### **Exempt From Laws**

The American people are stupid.

We elect U.S. Senators and U.S. Representatives, send them to Washington and evidently the smell of Cherry tree blossoms and the mystical flow of the Potomac River begins turning their brains to jelly.

They pass all kinds of laws, bills and decrees, raise the taxes, spend taxpayers' money like they were the sons of rich Arab oil tycoon, then have the gall to pass legislation that exempts them from the very laws that they pass.

First Case in Point: A recent headline in a Dallas paper, "Congressmen Seek \$50.00-a-day Deduction". Seems Congress began work on March 28 on legislation that would give members of the house and senate a \$50.00-a-day income tax deduction to help off set the cost

of living in Washington. The bill would cost the government an estimated \$2.5 million a year in lost income tax revenues. This figures out to an average tax reduction of more than \$4,600.00 annually for the 535 members of the house of

representatives and the senate. The measure would increase substantially the \$3,000 tax deduction members of the house and senate have been entitled to claim since 1952 for the cost of maintaining a second home in Washington. A tax deduction reduces the amount of income subject to taxes

and, as a result, reduces taxes owed to the government. Another case in point: In years past Congress passed the following laws, for the general well being of the American public, but saw fit to exempt themselves from compliance with the laws: [a] Nation Labor Relations Act, [b] The Equal Pay Act, [c] The Freedom of Information Act, [d] The Employee Retirement Income Security Act, [e] The Privacy Act, [f] The Equal Employment Opportunity Act, and [g] The Occupational Safety and

Two years ago congress voted its members a \$12,900.00 a year pay raise. Members now receive an annual salary of \$57,500.00. The senate was widely criticized early last month when it decided--without a roll call vote--to delay for four years imposing an \$8,625.00 ceiling on how much outside income senators can receive. The only currentl limit for senators is a \$25,000 annual ceiling on speech fees.

Now, back to the first case in point. A \$50.00-a-day income tax reduction to help off set the cost of living in Washington, I say bologna to that.

They knew what the pay was when they signed up for the job. Besides, I feel reasonably sure that a good percent of the American work force could accept the \$57,500.00 [about \$4,800.00 a month] basic pay-not counting the fringe fees for speaking engagements, etc., and make it just fine.

# **Hospital Board Increases Guarantee To Roby Doctor**

A little over a year ago Dr. V. Carandang was given a \$4,000.00 a month guarantee by the members of the Fisher County Hospital Board, 6 months ago that guarantee was extended for 6 months. Last Monday night, during the Fisher County Hospital Board's regular meeting, that guarantee was increased to \$5,000.00 a month with three board members voting in favor of the increased guarantee, and one casting his vote against the increase. Board members Rudy Martinez, Kirmet Terry and Albert Maberry voted for the increase while Board member Glenn Copeland voted against.

The motion by Terry,

Statements reflects that Dr. Carandang has had professional fees income of \$70,836.00; expenses of \$80,005.00; with cash received of \$55,028.00 while \$15,808.00 remains as accounts receivable. In other action, Admin-

istrator Hunsaker told the board members that he had been confronted on numerous occasions with the statement that "Taxes are going to go up if we build the clinic". In an attempt to review the overall financial picture of the Fisher County Hospital District and Fisher County Clinic. Hunsaker used a chalk board to visually explain to board members the situation. He mentioned declining oil reserves, the provision for depreciation, the chances of obtaining another doctor and having a clinic space available for doctors interested in practicing in Fisher County.

It was also brought out in the meeting by Hunsathat Cleburne Murdoch had corresponded with him and expressed an interest in leasing the pharmacy at the new Fisher County Clinic. Hunsaker made this information available to the board as a matter of information,

no action was taken. In reviewing the financial report for the Fisher County Hospital District, Hunsaker said that for the month of March revenues es listed at \$66 000 for a loss of \$3,714.00. He told board members that for the year the hospital was showing a profit of \$46,000 from operations. Subtracting the pro-rated provision for depreciation of \$27,000 Hunsaker said that the profit still amounted to \$18,822.78.

Hunsaker also reported to the board that he visited with Dr. C.U. Callan and Dr. Bennie LeBleu concerning the possibility of making an attempt to get all of the Fisher County doctors into the new clinic. but said that their reactions were not favorable.

Hunsaker also told the board of a request from Dr. C.M. Callan that thought be given to having an anesthetist available locally for emergencies.

In connection with the item on the agenda concerning discussing the proposed new Fisher County Clinic, Hunsaker told the board that Wadleigh Construction Company expected to have the plans and specifications on the new clinic completed in approximately 10 days to 2 weeks.

The board set the budget hearing for April 30, at 7:30 p.m. with a special board meeting called for the same night at 8:00 p.m.

The board levied the tax rate for 1979. They left the rate of .75 cents per \$100.00 valuation and the assessment amount of 22% the same as it was in

In final action the board discussed possibly changing the drug room at the hospital. Hunsaker said that thought was being given to going to the unit dose system of dispensing pills. No action was taken on the item.

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



This calls for applying fertilizer in the early spring at six to eight week intervals. If "slow release" nitrogen materials are in the fertilizer, use higher application rates to extend the interval between uses.

Each application of fertilizer should supply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen for The amount of fertilizer needed depends on the analysis shown on the bag. For example, 21-0-0 is ammonium sulfate which containes 21 percent nitrogen (N) and no potassium (K) or phosphorus (P). To get the needed 2 pounds of nitrogen, apply 20 pounds of ammonium sulfate (10 x .21=2.1). Use fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in the spring or spring and fall. The P and K levels in soils build up after such fertilizers are used for several years. Therefore, only annual maintenance







Canning is one of the oldest methods of preserv- the recommended tempering food. Proper canning insures safe food by processing food with high heat and protecting it with an airtight seal.

Heat destroys harmful escaping. bacteria and other microorganisms that cause food spoilage.

CANNING METHODS Two processing methods to use in home canning are water bath and steam pressure. The acidity of the food is the chief factor freely around the jars. in determining which method to use.

Steam Pressure Canner For low acid foods such as meat, poultry, fish and vegetables, use a steam ressure canner--a heavy pan with a rack and cover canners. which can be clamped down to make it tight. The cover is fitted with a safety of canning, use only valve which will blow out if the pressure gets too great, a petcock to drive ning. air out and a pressure



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
