the gym for practice of games. This money will be refunded if the gym is found clean with no destruction the next day.

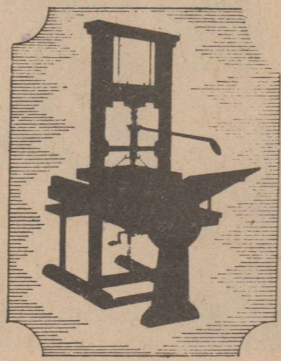
4. Any person found with a key or in the gym without authorization will be prosecuted.

Fisher County 4-H'ers placed second in the heavy weight Angus class. The steer weighed 1044 pounds an sold for \$9.00 a pound. The sale price was \$9,396.

The steer placed first at Fisher County, Reserve Champion at Sweetwater,

and Reserve Champion Angus at Abilene.

Other winners in the steer division were Jeff Upshaw, 5th in the middleweight Angus class; Clay Wilfong, 6th in the middleweight Angus class; Jill Wright 4th in the heavy weight Short-horn class; and Paula Terry, 8th in the lightweight Limousine class. Mr. G.H. "Hutch" Carter, 86, son of a pioneer Fisher County family, died at 2:00 P.M. Sunday, March 5, 1978, at the Golden Haven Home for the Aged in Roby. Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church, Roby. The Rev. Allen Cartrite, pastor, and Rev. V.D. Walters of the Elmwood Baptist Church in Abilene officiated. Burial was in the Roby Cemetery under the direction of Weathersbee Funeral Home.

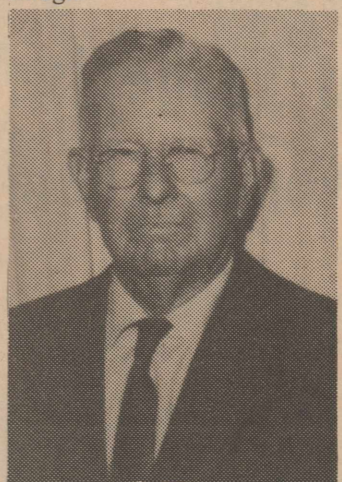
Born October 26, 1891 in Merkel, he was the son of the late James Samuel and Ida Carter. He lived most of his life in Fisher County, where his grandparents had been early settlers having moved here in 1881. He attended the University of Texas at Austin and taught school for several years. He married Jo Hodges, June 15, 1918 near North Roby. She died November 14, 1976.

Mr. Carter also was a mail carrier and the first to use an automobile on a rural route out of Rotan. He had worked for the ASCS office in Roby and served as manager of the ASCS office in Dickens for three years. He was employed in the Fisher County Tax Collectors' office from 1951 until his retirement about three years ago. He was a land owner and farmer since 1920. He was a member of First Baptist Church where he served as a Sunday School teacher for many years.

He is survived by four sons: George H. Carter Jr. of

Vermillion, South Dakota, Don Carter of Roby, Forrest Carter of Abilene, and Dale Carter of Corrente, Brazil; seven grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren.

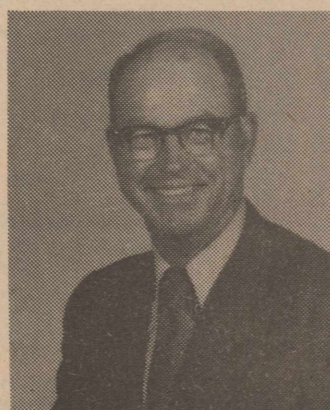

LIKE SHEEP

Recently an interesting observation was pointed out to me about our sense of direction. I was reminded that homing pigeons can be taken as far as 1,000 miles away from home, turned loose, and they will instinctively fly back home. Likewise, bees have the same homing device and when set free miles from their beehive they will find their way home quickly. We call this making a "beeline" for home. Many animals are not easily confused in their directions and seem to know just where to go in order to get home again. But, there is at least one animal without this sense of direction, the sheep.

Sheep can become lost easier than any other animal. Unlike other animals, sheep do not raise their heads while grazing to see where they are and how far they have traveled from the main flock. They feed while walking with their heads down at the ground. I once heard of sheep walking off a high cliff to their death because they fed and walked with their heads down at the ground. You can see now why it was important for sheep to have a shepherd to guide and guard them. While preaching to Israel concerning their disobedience toward God, Isaiah was inspired by God to make a parallel between the habits of sheep and Israel's tendency to wander from God's protective care. Isaiah announced, "all we like sheep have gone astray." (Is. 53:6) Like sheep Israel had wandered from their shepherd. How many of us have strayed from God? The ways in which we sin might be different from others but our straying is the same. Isaiah continues, "we have turned every one to his own way". (Is. 53:6) What will cause some to fall away from God will not tempt others. Yet, each of us has a flaw in his character that keeps us separates from God. Now, the question is, what are you going to do about it? Will you go on like sheep and perhaps walk blindly into your spiritually eternal death? Do you wish to call to the Good Shepherd and trust in His guidance to bring you into the fold again. Of course, the Good Shepherd is Jesus the Christ through whom we have forgiveness and salvation. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, is offering you a new sense of directions for life and He wishes to rescue you from the destruction of sin. Will you now follow the Good Shepherd? Amen.

