

## County Man Is Found Not Guilty By Jury

Paul Carrillo, Jr., who was indicted by a Fisher County Grand Jury in connection with an incident involving the stabbing of a Pinkerton Guard at the National Gypsum Plant in Rotan, was found not guilty after being tried in 32nd District Court.

The first trial, approximately 3 months ago, was declared a mis-trial after

the jury could not return a unanimous decision.

The second trial, which began on June 1 and ran through June 6, resulted in Carrillo being found not guilty in connection with the stabbing incident.

Carrillo was defended by Jim Pearson of Sweetwater, while Frank Ginzell, District Attorney, served as the prosecutor.



## Rev. Gardner Takes Roby First Church

The Rev. Loren Gardner accepted the pastorship of the First United Methodist Church of Roby on May 12. He and his family moved to Roby on June 6.

Rev. Gardner had been the pastor of the St. Luke and Dorn United Methodist Churches in Colorado City since August 23, 1975. He has also held pastorships in Eula and Hermleigh.

Rev. Gardner was born October 26, 1940 in Bens Run, West Virginia and was raised in Weirton, West Virginia. He came to Texas in Nov., 1961 with the U.S. Air Force and was stationed at Dyess Air Force Base until November, 1965. During this time he met and married the former Karen Dawn Clements, a native of Fisher

County, on March 1, 1963. Karen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Clements of Rotan. The Gardners have three children, two sons and a daughter, they are Chad, age 14; Dawn, age 13; and Trey, age 8.

Rev. Gardner is a 1959 graduate of Weir High School, Weirton, West Virginia, and graduated from McMurry College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Religion, major, and English (minor) in May, 1977. He graduated from the Perkins School of Theology Course of Study in August, 1975.

Rev. Gardner was licensed to preach in August, 1969. He was ordained a deacon in May, 1971, and is an associate member of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

## Rotan Board Hires Principal Agriculture Teacher And Coach

The members of the Rotan School Board hired a coach, elementary principal and ag teacher at their regular meeting last Monday night.

R.L. Coates, a native of Coahoma, was hired by the board to teach social studies and coach football and basketball. He will be paid \$2,200.00 above the state salary. He previously coached for four years in the Lockhart School System where he was an assistant coach in football, basketball and baseball. He is a 1974 graduate of Angelo State University. Coates and his wife Linda have two children, Matthew age 4, and Dale age 7. They are members of the Baptist Church in Lockhart.

John Collins, a native of Joshua, Texas, was hired last Monday night as agriculture teacher. He is

a 1978 graduate of Tarleton State at Stephenville and is engaged to be married in August.

The board, after interviewing two applicants last Monday night, hired George Schroyer as the new elementary principal. Schroyer began teaching in 1958, completed his master degree in 1959 and at

present is living in Hamlin. He has completed 30 hours of graduate work at Abilene Christian University and has received his superintendent's certificate. He has successfully completed all course work, residency requirements and has successfully passed preliminary and qualifying examinations for his

doctors degree. He is currently in the process of writing a dissertation in the area of school finance.

He served as an elementary principal in San Angelo for three years. In 1970 Schroyer was awarded the National Educator of the Year Award by the American Freedom Foundation.

## Commissioners Split Vote On Monday Issue

The Fisher County Commissioners split on a vote 3-1 last Monday on allowing Justice of the Peace Jeff Simmons to hire a replacement if he relieves the current justice of the peace clerk of her duties.

The incident came before the Commissioners

at their regular monthly meeting. Commissioner Thurman Terry made a motion, seconded by Commissioner E.J. (Junior) Kiker, to "allow the Justice of the Peace to hire a replacement immediately if he relieves the current clerk of her duties." Commissioners Kiker, Terry and Ford voted in favor of the motion, while Commissioner Jay Hendon voted against the motion.

The current Justice of the Peace clerk is Jill Laurie.

In other action the Commissioners voted to allow the Fisher County

Sheriff to purchase new flags for the District Court Room upon recommendation of the District Judge.

