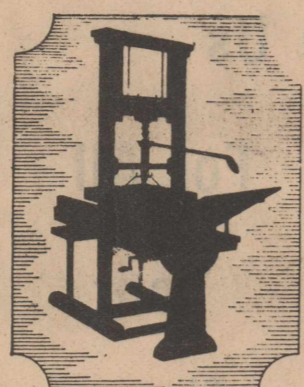

Locusts Are The Cause Of Holes In Lawns

The holes that are appearing in lawns in Fisher County are caused by the emergence of cicada or locust. There are several different cicadas, but most of them in this area have a life cycle of two years, according to David Finley, County entomologist.

The full grown nymphs emerge from the soil at night and crawl upward on nearby objects such as trees and emerge as adults leaving the nymphal exoskeleton.

The males produce the loud shrill calls but the females have no sound-making apparatus.

The female cicada deposits her eggs in twigs splintering them. The cicada seldom if ever causes excessive damage to shade trees, but if control is desired an application of carbaryl (Sevin) will give control for about a week.

Recipients of the Distinguished Student honor must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio, out of a possible 4.0, during the most recent grading period.

Words of Life

For the next five or six weeks I would like to share with you some great truths on the Nature of Biblical Repentance and the Problems of False Repentance. During my seminary days a professor taught me these pearls of wisdom and I wish to pass them on to you. I believe these messages will help us all understand better how a person can turn from disobedience and walk in the Will of God.

Many of our old churches have a cemetery near it; but in the sense in which I mean it now, every church has a cemetery right up against its walls—the cemetery of convictions and divine impressions and holy purposes and desires which were awakened within the walls of the sanctuary, but which were never acted upon. Chief among these buried impulses to action is the feeling of repentance—the holy desire to return to a close walk with the Lord Jesus. The heart was touched, the mind was convinced; but the person never arose to go to God to find a renewed fellowship with the Lord.

Repentance is a step in the path of Christian Conversion. The idea of making a turn in the direction of life is the essence of repentance. An Old Testament word for repentance, shuv, literally means "to turn" or "to return". The most important word for repentance in the New Testament is, Metanoia, which suggests the same idea. It literally means "A change of mind", thus a turning in the psychological and spiritual direction of life. Therefore, repentance is the turning from sin and turning to Christ. This is a necessary step for salvation. For unless we turn from sin we cannot be followers of Christ.

It must be recognized clearly, however, that the human desire for repentance does not assure a genuine return to God. This desire is resisted often by our inner selves. At times, the resisting forces frustrate the desire to repent and the would-be penitent makes substitutes for repentances. This will be the direction your devotion will take for the next several weeks. I pray that you will find truth to help yourself and others keep a close and obedient walk with Christ our Lord. Amen.

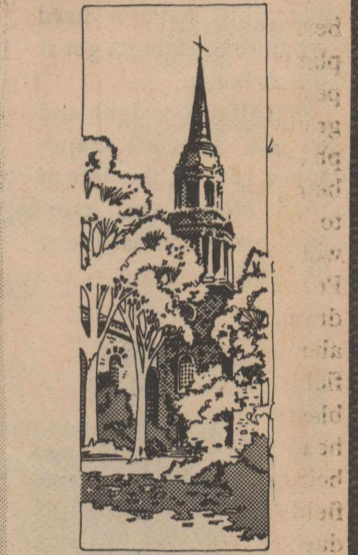

County Entomologist Column

Older cotton is squaring rofefully, while the younger cotton is in places ghting to stay alive and others putting on leaves t a fast rate. Grain orghum is heading in everal fields, while in thers has not reached 6 nches in height. Insect ctivity has increased on ll fronts for the most part nd a thousand different situations are being found in fields directly across the turn-row from each other.

Thrips are being found on all cotton at the present time. Their numbers are still ranging from 0-8/ plant in most fields but the majority of cotton has grown out of danger from these pests. If your cotton is past the 5th true leaf stage you can forget about them causing you damage this year.

Cotton fleahopper numbers range from 0-8/100 plants in fields across the pest management program area. Several nymphs or immature fleas are being found and leads me to believe that numbers will be increasing soon. Percent square sets have dropped to an average of about 84 percent in several fields. Although many blasted or blackened pin-head sized squares are being found in some fields, I feel that this is not due entirely to fleahoppers. Hot dry winds can and are affecting some of the terminals in these fields and are causing some shedding of these squares. Check your fields closely and compare not only blackened or damaged squares, but also fleahopper numbers in determining if you want to spray for these pests or not. You had better look at that field's particular moisture situation too and see if it can support a lot of plants that may fruit up very fast after an application for fleahoppers is applied.

