

COUNTY HOSPITAL TAX WILL SOAR

The establishment of a separate taxing agency for the Fisher County Hospital District could cost the taxpayers of Fisher County approximately \$35,000.00, according to Dave Posey,

hired to head the re-evaluation computation by the hospital district and county.

"The best we can figure is that the total cost of opening a hospital district

tax office will be roughly \$40,000.00 a year, the taxes are currently being collected by Fisher County and they are charging us \$5,000", said Posey.

Posey is in hopes that

some method of collecting taxes can still be worked out so the taxpayers of the county will not have to be out an additional \$35,000.

Posey, together with his assistants Raford Har-

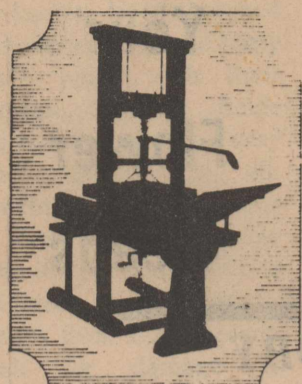
grove and Roger Blackwelder, originally established the true market value on the best farm land in the county for taxing purposes at \$132.00 an acre. They recently

revised their original computation and increased that figure by 20 percent so that the best farm land will now go on the tax rolls at \$158.00 an acre. Instead of using the basis of 25

percent of actual value as originally intended, the suggestion now is that Posey will lower that figure to 22 percent. This, according to Posey, is "being done primarily to try to reach an out of court settlement with the oil companies". By using the lower figure, local landowners and homeowners will be receiving an approximate increase in taxes of 275 percent while

the increase to General Crude Oil Company will only amount to 10 percent.

Posey has arranged a meeting with representatives of General Crude and Continental Oil Company for Thursday morning, August 17, at 9:00 a.m. At this meeting the parties involved will attempt to reach an understanding on the methods to be used in computing taxes.

Roby Board Approves \$503,398 New Budget

The members of the Roby School Board gave approval to a tentative budget for the 1978-79 school year of \$503,083.00 at their meeting last Monday night, according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie. Laurie told the board that he projected an income of \$505,398 for the 1978-79 year.

The new budget is only \$15,000 higher than the amended budget for the 1977-78 school year. Roby operated within a budget of \$487,326.00 last year, showing income of \$485,256.00.

In other areas of finance, the board approved an equipment budget for the band of \$2,200; for the ag department a budget of \$1,500 for equipment, and a \$500 equipment budget for the home economics department.

Rotan School Board Approves Tax Rate

The members of the Rotan School Board left the tax rate at \$1.60 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation at their regular meeting last Monday night, and set the public hearing for the adoption of the 1978-79 budget for 8:00 p.m. on Monday night, August 28.

Approximately 17 percent of the total taxes that the school district anticipates collecting, or \$56,500, will be diverted into the interest and sinking fund. The remaining 83 percent will be used in the general fund. The general fund collections should amount to approximately \$293,000.00.

The district will make a \$54,400 bond payment in 1979 from the interest and sinking fund which officials anticipate will leave \$1,500.00 from current collections in the account based on the collection of 90 percent of the current tax roll.

During last Monday night's meeting, the board accepted the lone bid of 11.25 cents on homogenized and 12.75 on chocolate milk as submitted by Gandy's Dairies for lunchroom milk during the 1978-79 year.

The board also adopted plan "b" of the reduced price list for lunchroom meals.

Starting this year, the Rotan school lunchroom personnel will begin serving breakfasts. Board members approved an across the board charge of 20 cents for all student breakfasts and set adult

breakfasts at 40 cents each. School breakfast feeding will begin at 7:45 a.m. and continue until 8:20 a.m.

The board did not increase the prices of student lunches. Lunches for primary students will be 25 cents, junior high 30 cents, and 35 cents for high school students. Adult lunches were increased from 60 cents to 65 cents for the 1978-79 year.

Board president, Bobby Smith, appointed three members, Dr. Jerry Marshall, Laurence Wayne Sparks and Louie Hayes, to serve on a committee with school administrators to study delinquent property taxes.

In a split vote by the board on the payment of salaries, the board authorized a 6 percent pay increase to auxiliary personnel. All cafeteria personnel and custodians will be granted a blanket 6 percent salary increase estimated to total \$2,775 for the coming year.

Board members Marshall, Houston, Hayes, Gruben and Ragan voted in favor of the increase

while Board member L. Sparks voted against the salary increase.