Winners Named In Mid West Youth Contest

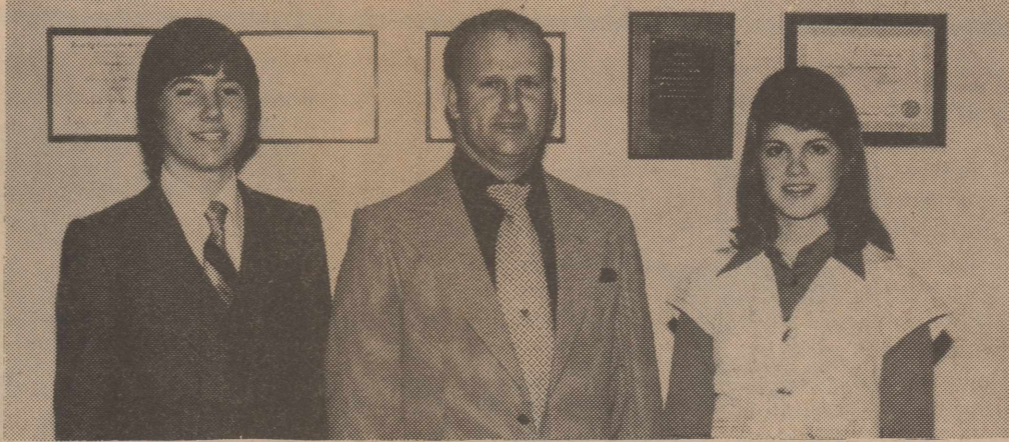

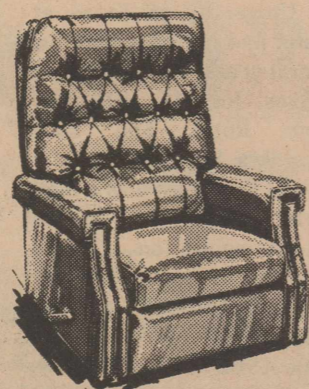

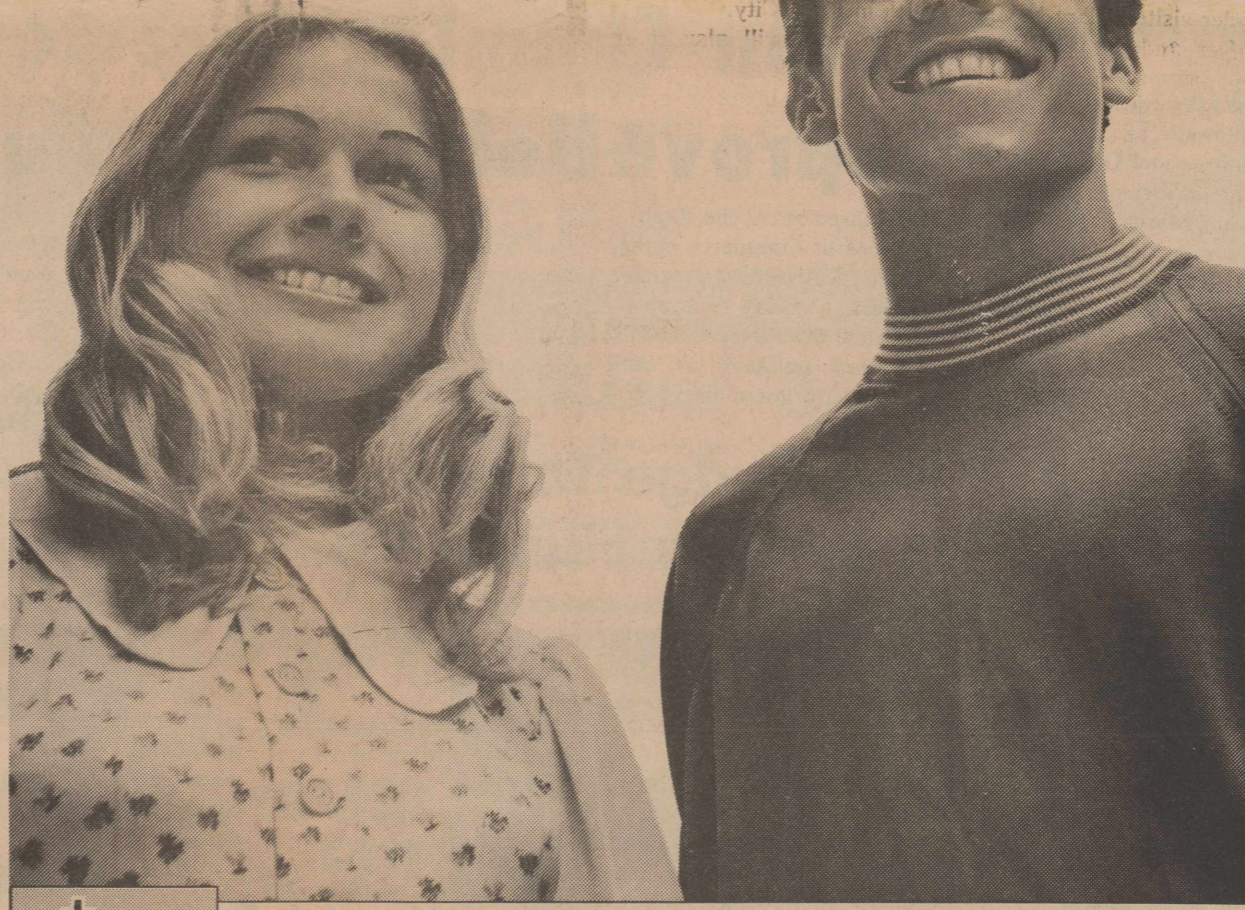
For Karl and Karen this month marks their second wedding anniversary. It brings bright memories that glow as the candles glowed that Saturday evening they were married.

