is an October 14 game at home with Munday. On October 21 Rotan plays Knox City on the road then returns home for games on October 28 with Paducah and November 4 with Aspermont (homecoming). They wind up regular season play on November 11 with Hamlin.

Roby has three games at home to open the 1977 season. This Friday night they face Borden County, then Hawley on September 9, followed by Bronte on September 16. The Lions play Rule on September 23

and Baird on September 30. On October 7th the Roby squad opens district play with Garden City on the road. The 1977 homecoming game is at home against Jayton on October 14. Roby Roby plays Sterling City on October 21, Loraine on October 28 and winds up the season with Forsan on November 4.

The Hobbs Panthers square off against Weinert on September 2nd on the road. The Panthers being a three game home stand with Harrold on September 9, Leuders-Avooca on September 16 and Wellman on September 23.

On October 1 the Panthers play their last non-district game with Blackwell on the road.

The last five games (all district) include Hermleigh at home, McCaulley on the road, Highland at home on October 21, and Ira and Trent in two away games.

# HOSPITAL BOARD VOTES TO BUY CLINIC, BUILD NEW ONE

Fisher County Hospital directors voted to approve the purchase of the Wilkerson Clinic in Roby by the hospital district and also voted to construct a new Fisher County Hospital District Clinic at the current hospital site.

Board member Thurman

Terry made the motion, received a second from Rudy Martinez. Terry, Martinez and Board member Wendell Morrow voted in favor of the proposal. Dr. C.M. Callan abstained from voting.

The board voted to sell the remaining \$250,000.00 in bonds and use the funds to:

(1) purchase the Wilkerson Clinic at a cost of \$31,250.00 and (2) construct a district owned clinic at an approximate cost of \$190,000.00.

The Fisher County Hospital District Clinic in Roby will be used by Dr. Robert Stafford and Dr. N.R. Kulkarni, both of Hamlin, on

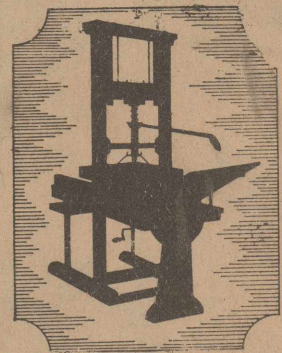
a part time basis. The clinic in Roby is to be staffed and operated by the Fisher County Hospital District with the practicing doctors receiving a percentage of the revenues. When the new Fisher County Hospital District Clinic at the hospital is completed, the Roby Clinic

will be closed and moved to the current hospital site.

Board members are in hopes that the new clinic building could be constructed and equipped and be ready for occupancy after the first of the year.

Hospital personnel and board members are in the

process of notifying Gene Vinyard, with Vinyard and Street Financial Advisors in Austin to begin the paper work to sell the \$250,000.00 in unissued bonds. Local personnel are also studying plans for the building and discussing equipment that will be needed at the new clinic facility.

## Arrest Made In Gyp Mill Knifing Incident

A Fisher County resident was arrested last week by law enforcement officials and charged with aggravated assault and aggravated robbery

in connection with the alleged knifing of a Pinkerton Security Guard at the National Gypsum Plant on August 21, according to Sheriff Mickey Counts.

Ramond Carrillo was arrested on Tuesday, August 23, and charged with aggravated assault and aggravated robbery. He was released by Fisher County Judge Dwight Lovett on appearance bonds totaling \$15,000.00.

Santo Almonza, age 19, was knifed approximately 20 to 30 times on the night of Sunday, August 21, and struck on the back of the head. According to Sheriff Counts, Almonza signed a statement indicating that Carrillo was one of the subjects that attacked him. Almonza is still confined to the Fisher County Hospital where he is being monitored for head injuries.