Superintendent Tom Harkey outlined some new teacher assignments and reviewed some re-assignments with board members last Monday. Harkey indicated that Mrs. Jim Weathers will be assigned to the reading lab in the primary building; that Mrs. Joyce Harkey would begin the year teaching high school English I and III and World Geography until Mrs. Dean Brown could complete her student teaching. Harkey said that Doyle Walker, assistant coach hired at \$1,200 above the state base, would be teaching social studies in junior high.

In the area of re-assignments, Harkey informed the board that Mrs. David Hudnall would move from the reading lab to a 4th grade teacher and that Mrs. Joyce Hill would be re-assigned from the 4th grade to the reading lab.

The board is in the process of adopting a new set of school board policies that should be ready for final approval in approximately 60 days.

HALFHEARTED REPENTANCE

When one only halfheartedly repents we find while certain parts of the personality repents another part remains impotent. Some of the sentiments, attitudes, and ideas seek to turn to God while others cling to the old ways. The halfhearted penitent presumes to leave sin, but as Lot's wife, he looks back to his cherished interests. He seeks to make a compromised settlement of his life with God in which the Almighty receives certain areas of control while he himself retains others.

In halfhearted repentance, Dr. Mavis points out that "one becomes religious by the addition of certain sacred ideas and practices rather than by a radical renunciation of all his evil ways." He comes to believe that God will accept him on these conditions. He becomes a Christian partially on the basis of a conditioned commitment: "I will follow thee; but let me first go..." (Luke 9:61). Of course, this is a serious error. A conditioned commitment leads to a divided heart. Interests center around both positive and negative values. This kind of person wishes to renounce sin and to live righteously, but finds himself frustrated and defeated by inner forces which oppose his good intentions. This person never finds satisfaction in his Christian life.

The greatest problems in repentance for everyone are seen in the threat of halfhearted repentance, the desire to remain loyal to sin while enjoying the benefits of Christianity. The problem is that the impulse to repent is opposed by contrary sentiments, attitudes, and dispositions. Rebellious impulses of the heart, loving the old ways of life, resist a change of direction in living. There is a great power of deception in halfhearted repentance. Do not fool yourself concerning this matter!

It will do us good to recall the words of our Lord which He spoke in the Sermon on the Mount: "No one can serve two masters; for he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other." (Matt. 6:24) In Luke 14:33 Jesus makes it clear that nothing less than total surrender to His will is acceptable: "So therefore, whoever of you does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple". If you are holding back in your commitment to Christ, you are hurting yourself. So please reconsider your obedience to God's Word. Determine today to be totally surrendered to Christ and be confident that you rest in God's hands. Amen.

New Child Care Program To Be Offered By TEA

Persons desiring to enroll in vocational courses at Western Texas College this fall may qualify for child care assistance, Judy Barkowsky, coordinator of Child Care and Teacher Aide programs at the college, said.

Under a new program sponsored by the Texas Education Agency (TEA), funding may be made available if the college is approved. The program would provide care for children at the Snyder Child Day Care Center during day or evening hours.

"It is important that we hear from parents in the

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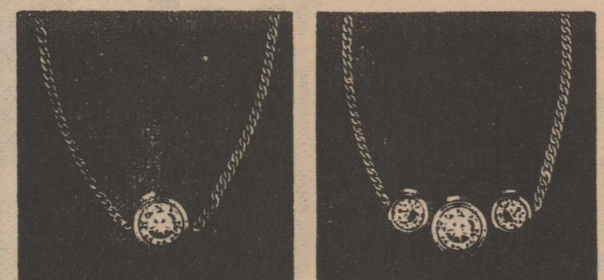

Texas Lawmakers Approve Tax-Relief Package

With slightly less than two hours remaining before the midnight adjournment deadline of the 30-day Special Session, Texas lawmakers put their final approval on a \$500 million tax-relief package.

The omnibus package of constitutional amendments will be presented on the November 7 general election ballot.

The tax-relief package would grant homestead exemptions of \$5,000 for school tax purposes and would authorize the Legislature to grant exemptions up to \$10,000 for persons over 65 years of age and the disabled.

Rep. Elmer Martin of Colorado City said, "the savings for an individual homeowner from the \$5,000 exemption is estimated at \$30 a year for a \$40,000 home, based on 60 percent of the assessed

value and a \$1 per \$100 school tax.

"Enabling legislation was passed which would det aside \$450 million from the General Revenue Fund to repay local school districts for revenue lost because of the homestead exemptions," Martin continued.

Legislators would be directed under the proposed amendment to provide for taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of productivity rather than market value. Timber land could be taxed on the same basis.

