



#### WHEN THE BOSS IS AWAY

Many of us get the idea that if we should go on an extended vacation, or otherwise drop out of the daily routine, our business affairs would go to pieces, but that depends upon how well those affairs are organized be-

It is related of Andrew Carnegie that after one of his department heads had been in charge for a year he sent him to Europe for six months. If the department didn't run better while he was away, the department head was fired on his return. Carnegie's theory was that a man who could not organize a department so that it would function in his absence was not fit to be the head of it.

There is a great deal of practical value in this theory, particularly in the case of large enterprises. Where the subordinates feel that they must consult the chief concerning every minor detail they fail to develop the ability to make decisions or assume responsibilities. The chief at the same time keeps himself enmeshed in a mass of petty routine which prevents his giving adequate attention to larger problems.

The president of a famous hotel was recently complimented by a guest upon the excellent manner in which the place was being conducted. It developed that the president had just returned after a vacation of six months. He informed the guest that he had been away, and added:

"Everyone seems to feel that the house has been run better without me, and that even the weather was better than in previous years."

#### ROOSEVELT OPPOSES WAGE CUT

Threat of further slash in rail wages does not seem to fit in very happily with various moves of the government for recovery, and President Roosevelt has made it plain that he is opposed to the idea.

In his letter to leaders of both sides the President reminded them that last June's agreement was reached because of the desire of contracting parties not to embarrass the policies of the administration during the active economic emergency. Despite the unquestioned progress toward recovery, the emergency still exists, says the President.

There will be general hope that the President's opposition to the wage slash will be heeded. Due to the increased cost of living, wages should be higher, not

### CRIME CONTROL DOESN'T END WITH ARREST

Few Americans are apt to quarrel with Attorney General Cummings' plea that broad powers be given the federal government to move against gangsters, kidnapers, racketeers and other criminals, states a writer in the editorial columns of the Wichita Falls Record-News.

The offensive against organized crime, somehow or other, has taken on new life in recent months. A nation that looked on its crime record with more or less complacency for a long time seems at last to be determined to do something about it.

The program suggested by Mr. Cummings probably will meet a sympathetic reception.

But it is worth remembering that such a program, in itself, isn't nearly enough.

We need to broaden our powers to catch criminals, surely; but we need also-and we need it very badlyto do something effective about the problem of handling them after we have caught them.

The best crime detection service in the world can be no stronger, in the last analysis, than the criminal court into which it feeds its product.

And it would take a very great optimist to say that our criminal courts today are anywhere nearly as effective as they ought to be.

The American criminal court is cursed by many things; by archaic rules of procedure, which give the criminal all the breaks; by politically-minded judges, who periodically must run for re-election; by a jury system which too frequently keeps off the panel any man who is aware even moderately of what is going on in the world about him; by a vast horde of unscrupulous attorneys who will stop at nothing to get their clients off, and whose only question, when a case is offered them, is, "How much is there in it?"

If we had the best federal and municipal police systems on earth, we still would come up again this criminal court barrier.

We still would find smart lawyers interposing delay after delay between arrest and trial, until the case against the criminal collapsed of its own weight. We still would find judges granting continuance after continuance to defendants who "had an in."

We still would find the machinery of paroles and suspended sentences being perverted by politicians against the public good. We still would find juries being fixed, witnesses being tampered with, and legal technicalities being used to block the course of justice.

Before we can make real headway in our war on crime, we must overhaul car criminal court system-and the overhauling must be pretty drastic.

The rapid growth of traffic has necessitated the widening of many of our principal highways, but the well known "straight and narrow" still seems able to handle its travelers without congestion.

## ITEMS TO REMEMBER

Nearly every flock of chickens of any size in the vicinity of Haskell has been visited by Fowl Typhoid this winter. The disease resumbles Cholera very much as to color of droppings but if the bird is out open after death or is killed for a postmortem examination a person may be sure of the disease. The liver of the sick bird is many times larger than the ordinary chicken liver. Other symptoms are loss of appetite and loss of weight.



A good cow producing 8,000 dbs. of 4% milk a year will produce enough skim milk for one growing calf, one growing hog, 30 hens, and 320 pounds of butter-fat to sell. Skim milk equals whole milk as

feed for growing calves. Cows should be fed according to the amount of milk they give in addition to the amount required for body maintenance.




