### Amendment Election Here November 6

Fisher County residents will have the opportunity to vote in a "Constitutional Amendment" election set for Tuesday, November 6, at two voting locations in Fisher County. The two polling places

will be at the Rotan Community Center and at the coffee room of the Fisher County Courthouse.

Fisher County residents normally voting in precinct boxes 1, 1a, 4, 4a, 17, 18,

and 22 will vote at the Roby location. Residents normally voting in boxes 6, 10, 12 and 13 will vote at the Rotan location.

Absentee voting on the constitutional amendment election ends on Friday, November 2. Those desiring to vote absentee can vote during normal business hours at the office of the Fisher County Clerk.

Fisher County residents will be voting for 3 amendments (for or against). Amendment No. 1—the constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for

the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law.

Amendment No. 2—the constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rule making by agencies in the executive department.

Amendment No. 3—the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

### Single Copy Price Of Newspaper Going Up

The single copy news stand price of the Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record is being increased from the current 20 cents per copy to 25 cents per copy on Thursday, November 1, according to publisher Kim Pease.

"This move is necessary in order to keep abreast of

the ever increasing hikes in the newspaper supply industry", said Pease.

The cost of classified advertising is also being adjusted on November 1, with the minimum classified charge going from \$2.00 to \$2.50. All classified ads that are billed will increase from \$2.00 to \$3.00.

### County Gins Fire Up

The seven Fisher County cotton gins have baled a total of 2,129 bales of cotton through last Tuesday morning.

The Rotan Gin had a count of 652; Terry Gin in

Roby, 540; Hobbs Gin, 412; Longworth Gin 315; Farmers Gin in Rotan 210, while the Sylvester Gin and Farmers Union Coop Gin in Roby have not yet started ginning.

First prize in the contest will be a \$25.00 savings bond from the Newspaper Office. Numerous other merchants are donating prizes.

going to have to start picking up those dogs that we can and shooting those we can't get near".

