Many Texas beef cattle herds may be deficient in an important mineral—phosphorous—and their performance may suffer for this reason.

Many cow-calf operators realize that dietary phosphorous is one of the important factors in reproductive efficiency.

It is fairly well recognized that the phosphorous content is inadequate for good animal reproduction on most pastures and

of herds breed during the spring when phosphorous may be adequate. So it is tempting to believe that phosphorous supplementation is unnecessary on a spring breeding program.

What producers don't always realize, however, is that the mineral is important in many other functions including growth, appetite, feed efficiency and milk production.

For this reason, specialists have found that most good operators provide a mineral supplement at all times. There is little unnecessary consumption, if salt and other minerals are offered separately since cattle will generally eat little mineral when forage is lush.

Don't spare the nitrogen on small grains this fall. Three important reasons

for high production of forage and grain.

Sufficient fall growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen at planting. The advantages of early planting and favorable fall growing conditions can be lost if nitrogen fertilization is delayed until the condition of the stand can be determined. Establishing

can apply the total requirement before planting on heavy textured soils or can apply a small amount at planting followed by top-dressing soon after planting.

Of course, fall nitrogen fertilization is also affected by the amount of straw from the previous crop. The bacteria and other microorganisms need to

applying nitrogen has been to increase the rate about 20 pounds per acre for each ton of undecomposed straw. However, a portion of this nitrogen is recovered during the final stages of decomposition that as much as half of this may be available during the spring months. A little town, when all is said and done, is a very nice place to live.

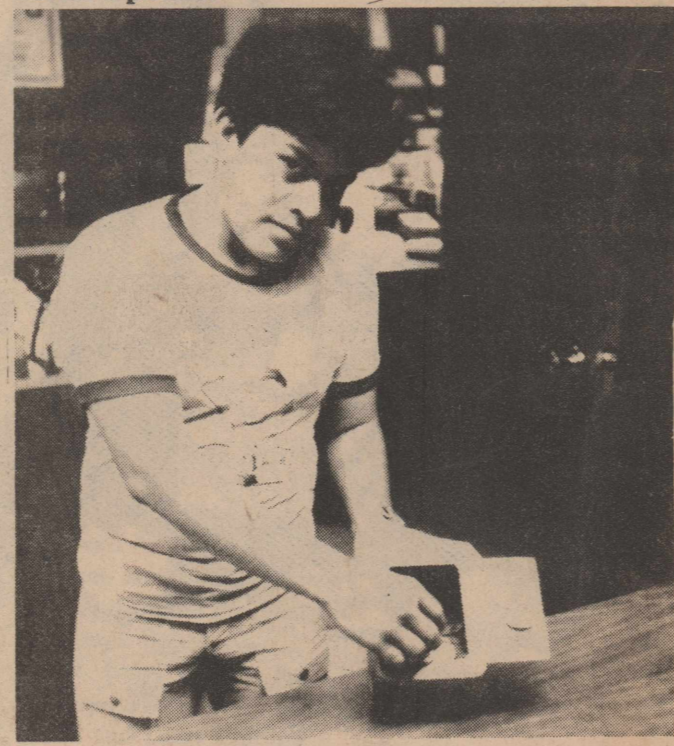
**Screening For

The tax relief measures-broadened exemptions and special assessment of farm lands.

-Direction for state buyers to consider purchasing products from the hand-dipped where available.

-Authority for cities and counties to issue industrial development bonds.

-Authority for tax increment financing of urban renewal.

-Property tax exemptions for solar and wind-powered energy devices.

-An increase in civil case jurisdiction of justice of the peace courts from \$200 maximum controversies to those involving \$500, with the legislature empowered to increase the limit to \$1,000.

-Provision for adding more judges to the 14 three-judge state courts of civil appeals.

-Abolishing the State Building Commission and building fund.

-Permission for water districts to furnish fire-fighting services and issue bonds to finance them where voters approve by a two-thirds majority.

