



### MEMORIAL DAY

Advertising Rates Will Be Gladly Given Upon Application

Amid its preoccupation with economic stress, the nation paused Wednesday to celebrate with solemnity and pride the deeds of bravery and patriotism performed by its sons on land and sea in the hour of emergency.

Each year more and more graves of our soldier dead claim the loving attention of relatives, friends and living comrades, who on May 30, place upon them flowers and flags as loving tributes to those who sleep.

This beautiful custom is said to have originated at Petersburg, Va., where, on June 9, 1865, the citizens decorated the graves of a number of Confederate soldiers who had fallen in the battle while defending the town on the same date a year before. In 1868, Mrs. Logan, wife of General John A. Logan, then commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., happened to visit Petersburg on its annual Memorial Day and was so impressed with the idea that she recommended to the general that it be made a national custom.

Accordingly, he issued a proclamation next year, calling upon all posts of the G. A. R. to observe May 30 as Decoration Day, or Memorial Day, by which it is also known, and this day is now a legal holiday in 40 states and in all U.S. possessions.

In recent years, especially since the World War, this date has been observed more generally in the South, under the auspices of the American Legion, although all Southern States also observe Confederate Memorial Day on different dates in the various states.

National Decoration Day, on May 30, is the occasion for especially impressive ceremonies at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery, Washington, D. C., where the President and high officials of our own and foreign governments usually participate in the exercises.

Each recurring Memorial Day ought to impress upon Americans anew not only an appreciation of what they owe the survivors of the fighting men of the sixties whose "thin line of blue" is rapidly growing thinner, but a determination to avoid, if possible, in the future every influence calculated to lead the country into new conflicts. To the veterans of three wars-the last the bloodiest of all-we pay our respects. They risked all for the flag they love, struggled with fate and came forth gloriously triumphant.

Memorial Day, and every other patriotic holiday, may well be dedicated to the thoughts of peace-present and future-as well as to thoughts of wars passed. We have seen the devastation and tragedy of conflict. It remains for us as a nation, devoted to the arts of husbandry and industry, so to meet the issue of the hour as to make unnecessary the repetition of such sacrifices as come to every American mind on Memorial Day. It is a day on which every American, while honoring our warriors alive and dead, should "highly resolve" that so far as his influence goes it shall be used for the prevention of future wars.

### PREPARING TO BARGAIN

Anticipating favorable action by Congress on the proposed bill empowering the President to negotiate reciprocal trade agreements, certain foreign countries are reported as subjecting American manufacturers shipping goods abroad to a number of new and oppressive trade restrictions. It is evident that they seek by these measures to place themselves in a more favorable position when the time comes for bargaining.

Recently more than ten nations have established new regulations which bear heavily upon American goods. France through quotas and marketing regulations, Switzerland by establishing quotas on American products and a number of Latin-American republics have set up restrictions which will injure exporters of many lines of

We have no doubt that such practices will be given due consideration if and when negotiations for reciprocal trade treaties are begun by the United States.

These countries will find that they cannot put anything over on President Roosevelt.

Tax penalties are needless expense and for the benefit of every taxpayer in Haskell county, I herewith publish a table showing in every detail the cost which will accrue in event taxes are not paid, in accordance with the law pre-

The penalty on State and County taxes delinquest for the year 1932 and prior years will increase a July 1st, 1934, from 6% to 10%.

After July 1st, also interest at 6% per annum from date of delinquency will be required by law. No INTEREST is charged on delinquent taxes that an paid before July 1st.

The law exempting penalty and interest DOES NOT APPLY to 1933 Taxes. The ten per cent penalty was added February 1, and is NOW drawing 6 per cent interest.




