Program Report

Taxpayers should send either a personal check or money order, but not cash, when remitting Federal income tax, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Using a check or money order is not only safer, the IRS explained, but the taxpayer has the added advantage of having a record to prove that he or she made the payment.

The IRS also stressed the importance of entering a correct social security number on the check or money order directly below the signature. If the payment should be separated from the tax return, it is very simple to readily locate the taxpayer's return through the use of the social security num-

Taxpayers should also bear in mind that whether a check is certified or non-certified, the tax is not paid until the check is honored by the bank on which it is drawn. All checks or money order should be made payable to Internal Revenue Service.
