

High County Voter Turnout Expected

Fisher County residents go to the polls this Saturday to elect two Fisher County Commissioners, a new clerk, treasurer, Justice of the Peace, and Judge in county contested races.

According to Fisher County Cler, Geneva Perkins, a total of 132 people have voted absentee with an additional 44 requesting

absentee ballots by mail. If the high number of absentee votes is any indication of the turnout expected Saturday, Fisher County could well exceed the total number of votes cast in the last election in May of 1976. In that election only 149 absentee ballots were cast with a total of 2,531 voting in all precincts.

Voting locations will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at eleven Fisher County voting precincts. On Tuesday, April 25, 1978, the Fisher County Crops Committee voted to set Monday, May 22, as the uniform planting date for cotton for the county. Some communities across the county had already adopted May 22 as a planting date, thus it was decided by the committee that Monday would be an excellent date for countywide planting to begin.

This idea of using this date was not just decided upon from the clear blue. It has been proven in Fisher County over the past five years that it would be

effective if entire communities would accept it and hold off planting until that date. The following is an outline of the research conducted in the county by agents Richard Spencer and David Finley.

From 1973-1977, boll weevil movement out of overwintering habitat was monitored at the Foy Mitchell farm on the Clear Fork River. It was proven during these years that boll weevils move in heaviest numbers from overwintering habitat the last week of May and

first week of June every year. This has been proven to happen since 1969 in other areas of the Rolling Plains. These weevils that emerge at this time will live from 8-14 days without cotton squares to feed upon. If squares are present at this time, they will feed and then begin to lay eggs as soon as cotton begins to put on the first one-third grown squares. The few weevils that are left in habitat after the last of May and first of June will colonize and move into cotton as it

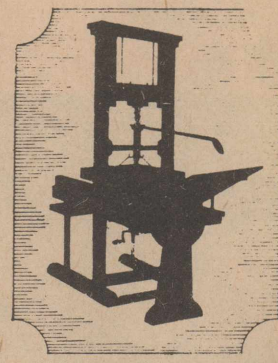
reaches the first one-third grown square stage. Weevils cannot lay eggs that will produce a living grub in squares smaller than one-third grown. The squares must be one-third grown to support a weevil grub during its life cycle.

With this idea in mind about when weevils move out of habitat every year, it was then discovered that the simple manipulation or delaying of planting dates until after May 20 could be a way of escape from early boll

weevil pressure. What happens with a May 20 or later planting dates that those high numbers of weevils that come out of habitat the last of May and first of June will die if there are no squares for them to feed upon. A May 20 or later planting date will put the squaring period to the first or second week of July. As you can see by the research presented earlier those heavy numbers of weevils that emerged in May or June will have died, thus there will be only small

numbers of weevils alive in infest your cotton in July. Here a single, precisely timed early season control application applied at the first one-third grown square stage will control the remainder of the weevils had if done right will be the only application needed for boll weevils the entire year. The idea on one early season application for the entire year has been proved the past two years in Fisher