The court agreed to accept bids on a new radar unit for the highway department and gave approval to Sheriff Counts to accept bids on getting the roof of the jail repaired.

The Commissioners authorized Judge D.L. Lovett to allow Johnny Rivas to pay \$225.00 a month until the full repair bill of \$1,575.00 is paid on damages caused by Rivas' vehicle hitting a vehicle being used by County Agent Richard Spencer.

## Roby Council Water Issue Drains Back

The Roby City Council, after unsuccessfully attempting to get the Fisher County Water Authority to make a ruling in the recent complaint concerning water rates, voted to table the matter until it could seek legal counsel.

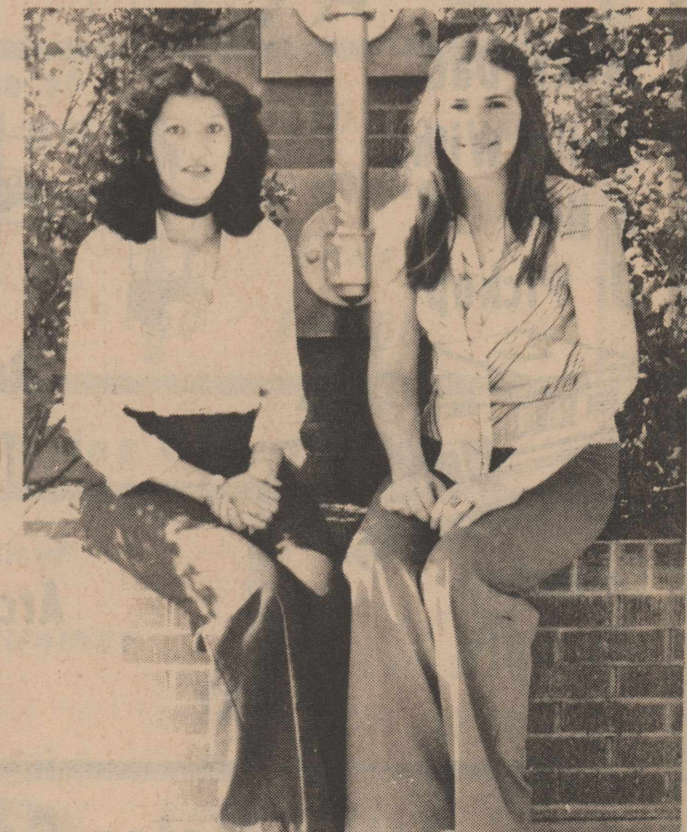
The incident came to light recently after a group of approximately 6 members appeared before the Roby Council and voiced objection to the raise in water rates. The objection came from a group of "original" water line patrons that supposedly had an agreement that their rates would always be the same as the rates charged

patrons within the Roby city limits.

Several months ago the Roby City Council increased the water rates and at the same time gave an additional increase to all water patrons outside the Roby city limits. Supposedly, there are approximately 15 "original" patrons outside the city limits that gave water easements to the Fisher County Water Authority that feel that their rates should not have been increased.

After the May Roby council meeting it was understood by council

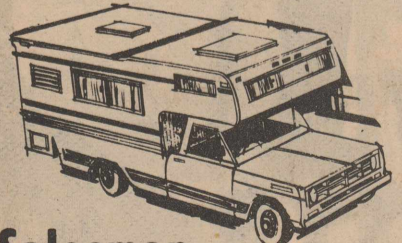

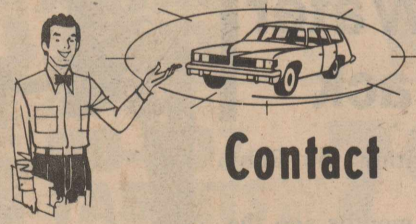

It appears that the Roby City Council is planning now to meet with Rudy Hamric, County Attorney, in an attempt to iron out the problem of water rate charges.

