Hospital Board Will Look At New Clinic

Approximately one week before the last vote, in August of 1977, to build a new Fisher County Clinic on the site of the Fisher County Hospital, Dr. C.M. Callan stated that he was, "not opposed to building a new clinic, but as it stands now, I don't think I would ever use it."

Last Monday night, before any discussion on the clinic could surface, Dr. C.M. Callan asked for the floor to make another statement in regard to the construction of a new clinic. Callan said, "We want the board to know we're not interested in a clinic out here (at the hospital) in any form or fashion. We're not going to fight it. We're not going to move into it, as things stand now. I feel as a board member I should tell you that I'm not going to vote yes or no, I'm going to remain neutral, but I want it clearly understood when it's completed we're

not going to move into it."

In late August of 1977 the board voted to purchase the Wilkerson Clinic in Roby and also voted to construct a new Fisher County Clinic at the Hospital. Board member Kermit Terry made the motion, had it seconded by Rudy Martinez. The motion was approved by Terry, Martinez, and Wendell Morrow, while Dr. C.M. Callan abstained from voting.

Last Monday night Board member Glenn Copeland made a motion, seconded by Kermit Terry, to "look into the feasibility of building a clinic". Copeland, Terry and Rudy Martinez voted for the motion while Dr. C.M. Callan abstained from voting.

After the vote Board member Terry remarked, "To me, if we didn't intend to build a clinic we shouldn't have messed with taxes".

Ever since my wife and I married, and I never can remember the date for sure--it's either August 6th or 8th, she has taken great pleasure in reporting the strange events of the night at the breakfast table. She's made me feel guilty at times. "Did you hear that car race by the house at 3:00 a.m.?" or "What was the dog barking at around 4:43 this morning?" she'd say.

My wife has super sensitive ears, in the years that our four children were just babies--I know she could hear one of them kick off a bootie. If one of the children sneezed or coughed in the middle of the night old "eagle ear" would be at their side in a flash.


It goes far beyond the normal instincts that are built into a good mother. My wife can hear a car door slam three blocks away, she can tell just what child got up for a drink of water at exactly what time of the night.

It aggravates her that I don't hear any of these things. I not only don't hear what goes on, I don't even remember hearing her get in and out of bed to make her rounds.

The reason I say all this is to make a point of concern. I think the old gal's "radar" got cross wired. Last Friday morning, after I didn't show up for a Chamber of Commerce 6:00 a.m. breakfast, Jo Ann Cleveland, Chamber Secretary, called the house to remind me of the meeting. Janece answered the phone on the first ring then spent 5 minutes kicking, punching, screaming and hitting me with a pillow to wake me from my normal deep nightly coma.

Everyone will remember that the mild earthquake rumbled through Fisher County at approximately 6:50 last Friday morning. The tremors measured 4.75 to 5.0 on the Richter scale. I was at the Chamber meeting and can truthfully say I felt the tremor. I sat across from Charles Thornton, Postmaster, at the meeting and when the quake hit--he said, "Oh, that's just John Ross Hale's air conditioner kicking in". Like a dummy, I bought his story. It wasn't until later in the morning that I learned the seriousness of the event.

When I went home for lunch last Friday and asked my wife about the earthquake, she said, "what earthquake?" She didn't hear or feel a thing. Houses vibrated, furniture moved, dishes cracked, and old eagle ears slept right through all the commotion. I would have given her a 90 percent chance of landing a job with the National Earthquake Information Service in Golden, Colorado as a reporter, but not now. The old gal has lost her touch. She has me so concerned that I went out and purchased a smoke alarm, three new door locks and have started locking the cars at night. When ever you can hear the click of a lightswitch three doors down the hall then deep through an earthquake, something is wrong.

Re-Evaluation Tax Suit Could Surface

Oil Company tax evaluation personnel Bob Ford and Jerry Krupka, representing General Crude Oil Company and Continental Oil Company respectively, met with the Fisher County Hospital Board last Monday night and expressed serious doubts that their companies would accept the pending tax increase.

The pair attempted to convince the board that in their opinion, farm and ranch land that ranged in value from \$9.00 an acre to \$125.00 an acre did not represent a true market value figure. They also indicated that they were not pleased to see homes valued at \$6.50 to \$11.00 a square foot for taxing purposes.

They displayed a county map that reflected all the sales of land in Fisher County that supposedly went from one owner to a new owner that would use the land for the same purpose. The land, according to Ford, sold for a low of \$120.00 an acre for a 320 acre plot to a high of \$650.00 an acre for a tract just north of Roby.