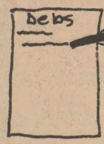

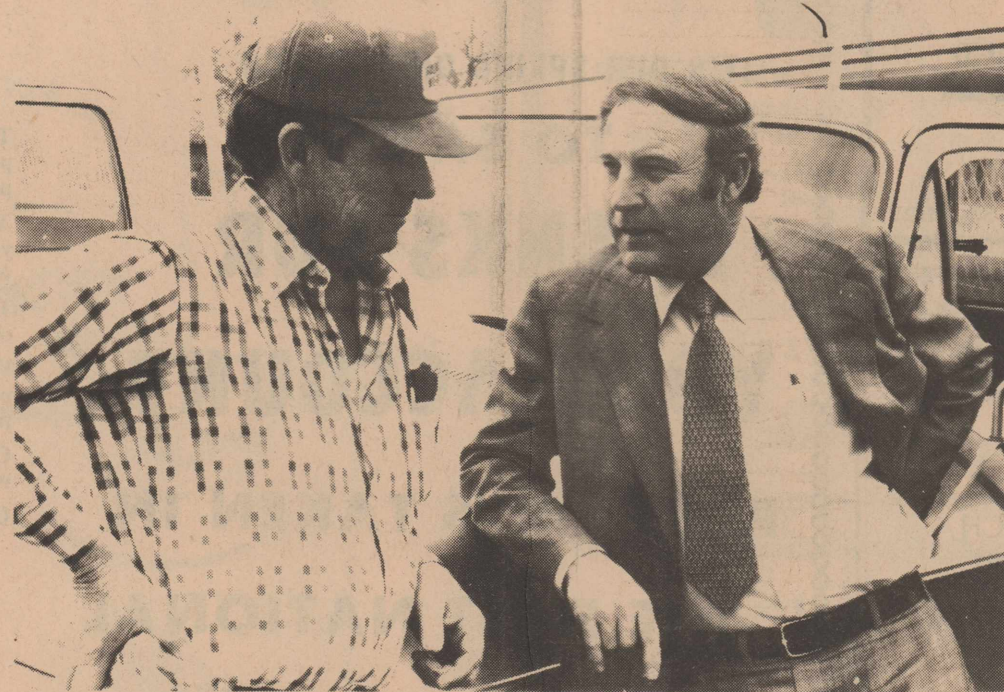

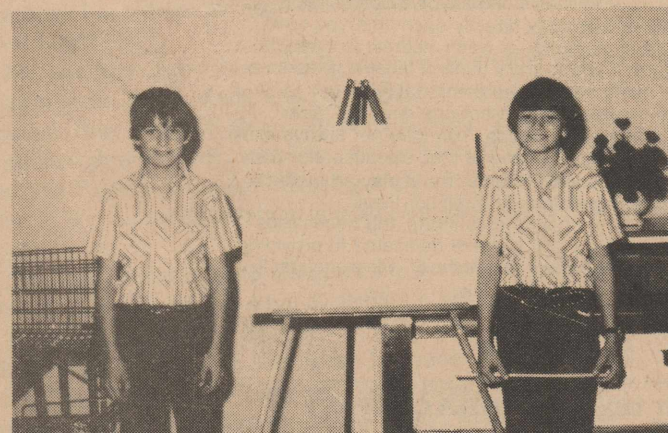

The 1600 meter splits were Rivas 53.7, King 54.1, Gonzales 52.0, and Stuart 51.4.

In addition to qualifying the boys broke two school

records at regional. Al Gonzales broke his own 220 record, his old record was 22.27, set at Jayton this year, the new record is 22.22 for 200 meters which is about a 22.3-220 yd. time. The 1600 meter relay time of 3:31.25 is a new 1600 meter record and is equal to a 3:32.35 mile relay which would have easily broken the old record which is 3:35.0.

Running but not placing was the 400 meter relay team of Britt Stuart, Ricky King, Timmy Morton and Brad Stuart; and Ricky King in the long jump, 20-3 1/2.

All six of the boys qualifying at Regional will go to the State Meet in two weeks. "This is an outstanding accomplishment by some very outstanding young men," said Bagwell.

The next Roby meet is a state qualifiers meet in Jayton on Friday, May 5.