Campaigns already are shaping up on the tax relief measure. Gov. Dolph Briscoe is urging support. Texas United Labor Legislative Committee is opposing the amendment as of small benefit to small taxpayers.

Port Files

Texas Deepwater Port Authority has filed its plan to build an offshore oil terminal with Transportation Secretary Brock Adams in Washington.

The \$800 million super-port would be constructed 26 miles offshore from Freeport in Brazoria County. More than \$1 billion in revenue bonds would finance the project. First sale would begin in January 1980.

Oil companies will be called on to sign user agreements to offload oil from giant tankers through the facility.

The application is about the same as that filed earlier by Seadock, Inc., a consortium of oil companies. Seadock's application was withdrawn after red tape connected with the application left only a handful of sponsors ready to assume the financial risk. The major change in the new application is the provision for public ownership.

It approved and actually constructed, the Texas terminal-in 100 feet of water-probably will be the second in the nation. Another is planned near New Orleans. About 1.8 million barrels of oil arrive at Texas ports daily.

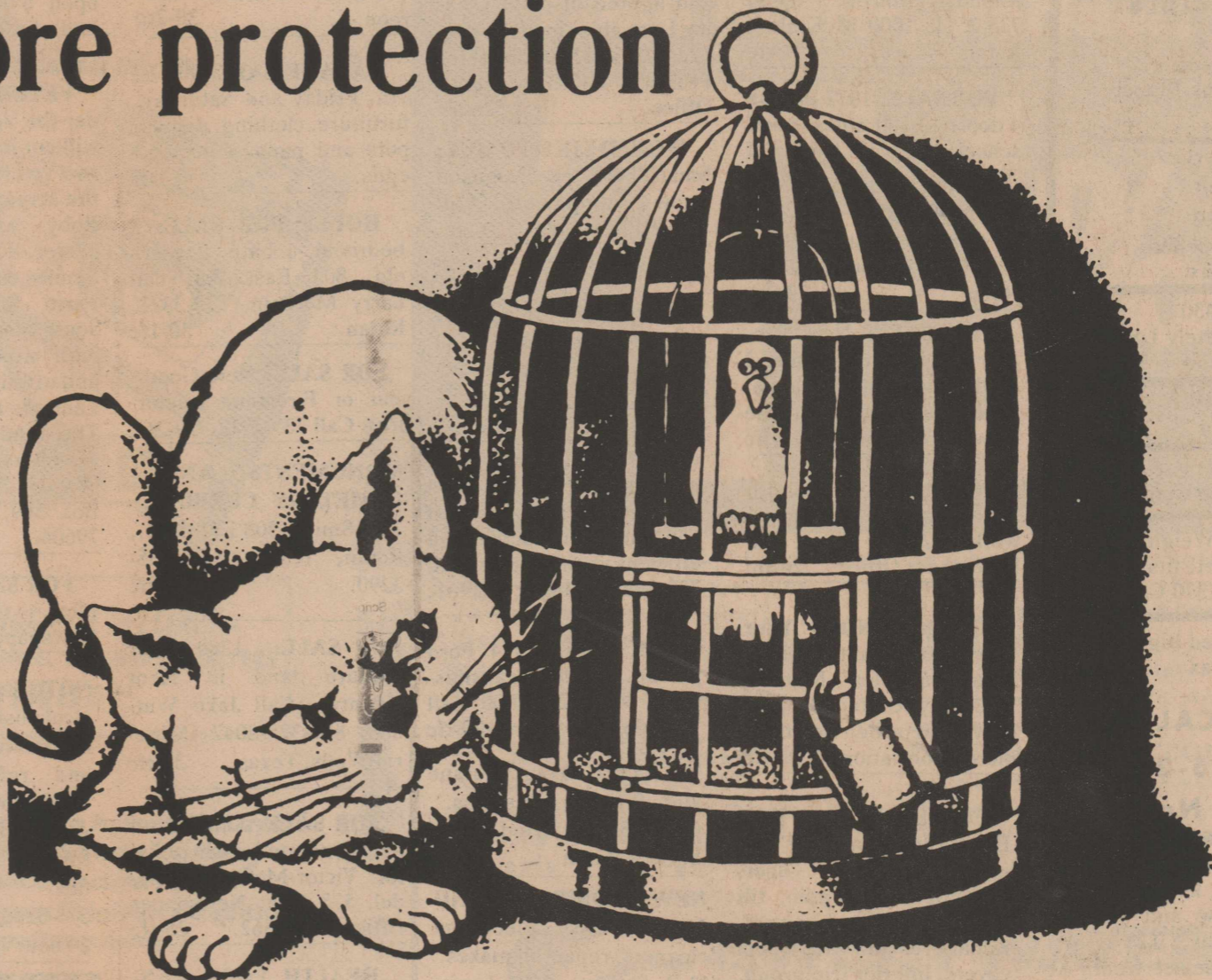

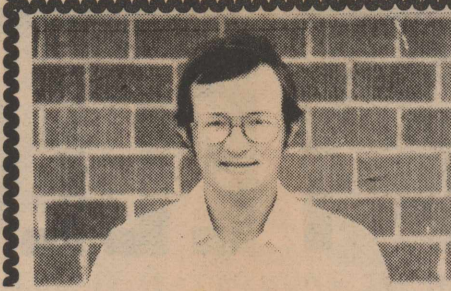

Fisher County Entomologist Column

DAVID FINLEY

Insect activity, particularly bollworm activity, has decreased after two weeks of remaining at a fairly stable level. However, boll weevil movement has increased and damage from this insect is on the incline.

Boll weevil damage this week ranges from 1-16 percent in dryland fields with most registering less than 10 percent. Irrigated fields' damage ranges from 8-60 percent punctured green squares. Some irrigated producers are continuing in a five day with three to four applications, spray program and are beginning to reduce weevil pressure at the present time. From grubs being found in squares on the ground, another generation of weevils may very well hit some of these fields in about two weeks, thus boll protection may have to be recontinued.

