



C.D. Ferris Recalls Tale Of Two Mules

Carl Dallas Ferris celebrated his 87th birthday on Sunday, April 2, at his home in Rotan. The first good wishes extended to Ferris came from the U.S. President Jimmy Carter's Office in Washington, D.C., signed with the first names of Pres. and Mrs. Carter. The presidential greeting was followed by those of friends and relatives.

Ferris was born in Franklin, Texas on April 2, 1891, the youngest child of the Henry and Frances Ferris union. He acquired a good sense of humor from both his parents, along with a "heavy dose of the right and wrong" of things. The principal of both he has used all his life. Carl Ferris grew up in a home where many noted people visited. As he recalls now, his life got off to a most unusual start. His father, Henry Ferris, being the son of Warren Angus Ferris and Frances Moor Ferris, automatically made a difference. W.A. Ferris being the celebrated writer of a diary he kept while working as s surveyor and clerk for the American Fur Co. from 1830 until 1835. From the diary came many publications and the Ferris book titled "Life in the Kockey Mountains" and thus sprang forth the "Ferris Collections" that are kept in various places in the United States.

Carl Ferris recalls now the early recollections of childhood, passed on to him by his parents. When Henry Ferris and Frances Smith decided to get married it created quite a stir. The wedding drew a crowd, among the noted attending was Sam Bass and some of his sidekicks of outlaw fame. "Just dropped by to see ole Henry and Fanny get hitched and dance a spell afterwards". Henry Ferris being acclaimed as a fellow who could draw a pretty mean bow across a fiddle, whether the tune be classical or hornpipe, folks figures ole Henry wouldn't pass up a chance to draw the boweven at his own wedding. Carl Ferris recalls now that he had the honor among his classmates in school of being the only boy in class having a mother who was born on a riverboat -- at Memphis, Tenn. As a young man Carl Ferris acquired a fondness of reading and studying history. He liked Western folklore. From his studies he gleamed a vast knowledge that in later years has brought about many pleasant times. He has swapped information with relic hunters and historians alike. The Ferris homes have had many such people pass through the portals over the years. In the early years of his 28-April 3, 1978. manhood Ferris worked in the oil field. It was during his ch, Terry Chaney, Emma "oil patch days" he met and married his wife--the former nice Loving, Joe A. Neeley, Stella McAnally. Not long Joe Rushing, Bill Day, Mary afterwards they settled down Etta Hale, Era Show, W.R. to farming, Ferris doing building work during slack times on the farm. It was during the time that Ferris was farming that an incident happened that truly applied the old right or wrong of it, or the looking for the good in bad. Ferris and his wife Stella owned a pair of mules. Those mules were like no other mules around. They were mean and onerey. They were called Major and Pete.

Those mules continually tore down fences and roamed off. If they fancied corn, they would simply back up to the corncrib door, kick it in, and help themselves. They had a bad habit of going to town when they roamed off. The local sheriff would drive out to the Ferris farm each time the mules came to town to let Ferris know his mules were in the pound and had to be bailed out. It seemed that Ferris was continually bailing his mules out of the pound-or making restitution for the damages they had done. Then one day a family moved into the community, the man in the family had shifty eyes and light-fingers. It was not unusual for farm tools, saddles and other things belonging to the neighbors to end up at the man's house. The man always declaring he just didn't know how they got there. The Ferrises and their neighbors didn't dare leave anything laying around that they'd care "for following that fellow off". Then came the day a neighbor came by to see Ferris. He hated to be the bearer of ill news--but he had witnessed the shifty eyed, light fingered neighbor stealing old Major and Pete. The man who witnessed the theft of the mules wanted to know, "are you going to see the sheriff and get something done". Ferris thought a moment then began to laugh to the amazement of his neighbor. Then he said no--I think not, in fact I'm just going to let him keep the mules, it will teach him a lesson.

Carl and Stella Ferris are members of the Calvary Baptist Church. They have six sons and three daughters, 21 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.







Rotan Girls Shake Up Heavyweights At Meet