Another section of the proposal would place in the constitution a requirement that local property taxes be raised only after formal notice and hearing. "Although I was not fully satisfied with all of the amendment package," Martin said, "I feel that we may have taken the first step in lowering taxes for the average Texas citizen and providing needed relief for the farmers and ranchers in our State.

"Moreover, I felt it was my duty as the representative of all the people of the District to give them the opportunity to vote on the amendment package themselves.

"I would urge each voter to carefully study all aspects of the proposal before going to the polls on November 7," Martin concluded.

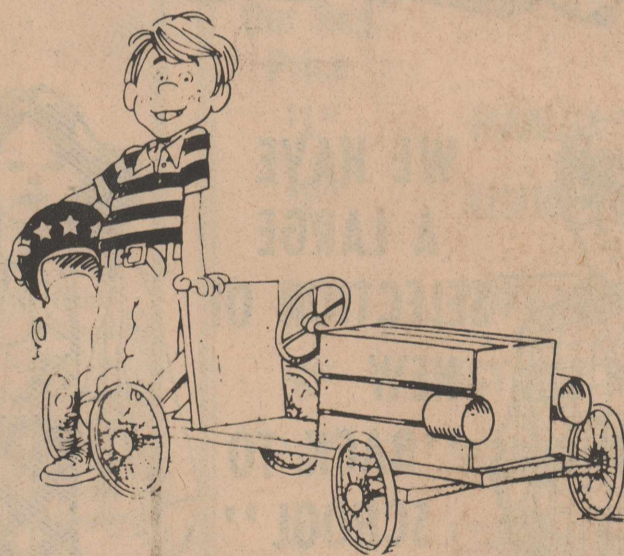
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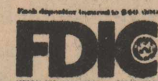
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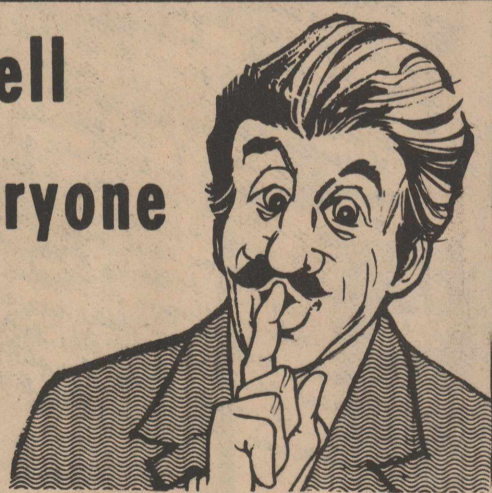


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Burleson Advises Filing For Drought Loan

Congressman Omar Burleson advises that although nearly 2,400 Texas farmers have either interviewed or filed drought loan applications totaling approximately \$28 million the SBA Regional Office announced the opening of six more offices to serve those Texas farmers who have not yet applied.

For farmers who suffered drought damage and resultant financial hardship, the filing deadline is October 11, 1978, which is unchanged from the original date established when the disaster was declared. "Before the deadline occurs doubtless there will be more applications filed and the SBA is therefore moving some of the existing offices and opening new locations as well in an effort to be as accessible as possible to the 220 counties that are eligible for drought disaster loans", said Burleson, "including 29 in the 17th Congressional District".

The Disaster Offices will be located in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Harlingen, Lubbock, Temple, Laredo, Amarillo, Pecos, Marshall, and Abilene. The Laredo, Pecos, and Abilene Offices opened July 5. Each office will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily, Monday thru Friday.

SBA Disaster Office Managers are recommending that the farmers come in person to pick up an application and then return it in person. This assures that the application is complete, which in turn expedites processing of the loan.

The following information should be submitted with applications for drought loan assistance.

- (1) A copy of the legal description of land, i.e., deed, mortgage, real estate contract, etc., (if real estate is to be offered as security).
- (2) Copies of tax records. The applicant should keep the originals as file copies.
- (3) A copy of the latest ASCS notice (Form 476) for allotments and yields.
- (4) If claiming a loss on pasture, indicate type of pasture (timber, grass, good improved, or excellent improved) and the number of months of normal grazing and pasture produced.
- (5) If land is rented crop share, indicate percentage division (i.e. 50/50, 60/40, etc.) and list only your share among the share of the acres.

Burleson explained that there are other items required if the applicant is in a partnership or corporation which is another reason why coming in person to the offices to initiate the loan application is recommended.