Bollworms have decreased this week in numbers and damage. A lot of this decrease can be attributed to the hot, dry weather, but mainly I feel it is due to the fast increasing populations of green lacewing flies. Damage in irrigated fields ranges from 2-19 percent with eggs running from 0-19 per 100 plants and worms pegging at 0-3/100 plants. Dryland fields damage ranges from 0-16 percent with almost all fields standing at less than 5 percent. Eggs range from 0-3/100 plants and worms range from 0-2/100 plants.

As I have noted, green lacewing flies have increased drastically over the past couple of weeks. All life stages of this insect can be found in the cotton and this means they should be around with us awhile. It doesn't mean a

whole lot to the dryland producer with little chance of much yield, however they are a much welcomed site to the irrigated producers. But, cotton production this year can't be all bad, because as I am

writing this letter the price is increasing. Somebody's finally figured out that there's not gonna be a bumper cotton crop this year, thus the law of supply and demand is beginning to exercise itself. See you next week.

We were pleased with our scrimmage with Crosbyton Friday night, but after grading the film, we still need to improve greatly. We faced an entirely different type team than we had the week before. Crosbyton was much more aggressive and quicker than Munday. We had a hard time moving the football consistently and couldn't connect when it came to pass. We think we have to grade 67 percent to win each week. Usually the defense is ahead of the offense and in our case it is very noticeable.

We still need to improve defensively but our main concern right now is to improve our running game. Defensively the top 5 graders this past week were Willie Hayes, Gary Harkey, David Posey, Fred Acorn, and Eli Sepeda, with a grade of 36, 27, 23, 23 and 17 respectively.

On offense Keith Mullins had a 94 percent mark, Nowlin had a 74, David Posey had a 69, Greg Hayes had a 65, and Gary Harkey had a 63 percent to lead the offensive team. At this time we are not ashamed of these grades because we have the type players that will try harder to improve each week. As many young and inexperienced players as we have, we will make these early season mistakes. Score-wise our JV scored once and did not allow Crosbyton to score. The varsity was 1-1 and we had one opportunity to score again but didn't. Our biggest plus, if we had one, was that we capitalized on 5 turnovers which in a regular season could have made the situation more in our favor.