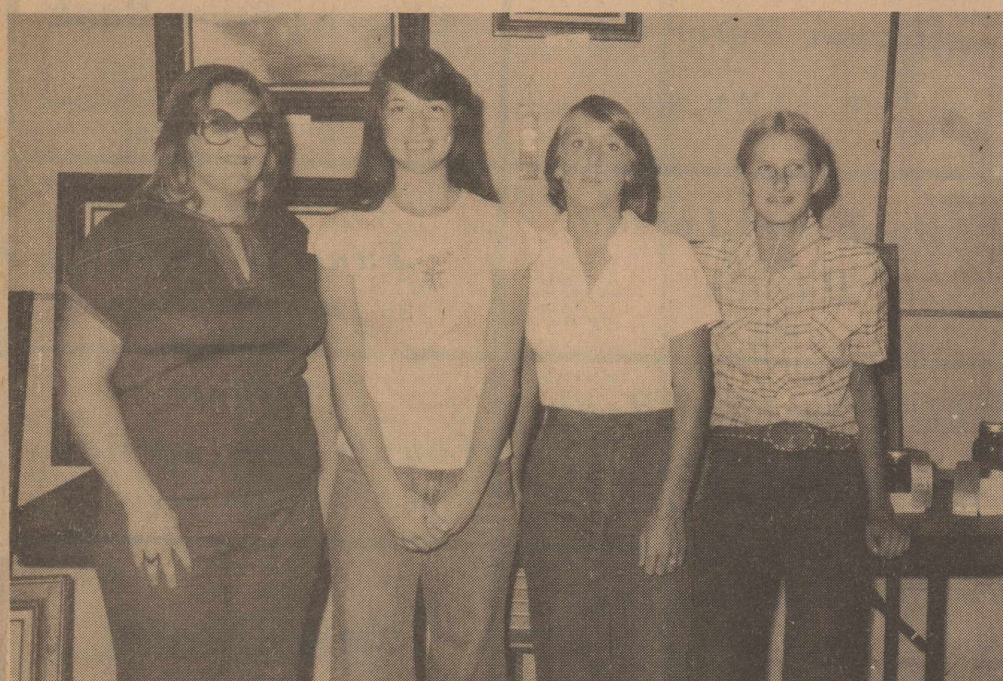

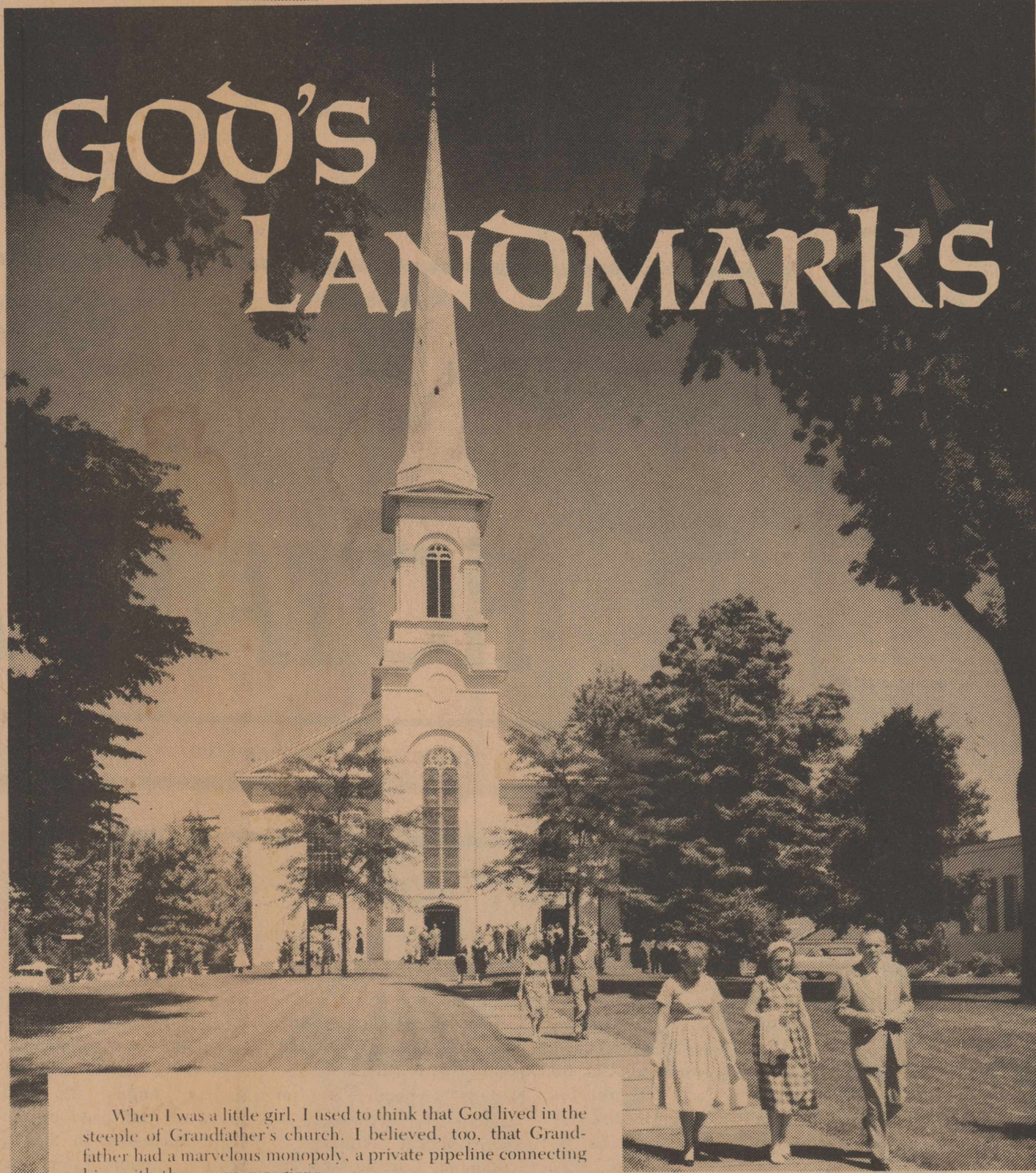
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# Let us Worship Together

