## Indians scalp the Cubs at Homecoming, 49-20

Haskell would bring home a big victory to add to the Homecoming celebrations, as they defeated Olney 49 to 20. Even the final score doesn't really show it, the Cubs did come out and played very well against the Tribe. Olney led at the end of the first quarter 7 to 6, but the Indians' offense seemed to find its way in the second quarter scoring 22 points, sending Haskell into the half leading 28 to 7.

The passing attack of the Indians, led by quarterback Dylan Hanson, accounted for 114 yards and three touchdowns, two of those going to sophomore Dalton Meinzer and the other finding old faithful, Sam Fouts.

As usual the Indians offense was led by their powerful running game, racking up 331 yards on the ground as a team. The team's leading rusher was Hanson who carried the ball seven times for 155 yards and one touchdown. That is the kind of statistics you see if you're playing video games, with one player averaging over 22 yards per carry. Lane Burson pitched in as usual, running the ball 10 times for 45 yards and two touchdowns, as well as Rocky Haggard who had six carries for 61 yards and one touchdown.

The Indians' running game has a list of players they can hand the ball to for positive production. Those mentioned, the receivers who are in motion and run the ball, led by Fouts who had two carries for 30 yards.

In my weekly talk with Coach Grady Benton, he had this to say about their performance, "I almost asked too much out of my kids and staff this week. Proud of how we stuck together through it all, held each other accountable, and responded when challenged. It wasn't pretty by any means, but we fought through it and got the job done."

Haskell gets a week off as they begin to prepare for district play, beginning the battle with the Electra Tigers. They defeated the Indians last year on their march into the play-offs. The Tribe's district is looking pretty tough with four teams showing 4-1 records including Haskell, Petrolia, Electra and Seymour. And last year's district champs, who I don't think you can sleep on despite their 2-3 record, and last but not least the Munday Moguls who are 3-2. One of the Moguls' losses came to the Stamford Bulldogs, 26-21 and the other to Quanah by one point, 14 to 13.

So, I expect nothing less than an extremely competitive run at this year's district championship. It could really end up in any team's hands, but I truly believe using no prejudice that our Haskell Indians have a great chance of not only being a play-off team this season, but hoisting their first district championship under Coach Grady Benton.

This season and the future of this Indian football program is showing great

potential, and with this current staff to lead the way I see nothing but success.

## Food protection training program set

A two-day Food Protection

Management training for food service managers in the Big Country area will be held Oct.

19 and 26 at the Taylor County Extension Office located on the Taylor County Expo grounds in Abilene from 8:15 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. both days.

The training will allow food establishments permitted by the Texas Department of Health to meet their certification requirements if they pass the exam. The exam being used is the National Restaurant Association's ServSafe exam. The class covers twelve food safety concepts related to personal hygiene, cross contamination, time and temperature, sanitation, pest management, foodborne illness and related

areas. The course is sponsored by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension in Jones, Nolan, and Taylor Counties and the Environmental Section of the City of Abilene.

Cost for the class is \$125, which includes the course book and exam. Registration deadline is Oct. 5. # Art partnership benefits fourth and fifth graders

While some things have stayed the same, many aspects of teaching and learning in our schools, have seen some drastic changes in the last two decades. Some of those changes are certainly more positive than others.

Haskell Elementary fourth and fifth grade classes are the beneficiaries of one such innovative program. Art Outreach is a partnership between The Grace Museum, the Abilene ISD and the Wylie ISD. The program provides art education for students in elementary schools in Abilene and Wylie. The students' art is displayed throughout the school year in the children's museum

gallery at The Grace.

After a school trip to The Grace, Haskell fourth grade teacher Amy Sloan said the teachers on the trip, inquired about being able to take part in the program. Unfortunately, Haskell Elementary was too far for the art teacher to travel for the lessons. After some brainstorming back and forth, they came up with a plan.

