

Acorn, Gonzalez Dash To Five Top State Medals

Two Fisher County boys truly had the "Eyes of Texas" on them last Saturday afternoon during the state track meet in Austin.

Fred Acorn of Rotan and Al Gonzalez of Roby had qualified for five events and when the smoke finally settled over Memorial Stadium, they were

the holders of four gold medals and one silver. Acorn had little trouble repeating as the 100 yard dash winner. He ran a Class A record tying time

of 9.5 for his first gold medal. He was pushed in his second event, the 200 meter dash, by Ernest Pennington of Groveton. Acorn won the event in a State Class A record setting time of 20.9. He finished the final high school meet of his career by adding two gold medals to his growing collection.

Roby's Al Gonzalez made more trips to the winner's stand than anyone else at the state meet. In his first event of the afternoon Gonzalez won the 100 yard dash in 9.9, beating second place James Washington of Snook. A few minutes later Gonzalez ran the open 400 meter dash and won in the time of 50.5 for his second gold medal of the day. Later in the afternoon, Gonzales entered the 200 meter dash, his third event of the day, and finished in second place, behind Washington of Snook. Washington ran a 21.8 while Gonzalez finished in second with a 21.9.

Gonzalez rounded out his high school track career by capturing two gold medals and a silver medal at the state meet.

The two Fisher County boys couldn't ask for much better—in five events they took four golds and a silver.

Up until the regional meet, the last week in April, both speedsters had members of their respective teams to practice with after school. After the regional meet, Gonzalez was the lone state qualifier from Roby and Acorn was the only man going to state from Rotan. During the two week period between regional and state, Acorn and Gonzalez worked out together after school in preparation for the state meet.

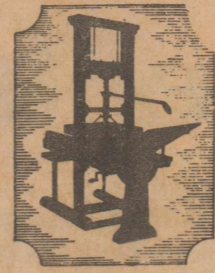
Ribbons will be awarded to the winners. The competitive events will be the 50 yard dash, 100 yard

