

# DR. R. T. WILKINSON DAY PLANNED IN ROBY

The City of Roby has proclaimed Aug. 5, 1978, Dr. R.T. Wilkinson Day.

Dr. Wilkinson, prominent long time physician, graduated from the university of Texas Medical School 1933. He did internship at Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio in 1934. He

practiced for a short time in Wyoming.

Dr. Robert T. Wilkinson married Eula B. Kriss in Lawton, Okla. 1935.

They moved to Rotan and began practice there in Sept. 1936 and remained there until Jan. 26, 1941 when he was called into

the army air corp., as Reserve officer, Ft. Sam Houston.

Dr. Wilkinson served as Transport surgeon in the Mediterranean Theatre during service in North Africa, and Italy.

He crossed the Atlantic aboard Convoy ships tak-

ing our men over and returning the wounded.

Dr. Wilkinson was the only doctor aboard a hospital ship off the Normandy beachhead on D. Day with only Corps men to assist him.

On returning to the states he served as Executive

Officer at Rehabilitation Hospital at Brooks General Hospital, San Antonio.

He was discharged from the army Nov. 11, 1945. He returned to Rotan Nov. 11, 1945 where he practiced until Aug. 1, 1955.

Aug. 1, 1955 he and his wife bought the Fisher Co.

Memorial Hospital. They changed the name to Wilkinson Clinic Hospital.

Dr. and Mrs. Wilkinson continued to operate Wilkinson Clinic until March 1977 when he retired due to ill health.

For 22 years Dr. Wilkinson was the only doctor in

Roby.

He served as county health officer for a number of years. Also as City Health officer for many years.


Prior to his retirement, Dr. Wilkinson was an active member of Colorado Basin Medical association, Fisher Co. Memorial V.F.W. Post #5072, The Lions Club, and the Methodist Church.

### Tisa Lovett Wins At 4-H Horse Show

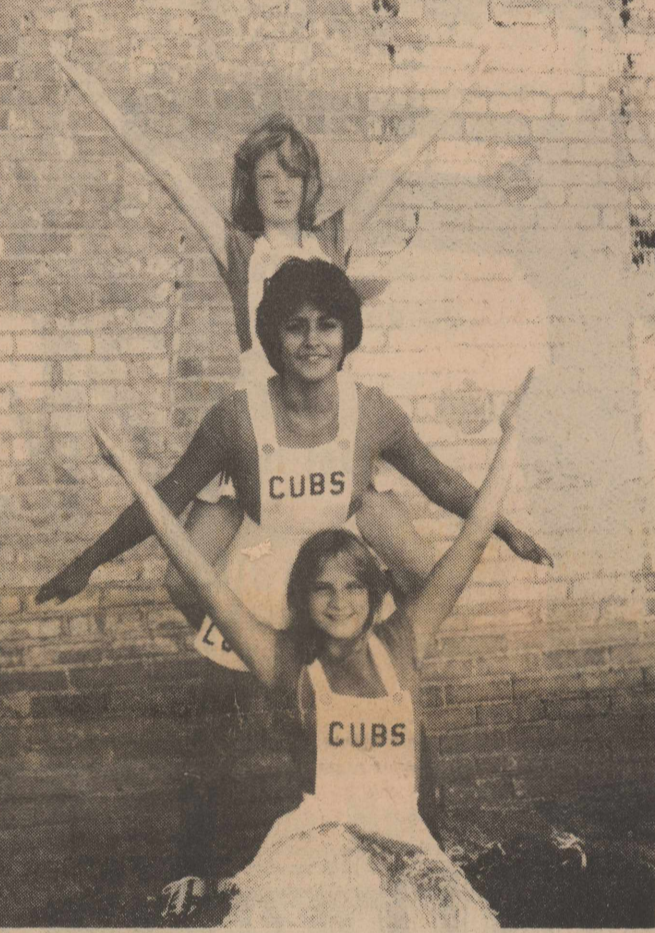

## Premium Sale For County Animals Set

The Fisher County Junior livestock Show Association offered a plan to begin a Premium Sale for market animals at the County Show which is held annually the first week in January, according to Richard Spencer, County Agent.

Due to the large increase in show animals and rising cost of show animals and feed, the committee feels a sale is warranted. The number of animals shown locally has more than doubled in the last 5 years.