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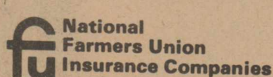
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# Uta Will Fast Becoming Texan...Bavaria Style

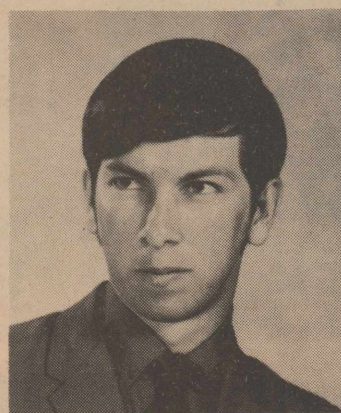

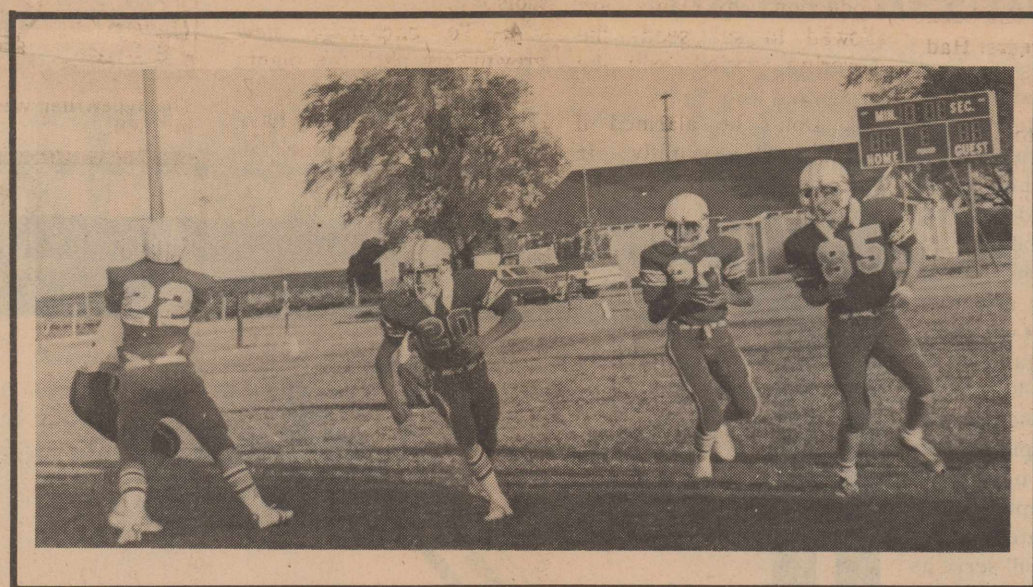

## Roby Firemen Vote To Purchase New Vehicle

On August 19, in a special called meeting, the members of the Roby Volunteer Fire Department voted to obtain a loan from the Citizens State Bank to be used for the purchase of a new fire truck. The truck is a 4x4, 1 1/4 ton

jeep, 320 gallon tank, 18 hp Hale centrifugal pump, Han-nay hose reel, 150 ft. of 1 inch hose, Elkhart 1 inch nozzle, 20 feet of 2 1/2 inch hard suction hose, two emergency red lights and electronic siren.