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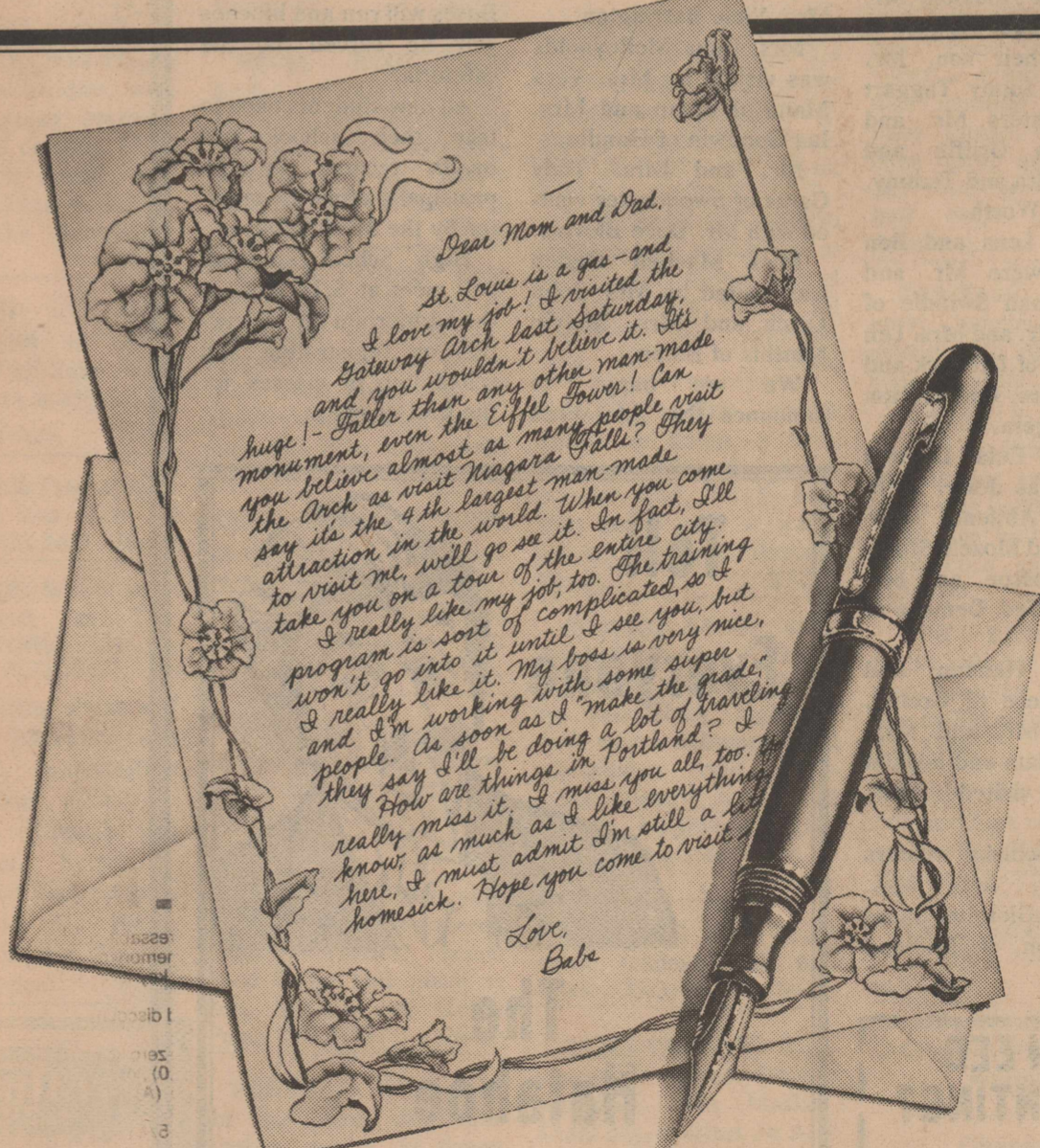

New Program Offered At TSTI

With two new associate degree programs and nearly \$2 million in construction under way, the Sweetwater campus of Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) will begin the 1978-79 school year in September.

For the first time in its history, TSTI Sweetwater will offer studies leading to the associate of applied science degree. Students may earn the degree in Technical Office Training and Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Technology.

Still another program new this fall at TSTI Sweetwater is Solar Energy Mechanic, a three-quarter (nine-month) option course in air conditioning/refrigeration. The program is designed to train mechanics to install and service domestic solar energy conversion equipment.

