



annoyingly disgusting to a true "Robyite" than to hear sound. Most will hasten to correct the speaker by pronouncing the word with the correct long o sound.

In 1880 there was no Roby to bear any name, only a ranch house on Cottonwood Creek just southwest of what is known as Roby today. That site was known as Cottonwood Spring and was headquarters for the KXOX Ranch. In the ealry 1880's this was a place to stop for cowboys and the daring "nesters" that were entering this section of West Texas, at that time hoping to find a place to establish a home.

Among those owning smaller plots or acreage pesides the KXOX ranch were two Mississippi brothers, D.C. and M.L. Roby. They owned about 2,000

Perhaps nothing is more acres near the center of what had become Fisher County.

When finally the County the name "Roby" pronoun- was organized, the Roby ced with the short o or ah brothers donated building sites to the Methodists, and Baptists and Cumberland Presbyterians, but it was about two years before the first church was built and then by the Methodists. Following soon after was the Baptists who erected a building in partnership with the Masonic Lodge. This was a two-story structure. The Masons used the top story

for worship services.





blizzard which all but wiped out the livestock interests. Ninety percent of the sheep were killed and between 70 and 75 percent of the cattle were frozen to death or had drifted south as far away as the mouth of Pecos River. It took many months for conditions to improve.

Early in 1886 the Roby Post Office was established by Capt. V.H. Anderson, who came to this area in 1885. He was given the choice lot on the southwest corner across from the courthouse square. He erected a wooden building about Office has been moved three 25x540 feet. The Post Office












a wooden building where the Cut and Curl Beauty Shop now stands, later was moved to a brick building which stands on the site the back of the first post office; still later it was moved to its present location.

The above information has come to the writer through the writings of Judge R.C.Crane who was the first County Attorney of Fisher County.

After the post office was built, the whole west side of the square was filled with the same style wooden buildings except for the two on the north west corner from the Courthouse. These were made of brick made in a kiln operated on the south side of Cottonwood Creek, a short distance from the center of Roby. The first bank of Roby and Fisher County built the corner structure and operat-

ed the First National Bank. The Elkins Brothers were builders and organizers of the bank. The other brick building was occupied by the Roby Mercantile Co., a firm composed of R.L. Lovett, Abe Hughs, Jess McWhiter and C.M. Pipkin.

Among others on the west side of the square was the "Central Office" where the privately owned telephone system was housed.

The north side of the square was filled with wooden store buildings and wooden sidewalks the length of the block. The main ones this writer remembers were L. Laposki Dry Goods and Grocery Store on the corner where now stands Sweetwater Production Credit Co., Geo. Nitzel's Restaurant, a meat market, a bakery, and where the post office now stands was livery stable. The east side of the square included three small wooden office buildings and a livery stable. The offices were those of L.B. Allen, L.H. McCrea, and M.A. Hopson.

Roby's south side was brick buildings. They were T.H. Mayfield Furniture, Hardware, and Funeral Supplies; Carter Bros. General Merchandise; J.B. Green Dry Goods; J.N. Weakley Drug Store; Office of the Roby Banner.

The first school building in Roby was built by the Roby Brothers. It was about 30x40 feet in size and of wood. Mr. J.H. Gee taught the first school. It is not known the number of students Mr. Gee had but a record of Mr.A.P. Kelly's school, 1887-1888, shows to have had 30 students.


This first building was

used for a social center for church, Sunday School, and parties until the courthouse was finished in Sept. 1886. Then the bulk of social functions, including dances were held in the second story of the courthouse. This first courthouse was finished at a cost of \$5,500.00.

Since that first one-room school house in Roby, five more have been constructed, one of which is the grade school. Each has shown the desire of the patrons to provide the best possible for the young people of the area. School is the central interest of this community and it is a matter of much price that older people can make a long list of successful people coming out of the Roby School system; business, the arts, all professions are filled by former Roby students.

The picture of the early day Roby (given earlier) extends from about 1889 to about 1915-15, when the second courthouse was built.





Today, vacant buildings attest to those past times when Roby was the trading center from a vast area from the north and west, yet Roby has never really stopped. Today we can boast of many more houses than those thirteen counted in 1886 (several of which still stand). As the years have passed, our churches have kept step with the forward outlook by building new buildings. We have a new modern high school building and the new Fisher County Courthouse graces the town square where once the \$5,000.00 white wooden building with the narrow spiral stairway stood.

Some of the latest improvements for Roby is the City Park with two well-designed tennis courts, a swimming pool and much play equipment in a well kept park.

A very special blessing that has been ours until recently when the health of Dr. R.T. Wilkinson forced his retirement, was the clinic operated by Dr. and Mrs. Wilkinson from 1955 to 1975. After closing and selling the hospital they opened the Wilkinson Clinic in 1975, a new model facility which they operated until Dr. Wilkinson's recent illness.

A new Fisher County Hospital and Fisher Co. Airport on Highway 70 near Rotan are facilities of which we are proud and appreciate.