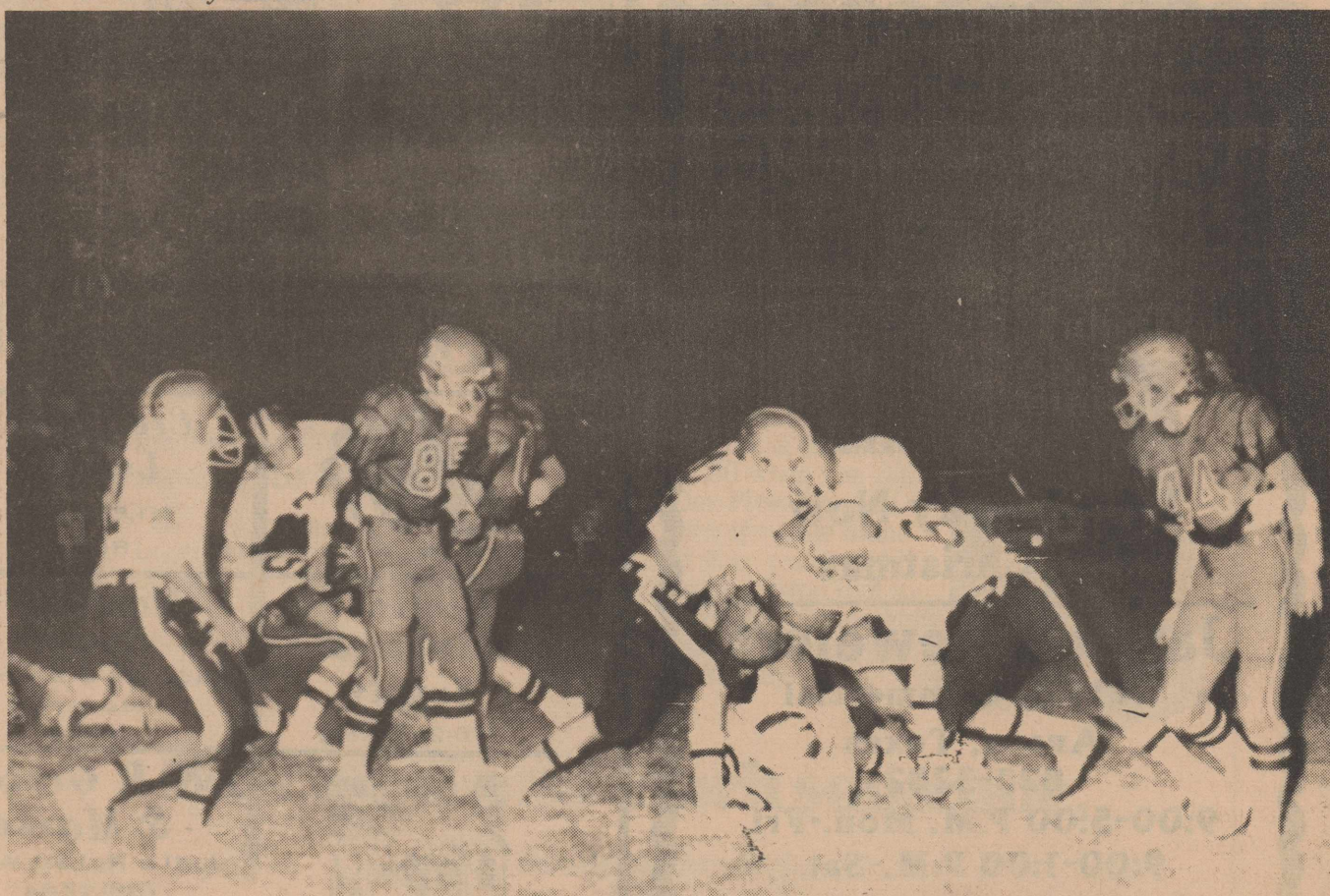
the Rotan City Ordinance requires all dog owners to keep their pets

## Roby Lions Edged In Jayton Game, Greg Jennings Scores

Roby was unable to sustain a 6-0 halftime lead as they fell to Jayton 14-6 in Roby Friday night. Britt Stuart downed the opening kickoff on Jayton's 3 yard line to spearhead a strong defensive game. Shelby Thompson, Mark Pope, Greg Jennings and Gordon Maberry combined forces to hold the Jaybirds to just under 10 yards on the first series. Jayton's quarterback was sacked for big losses three times during

the game by Jennings, Mike McGinns, and Leonard Hernandez. Kevin Rivers, Robbie King, John Morgeson, Terry Owens, Kenny Martin and Damon Shipp stopped Jayton for losses or no gains on several plays. With 4:24 left in the first quarter, Pope drilled a pass to Jennings who took the ball in for the score. The play covered 38 yards. The score remained 6-zip throughout the first

half as both teams moved the ball well but were unable to score. Pope, on one series, ran for 30 yards but penalties moved the Lions back and they were forced to punt.

Jayton began to move early in the second half as Joe McMeans scored from the 1. A pass was good for 2 points and Jayton led 8-6. With 24 seconds left in the 3rd quarter, Jayton scored again on a pass play but the attempt for

extra points was no good.

Roby threatened to score in the closing minutes of the game as Denny Cox zipped down the sideline for a 14 yard gain. Pope rifled a pass to Hernandez for 25 yards but Roby's drive stalled on Jayton's 22 yard line.

Roby faces another strong rival when they travel to Sterling City this week.

Rev. Dennis Schmelzenbach will be speaking at the Rotan Church of the Nazarene October 26, at 7:00 p.m.