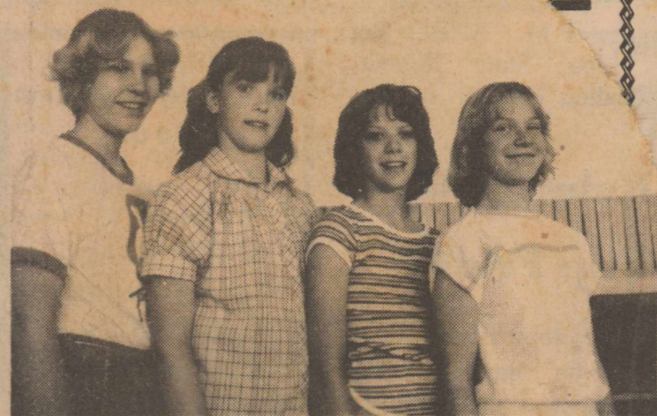

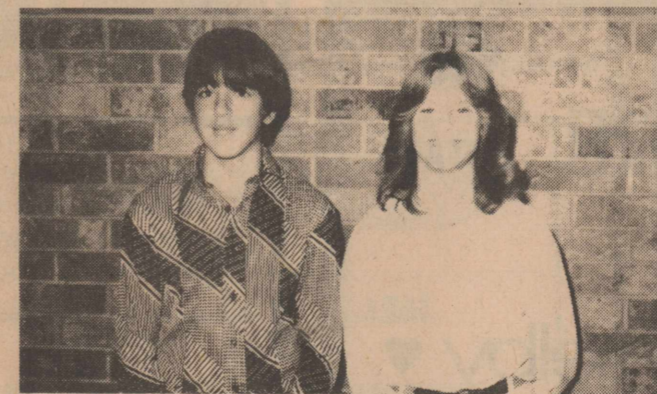

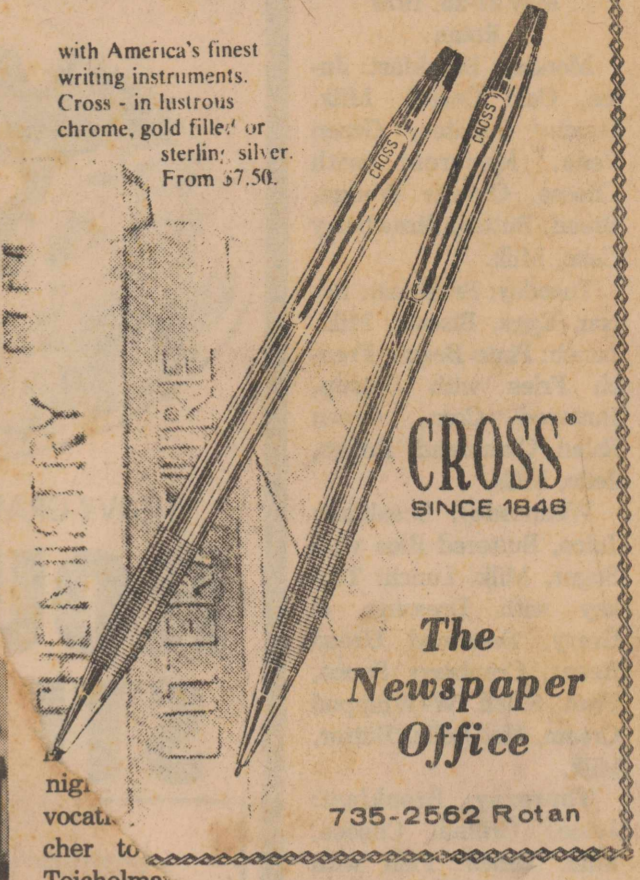

Only Roby's Mary Nell Clayton will be left in Fisher County as a state gold medal winner with the opportunity to make the trip back to Austin next year to defend her title. She has been coached this year by Vikki Schumacher.

We offer our congratulations to all the athletes. To the six seniors we wish them well and to Mary Nell—we'll see you next year at Austin.

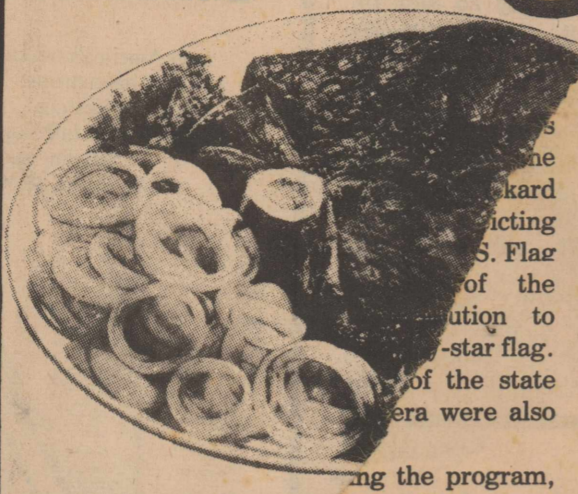

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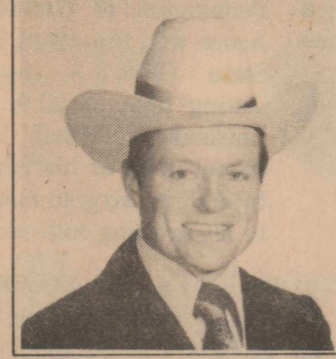

Deadline Nears For Vietnam Veteran Awards Nominations

The mayors of Rotan and Roby are putting on a county-wide search for five Vietnam era veterans that have exemplified outstanding community achievement in order that they can be presented a Presidential certificate during Vietnam Veteran's Week to be observed in Fisher County May 28 through June 3.

Rotan Mayor Lester Sescil and Roby Mayor Carl Matthies are encouraging all Fisher County clubs, organizations, churches and individuals to nominate a veteran now residing in Fisher County that served whether overseas or state side during the period from 1960 until 1975.

The mayors will appoint a county cross-section nominating committee to screen all nominations to narrow the field of applicants to five outstanding community achievement recipients.

In a letter from The White House concerning the recognition certificates, it said "Veterans of the Vietnam Era did not receive the Nation's full gratitude during a long and controversial war, nor after it was over. Further, upon their return to the community, they were often burdened with myths and stereotypes attributed by many to Vietnam veterans—'walking time bomb,' 'drug-addict, anti-patriotic and the like. The purpose of this Presidential recognition program is to bring to the general public's attention the contributions of these veterans to American life. Hopefully this acknowledgement of good citizenship will counteract many of these myths."