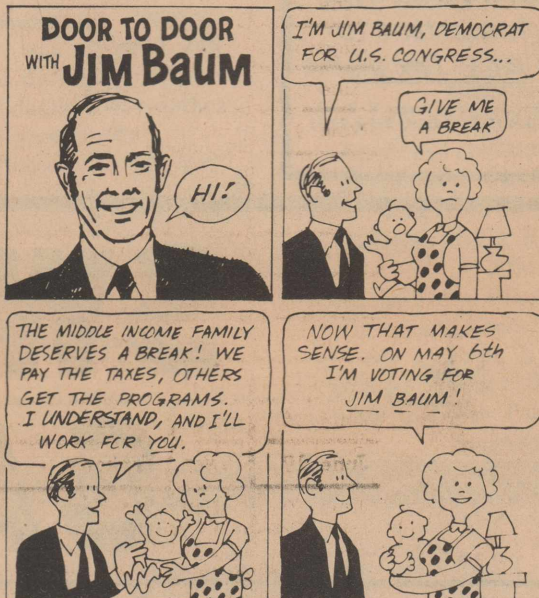

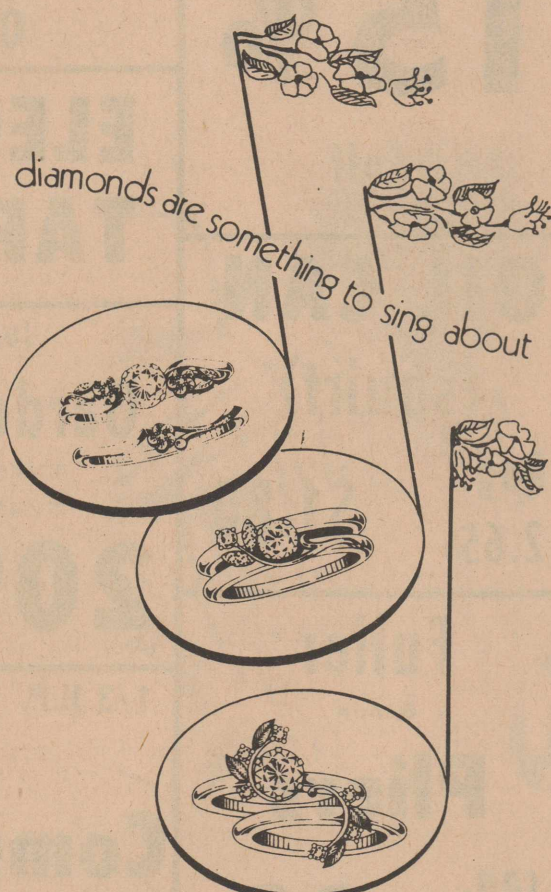

Charles Stenholm Wants 2 Year Contract

Charles Stenholm, Democratic candidate for the 17th Congressional District, is spending his last week of campaigning for the May 6 Primary telling the citizens of the 33 county area the three major issues which separate him from the other candidates.

"There most definitely is a difference in the candidates in this race", Stenholm told people as he visited with them. "It is always easier to agree with all groups, to be all things to all people; but we simply cannot continue to promise more and more of everything to everybody."

Stenholm was referring to three issues which "must be brought into focus; issues on which I want people to understand clearly how I stand," he said.

"I believe strongly in quality education, but more federal money is not the answer," he said.

Seven questions were asked all the candidates on the Texas State Teachers Association evaluation published in the April issue Texas Outlook magazine. Stenholm disagreed with the other candidates on two of the issues.

Number One--More federal aid to education. Stenholm's answer was, "No." Explaining his reasoning, he said, "We do not need an arbitrary level of minimum federal participation in our local schools. I think we need less federal involvement in all areas of our daily lives. If we are to have federal funds, they should flow as directly as possible to the local school district with a minimum of federal control."

Number Two--Separate Department of Education. Stenholm again answered, "No". He explained, "We cannot afford another federal bureaucracy. The need for funds at the local level for all purposes is too great to permit any additional loss of tax revenue at the Washington level. Due to the rural nature of the 17th District, we would have difficulty meeting the criteria of an urban dominated Department of Education."

Number Three--Inflation. Stenholm advocates balancing the budget and reducing bureaucracy as the best way to fight inflation. He proposes a "Sunset Law" similar to the one Texas now has. Under such a law, each federal agency, such as OSHA and EPA, would be required to periodically justify its existence. He suggested a review every five years. Commenting further on balancing the federal budget and reducing bureaucracy, Stenholm stated that he had not promised to open an office anywhere, as one candidate had. "In my opinion, this would violate the spirit of the law which forbids offering any entitlement to any individual in return for their support. I have promised to bring the office of the Congressman to all the District in the most economical way feasible. We do not need additional Congressional staff people working directly in cultivating and locating industries,"

he explained.

"I can visualize real problems with staff people getting involved when several towns in the District are in direct competition for a new industry. Congress can do most by creating an environment favorable to business, and leave the industrial prospecting to regional and individual chambers of commerce and industrial foundations. Once a project is underway, the Congressman can expedite the decisions to be made by governmental departments and regulatory agencies," explained Stenholm.

"We must establish clear priorities," he continued. Stenholm noted the growing concern about our posture in world affairs. "After all, our domestic internal problems become insignificant if we do not command respect among world powers and remain number one in military strength. The fiasco over the Panama Canal has brought this sharply into focus," Stenholm stated.

"We must be strong and stand up for American interests world-wide. I support a strong Air Force, Navy and Army, second to none. If the neutron bomb is in anyone's arsenal, I want it to be ours," he added.