Ned Moore of Sweetwater will be instructor for the course, Art 132. Classes are to meet from 6:30-9:30 on Thursday nights from March 16 through May 25 except for the week of the public schools' spring vacation.

Registration is planned at 6:30 p.m. on March 14 in the Rotan High School library. Students will pay fees of \$58 for the course. Moore, an art instructor at Sweetwater High School, received the bachelor of arts from McMurry College and the master of arts from the University of Colorado. He also attended Texas A&M University and the University of Houston. He has taught in Texas and Colorado for the past 12 years.

In describing the course, Moore said students should learn to use and recognize the five elements of art in their drawing assignments. Mediums used will be pencil, along with optional materials for additional color. The class should teach the eye to observe and the hand to coordinate with the mind, he added.

Moore will be teaching Art 132 at the Sweetwater extension center of WTC on Monday nights from March 6-May 29. Mrs. Lois Shaw will teach a painting class at

William and Gail Duke, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Duke and Ginger met other Fisher County farm families in McAllen last Saturday.

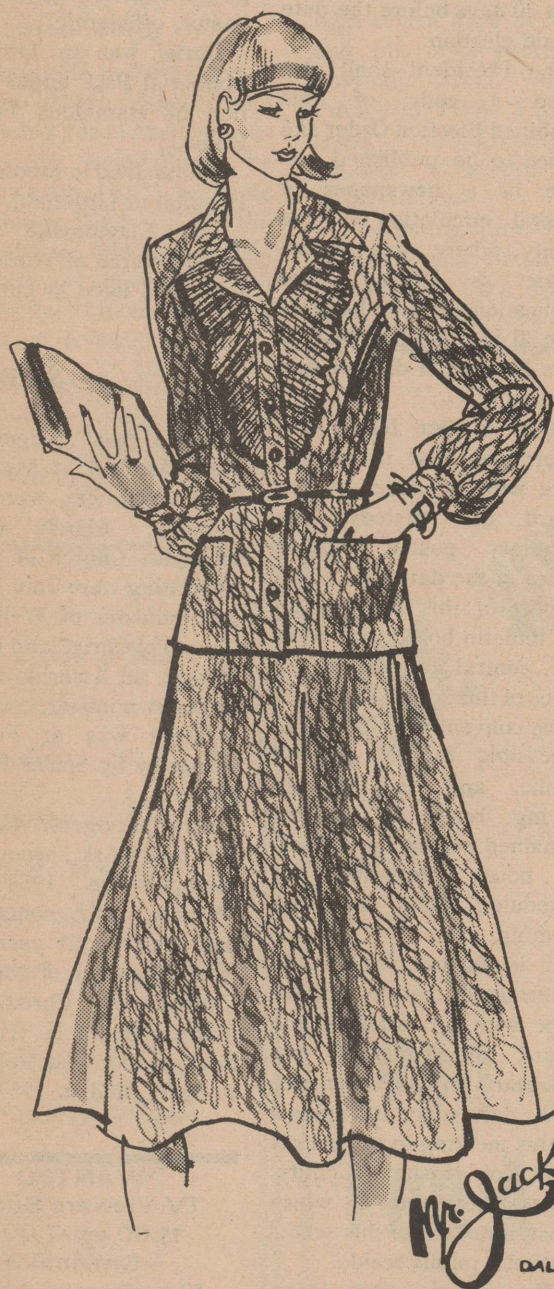

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said

election:

(a) In election precincts numbered 1,2,3, and 4 at Courthouse Building, in Roby, Texas, in said School District, with Rose Moore as Presiding Judge and Inez Neves, Lois Terry and Juanita Gaona, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling place shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Judge Dwight D. Lovett is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at office of County Judge within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Rose Moore, as Presiding Judge, Inez Neves, Lois Terry and Juanita Gaona, as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined

Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall not be more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Fisher County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.