"We can't stand by and accept complete re-evaluation every year on oil and gas property and take a 25 percent increase whenever a range of \$9.00 an acre to \$125.00 an acre is placed on Fisher County farming and ranching land and feel that it represents equalization", said Ford. He also said that he didn't feel

there was any simlancy of equalization between local property and oil and gas property.

Dave Posey, head of the team assigned to work up the figures and methods of computation on county land and property for the Fisher County Hospital District, said that most local land and property would increase from 2 to 2½ times. It was pointed out at the meeting that on the extremes, some land

1880 Cotton Acres Damaged By 2-4-D

Approximately 1,880 acres of new Fisher County cotton has been damaged to some extent, possibly from the application of a herbicide known as 2-4-D, according to Roby farmer Leon Helm, one of those suffering the largest loss in total acres.

According to David Davis, Inspector with the Commissioner of Agriculture office in Odessa, "This highly volatile hormone chemical if allowed to drift on susceptible crops is extremely dangerous". He said that the directions on applying 2-4-D take into effect the wind speed at the time and the temperature when the chemical is put down. It is used to control white weeds among other weeds, according to an area farmer.

David Davis and Bob Gafford of the Agriculture Commissioner's Odessa office were in Roby last Tuesday morning inspecting the damaged acres. According to Davis, a complaint was lodged asking that the Ag Department intervene and assist in determining possible liability in connection with the damaged cotton.

Jack Bowmer, agronomist with the Agriculture Commissioner's office in Austin said last Monday morning that Fisher County was one of the "unregulated counties in Texas with regard to the application of chemicals". He said that the only rules regarding the application of 2-4-D, since Fisher County is unregulated, is what was written on the 2-4-D can and abided by, with reference to the one applying the chemical.

If Fisher County were a regulated county, like 80 other Texas counties, then the department of agriculture would know who applied the 2-4-D and when it was applied and would be better able to assist those people who issued complaints, according to Davis.

There is a permit fee of

10 cents per acre to the user and applicators must post a \$20,000 bond and \$2,000 bond for each piece of equipment used to apply the chemical. This action to become a regulated county is reviewed yearly by the County Commissioners Court, usually during the months of October, November or December, according to Bowmer.

The liability is the same regardless if the county is regulated or unregulated. And, according to Davis, it is a joint responsibility between the applicator and the user that employs the applicator to use the chemical.

Leon Helm said that he had approximately 1,000 acres that received damage to some extent by chemicals. The 1,000 acres covered individual fields and while some is not drastically hurt, damage can be seen to some degree.

Helm said that there were four other farmers, to his knowledge, that received damage. He said he estimated that J.N. McGinnis has approximately 400 acres damaged to some degree; Charles Webb, 210 acres; Glenn Upshaw, 160 acres; and Bobby Smith, 200 acres.

Helm said that he was of the opinion that the damage took place around the latter part of May.

Glenn Upshaw said last Monday afternoon that he intended to begin a push in Fisher County to get a cut-off date established for the application of dangerous chemicals. "This is the third year in a row that I have received some damage from 2-4-D", said Upshaw.

Upshaw planted the cotton that received the damage on May 16, while Bobby Smith, who seemed to have some of the most extensive damage, planted his on May 18.

The new furniture store will be located in the old Kash Food Building on the north side of Snyder Avenue. The McClains have completely remodeled the interior of the building. New paneling has been put up as well as new carpeting installed.

The Western Auto Furniture Store will be carrying a full line of furniture including such brand names as Bassett, Singer and S-K. They will carry the Englander line of mattresses and box springs.

"In the area of appliances", said Larry McClain, "we will have washers and dryers, freezers, refrigera-

tors, console televisions, dishwashers, console stereos and micro wave ovens on display in the furniture store".

Marvis McClain indicated that a full line of baby furniture will be carried to include cribs, walkers and strollers.

The McClains assumed ownership of the local Western Auto Store in May of 1977. They just completed their first anniversary as the new owners.

WHAT CAN YOU SEE?