Most market steers cost from \$300-\$500 initially and another \$300 worth of feed is put in the steer, so an individual must receive between \$600 and \$800 for an animal just to break even. Average breaker costs for lambs is \$150 and \$200-\$300 on market hogs.

From the above information, one can see that 4-H and FFA members are at the buyers mercy. Presently there are 125 steers and 50 lambs on feed in the county. Market hogs will be put on feed in September and October.

The committee agreed that Fisher County Businesses and individuals would be contacted and cordially asked to attend the sale. The group will also have to collect prize money. A meal would be served prior to the sale especially for the buyers.

The FFA and 4-H is for the purpose of making better citizens out of our youth. Would you support a Premium Sale? Please let some of the Committee know your feelings on this matter.

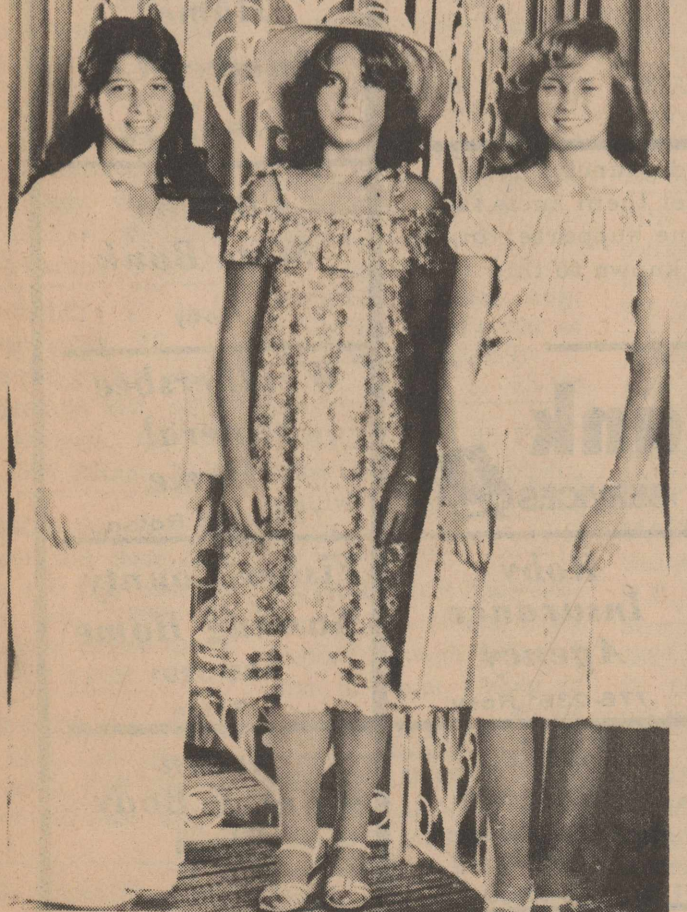
## For Fisher County Fair Women, Youth Entries Needed

## L. Cleveland Back From Seminar

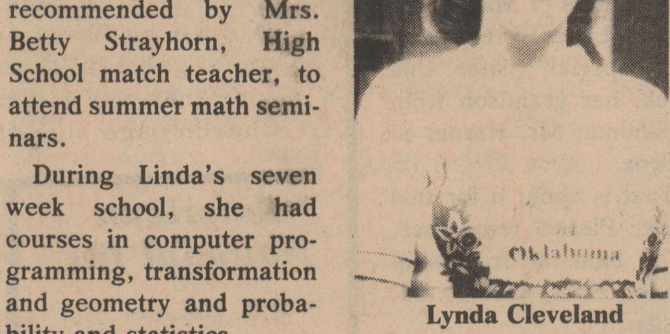

## Empress Day, Pioneer Teacher Services Held

Mrs. Empress Day, a pioneer area teacher, died at 12:25 a.m. Sunday in Fisher County Hospital following a brief illness.

Services were at 4 p.m. Monday at the First United Methodist Church in Rotan.

The Rev. John Robertson, pastor of the church, officiated. Burial was in the Rotan Cemetery.

She was known as "Miss Empress" to her friends.

Born on a ranch near San Angelo, she came to Rotan in 1908 when the town was less than a year old. She was the daughter of the late Mr and Mrs William David Beauchamp.

She taught at Luzon, Sim's Ranch, Cross Roads, and Rotan before her marriage to James B. Day in Rotan in 1914. Mr Day was a Rotan founder. While raising three children, she taught kindergarten for a number of years. Mr Day died in January, 1946.

