This small town of 1800 population doesn't need a Chief of Police with big city ways. You can't run a mall town on a big city
I am of the opinion that it's time someone took a look at doing away with the Rotan Police Department and putting the responsibility for law enforcement protection in our town with the the Fisher County Sheriff's Department.
I think the people that enforce the laws of our community should be