While the case can be made that the internet has some very harmful features, it also has some very beneficial features, particularly in the area of education. The Art Outreach certified art teacher, Kathryn Mitchell, wanted to try a virtual art

class. Haskell Elementary fourth and fifth grades are the pilot program. Mitchell will teach a total of six art lessons, one each six weeks, with five being virtual and one in person at the school.

Through the use of computers, cameras and a television, the students were able to see and hear the art teacher as she conducted the lesson from The Grace.

Sloan, who will be the facilitator for the program said that the goal is to introduce the students to as many art concepts and terminology as possible. They are tested on some of these concepts, especially the vocabulary, through the STARR test.

The first fourth grade lesson was called Matisse Bigger Burger. As Mitchell gave instructions and examples of the art project, she talked to the students about the life and works of the artist Matisse. As the students worked, she asked questions about the elements and media they were working with and encouraged the students to think creatively.

The fifth grade had a lesson on the color wheel, and learned about the life of Picasso and Klee. They made a line maze that certainly called for abstract thinking, as well as color blending. At the conclusion of both lessons, students walked by the camera to show Mitchell their finished products.

The Haskell Elementary PTO has provided the funds to participate in this pilot program. All of the needed supplies are packaged and sent to the school by the art teacher, in addition to a lesson plan for that day's project. Teachers Jennifer Roewe, Kameron Arce and Kristi Gibson assisted the fifth grade students, while Jacy West, Wendi Parks and Sloan helped the fourth grade classes.

It is not always practical for smaller schools to hire certified teachers in speciality areas, such as art. Through the use of the internet, programs such as this are possible, and the students reap the benefits.

# Haskell 4-H Club assists SASS Butterfield Trail Regulators

Do you ever get the feeling you were “born after your time?” Perhaps the Old West holds a fascination for you, or maybe you just like to play cowboy and shoot guns. If any or all of these appeal to you, then you should check out the Butterfield Trail Regulators’ monthly shoot.

Several members of the Haskell County 4-H Shooting Club and their sponsors did just that recently. They were invited to the annual two day match to “pick up brass” in return for donations to go toward the expenses of their shooting practices and competitions. It was a good fund-raiser for the 4-H shooting club, and provided an appreciated service during the two day shoot, which brought together approximately eighty shooters from all over Texas.

Butterfield Trail Regulators, located about 4 miles east of Anson, is an affiliated member of SASS, or the Single Action Shooting Society. SASS is an international organization created to preserve and promote the sport of Cowboy Action Shooting.

There are some one hundred thousand members of local SASS shooting clubs, scattered in every state in the U.S., Canada, Australia, South Africa, Europe and New Zealand. Competitions include local, regional, and state matches, with the big finale being the National Championship in Phoenix, Arizona and then the End of Trail World Championship at Founder’s Ranch in Edgewood, New Mexico.

A big part of the fun is choosing an alias, for example Judge Roy Bean, appropriate to a character or profession of the late

19th century, western star or fiction character. Shooters then develop a “costume” that also depicts the appropriate era.

Cowboy Action Shooting is a multi-faceted shooting sport in which shooters compete with firearms typical of those used in the taming of the Old West. Single action revolvers, pistol caliber lever action rifles and old time shotguns are used. The timed competition is staged in a unique, characterized “Old West” style. Each scenario features an array of situations, many based on famous incidents or movie scenes, in which shooters test their skill against steel targets.

The sport offers categories for all ages, both male and female, from the Buckaroo/Buckarett (age 13 and under) to the Gran Patron (age 80 and over). In fact the reigning 2015

Overall World Champion, shoots as a junior boy (age 14-16). There are cowboy, gunfighter, black powder and duelist categories, just to name a few.

Since most shooters reload their own ammunition, someone has to find and pick up all the spent brass and shotgun hulls between shooters. That is where the 4-H Shooting Club came in. They did a great job of retrieving the brass, thus

saving the competitors much bending and stooping. After the competition each day, the 4-H’ers took a turn at shooting the cowboy guns.

The Haskell County 4-H Shooting Club is always seeking donations to help with the expense of clays and ammunition. Anyone wishing to donate should contact Wesley Alsbrook or Darrell and Cherrie Dutton.