"There are many good arguments for many good programs. The question is whether we can afford all these things. All programs must be studied carefully and many eliminated," continued Stenholm, "if we are to control inflation."

The 39 year-old Stamford resident was born and reared on a farm in Jones County in the 17th District, a farm on which he is the third generation Stenholm to work. In addition he has had experience as a teacher, businessman, church and civic leader as well as political experience which has led him to state and national involvement.

Stenholm tells everyone he meets that he is "asking that the people of the 17th District give me a two year contract to serve you in Washington. If at the end of two years, I have not fulfilled your expectations, I would expect you to work as hard for my defeat as I am asking you to help me today."

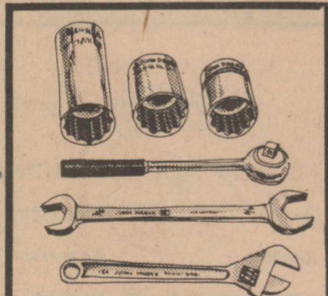

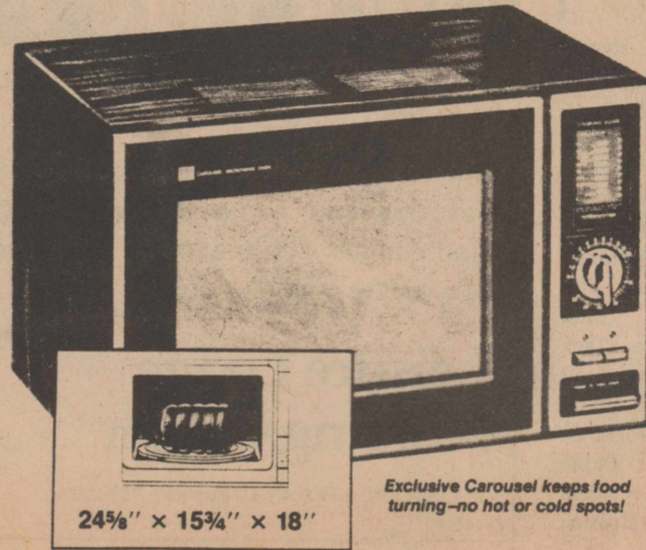

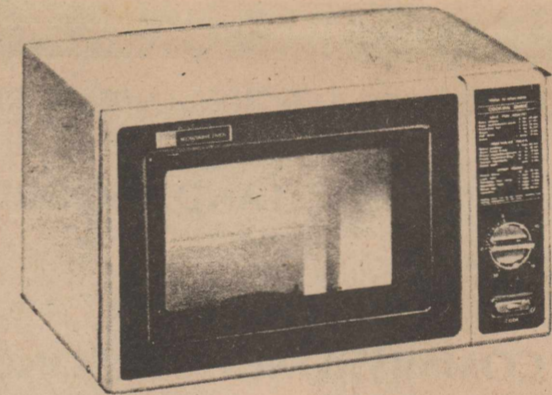

Chairman, Freddie Stuart called the meeting to order. The minutes were read by the secretary, Mrs. Ben Neeper. Mrs. James Cave read the standing rules.

Sub-committee reports were given on Family Living, Aging, Crops and Livestock. The Family Living report was given by Mrs. Dale Cave. The indepth program for the past year was clothing. A Fabric Fair was sponsored by this group and numerous mail outs were also sent out. For 1979 the group indepth program will be on Family Health.

The Aging report was given by Mrs. Annie Bruce. She reported that this group sponsored two senior citizens groups in the county and their membership received a monthly newsletter. The Aging Committee also sponsors the Outstanding Senior Citizen Award each year.

Freddie Stuart presented the 4-H Report. It was reported that 229 Fisher County Youth were 4-H members. There were two scholarship winners, one state record book winner, and one state winner in the Food Show from Fisher County. There were numerous winners in State Livestock Shows from the county. 4-H members showed 90 steers and heifers, 70 lambs, and 20 hogs the past show season. Ed Garnett, District Extension Agent from Vernon, gave the group a program on the Texas Community Improvement Program sponsored by the Utility Electric Companies and the Extension Service.

Twenty-eight members and agents attended the meeting.