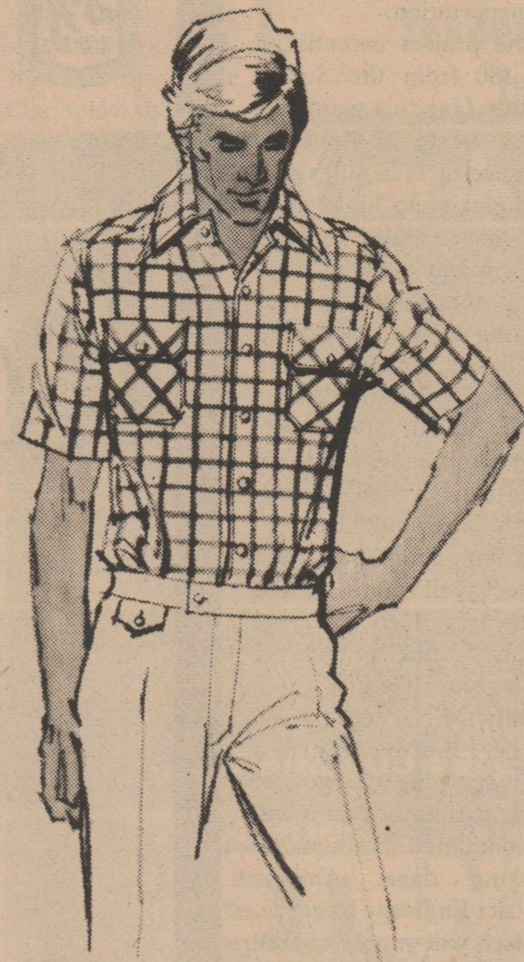

Bids for the reconstruction and improvement of US 180 in Fisher County are expected to be opened at the June 14-15 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public

Transportation. The project extends on US 180 from the Scurry County Line to a point five miles west of Roby, a distance of 11.5 miles.

The existing highway is a 22-foot asphaltic surface. The project includes widening the shoulders, extending culverts, additional base material, and overlaying with two courses of asphalt and aggregate to provide a 24-foot main lane travel surface and 8-foot shoulders.

When completed, the project will increase the highway's load carrying capacity and provide a wider, safer facility.

Billy E. Vernon of Snyder, the department's engineer in charge of work, estimates that it will be completed in about 250 working days. Abilene District Engineer Roger G. Welsh will supply overall project supervision.

## Rotan School Board Views Bid Proposals, Hears Plan Critique

The members of the Rotan School Board met last Monday and considered bids for lowering the ceiling and installing new drop lighting in the Primary and Junior High buildings, and heard a report from Don Williams, Region 14 Education Service Center, concerning

a visitation evaluation conducted during the final weeks of school.

The board, after reviewing preliminary bid proposals from approximately eight area firms to see if the ceiling and lighting project was financially feasible, agreed to officially advertise for bids on the

project. According to preliminary figures the savings per year in electrical consumption is expected to amount to \$2,750.00, while bids for installing the new lowered ceilings and lights are expected to run in the vicinity of \$20,000 to \$25,000.

Don Williams, visitation committee chairman, and four other area educators spent two days in the Rotan school system recently and at the request of Superintendent Tom Harkey were asked to evaluate the needs and assess the system with reference to an up-coming self evaluation program that will be implemented in the school next year.

Williams and his team made the following nota-

tions with reference to the overall school program. (1) An absence of established and validated educational goals for the school community, there appeared to be no essential direction or purpose for the total program of instruction. (2) There was an absence of course guides and curriculum plans, (3) Little flexibility in deployment of staff to meet specific student needs, (4) No specific plans existed to involve teachers in curriculum planning, (5) The policies and procedures regarding retention and promotion needed review. (6) The absence of a school wide (Kindergarten through 12th grade) comprehensive testing program. (7) Primary emphasis in instruction was geared to college entrance while local statistics showed that only 1 in 9 students received a college degree in four years after high school graduation. (8) Library services extremely limited and understaffed.

(9) The extra curricular activity and emphasis on literary and forensic areas of the Interscholastic League program.