Due to the UIL ruling we cannot play a junior high game until the 2nd Thursday in September. So we had to cancel with Spur, but will play Spur's JV here at 7:30 Thursday night. Our JV is unscored on in 2 scrimmages and will be trying to keep that record Thursday night against a strong Spur team. Their score against Crosbyton last week came on a 75 yard pass from Kip Pease to Sparky Conner.

The varsity's first game is Sept. 8 at Spur. Spur is large and has a couple of transfers to help out, we scouted them twice and they look impressive, es-

pecially on defense. Their main strength is in Alton Fisher a 3 year starter. Alton is about 210 and 6-2 tall. He is backed up by a transfer from Crosbyton that is carrying the ball the biggest part of the time. We must be ready to stop the power plays up the middle. We need to establish a strong running game early and to keep the football most of the time. Its hard to punt a team when in the scrimmages you didn't get to see any of their kicking game. We will spend a lot of time this week especially on return of punts and kick offs. Sometimes early, the other teams are quite as prepared to defend the kicking game.

I think with great support from our people and with the enthusiasm we have on our team this year, we can again put Rotan on the winning side.

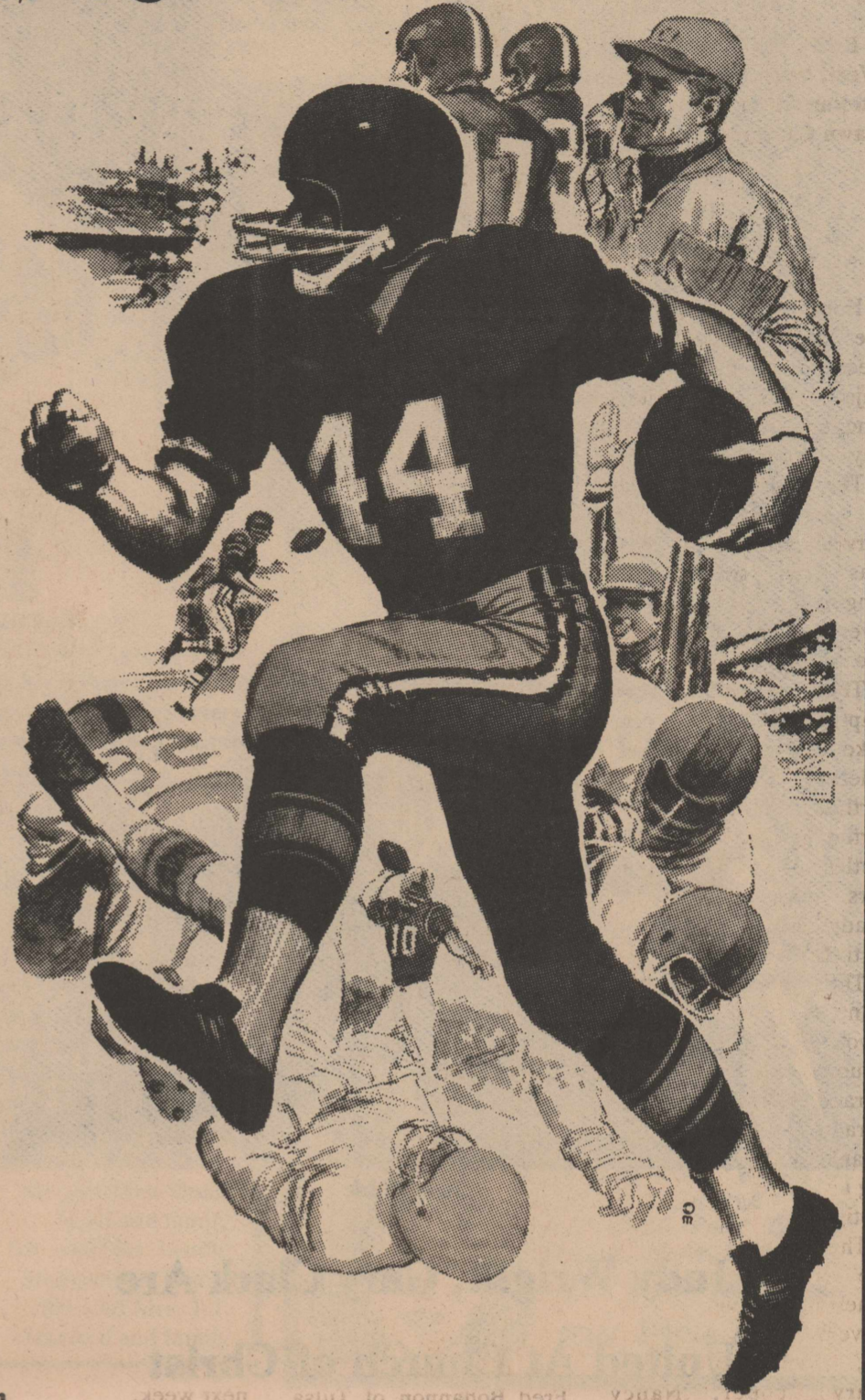

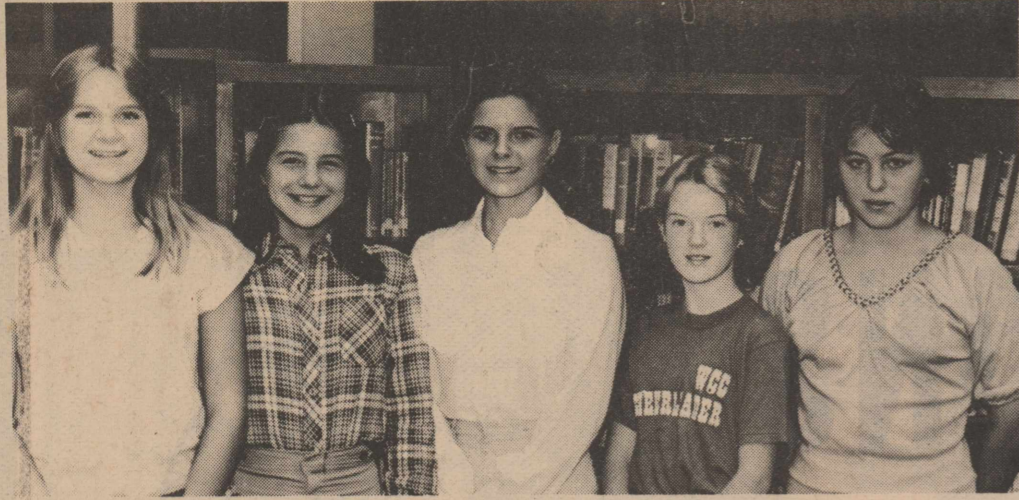

Rotan School Sets Lunchroom Policy

The Rotan Independent School Lunchroom has announced its policy for 1978-79 school year free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals

served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Each school district may determine the price charged for reduced-price meals but in no case may the charge for a reduced-price lunch exceed 20 cents or a reduced-price breakfast exceed 10 cents.

Price charged for Reduced-Price Lunch is 20 cents; Reduced-Price breakfast is 10 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. In addition families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the

mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms will be given to all children in a letter to parents on Thursday, August 31, 1978. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