These trucks are provided through the Texas Forest Service to Departments throughout the state at a cost only of the fire fighting equipment mounted on the truck. There is not cost for the truck, but the truck is to be kept on a strict maintenance program, and will be subjected to inspection by the Forest Service at any time, for a period of three years.

The Roby Department is getting the truck for about one-third its value through this program. There is a waiting list for the trucks in the program. Roby has been on the list for two years. Had Roby not taken this truck at this time, they would have been put at the bottom of the list, and waited for their turn to come up again in the

future. It is the feeling of the membership of the Roby Volunteer Fire Department that this truck is essential for providing the best fire fighting force available now

for the county. The truck will be delivered in four to six weeks.

## COUNTY AGENT

With continued care and attention, flowering annual can be kept attractive until frost. The following suggestions are offered.

1. Remove all faded flowers to prevent seed production. If plants are allowed to set seed, the flowering period will be shortened.

2. Don't be alarmed if plants wilt slightly in mid-afternoon. This is the natural method of preventing

excessive moisture loss.

3. Water thoroughly when soil is dry, soaking it to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. Allow soil to become slightly dry before watering again, and use a mulch to conserve moisture.

4. To encourage new growth, cut back the plants drastically. This is especially true of petunias as they have a tendency to become tall and leggy.

5. Stake tall-growing annuals to prevent damage from high winds or heavy rains.

6. Maintain a disease prevention program to fight off mildew and leaf spots.

7. Apply a complete fertilizer every 4 to 6 weeks.

A little care of annual flowers can add a sparkle of color to the fall landscape.