Boll weevil numbers are being detected in several fields, mainly those next to good overwintering habitat. Some fields show 2 overwintered boll weevils being found per 100 plants. Damaged square counts on older fields range from 0-10 percent. It is time to make a decision on several fields across both counties during this and next week concerning control of this pest. From what we are seeing it appears that if you are over 2 miles from the shinnery of Clear Fork river, you'll probably be safe from over wintered weevil attack. Even some fields next to the shinnery are safe, it appears, as no weevils or their presence are being detected at the present time. As you can see conditions from field to field vary greatly even in those that are in close proximity of each other. If you are checking your cotton daily and it is approaching the first one-third grown square stage and you cannot find boll weevils present or some punctured squares then definitely do not apply control measures at this

time. If you do find boll weevils present in your fields, then you must determine their population level by getting a percent punctured or damaged green square count from that particular field. Match head and larger squares will suffice for this count and should give you some general idea of damage. Timing of this application is critical and you must remember that the time interval from match head squares to one-third grown squares is not very long, 2-5 days depending on the variety. There has not been very much early season control applied this year due to the lateness of the crop and the light weevil numbers present in many of the fields. Also, there are some bollworms and eggs being found and a lot of dry soil to boot, thus several producers have declined to use early season boll weevil control this year.

Bollworm egg counts have increased drastically as it appears a moderate egglay occurred this week. In some fields sprayed during the last weeks of June egg counts were 100/100 plants examined. Several other field shave from 10-32 eggs/100 plants. The hot and dry winds are helping control much of the bollworm problem by actually cooking those eggs and small larvae exposed to it. Larval counts range from 0-5/100 plants and damaged squares range from 0-2 percent. Eggs are being laid directly on the square bracts, on the lush growth in the terminal area, on both sides of the tender leaves emerging from the terminal and on the undersides of some of the larger leaves down lower on the plant. Moths are getting smarter by the day. Egglaying should climb even higher beginning on July 15, so close examination of the entire plant will be required to detect their presence.

Beet armyworms are being found in cotton in heavier numbers this week than last. Larval counts range from 0-22 per 100 plants across the pest management program area. Some worms are being found feeding on squares, but no damage counts were taken.

Grain sorghum has not been mentioned much this year because there has not been much insect activity occurring in it. Greenbugs have just not developed at all this year. The only aphids being found on maize at the present time are corn leaf aphids and they are light in numbers and causing no damage.

Beneficial insects in both cotton and grain sorghum are ranging none to heavy as you travel from field to field. Hooded beetles are the most common with convergent

lady beetles and Scymnus lady beetles being the most prevalent. Hopefully they will stay around as bollworm pressure gets more severe.

Three Fisher County 4-H's participated in the District 3 and 7 4-H Dress Revue in Abilene July 6.

The event, held at the Civic Center was sponsored by West Texas Utilities Company. Charla Wiley was entered in the beginner Junior Division. She received a blue ribbon. In the Intermediate Division was Joyce Lynn Harkey, she won first in this division, receiving a gift certificate from Day Dreams By The Yard and a Cotton Award of \$10.00.

Patricia Posey was entered in the Senior Division. She won a Cotton Award of \$20.00. She is also alternate to the State 4-H Dress Revue in Austin September 15 and 16.

Appearing on the program for parents and leaders was Donna Hataway. She presented slides and told of her trip to National 4-H Congress last November.

Fisher County 4-H's who helped to decorate for the Revue were Linda Hoodenpyle, Leslie Carey and Lisa Hoodenpyle.

Other Fisher County 4-H's, parents and leaders attending were Mr. and Mrs. Richard Posey, Jill and Jan; Mr. and Mrs. Tom Harkey and Gary Don; Mrs. Florene Wiley; Mrs. T.M. Randolph, Mr. and Mrs. W.P. Schubert and County Extension Agent, Mrs. Alice Ballenger.

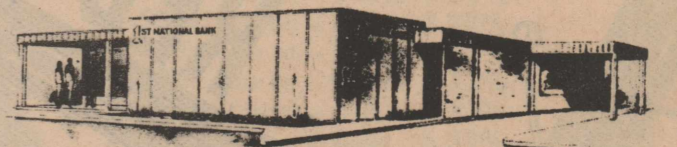

A meeting of the Planning Advisory Committee of the Brazos Basin Water Quality Management Planning Study will be held Thursday, August 3, at 1:30 p.m. in the Ranger Room of the Waco Convention Center, Waco. Walter J. Wells, General Manager of the Brazos River Authority announced today.

This meeting will allow committee members and members of the public to review and comment on Volume II, Plan Summary Report. This report summarizes the proposed Water Quality Management Plan for the Brazos Basin and adjacent coastal areas as prepared pursuant to Section 208 of Public Law 92-500.

Carson Hoge, Assistant General Manager of the Authority and Director of the study, said this plan will update and expand previous studies on water quality management within the Brazos Basin study area. The report includes an evaluation of sewerage system needs for certain communities within the study area and presents economically feasible and practical plans for meeting these needs. It also includes a summary of legal, institutional, and financial arrangements necessary to implement the plan, a schedule of implementation and recommendations for further studies.

Costs of the study are being funded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency through the Texas Department of Water Resources. All interested persons are invited to attend the meeting.