Saturday of each month for a match. ## ‘Hear the Beep Where You Sleep’ is Fire Prevention Week theme for 2015

If I asked you where your smoke alarms are in your home, could you tell me? If you’re like many people, you may not pay much attention to where smoke alarms have been installed. However, location matters when it comes to smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms should be installed inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.

Working smoke alarms are a critical fire-safety tool that can mean the difference between life and death in a home fire. According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), smoke alarms can cut the chance of dying in a home fire in half. Meanwhile, NFPA data shows that home fires killed 2,755 people in 2013, an average of eight people every day that year. Many of these deaths could

have been prevented with the proper smoke alarm protection.

As a member of the fire service for 15 years, I’ve seen the devastating effects of fire first-hand; the burn injuries, the loss of homes and possessions are distressing. What’s even worse is witnessing a family’s anguish after a loved one has been killed in a fire. It’s heartbreaking.

As the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10, NFPA is promoting “Hear the Beep Where You Sleep. Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm!” to better educate the public about the true value of working smoke alarms in the bedroom. In support of these efforts, Haskell Fire Department will be hosting local campaign activities throughout the week.

My sincere hope is that all Haskell County residents participate in one or more

of our Fire Prevention Week activities, and make sure there are working smoke alarms installed throughout their homes. These simple steps can help make a life-saving difference, and prevent the potentially life-threatening impact of fire.

Here are additional smoke alarm tips to follow:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.

- Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.

- Test alarms each month by pushing the test button.

- Replace all smoke alarms, including alarms that use 10-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond properly.

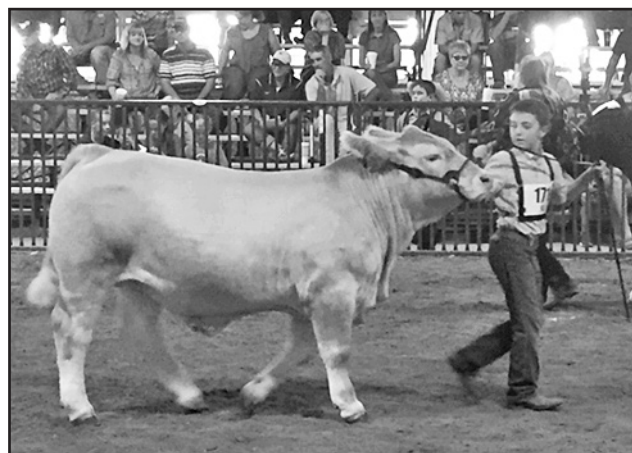
- Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound and understands what to do when they hear the smoke

alarm.

- If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.

- Go to your outside meeting place. Call the fire department from outside the home.

# Paint Creek defeats Moran, 81-55

The Rule Bobcats came up with a big 81 to 55 win Friday night over Moran.

The Bobcats' leading rusher was Chase Thompson with 18 carries for 205 yards. Brandon Mitchell completed three of six passes for 108 yards, while Jacob Nazarette

caught two for 48 yards. Rule had more than 300 yards rushing. Chase Potter scored twice in the first quarter with a one yard run and a 50 yard pass reception from Mitchell. The second quarter saw the Bobcats scoring four touchdowns. Potter had two TDs on one and sixty yard runs, while Thompson scored twice on runs of forty-seven and twenty-seven yards.

In the third quarter, Mitchell returned a kickoff for sixty yards and a touchdown. Nazarette caught a twenty

yard touchdown pass from Mitchell, and Potter finished off the quarter with a touchdown run of five yards. Rule scored twice in the final quarter of the game, when Potter scampered forty-one yards for a TD and Dolfo Gonzales ran the ball over the goal line from thirty-one yards out. Gonzales also kicked seven PATs for the night.

The Rule Bobcats are 3-2 as they prepare to meet the Benjamin Mustangs on their home turf, Friday, Oct. 2 beginning at 7:30.