In 1952 Florence Chadwick attempted to be the first woman to swim the difficult, cold, twenty-one-mile stretch of water between Catalina Island and the California coast. After 15 hours and fifty-five minutes of swimming, she asked to be taken from the water. She quit one mile short of her goal. Florence said, "I quit swimming because I could not see the shore." She was defeated by something she could not see. Her vision was blocked by a fog which settled upon the water. Later, Florence said, "I knew the fog had no power in itself to stop me, but I allowed by blinded eyes to blind my heart also and I decided to quit." Two months later, Sept. 20, 1952, Florence made a second attempt to swim the twenty-one miles. This time she was prepared to visualize the shore in her mind even if the fog blocked the vision of her physical eye. The fog did hide the shore, but in her mind's eye she could see the shore, and she swam until her feet touched the California coast.

Florence Chadwick's experience in swimming is much like the experience of the Christian who is trying to live an obedient life in the Will of God. Somethings as we attempt to overcome sin or attempt to be a witness for Christ we fail. Like the fog, we allow doubt and fear to blind us from seeing the goal ahead. Doubt and fear block our vision of God's Will for our lives and we fail to see the potential that God has for our lives. Hospital Shows A Healthy Operational Profit During 1978

The Fisher County Hospital Board members heard a report by Administrator Perry Hunsaker last Monday night that indicated that the hospital had a net profit from the operation of the hospital for the month of May of \$19,-

884.98 before the provision for depreciation.

After an \$8,275.00 depreciation deduction the next profit still remained at \$11,609.98.

The reason for the profit, according to Hun-

saker, was the 59.13 percent of occupancy during May.

The hospital is showing a \$12,465.66 profit, before depreciation, from operations through the first five months of operation in 1978. After the deduction

of depreciation (\$28,909.34) and the payment of general obligation bonds (\$24,027.08) the hospital is showing a net loss of \$51,236.41 through the first five months.

In another area Hunsaker reported an approximate savings of \$4,000 in the area of linen cleaning. Hunsaker computed that the average cost per patient day for linen in 1977 was \$4.60 and said that for the first 4 months of 1978 the cost had been reduced to \$2.60 per patient day.

A discussion centered around the quality of the linen being used with reference to sterile linen, lint and stained linen.

The final action was a report by Hunsaker concerning the financial operation of the Fisher County Clinic.

Fisher County Experiences Earthquake Sensations

West Texas made the national news in an unusual way last Friday as area residents experienced what was for many their very first earthquake. The Earthquake Reporting Service in Colorado placed the epicenter of the quake "20 miles north of Snyder" and reported that the tremor measured 4.75 to 5.0 on the Richter scale. A measurement of 5.0 normally will cause considerable damage.

Some Fisher County old-timers can remember the last earthquake which occurred in August of 1931, but for most last Friday's tremor was a first.

Rotan Police Chief Tom Jones reported that he had approximately a dozen calls just after the tremor. "Most wanted to know what happened", said Jones. "There wasn't any damage reported to this department, with the exception of a lady saying that the quake rocked a cup off her shelf", said Jones.

Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts reported numerous calls. Some felt there was an explosion, others just wanted to know what caused the unusual sensation. Counts said that he didn't have any reports of damage. He heard that someone in the Hobbs area apparently had some cracked walls, but this had not been confirmed.

Quarterly Fed. Tax Report Deadline Near

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1978 by Monday, July 31. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until August 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return", the Internal Revenue Service said.

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office.

be insured for at least \$24,000 to collect full payment for a one room fire or theft of some items or other partial loss.

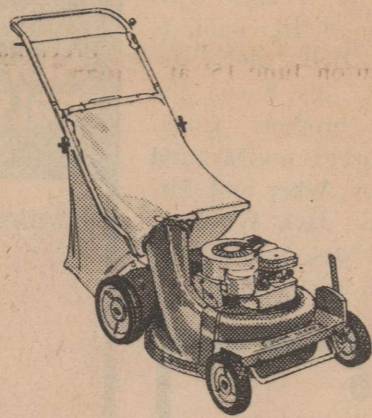

Bob Ford. "I don't see where you have a lot to complain about."

Ford told Posey. "If my oil field had not be re-evaluated in 20 years and you raised me from 20 percent to 25 percent, I wouldn't even be here."

Krupka said, "We're paying more than our fair share and I'll just have to relay this information to my company's management and see what they want to do."

Toward the end of the presentation Ford told the board members, "speaking for my company, there is no way we can take a 25 percent increase, its just not representative of re-evaluation". With that statement, Krupka and Ford looked at each other as Krupka said, "Well, we tried".

If in the opinion of the two major oil companies, they are in fact paying "more than their fair share", it appears they have but two options. They can accept the increase or they can bring suit against the hospital district and prove that the values set are not representative of re-evaluation.

