





Several Fisher County Stock Farmers have added sheep farm flocks to their operations during the past year. There are now over 1,000 herd of ewes in the county compared to 200 two years ago. The newest sheep producer is James Ratliff. Sheep producers are reporting very high lambing percentages with one flock as high as 160 percent while others report 140 percent. The average range lambing percentage is about 80.


A farm sheep flock can be described as one that primarily utilized feeds and forage produced on cultivated land. In most farm flock operations there is little or no native rangeland grazing available.

Farm operators who have interest in diversifying their business activities should consider sheep as a supplemental enterflock varies with the size of the sheep enterprise and the desires of the operator governing the quality and quantity of the facilities, equipment, and breeding animals. wool.





Resources required: Sheep can grace on small grains, crop stubble, and weeds. They can be confined in dry lot and fed almost any kind of feed, including some that may be considered low-quality roughage.

Fencing can be existing fences, or electric fences can be erected at low cost. Sheep are relatively easy to restrain and fencing for sheep need not be a major investment.

Facilities such as barns, sheds, pens and feeding equipment are often available on many farmsteads. There is a minimal requirement for these types of assets for small sheep flocks.

Labor for a farm sheep flock should not be excessively competitive with the major crop enterprises. In most instances it is possible to arrange feeding programs and lambing seasons to take advantage of spare time from other business activities.



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



# Sunflowers Valuable Wildlife Food

'Aztec' Maximilian sunrelished by livestock and wildlife, has been released by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. A forb is a herbaceous plant that is not a grass, sedge, or rush.

Charles K. Black, dis-SCS at Rotan, said the new variety was selected for use in range seeding.

"A lot of livestock producers in Texas would like to include seed of a native plant used by livestock and wildlife-especially deer and game birds-in range seeding mixtures," Black said. "But seed for such plants simply are not available.

"But 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower will change that." Black continued. "We anticipate a heavy demand for the seed as soon as it is available."

Black said that commercial seed growers will be planting 'Aztec' in 1979. A small amount of seed should be available for use in range seeding mixtures in 1979 and 1980.

Maximilian sunflower is native to most of the grassland of the Southwest but the plans is so relished by livestock and wildlife that it has been killed out on most rangeland. Seed for the plant has never been grown commercially.

'Aztec' has undergone extensive field testing since 1969; plantings have been made at 55 locations in Texas, 17 in Oklahoma, and at 11 locations in Kansas. The plant has proved to be adapted to most soil types for range

seeding mixtures where flower, a native forb average annual rainfall is 18 inches or more. The plant, however, does not appear to be adapted to wet or saline soils.

The high protein content of Maximilian sunflower makes it especially attractive to deer, cattle, sheep, trict conservationist for horses, and goats. The plant is so palatable that several test plantings have been killed by overgrazing from cattle and deer. Birds

eat the seeds readily and the tall, dense growth provides cover for several species of wildlife.

'Aztec' is being released by SCS in cooperation with the Texas Agriculture **Experiment Station and** the Texas Parks and

Wildlife Department. Foundation seed can be purchased by commercial seed growers from the Foundation Seed Service. Texas A&M University. College Station, Texas

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





Land is in constant change from wind and water erosion, and conservation has to be a daily practice to insure our future generations of a place to live and produce food.

One theory is to figure out how to get it to rain more, and conservation of water would be outmoded. Since rainmakers have a poor batting average in West Texas, water conservation is the surest bet.

Another theory is to turn the Great Plains back into grassland to stop wind erosion, but this theory is certainly not economically feasible. So, again, conservation is the only alternative.

One untested theory is to dam up more creeks in West Texas to increase the humidity to cause more rainfall in return. If there was as much surface water in West Texas as there is in East Texas, the rainfall might also be larger.

Yet, the one theory that needs to be emphasized is that of conservation education. Since Americans are

well-known for their waste and extravagence, conservation education needs to are encouraged to prebe directed to every age register with their County level. Every human being-**Extension Agent.** schoolage children, housewives, farmers, ranchers, industralists, etc.--needs to realize how precious

every drop of water is. When housewives remembers that "running water" used to be to run down to a stream, they will set their washing machines on water levels appropriate for the load. When ranchers become aware that overgrazing and flashfloods can ruin grassland, conservation will be related to cash income. When farmers realize that waste of tailwater in irrigation systems, improper terracing, and minimum tillage are related to loss of water," conservation will become a constant thought. When farmers and ranchers learn that their soil conservationist is their "Soil and Water Doctor", they will become regular patients scheduled with regular checkups and examinations to learn of the many programs offered to them.