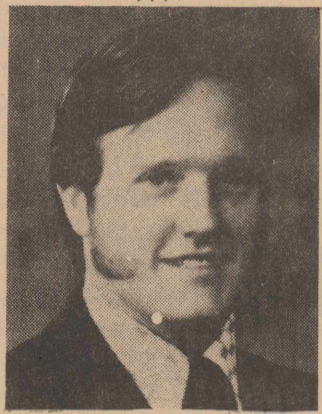

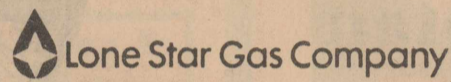

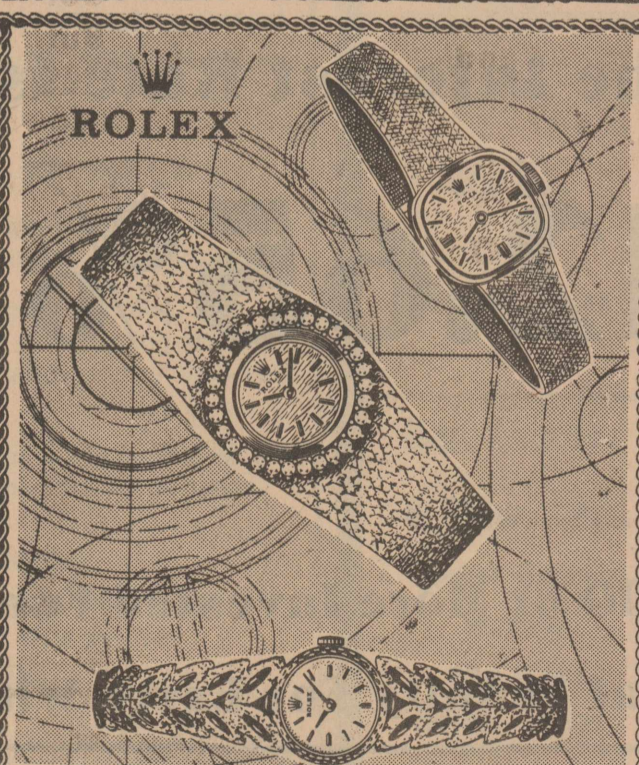

### Cotton Samples Are Gaining In Abilene

Cotton sample receipts are gaining as expected, reports B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Harvesting is beginning in all areas of the Abilene area, and probably have reached a peak in and around the counties of Tom Green and Runnels. During the week ending October 19, 24,000 samples were classed at the Abilene office, bringing the season total to about 35,000.

Local cotton prices were unchanged during the week. Most cotton sold at 9 to 9 1/2 cents over 1979 loan values. Grade 31, Staple 31 cotton miking 35 to 49 sold for about 55 to 56 cents per pound. Cottonseed prices paid producers at gins were mostly 115 dollars per ton. Quality of cotton continued high, being very bright and clean, with

Grade 21 comprising 17 percent of the samples classed. Grade 31 comprised 58 percent and Grade 41 comprised 13 percent. Fiber length showed little change from a week ago with 32 the predominate staple at 49 percent. Other staple lengths were 31 at 35 percent, and 33 at 12 percent.

Mike readings were 88 percent in the 35 to 49 range; and 10 percent in lower ranges. About 2 percent miked in the high ranges above 50. About 5 percent of samples were reduced because of grass content. Fiber strength averaged around 89,000 pounds per square inch breaking strength.

As soon as equipment can be installed, a market information telephone tape that can be called day or night to obtain the latest market information will be available.