After his death, she was principal of Rotan Elementary School, then studied for her bachelor's degree at McMurry College and her master's degree at North Texas State. She was a dormitory house

mother at both schools. She also did graduate work at West Texas State.

She taught social studies and reading in Rotan Junior High until her retirement in 1964. She did substitute teaching until 1977.

She was a life member of the International Delta Kappa Gamma Society, honorary women teachers organization, and she was charter member and past president of the Gamma Tau chapter, local chapter of that organization. She was an organizer of the Anne Pettus Shelburne chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, of which she was past chapter chaplain and current chapter historian. She was a member of Tejas Chapter of the National Society, Colonial Daughters of the 17th Century, establishing her Beauchamp ancestry to the 1600's in Maryland.

She was a member of the board of the Rotan City Library and chairman of the memorials committee at the time of her death.

Mrs. Day was a life member of both the state and national Parent Teach-

## Rotan Coach Names Key Players

Prospective Rotan football players will get their first look at the full coaching staff on August 9 when coaches Don Mullins and Ted Posey, and the two new coaches R.L. Coates and Doyle Walker begin issuing equipment to approximately 55 players.

"We are expecting some 10 to 12 senior players, 14 juniors, 14 sophomores and 15 freshmen to take part in this year's high school program," said Mullins.

The Rotan coaches will issue socks, shoes and shirts beginning with the senior players on August 9th from 1 to 3 in the

afternoon. Juniors will be fitted from 3 to 5; sophomores from 5 to 7; and freshmen from 7 to 9.

Mullins said that "No equipment will be issued to anyone if their hair length does not meet the present styles--this means that half the ear must be showing".

"Our passing game should be the bright spot of our offensive attack, and we will rely on it heavily throughout the season", said Mullins.

There will be several spots on the offensive and defensive teams that are wide open to the players that demonstrate that they have the sincere desire to play football, according to Mullins. Openings exist at

the center, guard and tackle spots on offense and at all guard and tackle spots on defense, as well as both defensive linebacker spots.

Personnel wise, we have 5 senior players that we will be counting on heavily. David Posey at the quarterback spot; Jacento Reyes who has 2

years experience as a receiver; Mark Henderson with 2 years experience and last year's leading receiver; Robert Posey at the defensive guard spot and Todd Goodwin, an offensive starter.

Four junior players were mentioned by Mullins as keys to the success of the 1978 season. Eli Sepeda at

tackle, Neal Flores and Mark Nowlin in the offensive backfield and safety Gary Don Harey on defense.

"Size is not one of the plus marks for the 1978 season", said Mullins. He indicated that the team overall will be small compared to other teams they will face.

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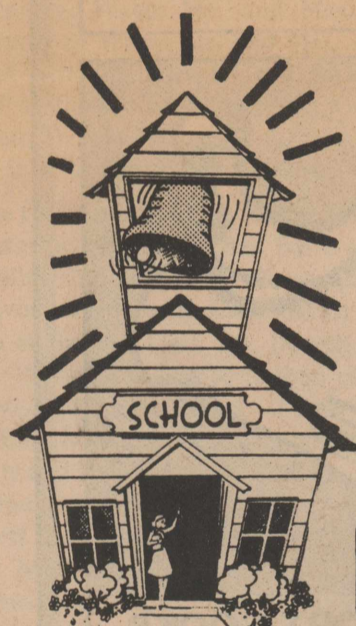

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## Brent Bolding Firm Stenholm Supporter

Brent Bolding, a native of Stamford, may be only 21-years of age, but he is already actively engaged in politics. He is currently working as a volunteer in the Charles Stenholm for Congress campaign.

As Youth Coordinator, Bolding arranges meetings with the candidate. He meets with youth groups in colleges, high schools and towns to tell them about the candidate. Stenholm, who was born and reared in Stamford, is the Democrat candidate for the 17th Congressional District. He recently won the Democratic bid in a landslide victory in the June 3rd runoff. He is seeking the Congressional seat being vacated by retiring, veteran Cong. Omar Burleson.

Although Bolding's primary function is making contacts with young people in the District, he also works at the Stenholm campaign headquarters answering the phone, writing letters, running errands, checking on arrangements for Stenholm's personal appearances and visits, working with county and area campaign coordinators, and travelling throughout the district with Stenholm.