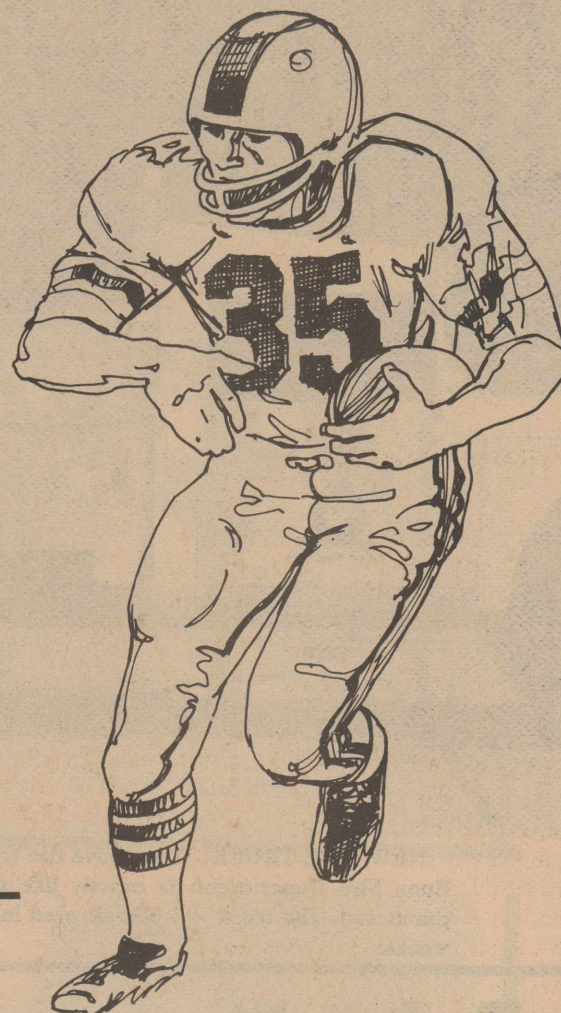

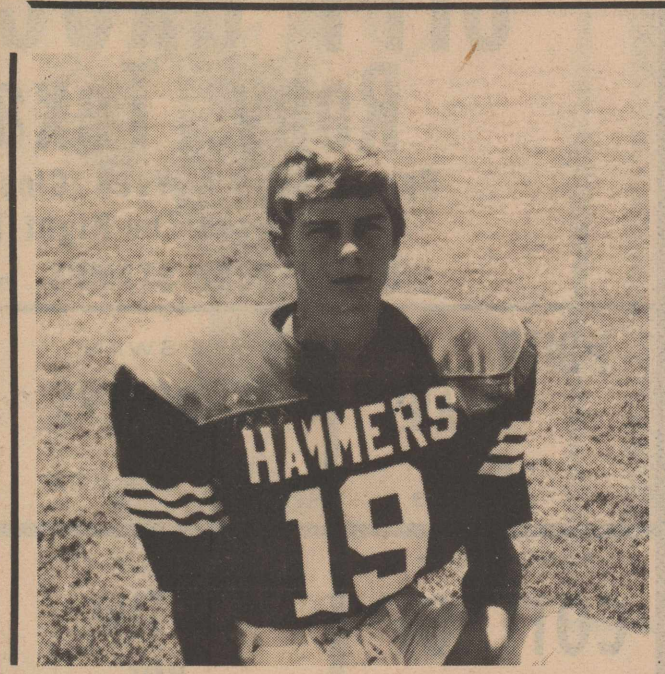

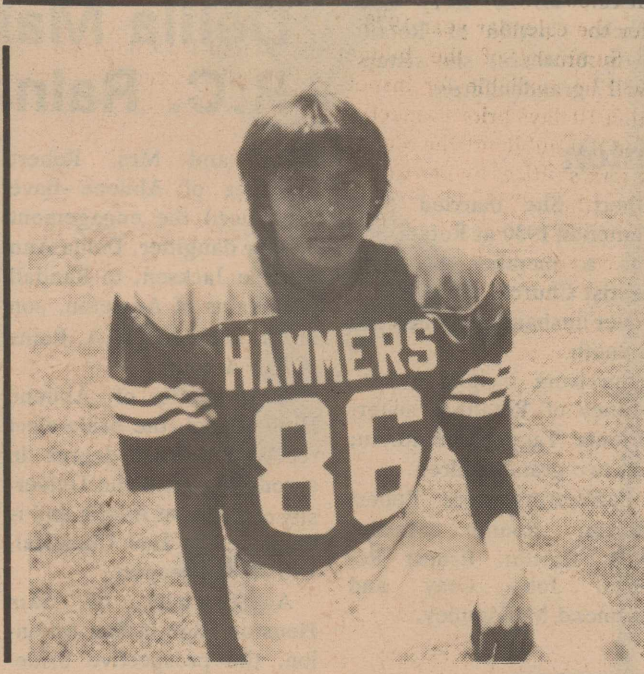

A "silent disease" that can lead to heart attack, stroke or other cardiac or

kidney problems is taxing the lives of over two million Texans. The culprit is hypertension--commonly known as high blood pressure. Of even greater consequence is the fact that nearly one-half of these victims or approximately one million Texas are unaware that they have hypertension.

Hypertension is called the "silent disease" because it often manifests no unique symptoms to call attention to its presence. That is why so many people are unaware that they have it. This is a tragedy because hyperten-

sion can be detected by a simple test performed by a physician and many drugs have been developed that can control most cases of hypertension.

In an effort to find the approximately one million Texans suspected of having undiagnosed hypertension and to help get them under effective treatment, the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate, is conducting a vigorous program of detecting hypertension among the public through Blood Pressure Screening Programs. These programs will be sponsored by the local Divisions of the American Heart Association.

In addition, the American Heart Association has announced a program of increased emphasis on educating the public about hypertension through a mass media and educational program in an attempt to create public awareness about hypertension.

Hypertension hits particularly hard at Black Americans. Both male and female Blacks show a greater mortality rate from hypertension in every age group than whites in the same category.

Other studies have confirmed that treating even mild elevated levels of blood pressure can be effective in treating heart attack and stroke, contrary to some earlier beliefs.

But what is important for Texans to remember is that although hypertension is serious, it can be detected easily and controlled by treatment. But, only a doctor can detect and treat it.