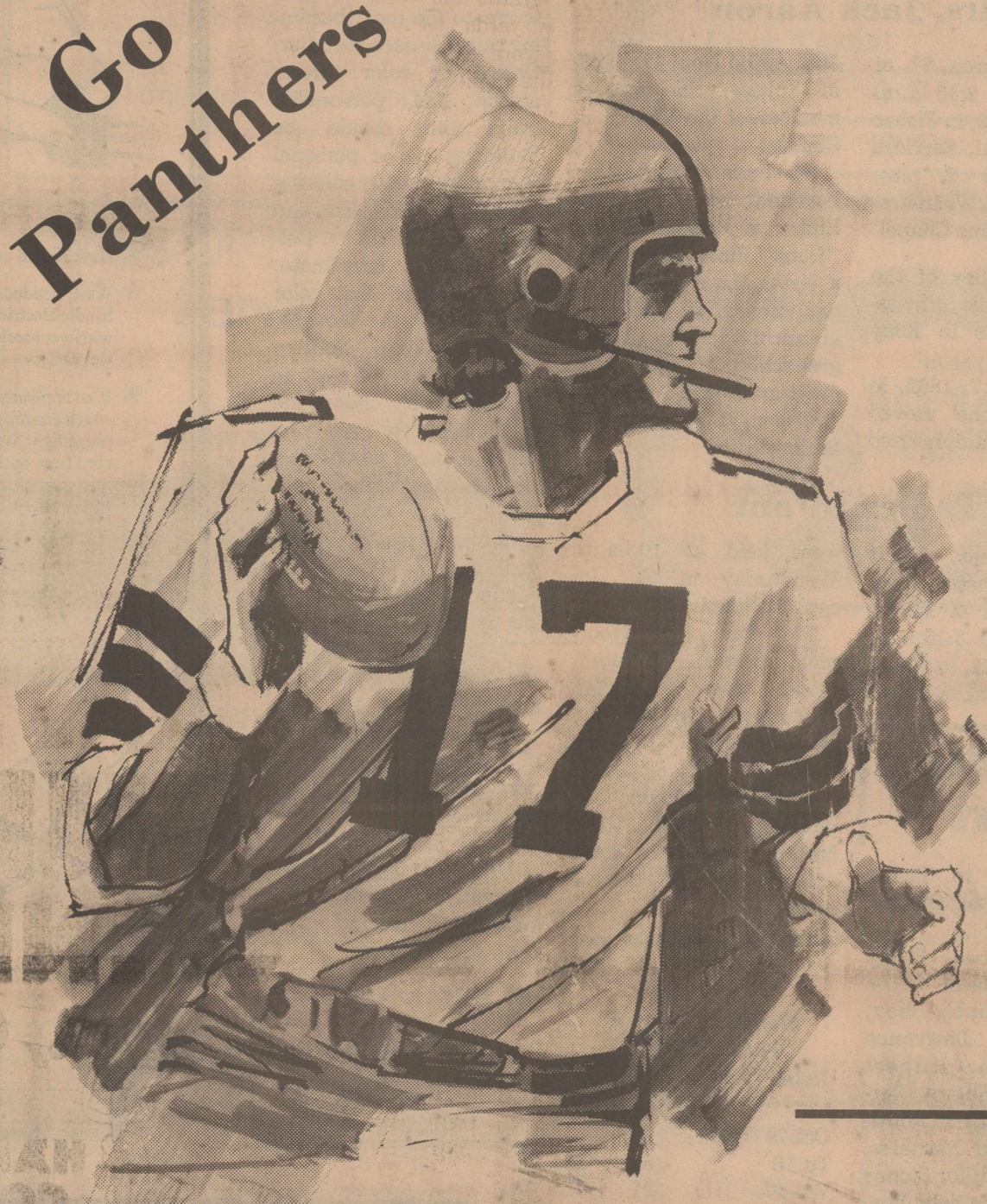

Next meeting will be in the home of Mrs. H.F. Guelker, Nov. 15. The program will be on the art of being an informal person and a Thanksgiving luncheon.

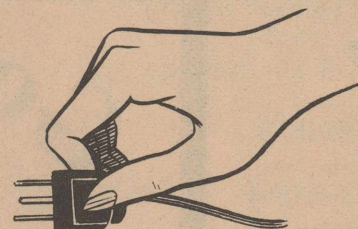

Clay cookware revives in popularity on the home-front. With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and disadvantages.

