The Hobbs School Board members talked with a representative of Southwestern Appraisals in Fort Worth at their last meeting and discussed the possibility of re-apprasing all the land in the Hobbs School District.

Board members are to meet with another appraising firm from Austin during a special meeting of the board on October 2, at 7:00 p. m., according to Superintendent Maxwell.

Having voted to sell bonds back in August of 1977 for the new clinic, the board had to temporarily halt plans when they were told that their total hospital district assessed value was not sufficient to support the sale of additional bonds.

Since the recent re-evaluation and an estimated new assessed valuation for the hospital district of \$52 million, board members have put the clinic back on

course by authorizing Gene Vinyard, financial consultant with Vinyard and Street of Austin, to begin preliminary work on the bond sales.

The bonds, having already been authorized by the voters of Fisher County, can now be marketed. Although bids on the clinic have not been officially received, board members have discussed the construction costs with area firms and anticipate costs to be in the area of \$150,000.00.

In his opening remarks to board members last Monday night, Gene Vinyard stated, "I don't see any other way you're going to get doctors here except with a clinic on the premises. You need doc-

AN UNCONSCIOUS GOODNESS

Remember the New Principle of Jesus which we discussed last week? Jesus said. "As you dit it to the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." We noted that this New Principle of Judgment meant that one of the commandments of God is that requirement to respond actively to the needs of others. Therefore, we concluded, on Judgment Day God will ask us, "What have you done to better the life of others?" You may desire to read the parable again to refresh your memory (Matthew 25:31-46).

As you read the parable notice the defense given by those who were judged by the parable. In effect they say, "If we had known it was you who was in trouble we would have helped quickly and eagerly." There can be a sonbbery in giving help to others in need. Many a person will cheerfully help a well-known person who happens to be in need, while they would never notice the need of an ordinary person in town. Too often we will only help those who we are sure will be grateful and who will repay the favor. But to help a stranger is a horse of a different color. These people failed to do the simple things which Jesus demanded. And they said, "If we had known".

But also notice that the people who were praised in the parable never realized what they were doing. Their goodness was unconscious: their kindness, sympathy, and generosity were spontaneous and not a calculated deed, it was free flowing natural goodness. They said, "when did we do that for you?" From their love and devotion to Christ flowed an unconscious goodness which is pleasing to God. How do we stand in this parable? Perhaps an illustration will help reveal the true meaning of this parable.

There is a legend told of Marti of Tours. Martin was a poor man and he loved Jesus. One cold winter night Martin gave half of his coat to a beggar who was about to freeze to death. And that night Martin had a dream about heaven. In his dream he saw Jesus standing among the angels wearing the half of the coat that he gave to the beggar. And Jesus said to him, "As you did it to the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." How will Jesus greet you on Judgment Day? Amen.