The mayors indicated that nominations will be received for the Presidential Awards until Friday, May 18. The selection committee will meet on Monday, May 21, and review all nominations.

As criteria for nominating Fisher County veterans that have served in the military between 1960 and 1975 the following guidelines should be considered: (a) making significant contributions to the community, state or Nation in civic involvement, community projects or human assistance; (2) overcoming obstacles,

whether physical, social or economic, to attain positions they now have; (3) demonstrating personal involvement, such as volunteer service in civic, religious, youth and other activities; (4) helping other veterans through counseling and assistance; (5) demonstrating outstanding character in civilian life through an act of bravery or heroism; (6) representing general excellence or accomplishment in any civic, professional or personal endeavor.

Mayor Sescil and Mayor Matthies have recruited the assistance of Fisher County VFW Commander Austin McKinney in collecting nominations. For six of this week's newspaper.

The nominations must be received by Austin McKinney, 1103 East McArthur, Rotan, Texas, Texas 79546, by Friday, May 18, in order to be reviewed by the selection committee.

Those making nominations should keep in mind

that nominees must be veterans living in Fisher County that have been honorably discharged.

The two mayors will act as co-master of ceremonies at a special recognition banquet on Thursday, May 31, at the Rotan School Cafeteria. The five Vietnam Era Veterans and their immediate families will be honored at the banquet and presented Presidential Citations. The banquet will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The selection committee will meet on Monday afternoon at the Community Room of the Fisher County Courthouse to review the nominees and make the selection of the five residents to be honored.

Names of the five veterans will be announced in the Roby Star Record-Rotan Advance of Thursday, May 24.

A limited number of tickets will be available to the general public to attend the presentation ceremony. Additional information may be obtained by contacting Austin McKinney at 735-2502.