## Farm Bureau Says Higher Prices Here

Consumers "are going to have to adjust" to higher food prices because of excessive cost increases on the inputs of production, Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka declared.

The Dalhart grain farmer and cattle producer responded to the Wednesday announcement of a sharp rise in the latest cost of living index with increased costs of food, particularly beef, being singled out as the main culprit. He expressed doubt that the producer is realizing the full benefit of the retail price increase, commenting that processors and distributors pad price increases "whenever there's an opportunity" producing what he termed "a wratchet effect" with a total price rise of "more than what we think might be justifiable."

He said Farm Bureau would protest any move to relax limitations on beef imports to slow the price rise. "We don't need to beat the cattlemen down any longer; they've had their share of problems for a period of years," he declared.

"We can no longer produce in America with inflation like it is at prices we've received in the past," he emphasized, noting that the costs of production items "are accelerated primarily because of excessive labor increases." If farmers and ranchers are to continue producing an adequate supply of food, they will have to receive better prices, he declared.

## Etheredge, Walker Show Top

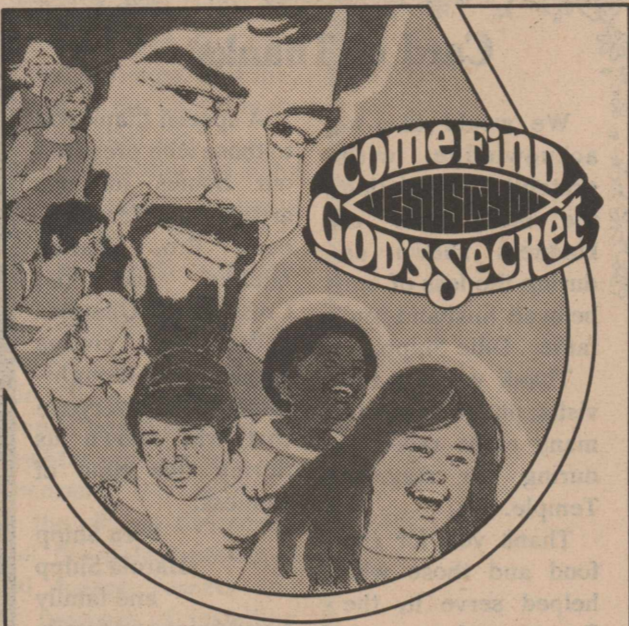

## Bullock Says 5% Of All Federal Outlay Comes To Texas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that federal expenditures in Texas during the past state budget year totaled \$20.2 billion--\$1.651 for every man, woman and child in the state.

This represents a 14 percent increase from the previous fiscal year when federal outlays in Texas totaled just under \$17.7

billion. That amounted to \$1,446 per person.

Overall, Bullock said, 5.1 percent of all federal outlays during federal fiscal year 1977 went into Texas. This compares to 4.9 percent during the previous budget year.

An analysis of federal expenditures is contained in the May issue of "Fiscal Notes," the monthly fi-

nanial report prepared by the State Comptroller's Office.

As in the past, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare accounted for the biggest chunk of federal spending in Texas in Fiscal 1977--some \$6.8 billion.

HEW expenditures for the past year were up 19 percent in Texas, primari-

ly because of increased Social Security benefits, a boost in medical assistance grants and higher Medicare costs.

Department of Defense outlays, meanwhile, increased 13 percent to \$6.35 billion in Fiscal 1977 and Department of Agriculture expenditures in Texas were up 19 percent. Texas ranked 35th

among all states and the District of Columbia in per capita federal outlays in Fiscal 1977--the same position it held the previous budget year.

Bullock also reported that state income in January totaled \$597 million, raising total revenues for the current fiscal year to \$2.96 billion. This is a 14 percent increase over

the first five months of Fiscal 1977. The state fiscal year runs from September 1 through August 31.

Expenditures through January, meanwhile, totaled \$3.34 billion, up 17 percent from last year.