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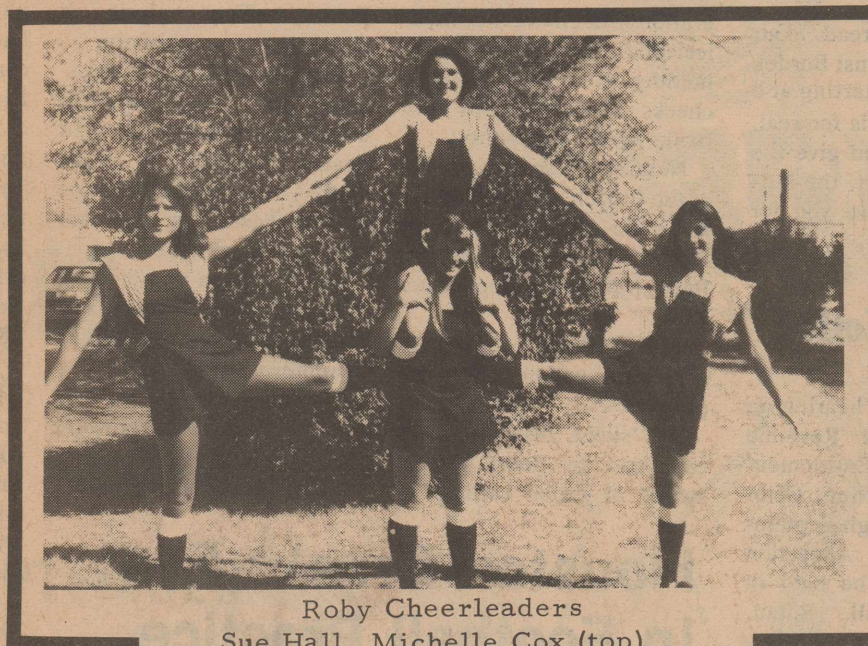

next two years. He has improved probably more than anyone at this point.