Registration for the fall quarter of 1978-79 will begin Sept. 26. However, students may complete the registration procedure during the week of Aug. 14-18. Fall quarter classes begin Sept. 28.

Moises Perez, manager of student services, urged prospective fall quarter students to send in their \$20 room deposit as soon as possible if they plan to live in a dormitory. Perez said student housing facilities probably will reach capacity by the end of August.

Perez also said students who wish to apply for financial aid to attend TSTI should do so immediately. Processing of financial aid applications will cease two weeks before registration, the student services manager said.

Meanwhile, prospective fall students may take the required Differential Aptitude Test (DAT) any week day at 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. in the TSTI Sweetwater Student Center.

The 1977-78 school year will end Aug. 25. Graduation exercises will be at 8 p.m. August 24 in the Sweetwater High School Auditorium.

In addition to the degree-granting programs TSTI Sweetwater also offers certificate courses in auto mechanics, auto body repair, building trades, combination welding, drafting, livestock and ranch operations, radio and TV servicing, dental assistant and vocational nursing.

The 1978-79 vocational nursing class will begin its one year of training Aug. 21. Applicants no longer are being interviewed.

County Entomologist Column DAVID FINLEY

Cotton has made a week of good growth with improved moisture conditions and cooler temperatures. Insect activity has begun a slight increase with larger increases expected within a week.

Boll weevil damage has increased in irrigated fields not sprayed early in the season. Newly hatched weevils can be found fairly easily along with their damage. Dryland fields are not experiencing very much damage at all. Punctured square counts in dryland fields range from 0-7 percent, while in irrigated fields damage ranges from 2-28 percent. Look for damage to increase in all fields during the next two weeks as weevils begin to migrate from field to field.

Bollworm activity appears to be increasing at the time of this writing. Eggs are being found in numbers ranging from 0-28/100 plants. Most fields have from 2-5 eggs/100 plants. Worms range from 0-7/100 plants and damage ranges from 0-39 percent. Fields with larger amounts of damage have only large worms present now. Time is approaching where control decisions must be made, especially on irrigated fields. Those are the ones with the most yield potential at the present time. It's extremely hard to recommend control on dryland fields that just do not have the potential for 1/4 bale/acre yields. Let me point out a couple of control alternatives that you have. First of all is the "do nothing" control. This is where you sit back and let the worms take all they want and rely on present beneficials to control the population. This measure will probably be practiced on most of the fields in the county, especially on those with little moisture and little yield potential. Second is the "get in there and fight to the finish" control, whether it be the finish of bollworms or the finish of your pocketbook. With this type of control you choose to spray with hard chemicals such as Lannate, Azodrin, Methyl Parathion, etc. When this decision is made you are then committed to a season-long spray program consisting of probably 5-8 applications with costs ranging from \$50-\$60 per acre. This may be done by several irrigated producers and possibly some dryland producers. Remember this decision will kill a few bollworms, possibly, but you can be sure it will kill all of your existing beneficials.

The other side of the coin is the "I'll help you if you'll help me" type of control. This is where you attempt to control small worms with the biological types of insecticides, namely, Elcar which is a virus to which bollworms are susceptible, or you can use materials such as Dipal, Bactur or Thuricide which contain the bacteria, *Bacillus thuringiensis*, to which bollworms are again susceptible. The use of these materials will not harm your existing beneficials. Materials such as this should be applied at the time of egg hatch. Good coverage is essential as the worms must eat some of this for control to be achieved. Aerial applications should be put out with 3-5 gallons of water per acre and ground applications should be put out with 10-15 gallons of

water per acre. Control seems to be better if applications are put out late in the evening or at night. The cost of an aerial application for these materials will run from \$5-\$7 per acre depending on rates and amounts of water per acre applied. Ground applications costs could run from \$3.50-\$6.00 per acre also. But with biological control you are not "locked" into a spray schedule. The manufacturers recommend a 5 day spray interval until eggs disappear. Field checks must be made by each individual producer to see when and how many eggs are being laid. Checks every three days will be required during the next two weeks to catch the developing worm populations.

Cotton should be worth some money this year and if you have the potential for a good yield (3/4 plus bales/acre, then you may be able to spend a little money on this crop. Irrigators should definitely consider control measures if worm pressure exists and yield potential is present.

Beneficial insect activity has declined over the past week. The lady beetles must be migrating to Ruidoso as their numbers have declined over the past 7 days. Green lacewing flies are a bright spot as their numbers are spread over more fields, dryland and irrigated, this week. If you need to talk to someone about your insect situation don't hesitate to call. I'll try to be available.