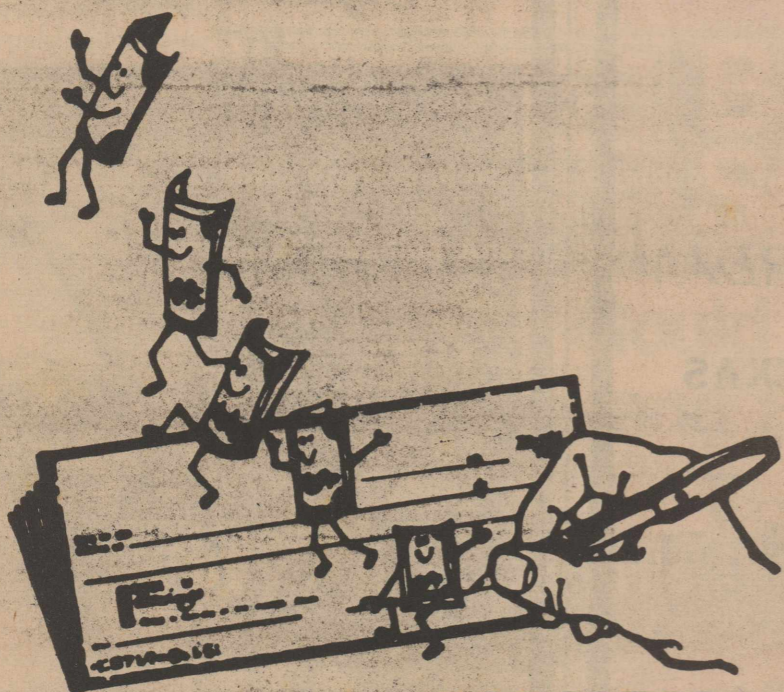

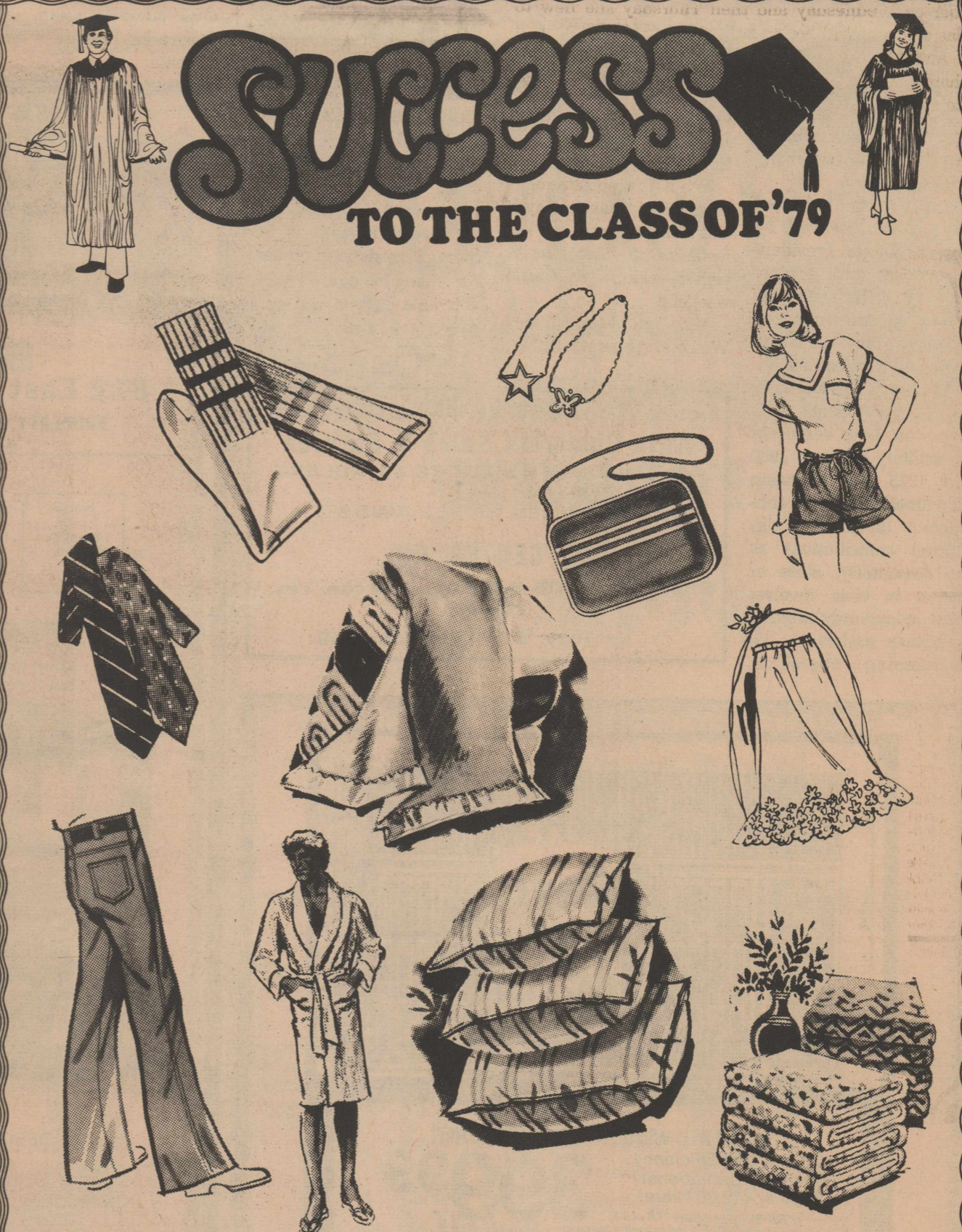

The Fisher-Jones County pest management directors met on Tuesday, May 8, and set prices for the scouting of cotton in the 1979 Fisher-Jones Pest Management Program.

The prices for the 1979 program are as follows and are set on row acre basis and not land acre. The price for solid planted cotton is \$1.75/row acre, 2x1 and 4x1 cotton, \$2.15/row acre, 2x2 cotton, \$2.25/row acre, 2x3 cotton, \$2.35/row acre, 2x4 cotton, \$2.45/row acre and milo \$1.00/acre.

Irrigated cotton will be scouted at a one-third price increase over the

mentioned rates. These crops will be scouted on a weekly basis beginning the first week of June and