From the tone of the conversation with board members last Monday night, the possibility of a suit is not out of the question.

Screwworm cases are popping up rapidly in unexpected--and in some instances, unexplained--locations in Texas during May and June.

As of May 31, Texas had recorded 18 screwworm cases. The state's first 1978 case was confirmed April 21 from Hudspeth County. The worm sample was collected on a ranch

about 48 miles east of El Paso.

The second case was confirmed May 8 from a worm sample submitted by a ranch located 20 miles southwest of Marfa in Presidio County, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Screwworm Eradication Laboratory at Mission.

Then on May 15, the

year's first screwworm case in central Texas was confirmed from a worm sample collected on a ranch in Coleman County, two miles southwest of Voss. Two days later, a second Coleman County case was confirmed from a sample collected near Coleman on another ranch some 30 miles from the first case.

Two more cases were confirmed the following day (May 18) in widely separated counties. The northernmost case was in Stonewall County, in Extension District 3. The worm sample was collected on a ranch 17 miles west of Aspermont, along the forks of the Brazos River.

The southern most case originated in upper Hidalgo County on the Lykes Bros. Ranch at Linn, but was collected from an animal sent to a Live Oak County auction barn.

"With the widely-spread pattern of cases that are erupting this year, producers in every county must remain on the alert for outbreaks."

The recent dramatic increase in screwworm cases in the states of Chihuahua and Sonora, Mexico--which lie directly south of El Paso and the Big Bend area of Texas, as well as New Mexico and Arizona--provides a logical explanation for the screwworm upsurge in those areas.

After experiencing one of the mildest and wettest winters on record, southern Arizona's screwworm cases have increased rapidly this spring, with 307 cases recorded thus far in 1978. More than 200 of the cases were confirmed in May, with caseloads averaging around 20 per day in late May.

The screwworm buildup in New Mexico got off to a slower start, with 38 cases being confirmed by the Mission Lab as of May 17.

Most of these are in the three southernmost counties of the state, Luna, Grant and Hidalgo.

"Thus, the Texas cases in Hudspeth and Presidio Counties likely are spin offs from the heavy concentrations that are being reported in those immediate areas. The other Texas cases, however, are more widely spread and have no know history of native fertile screwworm flies in those areas.

Screwworm eradication program staff personnel have maintained fly traps to capture samples of all flies in the area from Brownsville to Lardeo all of this year, but have found no native fertile flies. States of northern Mexico have been extremely dry--creating an unfavorable environment for flies--during the past year, with rainfall generally less than eight inches recorded in the 12-month period, officials of the Joint U.S.-Mexico Screwworm Commission report.

At present, large numbers of Mexican cattle are being moved to the El Paso area and other entry points along the Rio Grande awaitig permits to enter Texas, officials add. Permits are now being

processed rapidly, and large numbers of animals from drought-stricken areas of Mexico are being inspected and moving to Texas rangelands or feed-lots.

Besides cattle movement, other factors which may influence the migration of fertile screwworm flies into Texas are the extremely strong wind currents of April and May; and "hitch-hiking" flies, which enter trucks and cars and travel many miles before escaping to new areas to infest.

Following last year's successful "Stamp Out Screwworms" campaign, 1978 was designated as "Screwworm Watch" Year throughout the southwestern United States.

But the effort can succeed only if everyone gives a year of dedicated effort.

Livestock producers of Texas, through May 17, have submitted some 475 worm samples that have proved to be non-screwworms.

This is a good job of reporting suspected cases, but the effort needs to be beefed up in the forthcoming months. Producers should inspect their animals on a regular basis, collect worm samples from any infested wounds found and mail the samples to the USDA Screwworm Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas. The zip code is 78572. Tubes for mailing the samples are available from county agents and the Rotan Vet Hospital. Additionally, producers

should treat all animal wounds found with approved insecticides. County agents have more details about products and treatment methods.

Screwworm--larvae of the screwworm fly and a deadly parasite of all warm-blooded animals--continue to plague the southeast in spite of efforts to push the fly south of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, in southern Mexico, near the new fly plant at Tuxtla Gutierrez.

Your help is needed to

keep screwworm populations from building to high levels in Texas and surrounding areas this year. Sterile screwworm flies can't do the job without your help. Early reporting of all worm cases will enable Mission Screwworm Program Officials to treat case areas with sterile fly drops. These sterile flies then mate with any fertile flies in the area and the eggs resulting from such matings do no hatch, thus ending the life cycle.