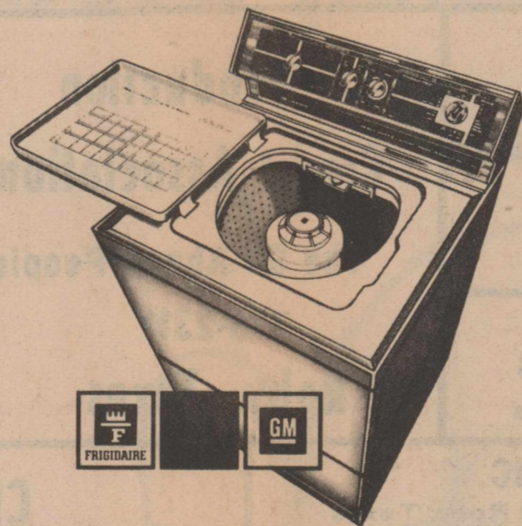

Fisher County AGENT NEWS by Richard Spencer

Many Texas beef cattle herds may be deficient in an important mineral-phosphorous-and their performance may suffer for this reason.

Many cow-calf operators realize that dietary phosphorous is one of the important factors in reproductive efficiency.

It is fairly well recognized that the phosphorous content is inadequate for good animal reproduction on most pastures and ranges in the Southwest except for periods of lush growth.

A considerable number

of herds breed during the spring when phosphorous may be adequate. So it is tempting to believe that phosphorous supplementation is unnecessary on a spring breeding program.

What producers don't always realize, however, is that the mineral is important in many other functions including growth, appetite, feed efficiency and milk production.

Borderline deficiencies may reduce performance of cows, calves and stocker cattle without producing effect which can be seen.

For this reason, specialists have found that most good operators provide a mineral supplement at all times. There is little unnecessary consumption, if salt and other minerals are offered separately since cattle will generally eat little mineral when forage is lush.

Don't spare the nitrogen on small grains this fall. Three important reasons why wheat and other small grains need nitrogen at planting or a short time afterward: for early grazing; to help decompose excess residual straw, and

for high production of forage and grain.

Sufficient fall growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen at planting. The advantages of early planting and favorable fall growing conditions can be lost if nitrogen fertilization is delayed until the condition of the stand can be determined. Establishing a good uniform stand requires some nitrogen, and most soils are deficient in this nutrient.

To meet nitrogen requirements during the fall growing period, producers

can apply the total requirement before planting on heavy textured soils or can apply a small amount at planting followed by topdressing soon after planting.

Of course, fall nitrogen fertilization is also affected by the amount of straw from the previous crop. The bacteria and other microorganisms need to decompose the straw require nitrogen and can use that already in the soil as well as that applied, thus reducing the amount available during the fall.

The general rule in

applying nitrogen has been to increase the rate about 20 pounds per acre for each ton of undecomposed straw. However, a portion of this nitrogen is recovered during the final stages of decomposition that as much as half of this may be available during the spring months. This means that about half of the "extra" nitrogen could be deducted from the late winter topdressing.

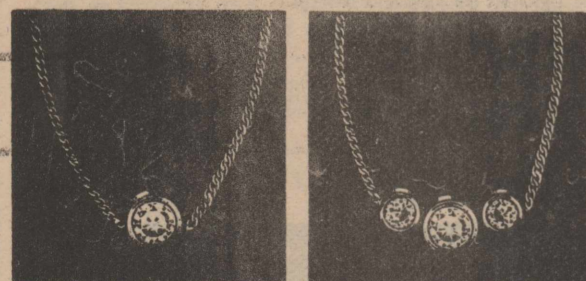

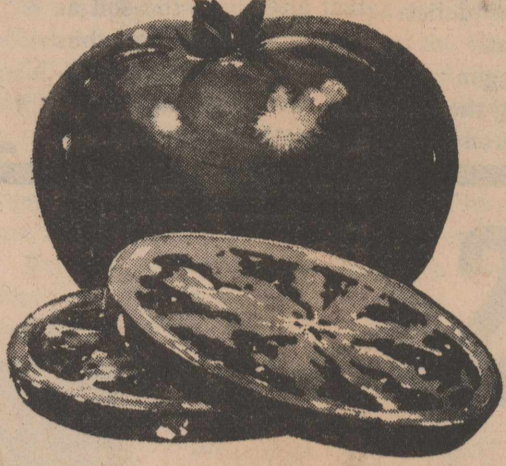