Advantages: Enthusiasts claim that the self-basting action allows use of less-tender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds in the steam as well as the food juice. In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed—a plus for weight watchers.

Disadvantages: One disadvantage is the pots may stain. Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clean since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware. Also, sudden temperature changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.

Homemakers who use Mexican or imported pot-

tery for similar cooking should consider that such cookware is somewhat different. The glazes often used will affect the water retention and absorbency—and thus the steam effect during cooking.

Also, test the glaze to determine the absence or presence of lead. A simple home test is to fill the cookware half full of vinegar and allow it to stand overnight. If there is any difference in the glaze below the vinegar line, use the dish for non-acid foods only.

Adapting to Microwave:

Adapting this ancient cooking craft to microwave ovens requires few changes. As with many adapted recipes, decrease the amount of liquid by one-fourth. Mixtures cook more evenly if stirred during cooking. Place large food pieces around the outside edges with smaller pieces to the center. Cooking time will be approximate and require some experimentation. Usually, about one-half the conventional cooking time is required for microwave cooking in clay cookware.

the survey, which is being conducted in most major cities in their metropolitan areas, will result in more convenient locations for new Post Office outlets in the future.

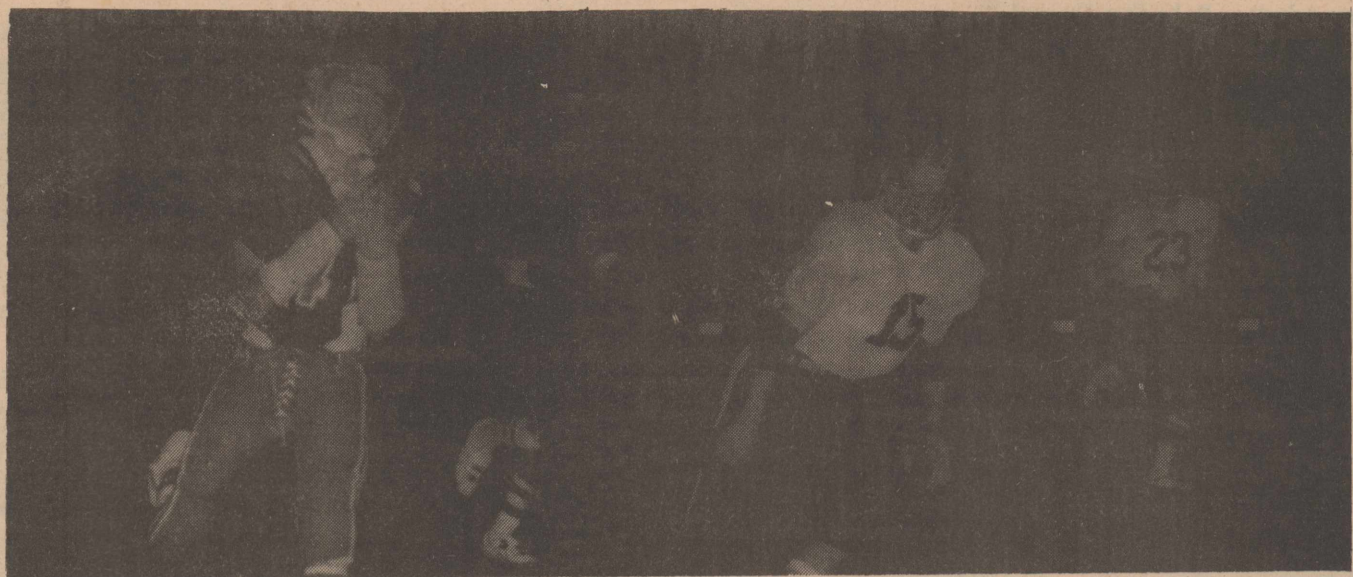
Results from the survey will be computerized. The computer will then analyze the shopping patterns of customers who use postal facilities and project the demand areas for the location of those facilities.
