## Rep. Grubbs Introduces New Drivers License Bill

State Rep. Walter Grubbs of the 61st Legislative District, introduced a bill on Friday to put more teeth in the laws in an effort to prevent the recurrence of such trage-
dies as the one which dies as the one which
occured west of Roby on occured west of Roby on
December 8, 1978, which took the lives of five McCaulley school children and injured over twenty other persons, some critically.
The bill introduced by Grubbs, House Bill 1924, would provide that a driver can have his license
suspended after due prosuspended atter due pro-
cess, event though. he cannot be located or fails to appear for a hearing. The change in the present law amounts to allowing the judge to suspend the license after due notice of hearing and after posted thirty-day notice in the newspaper circulated in the city of his address shown on his drivers
license, even if he fails to appear for the hearing. appear for the hearing.
Present law now requests that a person must notify the department of public safety within ten days of his change of address, but this law is not being complied with by habitual violators of the drivers license laws. The difficulty in locating these violators for the purpose of service