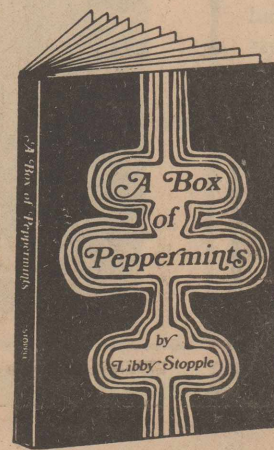

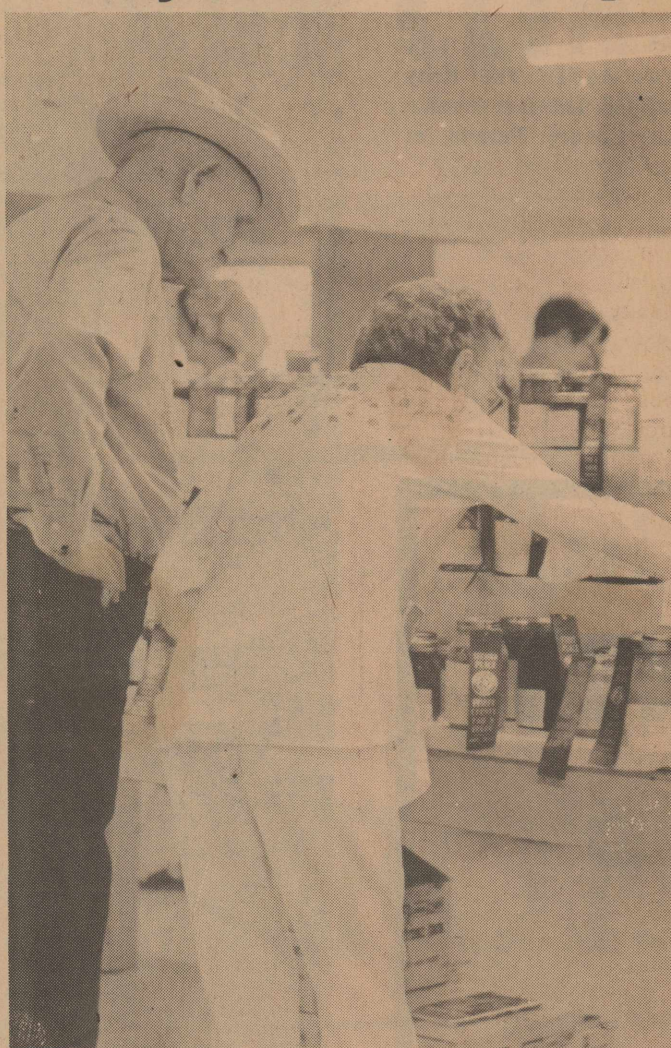

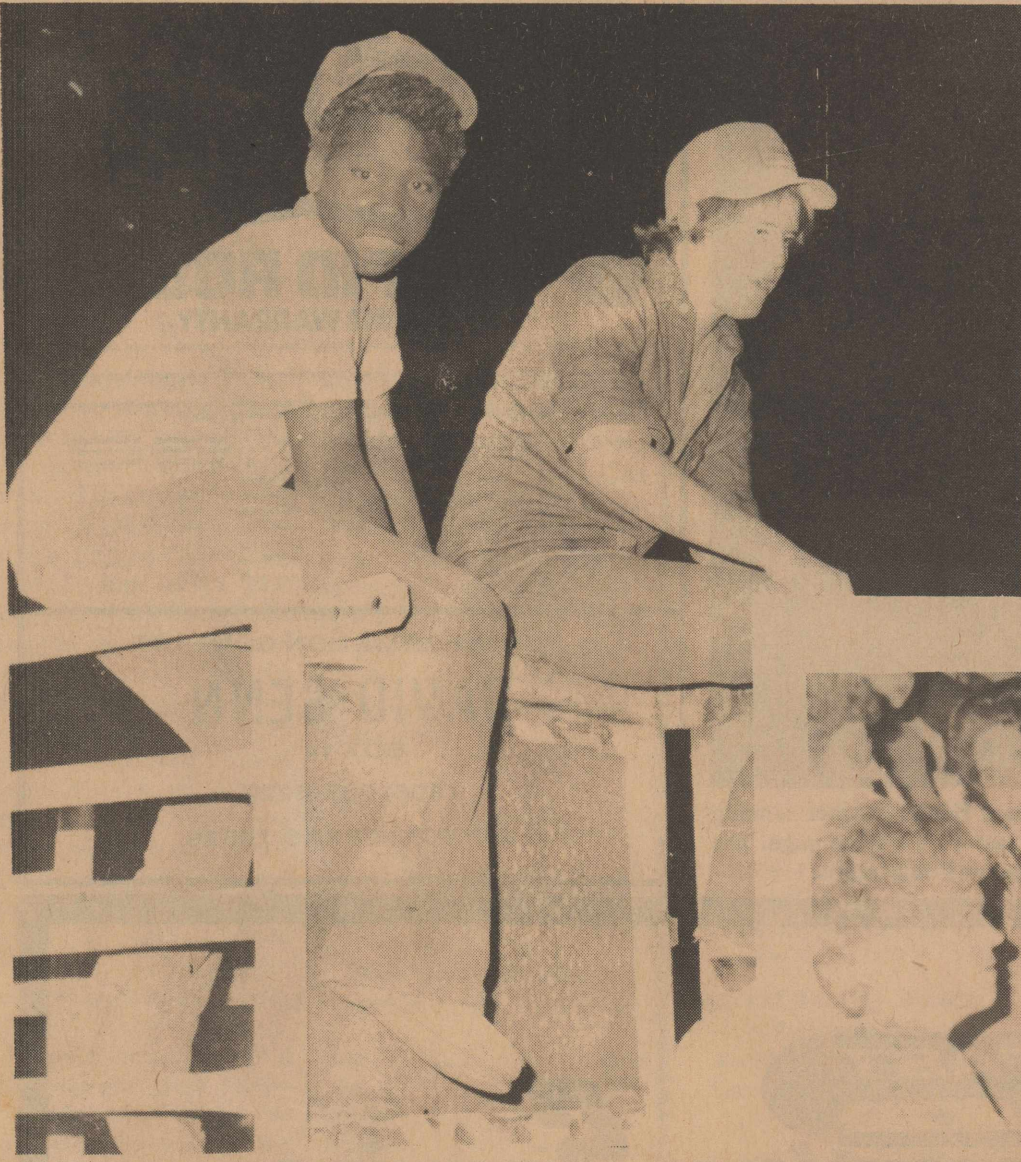