"I have always thought he (Stenholm) would win the election. Looking at everything now, I still think Charlie is the best man for the job", young Bolding emphatically states.

Stenholm was recently endorsed by Cong. Burleson. "I think that was great," commented Bolding.

"I really admire Charlie. He knows what he is talking about. He's honest and even-tempered. He listens to my opinions and considers them. He is really dedicated to the cause," Bolding further added.

Bolding has known Stenholm for about 10 years. His mother worked at Stamford Electric Cooperative when Stenholm was the general manager. Bolding worked on Stenholm's farm one summer.

"I have always liked politics," related Bolding. "I heard Charlie was thinking about running (last October) so I stopped by to see him and told him I would like to help. Ever since I have known him, I have figured he would eventually run for some political office. He's just the type of person that you expect and want to represent you in Congress," said Bolding.

He notes that working on the campaign has been a "unique experience for me because I had never done anything like this before." And he is quick to praise Mrs. Stenholm. "Cindy is really nice. "The most amazing thing about the entire campaign is the enthusiasm of the volunteers who have and are contributing their time to help Charlie win," commented Bolding. "Everyone is so good and always help when asked. There are over 300 volunteers actively working throughout the district, and no telling how many more that we aren't even aware of. "The amount of people helping us is great. The people I have met during our travels have been real unique experiences. I have met some great people who will probably be a part of my life from now on," he said.

And Longley is just as quick to praise Bolding. "He is a great asset to our team. We are very fortunate to have Brent working with us," stated Longley.

But Longley is not the only one to be quick with praise. "I am lucky, indeed, to have a young man of Brent's talents, enthusiasm, and dedication working on my behalf," commented Stenholm.

And the amazing aspect of Bolding's volunteer work is that he is taking time out from his college studies to work for a cause in which he believes. He will miss two semesters and two summer sessions.

A 1974 graduate of Stamford High School, he was attending the University of Texas at Austin until he dropped out temporarily to help on the Stenholm campaign. He was a member of the UT Young Democrats. Lacking a year and a half of college, he is working toward a degree in advertising. He is interested in going into television advertising and production.

He is the son of Dempsey and Margaret Bolding. His father is a switchman for Southwestern Bell. His mother is secretary for the Tri-County Educational Coop. His father farms as a hobby. He has two sisters, Tamara and Kara, both younger than he.

Bolding is a young man of action and strong beliefs. The friendly, outgoing, never meet a stranger

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type; he has received his first taste of political campaigning. And this probably won't be his last

experience. He is an excellent example of today's youth who will lead tomorrow.

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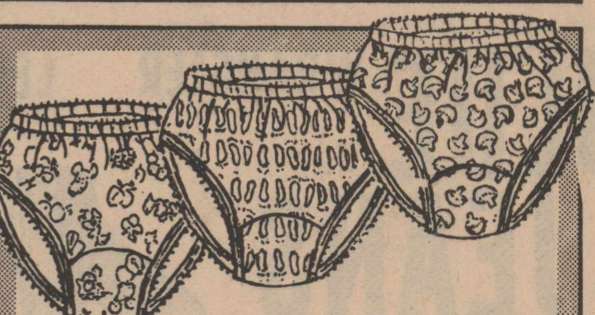
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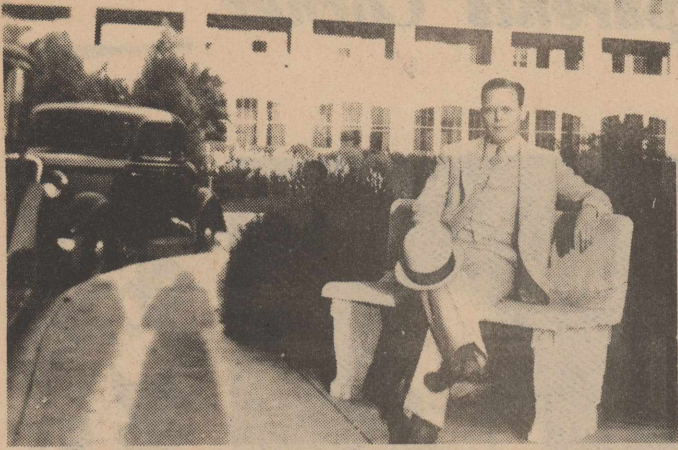
